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Airpark access topic of debate at city council meeting

By ROGER CLINE

A large portion of Tuesday evening's Big Spring City Council meeting was spent discussing possibilities for connecting the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark to the U.S. Highway 87 reliever route which has recently been completed south and west of Big Spring.

At the meeting, City Manager Todd Darden explained to the council that the city has recently been turned down for a U.S. Department of Trans-

portation TIGER grant to build the roads, and requested approval to form a committee to explore the issue fur-After much discussion, the council

voted four to two against formation of the committee, with only Mayor Larry McLellan and Councilman Raul Marquez voting in favor. Councilman Terry McDaniel was absent from the meeting. The most vocal of the

After a one-year hiatus, the hang gliding competition will return to the Big Spring Mc-Mahon-Wrinkle Airport this summer. There will be a practice day on August 4, with competition every day from August 5 through 11.

This year's event is expected to draw about seventy pilots from all over the U.S. and such other countries as Brazil, Canada, Mexico and Puerto Rico. It is part of a series of competitions that will determine the 2018 U.S. National Hang Gliding Champion and is sanctioned by the U.S. Hang Gliding and Paragliding Associa-

happens between noon and 1 PM, depending on the weather. Visitors can see the pilots getting ready and lining up, towing up behind ultralight airplanes, and circling above the airport to get high enough to start. It takes

about an hour to get everyone into the air.

The City proshaded vides bleachers at the McMahon-Wrinkle airport (enter through the terminal). There are restrooms inside the terminal, and there is usually food available for purchase. The airport is on the west side of town, near where Busi-

tivity, which normally ness 20 intersects with Interstate 20.

Trinity Baptist Church is working with numerous

organizations to help find safe and caring homes for local children entering foster care. The meetings also help you learn what it takes

to become a foster family, and how you can help make a change in some of these children's lives. "We're all very passionate

about bringing these services to Howard County," case manager of A World for Children, Yvonne Velazquez said.

Foster care can be a difficult experience for some of the children, and can be even harder if these children are forced to relocate.

"The goal is to keep children that enter foster homes

in their home town and community," Velazquez said. But unfortunately, with the lack of foster parents in Howard County, a majority of children are completely

removed and relocated to entirely different regions of the state. This makes it hard for families to visit or meet with their children, and also makes it more difficult for the children to stay

close to things they are familiar with and love. "Entering foster care can

be hard enough on the children alone, and it won't get any easier being pulled away from friends, family, schools, churches, or other people they care about in their com-

munity," Monica Hull of Wildflower Ministries said. Wildflower Ministries was started by Monica and See CHANGE, Page 3

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

councilmen voting against the committee - Jim DePauw and Raul Benavides – said the committee was unnecessary and would lengthen the time before the roads would be put in place.

"I don't think that's going to be sped up by starting a new committee," DePauw said. "Right now we've got six here that are duly elected by the citizens, and we've had discussion time and time again when we've had seven here that said 'We want something done now, even if it's just making a dirt road. Another committee's not going to help expedite things."

DePauw spoke in favor of putting in a basic road – even a dirt or caliche road – to give traffic a southern access point in and out of the airpark, and then improving it as resources become available.

"Maybe build the road out of crushed base. Maybe look at the prices of that, so that you've got a crushed base road and then, as time goes on, we can sealcoat that road, work it, sealcoat it, and go as the business develops," he said. "I think you're going to want to see what's the demand on that roadway. How fast is that thing going to develop? And then, if vou've got businesses along there that are generating sales tax for the city, let's just say we're going to dedicate that sales tax to the development of these roads."

Benavides agreed.

"I think we need to find a way for the Airpark to fund this," he said. "Whether it's some form of certificate of obligation, finding some way for it to carry that debt, that's one way. If that's what you want this committee to look at – finding ways for the Airpark to fund itself - great, let's do it. But I think we're very limited on the number of choices we

Current rules narrowly restrict what money raised by the Airpark through oil wells on its property can be used for. Roads connecting the Airpark to outside roads are not located on Airpark property, so the current ruling is that Airpark funds cannot be used to develop them.

Planning for the project has identified three "phases" of construction: Phase I includes a proposed route extending east from the intersection with Stallings Road; Phase II includes a route that circles around the north side of the airport where it ties into the Business 20 loop; and Phase III includes a route that continues through the existing Airpark on Airpark Drive and First Avenue that would extend to the south and connect to the reliever route. Several council members requested that the order of the phases be shuffled to put the current Phase III - connection of the southern part of the Airpark to the reliever route via the Martha May entrance - first, due to a desire to create truck access to the southern part of the Airpark and relieve truck traffic and wear-and-tear on the Airpark's northern primary entrance.

"Looking at this Phase I, Phase II, Phase III order that you have, we have spent so much money on rail on the east and southeast part of that Airpark, why is the Martha May entrance Phase III?" wondered Benavides. "I'd like to move that order around. We've spent so much money over there."

Councilman Howard Stewart expressed similar sentiments.

"From what we're hearing, Phase III should probably be Phase I," said Stewart. "Get it part of the city. I think we have renters wanting to move in and probably even help us with the road down the way."

In other business, the council:

• Voted to restrict \$750,800 of the General Fund balance toward purchase of radios for law enforcement in the 2018-19 fiscal year. The measure was approved five to one, with Councilman Doug Hartman dissenting.

 Awarded bids on two half-ton pickup trucks for the Sanitation Department to Cavender Chevrolet in Boerne, Texas, for \$21,957.34 per truck, or a total of \$43,914.68.

 Awarded a bid on 164 yard and a half dumpsters to Rolloffs USA of Durant, Okla... for \$431.24 each, for a total of \$70,722.72.

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Houston-based Kinder Morgan announces \$2B pipeline project

HOUSTON (AP) — Kinder (KIN'-der) Morgan Texas Pipeline has announced a \$2 billion project to transport natural gas from the Permian Basin.

The Permian Highway Pipeline project was announced Monday by the unit of Houston-based Kinder Morgan Inc. Partners include Midlandbased EagleClaw Midstream Ventures and the Apache Corporation, an oil and gas producer with headquarters in Houston.

Backers say the pipeline would be built to transport up to 2 billion cubic feet (56633693 cubic meters) per day of natural gas through approximately 430 miles (692 kilometers) of pipeline from West Texas to the Houston and Corpus Christi areas, plus Mexico markets.

The new pipeline is expected to be in service by late 2020.

Houston man recruited by IS gets 18-month prison term

Immigrant supporters demand parents' release, protest Trump

LOS ANGELES Immigrant-rights vocates asked a federal judge to order the release of parents separated from their children at the border, as dozens of demonstrators decrying the Trump administration's migration crackdown were arrested Tuesday at a rally ahead of a Los Angeles appearance by Attorney General Jeff

The court action was brought by the Los Angeles-based pro bono law firm Public Counsel on behalf of three Central American mothers whose children were taken from them by U.S. authorities in May.

More than 2,000 children in all have been separated from their parents and placed in A clergy member is arrested during a civil disobedience protest government-contracted shelters in recent 26, 2018. weeks under a now-

abandoned Trump administration policy toward families caught illegally crossing the border. Public Counsel demanded that the parents be released and immediately reunited with their children.

"These parents are terrified for their children and want nothing more than to ensure the scarring that this experience has already caused does not continue to inflict irreparable harm," Judy London, a Public Counsel attorney, said in a state-

The Justice Department declined to comment. Amid an international outcry over the children's treatment, President Donald Trump last week an-

nounced an end to the practice of separating immigrant families.

The Trump administration has instead asked the federal court in Los Angeles to let authorities detain families together for an extended period during immigration proceedings. Under a 1997 court settlement, children must be released from detention as quickly as possible.

Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar said Tuesday that his department still has custody of 2,047 immigrant children separated from their parents at the border. That is only six fewer children than the number in HHS custody as of last Wednesday.

On Tuesday, police arrested 25 demonstrators outside the U.S. attorney's office in downtown Los Angeles. Sessions was scheduled to address the conservative Criminal Justice Legal Foundation at a hotel later in the day.

Protesters carried signs reading, "Free the children!" and "Stop caging families." Clergy members blocked the street by forming a human chain while chanting, "Kids belong at home, not in cages." They were calmly handcuffed by police and led away.

"They told us on no uncertain terms they wanted to be arrested," said Deputy Police Chief Robert Arcos. "It was their desire to be arrested, it certainly wasn't ours."

High court rules against Calif. crisis pregnancy center law

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court effectively put an end Tuesday to a California law that forces antiabortion crisis pregnancy centers to provide information about abortion.

The 5-4 ruling also casts doubts on similar laws in Hawaii and Illinois.

The California law took effect in 2016. It requires centers that are licensed by the state to tell clients about the availability of contraception, abortion and pre-natal care, at little or no cost. Centers that are unlicensed were required to post a sign that said so. The court struck down that portion of the law.

The centers said they were singled out and forced to deliver a message with which they disagreed. California said the law was needed to let poor women know all their options.

Justice Clarence Thomas in his ma-

jority opinion said the centers "are likely to succeed" in their constitutional challenge to the portion of the law involving licensed centers. That means that while the law is currently in effect, its challengers can go back to court to get an order halting its enforcement. An attorney for the challengers said Tuesday that they expect to be able to do that quickly.

"California cannot co-opt the licensed facilities to deliver its message for it," Thomas wrote for himself and his conservative colleagues, Chief Justice John Roberts and Justices Anthony Kennedy, Samuel Alito and Neil Gorsuch. He called the requirement for unlicensed centers "unjustified and unduly burdensome."

Justice Stephen Breyer said among the reasons the law should be upheld is that the high court has previously upheld state laws requiring doctors to

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Protests in Iran as Rouhani says US wants 'economic war

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Angry protesters in Iran's capital held a third day of demonstrations on Tuesday over the country's anemic economy as President Hassan Rouhani told the nation that it faces an "economic war" with the United States following America's pullout from the nuclear deal.

While online videos showed demonstrators again confronting police on Tehran's streets and alleyways, the protests looked far smaller than those on Monday, when security forces fired tear gas on crowds in front of parlia-

Earlier on Monday, demonstrators forced the temporary

closure of Tehran's Grand Bazaar and on Sunday, protests forced two major shopping centers for mobile phones and electronics to close in Tehran.

Rage persists over the plunging of the Iranian rial to 90,000 to the dollar — double the government rate of 42,000 rials to \$1 — as people watch their savings dwindle and shopkeepers hold onto some goods, uncertain of their true

Part of the economic uncertainty comes from President Donald Trump's decision to pull America out of the nuclear deal and re-impose sanctions on Iran, even though other world powers have pledged to stand by the ac-

Similar economic protests roiled Iran and spread to some 75 cities and towns at the end of last year, becoming the largest demonstrations in the country since the months-long rallies following the 2009 disputed presidential election. The protests in late December and early January saw at least 25 people killed and nearly 5,000 arrested, but took place largely in Iran's provinces rather than in the capital, Tehran.

These latest protests have hit Iranian commercial areas, including the sprawling. historic warrens of Tehran's Grand Bazaar, the home of conservative merchants who backed the country's 1979 Islamic Revolution and overthrow of Shah Mohammad

Reza Pahlavi. It remains unclear who is leading these protests, though analysts say hard-liners wanting to challenge Rouhani likely sparked the demonstrations at the end of last year.

On Tuesday, witnesses described a noticeable presence of riot police on the capital's streets. Official reports and comments also were slim in Iran's state-controlled media, though Prosecutor Abbas Jafari Dolatabadi said the "main provocateurs" of Monday's protests were arrested. He did not elaborate on the number of people detained.

The state-run IRNA news agency euphemistically referred to one incident Tuesday in which the city's metro line was temporarily shut down near the Grand Bazaar, saying it happened "because of some people gathered there."

On Tuesday morning, Rouhani addressed a meeting of judges that included the head of the coungovernment, cratic Rouhani struck a hard line himself against America.

"We are fighting against the United States, it wants to make an economic war," the president said. "The U.S. cannot defeat our nation; our enemies are not able to force us to their knees."

That's a far cry from the optimism shared by Rouhani and other Iranians when the 2015 nuclear deal was enacted between Iran and six world powers, including America. Iran agreed to limit its enrichment of uranium in exchange for the lifting of economic sanctions.

But that deal came under Barack Obama's administration. Trump, who campaigned on a promise of leader to take a more tearing up the deal, pulled mane" look at Iran.

America out of the deal in May. The ensuing turmoil has seen international firms and oil companies back away from their own billion-dollar deals with Iran.

Rouhani's own power within Iran's government appears to be waning, with some openly calling for military officials to lead the country.

Iran also has suggested it could immediately ramp up its production of uranium in response to the U.S. pullout, potentially escalating the very situation the nuclear deal sought to avoid — having an Iran with a stockpile of highly enriched uranium that it could use to build atomic bombs.

Tehran has long denied wanting to build nuclear weapons, despite fears from the West and the United Nations.

Parliament Speaker Ali

Larijani, speaking at the same event as Rouhani, appeared to directly criticize his administration. "The government hasn't done enough to confront the

economic problems," the conservative politician said, according to the semi-official ISNA news agency. Meanwhile, a senior State

Department official said the Trump administration is pushing U.S. allies to completely eliminate their oil imports from Iran by November.

The official also said the U.S. is working with other Middle East countries to increase production so the global oil supply is not harmed. The official wasn't authorized to be identified by name and briefed reporters on condition of anonymity.

Also Tuesday, Iran's former hard-line President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad urged Trump in an open letter published on his website, mehremardom.ir, to change his approach to Iran, stressing that Trump's "violent methods" only target the Iranian people.

He also urged for "honest talks" between the two nations, which Ahmadinejad said would be of interest to both. The former Iranian president had sent his first letter to Trump in February 2017, appealing on the U.S.

tell women seeking abortions about adoption services. "After all, the law must be evenhanded," Breyer said in a dissenting opinion joined by his liberal colleagues, Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Sonia Sotomayor and Elena Kagan.

Attorney General Jeff Sessions and anti-abortion groups were among those cheering the decision. The Trump administration had argued that California's law violates the rights of licensed centers but had no objection to the requirement for the unlicensed centers. "Speakers should not be forced by their government to promote a message with which they disagree, and pro-life pregnancy centers in California should not be forced to advertise abortion and undermine the very reason they exist," Sessions said in a statement Tuesday.

California Attorney General Xavier Becerra

called the decision "unfortunate" but said "our work to ensure that Californians receive accurate information about their healthcare options will continue."

The abortion-rights group NARAL Pro-Choice California was a prime sponsor of the California law. NARAL contends that the centers mislead women about their options and tried to pressure them to forgo abortion. Estimates of the number of crisis pregnancy centers in the U.S. run from 2,500 to more than 4,000, compared with fewer than 1,500 abortion providers, women's rights groups said in a Supreme Court filing.

NARAL president Ilyse Hogue said in a statement after Tuesday's decision that the Supreme Court had "turned its back on women and condoned the deceptive tactics used by fake women's health cen-

California's law was challenged by the National Institute of Family and Life Advocates, an organization with ties to 1,500 pregnancy centers nationwide and 140 in California. The group was represented at the Supreme Court by Alliance Defending Freedom, a Christian law firm. NIFLA president Thomas Glessner applauded the court's decision Tuesday. He called the decision "monumental" and said it was a "great day for pro-life pregnancy centers" and for free speech.

Other cities and states have also passed laws related to crisis pregnancy centers. In 2014, A federal appeals court in New York struck down parts of a New York City ordinance, although it upheld the requirement for unlicensed centers to say that they lack a license.

Other states have laws that regulate doctors' speech in the abortion context. In Louisiana, Texas and Wisconsin, doctors must display a sonogram and describe the fetus to most pregnant women considering an abortion, according to the Guttmacher Institute, which supports abortion rights. Similar laws have been blocked in Kentucky, North Carolina and Oklahoma.

Morton, Marisnick power Astros over Blue Jays 7-0

HOUSTON — The normally stoic Charlie Morton actually cracked a smile after he was reminded that his stellar outing gave him 10 wins for just the third time in his 11-year career.

However, the Houston righthander was quick to point out that he wouldn't have such success without help from his teammates, a fact that was on display on Tuesday.

Morton (10-1) struck out 13 in seven innings, Jake Marisnick hit a three-run homer in the eighth after preserving the shutout with a big defensive play in the sixth as the Astros got a 7-0 win over the Toronto Blue Jays.

He scattered four hits and walked two for his third straight win to become Houston's first 10-game winner.

"I didn't even think about that," he said of reaching 10 wins for the second straight year. "Yeah, that's a lot. That's good. Honestly the wins, that's a team thing. I give most of the credit to the guys in there."

Toronto manager John Gibbons raved about Morton.

"Morton is in a class of his own," he said. "He's in an elite group now. He wasn't giving us much."

Evan Gattis put Houston up with a two-run single in the fifth. Marisnick padded the lead with his shot to left field with one out in the eighth and Alex Bregman, who tied a career-high with four hits, added

a two-run homer with two outs in the inning for his second straight game with a home run.

Marisnick's homer came after he dazzled on defense two innings earlier. Teoscar Hernandez singled with two outs in the sixth before Yangervis Solarte drew a walk. Marisnick then robbed Justin Smoak of extra bases when he leaped and bounced off the wall in left-center to grab his fly ball.

"It's a close game and everything that was on the line with that play ... the game is completely different if he doesn't make that catch," manager A.J. Hinch said.

Marisnick, who routinely makes tough catches, said that it was definitely in the top-5 in his career and joked about jumping significantly higher than left fielder Josh Reddick on the play.

"I'm going to get a poster made of that with Reddick a little bit lower than me," he said.

Toronto's Ryan Borucki (0-1) had a solid start in his major league debut, allowing six hits and two runs while walking four with three strikeouts in six innings.

"I thought he was fantastic against a great hitting ballclub," Gibbons said. "They put the pressure on him, and he didn't cave."

Chris Devenski struck out one in the eighth and Hector Rondon allowed one hit in the AP photo ninth to give Houston its sev-

LeBron's loyalty could push him to re-sign with Cavs

CLEVELAND (AP) — LeBron James sprung to his feet and screamed along with thousands of delirious Cleveland

When Indians outfielder Rajai Davis connected off Chicago Cubs reliever Aroldis Chapman for a tying home run in the eighth inning of Game 7 of the 2016 World Series, James came unglued and reacted the way he might after a monstrous dunk or back-breaking 3-pointer in the NBA Finals.

And while his fanatical response said a lot about James and his allegiance to the Indians, so did the tight, black Tshirt he wore on that unseasonably warm November night.

It said: "Cleveland Or Nowhere.'

As the sports world waits

to see where the three-time champion intends to play next season and beyond, there remains the real possibility that James could choose to stay in Cleveland, his hoops home for 11 of the past 15 years and where this Northeast Ohio son shares a unique and profound

connection with fans who have followed him since his teens.

James has other options: Los Angeles (salary-cap space for another star, Magic Johnson in charge), Houston (a chance to play on a super team with MVP James Harden), Philadelphia (young stars Ben Simmons and Joel Embiid), and maybe more.

But, as has always been the case for James, home will pull at his heart.

For the longest time, the perception was that once James ended Cleveland's 52-year title drought in 2016, he would leave again as soon as he could. That doesn't seem to be a slam dunk any longer.

By Friday, James is expected to make his first move and likely decline a \$35.6 million contract option for next season with the Cavs, who are hoping their past loyalties to the 33-year-old and his own sentimental attachments — family, legacy — will keep him in Cleveland.

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

This Date In History

Today is Wednesday, June 27, the 178th day of 2018. There are 187 days left in the year. Todav's Highlight in History: On June 27, 1846, New York and Boston were linked by telegraph wires.

On this date:

In 1787, English historian Edward Gibbon completed work on his six-volume work, "The History of the Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire." In 1844, Mormon leader Joseph

Smith and his brother, Hyrum, were killed by a mob in Carthage, In 1905, the Industrial Workers

of the World was founded in Chicago. In 1922, the first Newberry

Medal, recognizing excellence in children's literature, was awarded to "The Story of Mankind" by Hendrik Willem van Loon. In 1944, during World War II, American forces liberated the French port of Cherbourg from the Germans. In 1957, Hurricane Audrey

slammed into coastal Louisiana and Texas as a Category 4 storm; the official death toll from the storm was placed at 390, although a variety of state, federal and local sources have estimated the number of fatalities at between 400 and 600. In 1966, the Gothic soap opera "Dark Shadows" premiered on ABC-TV.

In 1974, President Richard Nixon opened an official visit to the Soviet Union.

In 1985, the legendary Route

66, which originally stretched from Chicago to Santa Monica, California, passed into history as officials decertified the road. In 1988, at least 56 people were killed when a commuter train ran into a stationary train at the Gare de Lyon terminal in Paris. In 1988, Mike Tyson retained the undisputed heavyweight crown as he knocked out Michael Spinks 91 seconds into the first round of a championship fight in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

In 1990, NASA announced that a flaw in the orbiting Hubble Space Telescope was preventing the instrument from achieving optimum focus. (The problem was traced to a mirror that had not been ground to exact specifications; corrective optics were later installed to fix the problem.)

In 1991, Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, the first black jurist to sit on the nation's highest court, announced his retirement. (His departure led to the contentious nomination of Clarence Thomas to succeed

Ten years ago: North Korea

destroyed the most visible symbol of its nuclear weapons program, the cooling tower at its main atomic reactor at Yongbyon. (However, North Korea announced in September 2008 that it was restoring its nuclear facilities.) In Zimbabwe, roaming bands of government supporters heckled, harassed or threatened people into voting in a runoff election in which President Robert Mugabe (moo-GAH'-bay) was the only candidate. Five years ago: The Senate passed, 68-32, comprehensive legislation offering the hope of citizenship to millions of immigrants living illegally in America's shadows; however, the measure became stalled in the GOP-led House. President Barack Obama visited Senegal, where he urged African leaders to extend equal rights to gays and lesbians but was bluntly rebuked by Senegal's president, Macky Sall, who said his country "still isn't ready" to decriminalize homosexuality. 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
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

A falsecard need not be flagrant to be successful. Sometimes, the play of a seemingly insignificant spot card can be enough to lead the opposition astray.

Consider this deal from a French tournament. North-South did well to reach the good club slam after East's opening pre-empt, and West led the diamond king. East overtook the king with the ace and returned the dia-

mond queen, South ruffing high. Declarer's only problem was what

to do with his J-10 of spades. Many options were open to him, but the simplest and best approach appeared to be to try to establish dummy's hearts by cashing the K-A and ruffing a heart. If the outstanding hearts divided 3-3, as in the actual deal, or if the queen fell doubleton, his problems would immediately be over. Even if the hearts divided 4-2 and the queen did not fall, other chances would remain.

So at trick three, South cashed the ace of trumps, planning next to draw a second round before tackling the heart suit. But this was where East found the subtle play that diverted South from the winning course. Instead of routinely following low on the ace of clubs, East dropped the

This falsecard had a telling effect on declarer, who reasoned that East would not have dropped the eight unless it was his only club. Surely, South thought, East would have retained the eight if he could, hoping for a possible overruff of dummy.

Declarer therefore abandoned his plan to establish hearts in favor of ruffing two spades in dummy with the 9-7 of clubs. But when South led a spade to the king and returned a spade toward his hand, East produced the six of clubs to sink the seemingly unsinkable slam.



He's letting agent Rich Paul and his other representatives handle the business side of things as he vacations with family and makes up his mind.

Months ago, James' connection with the Cavs seemed broken, hopeless. Last summer's shocking trade of All-Star Kyrie Irving, the team's failed attempt to integrate guard Isaiah Thomas, a lack of playmakers, assorted injuries and coach Tyronn Lue's medical issues contributed to James appearing ready to pull up stakes again and pursue championships elsewhere.

But a funny thing happened on the way to the

James was boosted by general manager Koby Altman's drastic-and-dramatic roster overhaul at the trading deadline, and despite a lack of cohesion and Vegas odds makers labeling the Cavs as underdogs, Cleveland advanced to a fourth straight summer showdown with Golden State, surviving two Game 7s and sweeping the top-seeded Toronto Raptors along the way.

Of course, James did all the heavy lifting. He played in all 82 regular-season games and had perhaps his best postseason, averaging 34 points, 9.1 rebounds and 9.0 assists while making a pair of buzzer-beating shots and doing all he could in a Finals sweep that could have been much different if Cleveland had not lost Game 1 in overtime.

"He gave his heart and soul, die-hard energy, commitment to this team, to this franchise, to the city, to Northeast Ohio," Altman said last week after the Cavs drafted Alabama guard Collin Sexton, who quickly raised some eyebrows by choosing to wear No. 2, Irving's number for six seasons with Cleveland. "It was an historical year and probably one of the best postseason runs of all time. We're very, very fortunate to have him here and what he gave to this franchise this year was nothing short of remarkable.

"We don't take that for granted at all."

And it's why the Cavs haven't surrendered from the fight to keep him.

Owner Dan Gilbert, whose relationship with James remains tricky if not rocky, has displayed a willingness to spend whatever's necessary to keep his team championship competitive. That's unlikely to change whether James extends his second stint with Cleveland.

In a recent Business Insider podcast, Gilbert referred to James as a "partner," an acknowledgment by the billionaire to what the superstar he once criticized means to his franchise.

The appeal for James to stay home is different now than it was eight years ago when he bolted for Miami. He's more mature, with three children and a burgeoning business empire. His priorities, responsibilities and goals are different.

After the Warriors finished their Finals sweep of the Cavs, James revealed an injured right hand but an unchanged view of the next phase of his career.

"I will still continue to be in championship mode," he said. "When I decide what I'm going to do with my future, my family and the folks that have been with me for the last 20 years will have a say-so. Then it ultimately will come down to me."
