Back to school Sales Tax Holiday scheduled Aug. 10-12

The first day of school at all Howard County public schools is August 20, and the State of Texas is continuing an annual tradition by holding a tax-free weekend on many items kids need as they head back to school.

The 2018 Sales Tax Holiday is scheduled Friday, Aug. 10, through Sunday, Aug. 12, statewide. State sales tax is 6.25 percent; the city of Big Spring typically tacks on an additional 2 percent, Coahoma adds 1.5 percent, and Forsan adds 1 percent. None of that sales clothes and supplies for their children as they return to school.

> "It just takes a little financial pressure off of families as they prepare for the beginning of school," said BSISD Assistant Super-

intendent George Bancroft. "All parents, they typically buy some new clothes and school supplies. It's not something you budget for monthly, it's an annual expense. So it's nice of the state to provide a little bit of relief from that burden."

In most cases, shoppers don't need to give the merchant any type of coupon or certificate to buy qualifying items tax free. An exception to this rule is for people buying items using a business

It is also a good idea to stop by the front office of the school your student will be attending before their meet the teacher day to verify your address, and to ensure that your child has indeed been placed in a class. When doing this, please bring your driver's license or state issued ID and a utility bill.

Bredesen, Blackburn win primaries in race for US Senate

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Former Tennessee Democratic Gov. Phil Bredesen and Republican U.S. Rep. Marsha Blackburn have been running their campaigns for a critical U.S. Senate seat like their matchup was assured. Voters made it official Thursday.

Bredesen and Blackburn disposed of minimal opposition in their primary elections, kicking off what's expected to a bruising, expensive fight that could determine Democrats' chances of overturning the 51-49 Republican Senate majority.

Polls have indicated a close contest to replace retiring Republican Sen. Bob Corker.

A general election win would be historic for Blackburn, who would become the first female U.S. senator ever elected in Tennessee.

Voters faced a more competitive field in the race for the nomination to replace term-limited Republican Gov. Bill Haslam.

Former Nashville Mayor Karl Dean won the Democratic primary, defeating state House Minority Leader Craig Fitzhugh after outspending him \$4.4 million to \$984,800.

Taking a page from Bredesen's playbook, Dean has touted himself as a leader who can break down partisan barriers and make divided government work during divisive political times. He told his supporters Thursday he intended to run a positive race focused on jobs, affordable health care and good education.

Businessman Bill Lee won a bruising GOP primary. He mostly stayed out of the fray while other opponents savaged each other in attack ads. Lee billed himself as the race's only conservative outsider and emphasized his Christian faith. "I am someone who is not a politician, but I do have a vision for Tennessee to lead the nation," Lee told supporters during his victorv speech.

The field also included U.S.

Rep. Diane Black, who began the campaign as the favorite and got the endorsement of Vice President Mike Pence but stumbled to a third-place finish.

No Democrat has won statewide here since Bredesen was reelected governor in 2006, when he clinched all 95 counties. It's been an even longer drought in the Senate, with the last Democratic victor former Vice President Al Gore in 1990.

Bredesen, who remains popular, would again need to peel off support from moderate Republicans and independents. He is pledging to work across party lines, saying he will support Trump on policies that are good for the state, and oppose him when they aren't.

He thanked his supporters Thursday night and vowed to be "the best damn senator you ever sent up to Washington."

Blackburn is a strong Trump backer in a state that voted for the president by 26 percentage points in 2016. She has run in support of Trump's agenda, including his wall-building immigration crackdown and his U.S. Supreme Court pick, Brett Kavanaugh.

"We know what Tennesseans say that they want to see in their next senator is somebody who is going to stand with President Trump to finish the agenda that they voted for when they elected him and sent him to Washington," she told her supporters, some of whom were wearing Tshirts emblazoned "Marsha Marsha Marsha."

Blackburn has billed herself as a "hardcore, card-carrying Tennessee conservative" from the outset of her campaign. She has benefited from center-stage appearances alongside Trump and Pence in public events and

fundraisers in Tennessee.

Pence and Trump have already attacked Bredesen, saying he's too liberal for Tennessee and would fall in line with Democratic Minority Leader Chuck Schumer.

Bredesen has countered that his record as governor shows he's an independent thinker who won't cave to party leaders.

Bredesen has criticized Trump's tariff policies, which threaten an estimated \$1.4 billion in Tennessee exports, according to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, a longtime Republican ally. The exports are linked to more than 850,000 jobs in the state related to farming, steel, baked goods, car manufacturing, whiskey distillers like Jack Daniel's, and more, the chamber said.

Blackburn has expressed "grave concern" about the tariffs, but said she appreciates the administration's goal of punishing bad actors like China. She asked the commerce secretary to reconsider broad tariffs to avoid harm to Tennessee's economy.

Blackburn has opposed Corker's proposal to require a congressional vote on tariffs issued in the name of national security, a move that fellow Tennessee GOP Sen. Lamar Alexander supports.

Tennessee has a history of centrist senators. electing Corker, for one, has further complicated the race by saying he's supporting Blackburn but won't actively campaign against Bredesen, whom he has called a friend.

Corker also has very publicly tussled with Trump, once saying he had turned the White House into an "adult day care center," with the president tweeting in response that Corker "couldn't get elected dog catcher in Tennessee." Corker endured booing at a Trump-Blackburn rally in Nashville this spring.

account, including a business credit card or check, being billed under a business account maintained by the seller, or using a business membership at a membership-based retailer.

During the tax holiday, you can buy qualifying items tax free even if the items have to be ordered, but you cannot receive the discount if you buy the items later (i.e. order them on the holiday and buy them when they arrive, or receive a rain check on the holiday and buy the item when it comes in).

Qualifying items are:

• Clothing, footwear and other items, including, but not limited to, shirts, trousers, skirts and dresses, shoes (not including ballet shoes, cleats, bowling shoes, fishing waders, overshoes, or tap shoes), boots (not including spiked or cleated climbing boots, galoshes, rubber work boots, ski boots, or waders), socks, hats and caps, underwear, school uniforms, and sleepwear;

• School supplies, including, but not limited to, binders, book bags, calculators, crayons, glue, lunch boxes, notebooks, paper, pencils, pens, protractors, rulers, and scissors.

Each item must have a total cost less than \$100 to qualify as tax free during the Holiday. For a complete list of items, or for more information, see comptroller.texas.gov/taxes/publications/98-490/.

Also, in Sunday's edition of the Herald, there will be a list of school supplies that each school in Howard County will be expecting the students to bring for the upcoming school year.

clear from the start that it will cost us something to be one of his disciples. He also talked about the true cost of sin and that it should be avoided at all cost. In Matthew 18, after he told his followers what they must do in to be great in the kingdom of heaven, he warns them of sin and its consequences, especially to those who also cause others to stumble spiritually and sin.

Matthew 18:5-9, Jesus says, Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me, but whoever causes one of these little ones who believes in me to sin, it would be better for him to have a great millstone fastened around his neck and to be drowned in the depths of the sea. Woe to the world for temptations to sin. For it is necessary that temptations come, but woe to the one by whom the temptation comes! And if your hand or your foot causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away. It is better for you to enter life crippled or lame than with two hands or two feet to be thrown into the eternal fire. And if your eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away. Jesus, on the other hand, makes it It is better for you to enter life with

only one eye than with two eyes to be thrown into the hell of fire (ESV).

The world says not to worry about sin – most even deny the concept of sin. Jesus says that sin is a serious matter and very worthy of our consideration. In Romans 6:20-23, the Apostle Paul writes that the outcome of continuing to choose sin and be enslaved to sin is death. Sin is not something to be taken lightly!

Well, "What are we supposed to do about it," someone may ask. Jesus said that we must do whatever it takes to avoid sin. Most people would consider removing a body part to be extreme. I remember the story of a man hiking alone whose arm was pinned under a large boulder during a rockslide. He could not move it on his own, so he cut of that arm with his pocket knife in order to save his life. He understood that he would not continue to live with that arm attached to his body.

How about removing a television? Do some of us need to go to that length to cut off the sinful sights and sounds from entering our homes and

our minds? But everybody has a TV. Isn't that a little drastic, some might say? What about - dare I go there our computers, even the small ones we carry around in our pockets and purses? For some, they are a constant temptation to look at sinful things and to take part in sinful activities. What are you going to say to Jesus when he asks you why you were unwilling to give up something that was a source of temptation in your life? "Everybody's got to have a computer, Lord." "Did you really expect me to go through life without my smartphone, Jesus?"

Don't take sin lightly. The Bible is serious about sin. Jesus is extremely serious about sin and about making a commitment to turn away from it and be with him in eternity. The payment for sin is eternal hell fire. Be obedient to Jesus and go to whatever extremes you must to avoid sin.



Reflections: Re-dreaming the Dream

Fifty-five years ago this month, Aug. 28, 1963, Martin Luther King, Jr. took his place on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial and addressed a crowd of 250 thousand. His name is perma-

nently linked with the Civil Rights movement. Boulevards, schools and institutions are named for him. But Martin Luther King, Jr. was first and foremost a Baptist preacher and pastor.

His words that day, and the nonviolent actions he adopted grew out BILL

of his faith. When he announced, "I have a dream," it was a dream that sprang from Scripture and the teachings of Jesus. Inspiring a generation to correct past wrongs,

he exhorted, "in the process of gaining our rightful place we must not be guilty of wrongful deeds. Let us not seek to satisfy our thirst for freedom by drinking from the cup of bitterness and hatred. ...'

"I have a dream that one day my four little children will live in a nation where they will not be

judged by the color of their skin but by the content changed his opinion regarding other ethnicities of their character.... I have a dream that one day every valley will be exalted, every hill and mountain shall be made low. The rough places will be made plain and the crooked places will be made straight. And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together. ... With this faith we will be able to hew out of the mountain of despair a stone of hope. With this faith we will be able to transform the jangling discords of our nation into a beautiful symphony of brotherhood."

Dr. King's words need to be heard again. The Bible is a dreamer's book. God is always inviting us to a new dream that transcends prejudice, suspicion and resentment.

Abraham's story begins with a vision and a dream: to leave his home in Mesopotamia so that God can make him a blessing to the nations. (Genesis 12:1-3). Jacob's life is transformed in a dream at Bethel where he saw angels ascending and descending from Heaven. God told him, "In you and your descendants shall all the families of the earth be blessed." (Genesis 28:14). Peter's vision at Joppa

He said, "I certainly understand now that God is not one to show partiality, but in every nation the man who fears him and does what is right is welcome to Him." (Acts 10:34-35).

Paul the Apostle was a devout Jew when he was young. He had little use for Gentiles and was a zealous Pharisee. But a vision of Christ changed all of that. He later devoted his life to reaching people of all nations with the message of God's love in Christ. In a world and a time known for its prejudice, violence, slavery and sexual abuse he wrote, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free man, there is neither male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.'

Prejudice, discrimination, resentment and violence are enemies that never die. Every generation must redream the dream to overcome these destructive forces.

Andrew Cashner (3-10) retired only five batters, allowing eight runs on seven hits. He struck out one, walked one and had a wild pitch.

"It was just one of those days," said Cashner, who played collegiately at nearby TCU and pitched last season for Texas. "I was just really struggling finding my pitches."

Odor, who hit .341 in July, hit a two run homer into the right-field second tier in the sixth, his 11th of the year. His first four walks came in the first four innings.

Yovani Gallardo (6-1) won his third straight start but lasted only 5 1/3


Johnny Football set for first **CFL start**


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

1. Win the trump with the queen, lead a spade to the ace and return the queen of spades. This virtually assures the contract, since it enables you to dispose of the 9-8 of clubs on dummy's ace of hearts and jack of spades.

It would be a serious mistake to attempt a spade finesse at trick two. If the queen lost to the king and North led another trump, you'd eventually go down one, losing a club trick as well as the spade trick. The temptation to try a spade finesse should be firmly resisted.


2. By far the best plan is to cash the ace of hearts at this point. If the trumps divide 2-2, the slam is certain even if the diamonds break 4-1. You would continue with a diamond to the ace, ruff a diamond, ruff a spade and then ruff another diamond, establishing dummy's last two diamonds as tricks, with a second spade ruff as the entry. At worst you'd lose one trick.

Now let's suppose North shows out when you cash the ace of hearts at trick four. In that case, you can still make the contract if the diamonds are divided normally, that is, 3-2. Lead a diamond to the ace, ruff a diamond, ruff a spade and then start running dummy's established diamonds. You lose a trump trick sooner or later to South's king, but that is the only trick you lose.

It would be wrong to attempt a second heart finesse after the first one succeeds, since in the process you would waste a precious entry to dummy that you desperately need to establish the diamond suit. The contract would become unmanageable if South started with three hearts to the king, and you would go down in a slam you could have made.



Today is Friday, Aug. 3, the 215th day of 2018. There are 150 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On August 3, 1936, Jesse Owens of the United States won the first of his four gold medals at the Berlin Olympics as he took the 100-meter sprint. On this date:

In 1492, Christopher Columbus set sail from Palos, Spain, on a voyage that took him to the present-day

to Nicaraguan rebels. In 1994, Arkansas carried out the nation's first triple execution in 32 years. Stephen G. Breyer was sworn in as the Supreme Court's newest justice in a private ceremony at Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist's Vermont summer home. Ten years ago: Nobel Prizewinning Russian author Alexander Solzhenitsyn died near Moscow at age 89. Al-Qaida confirmed the death of a top commander (Abu Khabab al-Masri), apparently in a U.S. airstrike in Pakistan; he was accused of training the suicide bombers who'd killed 17 American sailors on the USS Cole in 2000. At least 145 people were killed in a stampede of pilgrims at a remote mountaintop Hindu temple in India. Five years ago: President Barack Obama's trade representative, Michael Froman, vetoed a vet-to-beenacted ban on imports of Chinese-made Apple iPads and iPhones, overruling the U.S. International Trade Commission and dealing a setback to rival South Korean electronics company Samsung. Zimbabwe's electoral panel declared that longtime President Robert Mudabe had won re-election by a landslide. One year ago: Senators introduced two bipartisan bills aimed at protecting Special Counsel Robert Mueller from being fired by President Donald Trump. In 1807, former Vice President Aaron Burr went on trial before a federal court in Richmond, Virginia, charged with treason. (He was acquitted less than a month later.)

In 1914, Germany declared war on France at the onset of World War I.

In 1921, baseball commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis refused to reinstate the former Chicago White Sox players implicated in the "Black Sox" scandal, despite their acquittals in a jury trial.

In 1943, U.S. Army Lt. Gen. George S. Patton slapped a private at an army hospital in Sicily, accusing him of cowardice. (Patton was later ordered by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower to apologize for this and a second, similar episode.)

In 1958, the nuclear-powered submarine USS Nautilus became the first vessel to cross the North Pole underwater.

In 1966, comedian Lenny Bruce, whose raunchy brand of satire and dark humor landed him in trouble with the law, was found dead in his Los Angeles home; he was 40. In 1972, the U.S. Senate ratified the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty between the United States and the Soviet Union. (The U.S. unilaterally withdrew from the treaty in 2002.)

In 1980, closing ceremonies were held in Moscow for the Summer Olympic Games, which had been boycotted by dozens of countries, including the United States.

In 1981, U.S. air traffic controllers went on strike, despite a warning from President Ronald Reagan they would be fired, which they were.

In 1987, the Iran-Contra congressional hearings ended, with none of the 29 witnesses tying President Ronald Reagan directly to the diversion of arms-sales profits



COLLEGE FOOTBALL

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Ohio State closed ranks around the rollout of its football season as the university investigates whether coach Urban Meyer failed to report domestic abuse allegations, a scandal hitting a school already accused of not facing up to sexual misconduct allegations against a sports doctor.

The Buckeyes planned to open their first football practice Friday without Meyer, who was put on administrative leave during the probe and also suspended from an endorsement deal by restaurant chain Bob Evans. It's not clear how restrictive the paid leave will be for the coach set to earn \$7.6 million for the season after getting a raise this year.

Ohio State officials said reporters would be barred from football practices until at least next week, and university trustees announced that a sixmember committee will head up the investigation.

Co-offensive coordinator Ryan Day has been named acting head coach.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Vanderbilt coach Derek Mason says backup quarterback Deuce Wallace has been suspended this season over a violation of school policy.

Mason announced the suspension before the Commodores open fall camp and would not say what Wallace did.

The Commodores have senior Kyle Shurmur returning as the starting quarterback. Vanderbilt's other quarterbacks are Mo Hasan, who played at Coffeyville Community College last season after transferring from Syracuse, and freshman Allan Walters.

NFL CANTON, Ohio — The Ravens and Bears honored their great linebackers Ray Lewis and Brian Urlacher with some defense to make them proud in the Hall of Fame game that opened the NFL's preseason.

Oh, there was a little spark of offense, some provided by Baltimore's first-round draft pick Lamar Jackson in the second half of a 17-16 victory. His 7-yard touchdown pass to fellow first-rounder Hayden Hurst came after the Ravens' defense recovered a fumble.

Chicago put together its best drive in the final minutes and journeyman Tyler Bray connected with Tanner Gentry for a 10-yard score to cap a 92yard march. But the 2-point conversion pass fell incomplete.

Otherwise, D was the letter of the day: there were six turnovers in all, and 12 sacks, eight by the Bears.

The teams exchanged tipped interceptions on the first two possessions of the preseason.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The Tennessee Titans will be working out veteran safety Eric Reid in their search for a potential replacement after losing Johnathan Cyprien for the season with a torn left ACL, according to a person familiar with the visit.

Reid will work out for the Titans on Friday.

The Titans will become only the second NFL team to bring Reid in for a visit this year. Reid's visit with the Cincinnati Bengals ended with the safety filing a claim this spring arguing he was unsigned as a result of collusion by NFL owners over his protests of police brutality and racial inequality by kneeling during the anthem.

Reid, 26, has been out of work since playing out his contract with San Francisco. He started 69 of 70 games with 10 career interceptions.

The safety said in March that he does not plan to protest during the anthem this season if signed by a team. NBA

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Simply redesigning uniforms wasn't enough for the Memphis Grizzlies. They seized the opportunity to change so much more.

Everything from logos to color schemes to the way their court at FedExForum will have a new look this season, part of the team's most significant reimaging since 2004. All that and the Grizzlies also added FedEx to the jersey as the team's corporate sponsor. The unveiling ceremonies at FedExForum for the media and key fans even included a FedEx courier delivering packages containing the new jerseys.

BASEBALL

PHOENIX — San Francisco Giants infielder Pablo Sandoval will miss the remainder of the season after tearing his right hamstring while sliding.

Giants manager Bruce Bochy said the 2012 World Series MVP has a significant tear requiring surgery. Sandoval was injured while sliding into home plate Sunday against San Diego.

The 31-year-old Sandoval was hitting .248 with nine homers and 40 RBIs. He also played first and third base during his second stint with San Francisco.

NEW YORK — Mets slugger Yoenis Cespedes had surgery on his right heel, the first of two procedures that will likely sideline him for eight to 10 months.

Dr. Robert Anderson removed bone calcification in Cespedes' heel during the operation in Green Bay, Wisconsin.

Assistant general manager John Ricco said Cespedes will rest for eight to 12 weeks before getting surgery on his left heel.

Ricco also said doctors want to make sure Cespedes has some mobility in the right leg before the second surgery.

GOLF

AKRON, Ohio — Ian Poulter has never had much success at the Bridgestone Invitational until he opened with an 8-under 62. That was four shots better than Tiger Woods, who plays well at Firestone all the time.

Poulter was motivated by reading over his results and realizing he has never finished better than a tie for 13th. He made eight birdies in soft, vulnerable conditions and saved par from the bunker on his final hole to build a one-shot lead over Rickie Fowler and Patrick Cantlay. Back at Firestone for the first time in four years, Woods had his lowest opening round of the year. He shot a 66, but on a day like this, it was needed just to keep pace.

Forty-five players in the 71-man field broke par.

Rickie Fowler and Kyle Stanley each had a 63, while Jon Rahm, Si Woo Kim and Patrick Cantlay were another shot behind. Seven players were in the group at 65, which included Rory McIlroy, Justin Thomas and Jason Day.

LYTHAM ST. ANNES, England — The big thing missing for Minjee Lee in her impressive season is a strong performance at a major championship.

She might get it at the Women's British Open.

The No. 8-ranked Australian shot a 7-under 65, including a right-to-left putt for eagle from 25 feet on the par-5 15th hole, to lead by one stroke after the first round at Royal Lytham.

Mamiko Higa was a shot behind after a 66, while five players — Georgia Hall, Teresa Lu, Park Sung-hyun, Lee Mi-hyang and Pornanong Phatlum — were a further stroke back on a day that started with showers and a breeze before brightening up.

Top-ranked Ariya Jutanugarn bounced back from a double-bogey 6 at the second hole to shoot 71. Secondranked Inbee Park dropped four shots in her first five holes in a 76.

RENO, Nev. — Ollie Schniederjans scored five points with a closing eagle to take a three-point lead in the Barracuda Championship, the PGA Tour's only modified Stableford scoring event.

Schniederjans hit a 5-iron approach from 275 yards to 3 feet to set up the eagle on the par-5 18th at Montreux Golf and Country Club.

He finished with 17 points, also making six birdies. Players receive eight points for an albatross, five for eagle, two for birdie and zero for par. A point is subtracted for bogey, and three points are subtracted for double bogey or worse.
