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HCAD board approves budget 3-1

The Howard County Appraisal District Board approved the district's Fiscal Year 2019 budget at a meeting Wednesday evening by a vote of 3-1, but the budget must still be approved by a majority of the 12 local governmental entities that fund the HCAD before it takes effect.

Only board member Craig Wyrick voted against the budget. Board member Alex Calvio was not present at the meeting.

Earlier in the meeting, Wyrick suggested amending the proposed budget by deleting a line granting up to 5 percent merit-based pay increases for HCAD employees.

"My motion is to delete the 5-percent merit increase line item off the budget, and then accept the budget as is," he said. "Remove that line item, that 5-percent increase."

Wyrick presented figures he had gathered from local government officials showing that their employees don't receive raises as generous as those offered by the HCAD.

Commissioners table several Road and **Bridge issues**

Howard County Commissioners tabled several items brought for discussion by county Road and Bridge Administrator Brian Klinksiek at their meeting Wednesday afternoon.

Klinksiek presented the commissioners with a proposed site for a 4-H shooting range on the premises of the old Howard County Airport, located off Old Colorado City Highway near the intersection Highway 350.

"It's approximately 169 acres, and deals with a multidiscipline shooting facility that was proposed and discussed at the last meeting," Klinksiek said.

Commissioners tabled the item, asking Klinksiek and 4-H leader Dustin Gaskins, who was present at the meeting, to bring back a more detailed plan of the setup of the shooting range to the next Commissioners Court meet-

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Klinksiek also presented the commissioners with a list of equipment that is not being used by the county, asking them for approval to donate the equipment to the Howard County Volunteer Fire Department. "What I have is a

list of things, some of them are out there at the refinery and need to be removed, some of them are at locations undisclosed because I'm just not aware of where they are," Klinksiek said. "I also can't determine whether county funds were used to pay for them or not. These are things we have files on. Most, but not all, we have titles on. Some things were titled to us for insurance purposes that were paid for by the Volunteer Fire Department. There is nothing on this list that is being utilized today." After some discus-

sion, commissioners tabled the item, saying they needed to get legal advice

14,000 fight California fires, some from prisons or overseas

UKIAH, Calif. Firefighters said for the first time Wednesday that they have made good progress battling the state's largestever wildfire but didn't expect to have it fully under control until The blaze north of San Fran-

cisco has grown to the size of Los Angeles since it started two weeks ago, fueled by dry vegetation, high winds and rugged terrain that made it too dangerous for firefighters to directly attack the flames now spanning 470 square miles (1,217 square kilo-

Crews, including inmates and firefighters from overseas, have managed to cut lines around half the fire to contain the flames, the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection said. The blaze about 100 miles (160 kilometers) north of San Francisco around the resort region of Clear Lake has destroyed 116 homes and injured two firefighters.

than Cox said the area has few natural barriers to slow flames and terrain that firefighters can't get to. So firefighters fall back to the nearest road, ridge or river, where they bulldoze a wide line and wait for the flames to come to Mendocino Complex,

which will take months to put out, is one of 18 burning throughout the state Wednesday. Because of such extreme conditions early on, officials and experts warn that California could be facing its toughest wildfire season yet, with the historically worst months still to come. Here's a look at the firefight-

ers who are battling California's 14,000 FIREFIGHTERS

They are deployed statewide

and led by Cal Fire. The state's firefighting agency employs 5,300 full-time firefighters and hires an additional 1,700 each fire season. Trained prisoners and firefighters from 17 states and around the world fill out the ranks. They are battling blazes on the

Nevada border and along the coast. Cal Fire crews are helping federal firefighters put out flames in national forests and one that has reached Yosemite National Park, prompting its closure at the height of tourist season.

Those on the ground get help from more than 1,000 fire engines, 59 bulldozers, 22 air tankers, 17 airplanes, 12 helicopters and 11 mobile kitchens. Firefighters under Cal Fire's

command have helped Oregon authorities fight a fire near the California border and responded to a blaze that broke out this week in Orange County and burned a dozen cabins. 4,088 AT MENDOCINO COM-

PLEX FIRE

The state's largest wildfire in history has drawn a contingent to battle what is actually two fires burning so closely together that they're being attacked as one. Though it's exploded in size,

more firefighters are fighting a fire near Redding that has killed six people and destroyed more than 1,000 homes and businesses. It threatens a much larger urban area, so Cal Fire has devoted more resources to it. Both blazes are considered

nearly half contained. **1,916 INMATES**

California prisoners also are fighting fires. Cal Fire trains minimum-security inmates and pays them \$1 an hour in the field and \$2 a day when they're not on duty. Inmate firefighters also typically have their sentences reduced for every day spent fight-They do similar work to any

firefighter, working long hours and sleeping in camps with other inmates. Most are on the front lines, using chain saws and hand tools to reduce tinder-dry brush and trees to stop the flames.

Rite Aid, Albertsons call off merger deal ahead of vote

Rite Aid and the grocer Albertsons called off an agreement to become a single company with the deal facing shaky prospects in a shareholder

The owner of Safeway and other grocery brands had announced in February plans to buy Rite Aid's more than 2,500 stores with the goal of becoming "a leader in food, health and wellness." But a major shareholder and two proxy advisory firms came out against the deal.

Rite Aid Chairman and CEO John Standley said in a prepared state-

ment late Wednesday that after hearing the views of shareholders, the drugstore chain is "committed to moving forward and executing our strategic plan as a (stand-alone) company."

sider governance changes, although it did not elaborate.

The company cancelled a shareholder meeting to vote on the deal that had been scheduled for Thursday. Both businesses said neither party will be responsible for any payments due to the deal's termination.

Privately held Albertsons Companies, based in Boise, Idaho, was offering either a share of its stock and \$1.83 in cash or slightly more than one Albertsons share for every 10 Rite Aid shares.

One of Rite Aid's biggest shareholders, Highfields Capital Management, said that deal was "in the best interests of Albertsons and Rite Aid management, but not Rite Aid shareholders." The investment firm said in June that it would vote its roughly 47 million shares against the deal.

Two prominent shareholder advi-

sory firms — Glass Lewis & Co. and Institutional Shareholder Services also recommended no votes. Glass Lewis said the deal was "not critical to Rite Aid's viability" and provided no meaningful premium to investors.

Wall Street also has shown little confidence in the deal. The price of Rite Aid stock has mostly slipped since the acquisition was announced in February.

Rite Aid, based in Camp Hill, Pennsylvania, will face significant challenges continuing as a stand-alone company. The drugstore chain has

struggled with high debt levels and tough competition from larger rivals, as narrowing drugstore networks have pushed customers from its stores.

Earlier this week, Rite Aid said it was

Rite Aid also said its board will con- chopping its fiscal 2019 forecast because generic drug pricing wasn't shaping up how it expected in April, when it first laid out expectations.

The nation's largest drugstore chain, Walgreens, tried unsuccessfully to buy all of Rite Aid last year but scuttled that deal after encountering regulatory resistance. Last September, Walgreens Boots Alliance Inc. announced a slimmer agreement to buy nearly 2,000 Rite Aid locations and some distribution centers for about \$4.38 billion.

Rite Aid had told shareholders last month that the Albertsons deal would help build scale and diversify as the company deals with challenges like increased competition and pressure on drug reimbursement rates.

Shares of Rite Aid slipped 19 cents to \$1.55 in premarket trading Thursday.

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
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

Gallo, Gallardo stay hot, Rangers beat Mariners 11-7

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Yovani after a career-best Gallardo and Joey Gallo both remain on a roll for the Texas Rangers.

Gallo homered twice and drove in four runs, Gallardo won his fourth straight start and the Rangers held off the Seattle Mariners 11-7 on Wednes-

Gallardo (7-1) leads the majors with seven wins since June 23. He allowed three hits, two runs and three walks while striking out two in six innings. Through being released by Cincin-

nati in April, and then pitching at Triple-A Round Rock for more than two months, Gallardo said, "I'm the same guy, same person I've been throughout my career."

Rangers manager Jeff Banister agreed with Gallardo's comments.

"That's who he is. He's very similar to what we saw when he was here previously. He knows how to pitch in winning situations."

In 2015, Gallardo's only other season with Texas, he was 13-11.

Gallo also has been on a roll, with 10 of his 31 homers in his past 19 games. He went 3 for 5 to raise his batting average above .200 for the first time since June 16.

Gallo's homers against Seattle starter Marco Gonzales gave him 12 against left-handers this season, the most by a Texas left-handed batter since Rafael Palmeiro hit 15 in 2003.

"I've always hit left-handers pretty good. I don't really mind the lefties. My dad was lefty throwing to me when I was younger, so maybe that helped me."

Banister saw something else.

"I think he's calmer in the batter's

Gonzales (12-7) gave up career highs of 12 hits and seven runs in five innings. He has lost two games in a row five-game winning streak.

"They were him," Mariners manager Scott Servais "You have to said. give them credit, they've been swinging the bat very well."

Seattle used five singles to score four runs in the seventh to pull within 7-6, but the Rangers answered with four runs to pull away.

Mike Zunino hit two homers for the Mariners.

The Rangers have supported Gallardo's starts with 10.48 runs per inning. Their season-high 19 hits included 11 extrabase hits. Those were the most Texas extra-base hits and doubles (eight) in a game since 2011.

Seattle led only in one out, Jean Segura walked, went to second base on Gallardo's wild pitch and scored on Mitch Haniger's single to

longer than I expected to," Gallardo said. "The second inning I was able to get some early contact. Just getting weak contact.'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas' thriving capital city may finally become a major league sports town. It will just take moving a bedrock franchise of Major League Soccer out of its home turf to do it. Anthony Precourt, owner of the Columbus Crew

, has been pushing for months to move his team to Austin, the largest city in the country without a major professional sports franchise.

While the league front office has supported Precourt's desire to look around for a new city, picking up and relocating from Ohio to uber-hip Austin hasn't been easy. It hasn't been a slam-dunk deal in

Austin and the state of Ohio is suing to block the move. Fan groups in Columbus have rallied to try to save their team, the 2008 MLS champion which was one of league's founding clubs when it started in 1996.

The Austin City Council will vote Thursday on whether to make land available and authorize negotiations for a new \$200 million, 20,000-seat privately financed stadium for the Crew. Precourt's

If the stadium plan is approved, the Crew will likely chart a course to become the third MLS franchise in Texas by 2019, joining Houston and Dallas. built is yet to be determined.

Where the Crew would play until the stadium is Precourt has been eyeing Austin since he bought the team in 2013. His purchase agreement included a promise to keep the Crew in Columbus for at least 10 years, but it also had a clause that would let him move to Austin. And before Precourt announced his intention to move, MLS had trademarked Aus-

tin FC and Austin Athletic as possible names for a

franchise even though the city had not applied for

Major League Soccer did not immediate-

ly respond to a request for comment. Precourt noted Austin's "growing presence as an international city, combined with its strong multicultural foundation" when he first announced plans to explore a move in October 2017. "MLS in Austin could be an ideal fit."

The Austin metropolitan area is just over 2 million. The sports scene is dominated by the University of Texas Longhorns, but the city also hosts Formula One and MotoGP racing every year. Its economy centers on state government, the university and the city's surging role as a major technology hub featuring companies like Dell, Samsung and Apple. Facebook and Google also have offices here and there's a chance Amazon's coveted HQ2 could be coming as well.

Mayor Steve Adler has said soccer would be a "huge success" and a perfect fit for his city, which ranked among the top television markets nationally for watching the

"Soccer would be important for our community because it would bring our city together," Adler said. "It is also a sport that doesn't require a stadium with 70,000 people."

If the council approves the stadium plan, "the soccer team will come," Adler said.

Precourt has complained that Columbus has a lack of corporate sponsors and said the Crew's current stadium, which opened in 1999 as the first soccer-specific stadium in the U.S., is showing age and needs to be

MLS Commissioner Don Garber has said the league is reluctant to see one of the original franchises move, but has also

backed Precourt's desire to look for a new home. Deputy MLS Commissioner Mark Abbott has visited with a partnership in Columbus that is interested in buying the team to keep it there.

Columbus isn't giving up the team without a fight . The state lawsuit to block the move cites an Ohio law that owners of teams that use tax-supported facilities and accept state financial assistance must give at least six months' notice and allow local investors the chance to buy the team. The law was enacted after the NFL's Cleveland Browns moved to Baltimore in 1996.

A group of passionate Crew fans don't want to lose their club. Save the Crew has been collecting pledges from fans to attend games next season, has appealed for a new ownership group to step in and even offered its own renderings for a new stadium in Columbus.

"The Crew is tremendously important" to Columbus, said David Miller, Save the Crew communications director. "We're the original team in MLS. This team is a representation of history."

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
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

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

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, Aug. 9, the 221st day of 2018. There are 144 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On August 9, 1974, Vice President Gerald R. Ford became the nation's 38th chief executive as President Richard Nixon's resignation took effect. On this date:

In 1854, Henry David Thoreau's "Walden," which described Thoreau's experiences while living near Walden Pond in Massachusetts, was first published.

In 1902, Edward VII was crowned king of Britain following the death of his mother,

Queen Victoria. In 1936, Jesse Owens won his fourth gold medal at the Berlin Olympics as the United States took first place in the 400-meter

relay. 1944, 258 African-American sailors based at Port Chicago, California, refused to load a munitions ship following a cargo vessel explosion that killed 320 men, many of them black. (Fifty of the sailors were convicted of mutiny,

fined and imprisoned.) In 1945, three days after the atomic bombing of Hiroshima, Japan, a U.S. B-29 Superfortress code-named Bockscar dropped a nuclear device ("Fat Man") over Nagasaki, killing an estimated 74,000 people. In 1969, actress Sharon Tate

and four other people were found brutally slain at Tate's Los Angeles home; cult leader Charles Manson and a group of his followers were later convicted of the crime. In 1982, a federal judge in

Washington ordered John W. Hinckley Jr., who'd been acquitted of shooting President Ronald Reagan and three others by reason of insanity, committed to a mental hospital. In 1992, closing ceremonies

were held for the Barcelona Summer Olympics, with the Unified Team of former Soviet republics winning 112 medals, the United States 108.

In 1995, Jerry Garcia, lead singer of the Grateful Dead, died in Forest Knolls, California, of a heart attack at age 53.

In 1997, Haitian immigrant Abner Louima was brutalized in a Brooklyn, New York, stationhouse by Officer Justin Volpe, who raped him with a broken broomstick. (Volpe was later sentenced to 30 years in prison.) An Amtrak train with more than 300 people aboard derailed on a bridge near Kingman, Arizona; 183 people were injured.

In 2004, Oklahoma City bombing conspirator Terry Nichols, addressing a court for the first time, asked victims of the blast for forgiveness as a judge sentenced him to 161 consecutive life sentences.

In 2014, Michael Brown Jr., an unarmed 18-year-old black man, was shot to death by a police officer following an altercation in Ferguson, Missouri; Brown's death led to sometimes-violent protests in Ferguson and other U.S. cities.

Ten years ago: Todd Bachman, the father of 2004 volleyball Olympian Elisabeth "Wiz" Bachman, was stabbed to death by a Chinese man in Beijing in an apparently random attack just hours after the start of the Olympic Games. (The assailant took his own life.) Mariel Zagunis led a U.S. sweep of the women's saber fencing for the first American medals of the Games. Comedian Bernie Mac died in Chicago at age 50.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama promised to work with Congress on "appropriate reforms" for the domestic surveillance programs that stirred criticism at home and abroad. President Obama signed into law a measure restoring lower interest rates for student loans. Infamous drug lord Rafael Caro Quintero walked free after 28 years in prison when a Mexican court overturned his 40-vear sentence for the 1985 kidnap and U.S. killing of Enforcement Agency agent Enrique Camarena.

One year ago: North Korea's army said it was studying a plan to create an "enveloping fire" in areas around the U.S. territory of Guam with medium- to long-range ballistic missiles. Prosecutors in Florida said golfer Tiger Woods had agreed to plead guilty to reckless driving and would enter a diversion program that would allow him to have his record wiped clean; he'd been charged with DUI in May when he was found asleep in his car, apparently under the influence of a prescription painkiller and sleeping medication.

Bellerive eager to produce memorable PGA Championship

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Bellerive Country Club is considered one of the "Big Four" of traditional, exclusive St. Louis-area clubs, a picturesque parkland course designed by Robert Trent Jones serving as its centerpiece.

For a while, big events bolstered its reputation.

Gary Player won a thrilling Monday playoff to capture the U.S. Open and complete the career Grand Slam, at the time the third player to accomplish the feat. Years later, his fellow South African, Nick Price, stormed to the PGA Championship at Bellerive for the first of his three majors.

Yet recent history hasn't been

The World Golf Championship event in 2001 was cancelled after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, the first PGA Tour event to be cancelled in its entirety in more than 50 years. Heavy rains have washed out tournament play other years, unheralded winners have left galleries less than enthused, and some of the biggest names in the game — Tiger Woods, for example — have missed Bellerive because of inju-

"I guess you could say we're a little snake bit," said longtime member Jay Williamson, who played 16 seasons on the PGA Tour and now works in wealth management. "It's just part of the deal."

Or, as one local walking the course Monday pointed out, "We're owed one this week."

As if on cue, a white picket fence near the 18th green broke under the weight of fans pressing for autographs, sending several sprawling to the ground — nobody was seriously hurt. Then, a line of wicked storms rolled through Tuesday, soaking the course and wiping out many practice rounds.

Tiger Woods managed five holes, which is par for the course when it comes to him and Bel-

Circumstances have conspired against him playing it for years.

He had come to town early in 2001 to conduct a clinic for American Express, the sponsors of the WGC event, and he was in the locker room at Bellerive when the planes hit the World Trade Center. He watched the TVs with mouth agape until he couldn't stomach it anymore, finally heading to the course. He played nine holes of a practice round with Mark Calcavecchia while Woods's head of security, Joe Corless, provided them with a constant stream of updates.

"That was a very surreal time, at least for me anyway," Woods recalled. "They made the right move in cancelling the event. That was on the 11th, and I drove home on the 13th, 17 hours to get back to my home in Florida. It was a very surreal time for myself on that drive a lot of reflect-

Davis Love III never even made

it to St. Louis. "My flight got grounded," he said this week. "I did a lot of work for American Express, and the vice chairman and I were good friends — still good friends — and I immediately called to check on him and his employee friends that I knew in the city, and he said, 'We will not be play-

"I lot of guys came on out here," Love said, "but I knew that there

was bigger things than golf." Many fans that bought tickets that week waited patiently for another chance to see Woods, and they though it would happen at the BMW Championship in 2008. But two days after beating Rocco Mediate in a playoff at the U.S. Open, Woods announced he would be having season-ending knee surgery.

U.S. Senior Open in 2004, turning parking lots into mud puddles and dousing part of the second round. Rain fell again in 2013 for the Senior PGA Championship, when the hugely popular Fred Couples withdrew early in the week and Kohki Idoki beat Kenny Perry and local hero Jay Haas to provide Bellerive with a relatively unknown winner.

Given all that misfortune, it wouldn't have been surprising if PGA Championship chairman Mike DeCola had

heart palpitations when dark clouds swept in Tuesday morning. The sound of sirens on the course were more plentiful than the sound of drivers hitting balls, and massive crowds that braved withering heat for Monday's practice rounds were replaced by soggy fans seeking shelter.

When the rain stopped late in the morning, temperatures had dropped but the humidity had soared.

"To have a great major you need a little bit of luck, whether that's weather or traffic," Pete Bevacqua, the PGA of America's chief executive, acknowledged on the eve of the championship. "You need to have everything come together perfectly."

There are signs that might happen this week.

The forecast calls for dry weather, though temps are expected in the 90s again. The PGA's chief championships officer, Kerry Haigh, thinks the course is in remarkable shape given the summer heat, and that changes made by architect Rees Jones will produce a more interesting challenge.

Woods is in the field. So is Love, who will be playing in his 100th major championship. In fact, 98 of the top 100 players in the world rankings are at Bellerive this week. Justin Thomas is back to defend his title. Jordan Spieth is trying to complete his career Grand Slam, and fan favorites such as Phil Mickelson, Dustin Johnson and Rory Mc-Ilroy should provide plenty of roars around the course.

Perhaps all those bits of adversity and disappointment will have been worth the wait by Sunday.

Ruck wins 200

TOKYO (AP) — Taylor Ruck almost psyched herself out before the race even started.

Knowing she was swimming against five-time Olympic champion Katie Ledecky in the 200-meter freestyle on Thursday at the Pan Pacific Championships, the Canadian had to calm herself down as she readied to dive into the pool.

"It's the name, I guess, because she is the fastest woman on the planet in a lot of races," Ruck said of the American great. "My coach kind of saw that, so he told me to focus on my lane and my race."

And there's another factor. Almost everyone is already thinking about the 2020 Olympics in Tokyo and using this event as a trial run.

Ruck won the 200 in 1 minute, 54.44 seconds, just ahead of Japanese rival Rikako Ikee. Ledecky was third in 1:55.15. Ledecky won this event two years ago at the Rio de Janeiro Olympics — and the 400 and 800, too — though it probably is her weakest race. She was second in the 200 a year ago at the world championships in Budapest.

It wasn't a lost day. Ledecky took the 800 in 8:09.13 the fifth fastest on record — and will be the favorite in the 400 during the four-day event in Tokyo, the biggest meet of the year for most swimmers around the Pacific Rim.

"I knew it was going to be tough," Ledecky said. "It's a tough double. I've done it a number of times, but it's always a difficult thing. I really put a lot of work into not having that happen again. But I still have two more years to go until the big show here in Tokyo."

American teammate Lilly King did her thing. The Olympic champion in Rio again won the 100 breaststroke, this time in 1:05.44. Not her best time, but she'll take it.

"I'm just trying to take it year by year, but I do feel it's a little bit of a rehearsal for the Olympics since we're in the same city," King said. "I'm just trying to get used to the culture and things like that. But the Olympics are always in the back of my mind."

King hasn't lost this race since 2015. "It's definitely my baby," she said. "I don't know how I would take losing, so I'm just trying to keep

winning." Host nation Japan won twice. Yasuhiro Koseki took the men's 100 breaststroke, and Yui Ohashi

won the women's 400 individual medley. Australia's sole victory was in the mixed medley relay. China has sent fewer swimmers and is focusing instead on the Asian Games later this month in

Jakarta, Indonesia. Other American winners included Jordan Wilimovsky in the 1,500, Townley Hass in the 200 freestyle, and Chase Kalisz in the men's 400 individual medley. He beat out Olympic champion Kosuke Hagino and Rio bronze medalist Daiya Seto. Kalisz took silver in Rio.

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
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
