"Spectators can even track the racers by their Flymaster Trackers from mobile devices or laptops," Boulter said.

This year is the 16th Big Spring National Hang Gliding series, which was the site of the 2007 World Hang Gliding Championship won by Attila Bertok from Hungary, who will be making a return to Big Spring. Gliders from all around the globe gather and take to the sky for a serious strategic race through various waypoints of the challenge, battling the elements, or using them for their advantage to finish out the race.

This year's event is expected to draw about seventy pilots from all over the U.S. and such other countries as Brazil, Canada, Mexico and Puerto Rico. It is part of a series of competitions that will determine the 2018 U.S. National Hang Gliding Champion and is sanctioned by the U.S. Hang Gliding and Paragliding Association.

"Airport manager, Jim Little, and the airport staff make an extremely safe family-friendly environment to watch as the race goes on. It really is an incredible sport, and the flyers love the welcome they receive here in Big Spring," Boulter said.

This is a big event for West Texas hang-glider pilots and also for people that enjoy the races. There is plenty of parking and room for everyone to gather with bleachers or shade canopies, and the event is approaching quickly.

Check-in and practice will take place August 4. The series begins August 5 and will carry on through the 11. Detaining immigrant kids is now a billion-dollar industry

SAN ANTONIO — Detaining immigrant children has morphed into a surging industry in the U.S. that now reaps \$1 billion annually — a tenfold increase over the past decade, an Associated Press analysis finds.

Health and Human Services grants for shelters, foster care and other child welfare services for detained unaccompanied and separated children soared from \$74.5 million in 2007 to \$958 million in 2017. The agency is also reviewing a new round of proposals amid a growing effort by the White House to keep immigrant children in government custody.

Currently, more than 11,800 children, from a few months old to 17, are housed in nearly 90 facilities in 15 states — Arizona, California, Connecticut, Florida, Illinois, Kansas, Maryland, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Texas, Virginia and Washington.

They are being held while their parents await immigration proceedings or, if the children arrived unaccompanied, are reviewed for possible asylum themselves.

In May, the agency issued requests for bids for five projects that could total more than \$500 million for beds, foster and therapeutic care, and "secure care," which means employing guards. More contracts are expected to come up for bids in October.

HHS spokesman Kenneth Wolfe said the agency will award bids "based on the number of beds needed to provide appropriate care for minors in the program."

The agency's current facilities include locations for what the Trump administration calls "tender age" children, typically under 5. Three shelters in Texas have been designated for toddlers and infants. Others — including in tents in Tornillo, Texas, and a tent-and-building temporary

shelter in Homestead, Florida — are housing older teens.

Over the past decade, by far the largest recipients of taxpayer money have been Southwest Key and Baptist Child & Family Services, AP's analysis shows. From 2008 to date, Southwest Key has received \$1.39 billion in grant funding to operate shelters; Baptist Child & Family Services has received \$942 million.

A Texas-based organization called International Educational Services also was a big recipient, landing more than \$72 million in the last fiscal year before folding amid a series of complaints about the conditions in its shelters.

The recipients of the money run the gamut from nonprofits, religious organizations and for-profit entities. The organizations originally concentrated on housing and detaining at-risk youth, but shifted their focus to immigrants when tens of thousands of Central American children started arriving at the U.S.-Mexico border in recent years.

They are essentially government contractors for the Health and Human Services Department — the federal agency that administers the program keeping immigrant children in custody. Organizations like Southwest Key insist that the children are well cared for and that the vast sums of money they receive are necessary to house, transport, educate and provide medical care for thousands of children while complying with government regulations and court orders.

The recent uproar surrounding separated families at the border has placed the locations at the center of the controversy. A former Walmart in Texas is now a Southwest Key facility that's believed to be the

biggest child immigrant facility in the country, and First Lady Melania Trump visited another Southwest Key location in Phoenix.

Advocates on both sides of the aisle criticize the growing number of kids housed in government shelters, but they have different reasons — and they blame each other.

"You can't put a child in a prison. You cannot. It's immoral," said Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand, a New York Democrat who has been visiting shelters.

Gillibrand said the shelters will continue to expand because no system is in place to reunite families separated at the border. "These are real concerns that the administration has not thought through at all," she said.

But President Donald Trump says cracking down on immigration ultimately can lead to spending less money and having fewer immigrants in government custody.

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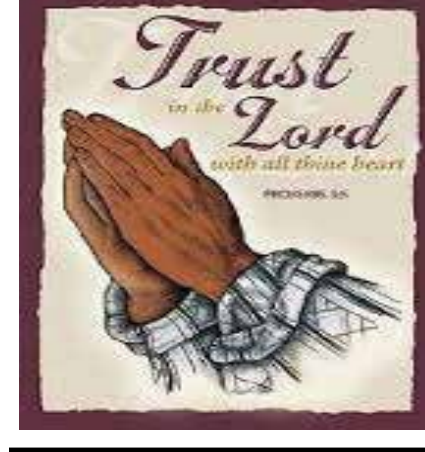

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Preview Of Glory

Jesus had just begun to explain what was going to happen to him. Peter had fought him on the idea that Jesus would suffer and be killed. Jesus let Peter know that this was God's plan that he should die and be raised on the third day.

About a week later, Jesus takes three of the Apostles with him up on a mountain. Here they are given a private preview of the coming exaltation and glorification of Jesus. We will look at Matthew's recording of the event from Matthew 17:1-8, *And after six days Jesus took with him Peter and James, and John his brother, and led them up a high mountain by themselves.*

And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became white as light. And behold, there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him. And Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, it is good that we are here. If you wish, I will make three tents here, one for you and one for Moses and one for Elijah." He was still speaking when, behold, a bright cloud overshadowed them, and a voice from the cloud said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him." When the disciples heard this, they fell on their faces and were terrified.

But Jesus came and touched them, saying, "Rise, and have no fear." And when they lifted up their eyes, they saw no one but Jesus only (ESV).

There is so much that could be brought out from this passage. I would like to focus on the preview they received of Jesus' glorified state. I try to imagine what all had been going through the minds of the disciples, especially Peter, over those previous six days. Why does he have to die? What will happen to our movement? What will happen to me?

I also try to imagine what could have been going through the minds of Peter, James, and John as they witnessed this awesome event. They see Moses, the great law-giver. There is Elijah, one of the mightiest of all God's prophets in Israel's history. And Jesus, the one whom they had confessed as God's Anointed only a few days before. What an amazing sight! How do you honor these heroes in your midst? Peter was going to try his best - good ol' Peter.

But God intervenes and lets them know that as great as Moses and Elijah were, Jesus is the one that is to be listened to now. He is now the greatest law-giver. He is the preeminent prophet and spokesman for heaven. He will also be crowned King of kings and Lord of lords and everyone must listen to and obey him.

And one of the things we anticipate as Christians

is that we will be just like Jesus when this life is over and we are glorified with him for all eternity! The Apostle Paul refers to our new bodies in 1 Corinthians 15:51-53, *Behold! I tell you a mystery. We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed. For this perishable body must put on the imperishable, and this mortal body must put on immortality (ESV).*

Paul also refers to our glorification in Philippians 3:20-21, *But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our lowly body to be like his glorious body, by the power that enables him even to subject all things to himself (ESV).*

If you want to be like Jesus when he returns, then you have to live like Jesus while you await his return! There are many voices in the world telling us many different things. Which ones are you listening to? Remember, God said, "This is my beloved Son, listen to him."

Reflections 1: Rescued

For the last two weeks the World Cup has been upstaged by a 12 boy soccer team trapped along with their coach in a cave in Thailand. The situation was desperate. A 2.5 mile labyrinth largely submerged under flood waters separated them from freedom. It looked hopeless.

But a multinational task force united by courage and determination succeeded in saving them all, each one led through dark waters by their guides. One Thai Navy Seal lost his life setting up the complicated system of oxygen tanks to enable their rescue.

On Tuesday, July 10, the last of the boys and their coach were brought to safety. The entire world celebrated.

It was a refreshing and heroic story in a world where human life often appears cheap. It served as a reminder of the precious value of every individual. Like those boys trapped in a cave, every person of every nationality is important, every man, every woman, rich and poor, of every race, every refugee in every country, every life is precious.

It echoed the teachings of Jesus in which He repeatedly urged us to treasure everyone with whom we come in contact. In the story of the Good Samaritan He instructed us to be neighbor to others by going out of our way, to put ourselves at risk, to bind up their wounds and care for their recovery. (Luke 10:25-37).

This is the way God sees us. He loves us, each and every one. He searches for us to rescue us. Like a shepherd who leaves his 99 sheep that are safely home to seek for the one that is lost, God searches for us and celebrates when we are found. (Luke 15:1-7).

Like these courageous men who put their own lives on the line for these

boys, God put His own son's life on the line for us.

Even more so, God sent His son to rescue us trapped in a world dominated by evil, knowing His Son must suffer and die that we might be rescued.

As the Bible says, "My beloved friends, let us continue to love each other since love comes from God. Everyone who loves is born of God and experiences a relationship with God. The person who refuses to love doesn't know the first thing about God, because God is love—so you can't know him if you don't love.

This is how God showed his love for us: God sent his only Son into the world so we might live through him. This is the kind of love we are talking about—not that we once upon a time loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as a sacrifice to clear away our sins and the damage they've done to our relationship with God." (1 John 4:7-10 The Message).

In a world increasingly sown with suspicion and distrust, where racial and economic divisions are rearing their ugly heads, we have all been lifted by the demonstrations of love, sacrifice, determination and joy in Thailand where twelve boys, one-by-one have been rescued by courageous men from many countries working together.

Reflections 2: Trees

We recently visited the house where we lived 42 years ago. There were no trees then, only six foot saplings recently planted on what had been flat farmland. Those saplings have grown to mighty oaks and maple. Their limbs stretch from curb to curb forming shaded arbors. They have transformed the landscape.

I have always been struck by the beauty of trees: majestic pecans, towering oaks and whispering pines of Texas, the blue spruce, crab apple and maple of Minnesota, the cottonwood and quaking aspen of Colorado.

Trees are majestic, mysterious and essential to our existence on earth. They sprout from tiny seeds that can be held in the hand. They send their roots deep beneath the earth and extend their limbs to the sky as if in prayer, transforming soil and light into substance. They bear the snow of winter and explode with blossoms in spring. They whisper in a gentle breeze and howl when the storm whips their branches. Their life-giving leaves filter the air to produce the oxygen that we breathe.

They give shelter to the birds that build their nests, perch among their leaves and sing their songs. Forests form the homes and habitat for wildlife. For thousands of years the trees have provided the wood with which we build our homes, fashion our furniture, warm ourselves in winter and produce the paper to preserve our written records. They feed both man and beast with their nuts and fruit.

Trees remind us of those who have gone before, those who planted them and those who lived among them. We sit in their shade in summer as our

mothers and fathers sat in an earlier day. The oldest trees date back more than two millennia. The "Arbol del Tul," a Montezuma Cypress in Mexico has the widest trunk on earth and may be 3,000 years old. Some of the olive trees in Gethsemane are at least 900 years old and likely descended from the very trees that shadowed Jesus when he prayed.

The "Cotton Tree" in Sierra Leone marks the place where freed slaves gathered beneath its branches to give thanks for their freedom in 1792. "General Sherman," the Giant Sequoia, one of the largest trees on earth is believed to be between 2,300 and 2,700 years old. The 500 year old "Treaty Oak" in Austin, Texas was once the sacred meeting place for Comanche and Tonkawa Indians. Stephen F. Austin met with them beneath its branches to form the first peace treaty for his colony.

The redemptive story of the Bible begins and ends with trees. It starts with the "Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil" in Genesis and ends with the "Tree of Life" in Revelation. Psalm 96 proclaims, "Let the field exult, and all that is in it. Then all the trees of the forest will sing for joy before the Lord, for He is coming!"

In the fullness of time God chose a tree in the form of the Cross to accomplish our redemption. The Bible says, "Christ redeemed us from the curse of the Law, having become a curse for us—for it is written, "Cursed is everyone who hangs on a tree"—in order that in Christ Jesus the blessing of Abraham might come to the Gentiles." (Galatians 3:13-14).

Trees remind us of God's goodness and grace by which he created the beauty of the earth and redeemed us for his glory.

I didn't always please my daddy, and I don't always please my Lord, but one of these days the Rapture will happen, the gathering together of His children to Heaven, and sweet communion will be ours for all eternity.

I can't even imagine what the fishing will be like up there. I can't even imagine when I wake up in Glory to the sights I shall behold and experience up there. But the Scripture says, I will be like Him. I will know even as I am known. I will be sinless, perfectly fit for this beautiful place, Jesus is preparing for me to be with Him throughout all eternity. I can't even imagine, and I can hardly wait.

When my mother would enter the same room, I knew it was her by the singing, or the smell of her lilac perfume. I think her favorite was lilac, because now when I smell a lilac bush or see one from afar, I am reminded of her essence.

I wonder what kind of essence I portray to the people around me. I wonder if it is sweet or not so sweet. I hope they think of me as a Godly character, not as someone so judgmental that I strike fear and trembling in their hearts.

When the disciples experienced the essence of the Resurrected Jesus in the room after His death and watching Him be buried in Joseph's tomb, I wonder if He still smelled of the frankincense and myrrh he was anointed with at His graveside. Or did He carry the essence of the sweet perfume of Heaven? Did He carry from Heaven the incense of the prayers of His saints as He entered the upper chamber where His disciples trembled in fear of earthly authority?

When Jesus Christ risen from the dead, entered that upper room, Scripture declares He was hungry, He was wounded in His hands, feet, and side, and I wonder if He was maybe a general open mess of wounds from the cruel crucifixion that hadn't had time to heal. I do know the disciples knew

Him. They had seen Him die, had put Him in a tomb, and two of them had even gone to check and see if the women's tale was true. They knew Him.

He told Thomas, "...blessed are those who have not seen me, yet believe." That's me!!! I have seen Him in my heart of hearts. I can feel the essence of my Saviour as He still forgives my sin. I can know Him in belief because of the promises He shows me that I can claim in His Word.

But something more happens when I come into His Presence, be it in Church, or in the company of other believers, or in those who ask me to pray for them over some sin or need in their lives. 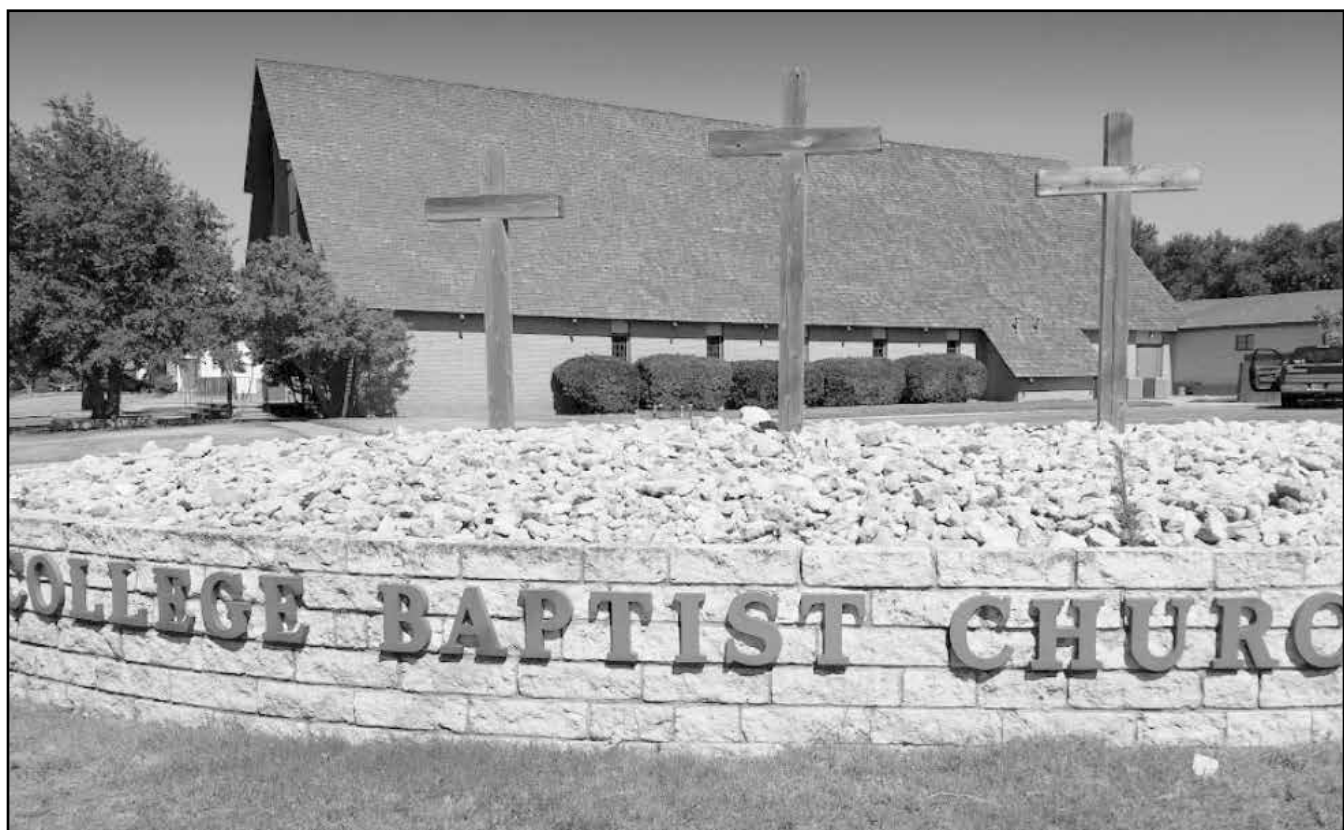

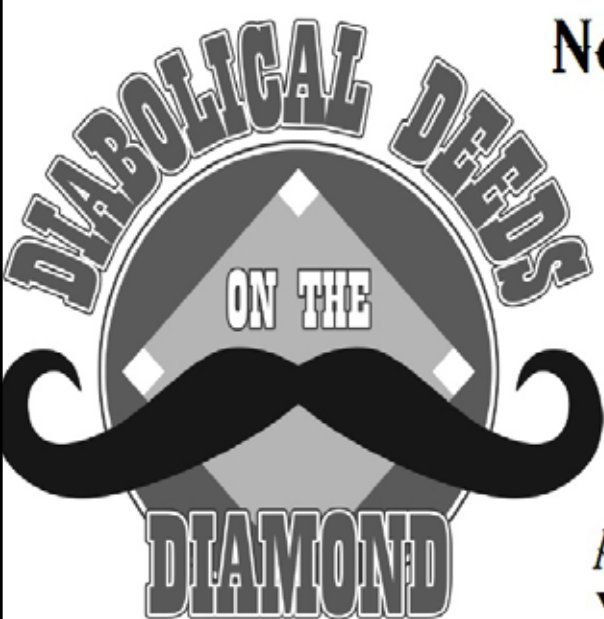
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Red Sox rolling, Thor returns, Bay Area battle

Mookie Betts and the rolling Boston Red Sox try to win their 11th consecutive game when they host Toronto again at Fenway Park. Betts, who leads the majors with a .352 batting average, had a grand slam and five RBIs in Thursday night's 6-4 victory. Boston owns the longest current winning streak in the big leagues and hasn't lost since getting routed July 1 at Yankee Stadium. At 66-29, the major league-leading Red Sox are 37 games over .500 for the first time since 1949. Rick Porcello (11-3, 3.58 ERA) starts for Boston against rookie left-hander Ryan Borucki (0-1, 2.25).

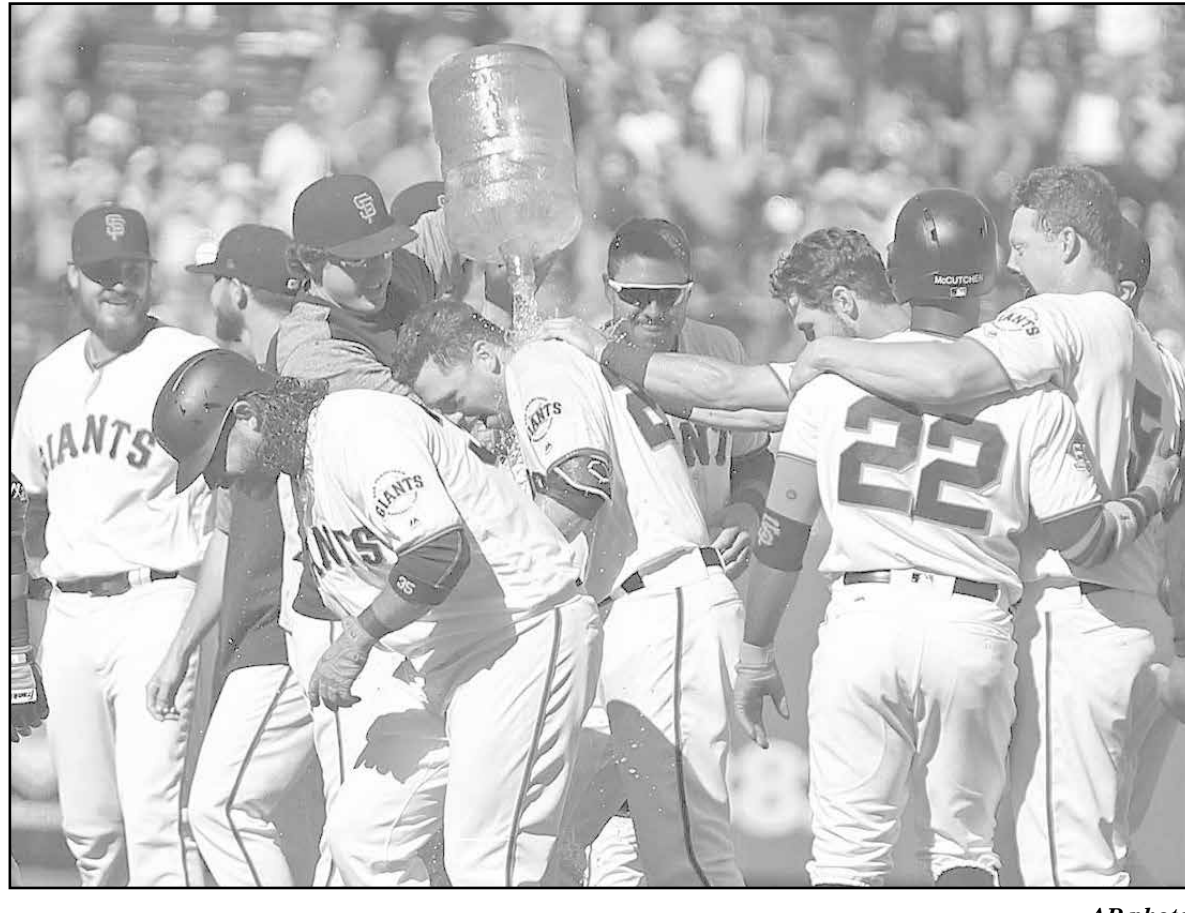
BACK IN BUSINESS

ANAHEIM, Calif.— On a night when Albert Pujols moved up the career home run ladder, rookie teammate David Fletcher grabbed onto the bottom rung.

Pujols hit two home runs to tie Ken Griffey Jr. for sixth place with 630, and Fletcher connected for his first in the majors as the Los Angeles Angels romped to an 11-2 victory

over the Seattle Mariners on Thursday.

Pujols rarely talks about personal achievements. But matching Griffey, a former Mariners star, had him feeling an extra sense of pride.

"Griffey was everybody's hero growing up and that's how I look at it," Pujols said. "I know I am a right-handed hitter, but everybody wanted to have that sweet swing. For me, I got a chance to become

pretty good friends with him. ... It's just really special to tie a legend and against a team that he came up with in the big leagues."

Justin Upton also homered for the Angels, who took two of three in the series. Tyler Skaggs pitched six strong innings in his return from the disabled list.

10 months after baby, Serena competes in Wimbledon final vs. Kerber

LONDON — Serena Williams has been saying it over and over and over: Wimbledon is only her fourth tournament since returning to the tour after having a baby.

"Every time I go out there, I want to, I guess, take a giant step forward," she said. "Keep taking giant steps, but keep improving."

Williams played a total of seven matches in 2018 before arriving at the All England Club, and she'll be playing her seventh match in the last two weeks when she meets 11th-seeded Angelique Kerber of Germany in the Wimbledon final on Saturday.

Certainly didn't take long for the 36-year-old American to get her gear in and close in on what would be an

eighth Wimbledon title, one short of Martina Navratilova's record, and 24th Grand Slam trophy in all, equaling Margaret Court's all-time mark.

It was only 10 1/2 months ago that Williams had far more serious concerns.

After giving birth to her daughter, Olympia, on Sept. 1, Williams dealt with health complications that included blood clots and led to what she said were multiple operations.

"Almost didn't make it, to be honest," Williams said shortly after completing her 6-2, 6-4 semifinal victory over 13th-seeded Julia Goerges on Thursday.

She's been wearing compression leggings during her matches as a precaution and says she remains nervous.

"I mean, even this week, I had a pain in my leg, and I

went to the worst-case scenario: 'Oh, my God, I have a (pulmonary embolism) in my leg,'" Williams said. "I didn't know I would have such, kind of, traumatic thoughts. Especially now that I have a daughter, I want to be around as long as I can to support her. It's interesting how that mental recovery is actually taking much longer than I ever expected."

The tennis? That's come quite naturally, not surprisingly. She was off the tour for more than a year after her Australian Open title in January 2017 — won while she was pregnant, she later revealed. Williams first came back by playing doubles with her older sister, Venus, for the U.S. Fed Cup team in February.

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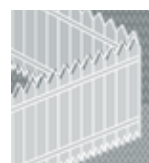
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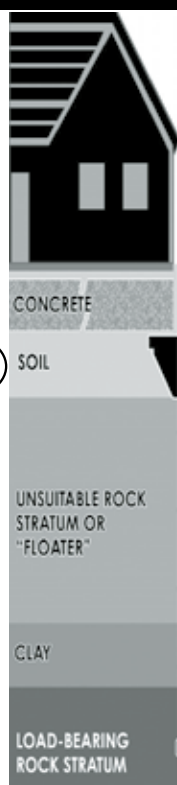

1. Superficially, it might seem to make no difference whether you cover the diamond with the king or not. But to make sure of the contract, you should duck the queen.

It is certainly reasonable to assume that South has the ace, and once this is granted, the contract is cold if you let North's queen hold the first trick. The problem with the king play is that South will win with the ace and return a diamond, allowing North to win and shift to a heart. If it turns out that South has both the king and jack of hearts, you will eventually lose two hearts and two diamonds and go down one.

But if you duck the first diamond, you're safe against any attack. If

North continues the suit, you can win any return by South, play the A-K of clubs and ruff a club in dummy, draw trumps and then lead a heart to the ten. Even if South wins with the jack, you score the rest of the tricks against any return.

Alternatively, if North shifts to a heart at trick two, you rise with the ace, draw trumps, play the A-K and ruff a club, then lead the king of diamonds. South wins with the ace, but whatever he returns you lose only two diamonds and a heart.

2. The only threat to the contract is if North has the king of spades and more than four hearts, since with any other distribution you can't lose more than four tricks after trying the spade finesse. You start by assuming that North's seven is his fourth-best heart, which means he may have led from K-Q-8-7-x, K-10-8-7-x or Q-10-8-7-x. (With K-Q-10-7-x, he normally would lead the king.)

The best way of dealing with these three possibilities is to go up with the ace at trick one. This approach fails in the first case, but succeeds in the other two cases (even if the spade finesse loses) by blocking the defenders' hearts whenever South started with K-x or Q-x. Ducking the opener's heart lead in these two cases would allow South to win and return a heart, unblocking the suit and defeating the contract if North has the king of spades.

This Date In History

Today is Friday, July 13, the 194th day of 2018. There are 171 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 13, 1960, John F. Kennedy won the Democratic presidential nomination on the first ballot at his party's convention in Los Angeles, outdrawing rivals including Lyndon B. Johnson, Stuart Symington and Adlai Stevenson.

On this date:

In 1787, the Congress of the Confederation adopted the Northwest Ordinance, which established a government in the Northwest Territory, an area corresponding to the eastern half of the present-day Midwest.

In 1793, French revolutionary writer Jean-Paul Marat was stabbed to death in his bath by Charlotte Corday, who was executed four days later.

In 1863, deadly rioting against the Civil War military draft erupted in New York City. (The insurrection was put down three days later.)

In 1923, a sign consisting of 50-foot-tall letters spelling out "HOLLYWOODLAND" was dedicated in the Hollywood Hills to promote a subdivision (the last four letters were removed in 1949).

In 1939, Frank Sinatra made his first commercial recording, "From the Bottom of My Heart" and "Melancholy Mood," with Harry James and his Orchestra for the Brunswick label.

In 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson nominated Thurgood Marshall to be U.S. Solicitor General; Marshall became the first black jurist appointed to the post. (Two years later, Johnson nominated Marshall to the U.S. Supreme Court.)

In 1972, George McGovern received the Democratic presidential nomination at the party's convention in Miami Beach.

In 1977, a blackout hit New York City in the mid-evening as lightning strikes on electrical equipment caused power to fail; widespread looting broke out. (The electricity was restored about 25 hours later.)

In 1978, Lee Iacocca was fired as president of Ford Motor Co. by chairman Henry Ford II.

BASEBALL

MIAMI — The Miami Marlins have suspended their business relationship with Papa John's after the company's chairman of the board apologized for using a racial slur and resigned.

In a statement Thursday, the Marlins said "derogatory and insensitive comments" by John Schnatter weren't reflective of the values of the baseball franchise.

Papa John's announced late Wednesday that Schnatter had resigned. Forbes said Schnatter used the N-word during a media training exercise in May.

A Marlins promotion with Papa John's had offered discounted pizza.

PRO FOOTBALL

ATLANTA — Police reports show officers responded to several nonviolent disputes at the home where Buffalo Bills star LeSean McCoy was attempting to evict his former girlfriend before an unidentified man bloodied the 34-year-old woman in a home invasion.

Police responded early Tuesday to a report of a violent attack at a home in Milton, Georgia, just outside Atlanta. A lawyer for Delicia Cordon says Cordon was hurt when a man tried to take bracelets from her wrist and hit her in the face with a gun.

McCoy had twice initiated eviction proceedings against Cordon, last month and in July 2017.

Reports released Thursday said officers responded to domestic disputes at the home on July 3, 2017, and April 11 this year. No violence was reported either time.

Police also responded last month when Cordon called from Virginia to stop people from removing items from the house.

PRO BASKETBALL

OAKLAND, Calif. — Free agent forward Jonas Jerebko has signed with the two-time defending champion Golden State Warriors.

The Warriors announced the deal and planned to formally introduce Jerebko on Monday.

A native of Sweden, Jerebko has played nine NBA seasons with Utah, Boston and Detroit. In 32 post-season games — four starts — for the Jazz and Celt-



ics, he has averaged 4.0 points and 3.1 rebounds.

Golden State had already added center DeMarcus Cousins in free agency and re-signed two-time reigning finals MVP Kevin Durant and forward/center Kevon Looney after winning a second straight title and third in four years. Centers Jarell Martin and Zaza Pachulia (Pistons) have departed.

GOLF

GULLANE, Scotland — Phil Mickelson says he wishes he could take back the moment when he swatted a moving golf ball at the U.S. Open. He says all he can do now is try to act a little better.

Mickelson spoke after opening with an even-

par 70 in the Scottish Open.

He has apologized previously for his actions on the Saturday in the U.S. Open, where he ran after a putt and hit it back toward the hole as it was rolling off the 13th green at Shinnecock Hills. Mickelson was penalized two shots and later said he did it on purpose.

Mickelson says he has done plenty of "dumb stuff" in his career. He says whatever backlash he suffers from other players and fans is his own fault.

HOCKEY

CHICAGO — The Chicago Blackhawks traded Marian Hossa and Vinny Hinostroza to the Arizona Coyotes, parting with a promising young forward in order to clear out a troublesome contract.

The Blackhawks also sent defenseman Jordan Oesterle and a third-round pick in the 2019 draft to the Coyotes for forwards Marcus Kruger, MacKenzie Entwistle and Jordan Maletta, defenseman Andrew Campbell and a fifth-round pick in next year's draft. Kruger was drafted by Chicago and spent his first seven seasons with the Blackhawks before he was traded to Vegas

last July.

The 39-year-old Hossa did not play last season because of severe side effects from medication to treat a progressive skin disorder. He isn't expected to play again, but he is signed through the 2020-21 season at a \$5.275 million cap hit.

Then came her singles return, at Indiana Wells in March, when she won her first two matches before losing to her sibling.

Next was a first-round loss at Miami.

"I honestly felt I would have done better in some of the earlier tournaments. That was the hardest part — accepting that I didn't," Williams said. "I know that sounds weird, but I worked out a lot and I worked hard."

Following another two months away from competition, she entered the French Open in late May, and won three

matches before pulling out before the fourth round because of an injured pectoral muscle.

Williams rested some after that, not practicing serving at all for a couple of weeks, and was able to ease into things once Wimbledon began because of a draw that allowed her to avoid playing any seeded opponents — or anyone ranked inside the top 50, for that matter — until Goerges, who was making her Grand Slam semifinal debut.

Now will come the sternest on-court test Williams has faced: Kerber, a former No. 1 and two-time major champion with a lefty stroke and never-give-up-on-a-ball defense.

Williams is 23-6 in

Grand Slam finals, and Kerber is responsible for handing her one of those rare defeats, at the 2016 Australian Open. Kerber also won that year's U.S. Open, replacing Williams atop the WTA rankings right afterward. That was also the year that Kerber reached the Wimbledon final, losing to Williams in straight sets.

They've played each other a total of eight times in the past, and Williams leads 6-2.

After winning her semifinal against Jelena Ostapenko 6-3, 6-3, Kerber was asked what she sees across the net when she goes up against Williams.

"I see a champion," Kerber said, "that's for sure."
