Curfew extension on tap for Tuesday's City Council meeting

 The Big Spring City Council will vote on whether to extend the existing curfew for Big Spring minors at their meeting Tuesday evening.
 The meeting will be held in the Council Chambers, 307 E. Fourth St., at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday.
 The curfew, set to expire Sept.

1 of this year, currently prohibits minors younger than 17 from being out and about after 11 p.m. on school nights, and after midnight on the weekends.
 "Curfew hours means: a) 11:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday until 6:00 a.m. of the following day;" reads the ordinance. "...and b) 12:01 a.m. until 6:00 a.m. on any Friday or Saturday."

The ordinance makes it an offense for a minor to be out in public or at a place of business during curfew hours; for parents or guardians to allow their minor children to be out during curfew hours; and for owners or operators of businesses to allow minors to remain on the premises during curfew hours.

FISD makes a few changes to better their students

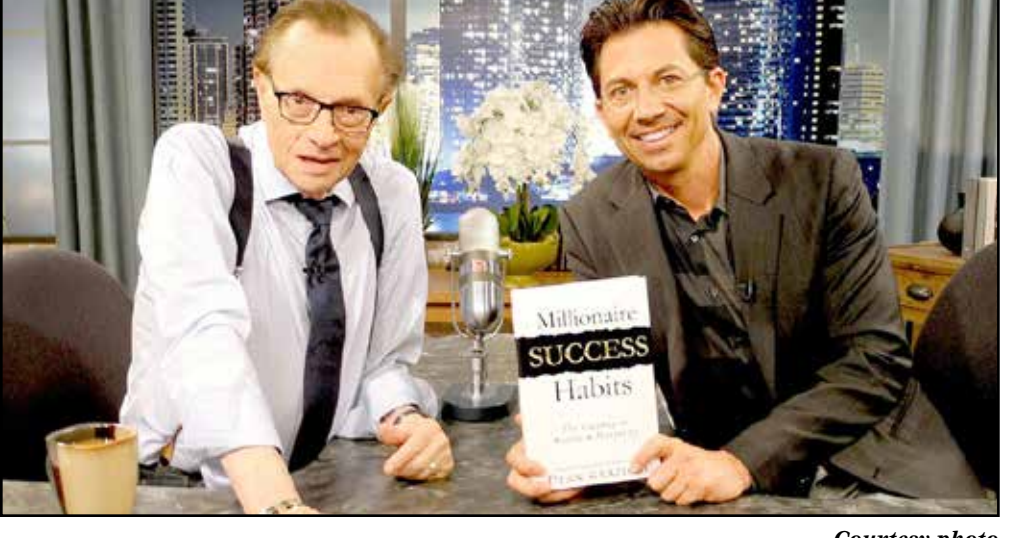

US stocks rise as technology and health care firms lead

NEW YORK — Stocks are rebounding on Wall Street in early trading Monday, led by gains in technology and health care companies and retailers. Ratings company Nielsen Holdings is surging after an activist investor started pushing the company to sell itself.

Asian markets fell overnight, while European markets were slightly lower.

U.S. indexes are coming off their worst losses in a month as investors worried about financial upheaval in Turkey which has sent that country's currency, the lira, plunging.

On Monday Turkey's central bank announced measures to help that country's banks manage their liquidity, but the Turkish lira and Turkey's stock market continued to slide anyway.

The lira has been tumbling as investors question whether the government of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan can cope with a plunging currency, a diplomatic spat with Washington and other

economic problems. Global markets skidded Friday as investors worried that Turkey's problems could cause trouble in other countries, but many analysts say that isn't likely.

KEEPING SCORE: The S&P 500 index gained 8 points, or 0.3 percent, to 2,841 as of 10:10 a.m. Eastern time. It fell 0.7 percent Friday. The Dow Jones Industrial Average added 53 points, or 0.2 percent, to 25,366. The Nasdaq composite jumped 39 points, or 0.5 percent, to 7,878. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks was unchanged at 1,686.

EARLY LEADERS: Apple rose 0.9 percent to \$209.41 and chipmaker Nvidia climbed 2.3 percent to \$260.68 as technology companies gained ground. Online retailer Amazon advanced 1.6 percent to \$1,915.87.

RATINGS RISING: Nielsen Holdings jumped 12.6 percent to \$24.74 after Elliott Associates, a firm run by activist investor Paul Singer, disclosed an ownership stake of 5.1 percent in the company. In a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission, the fund said Nielsen should consider selling itself or some of its assets to

boost its stock price. Nielsen stock was trading over \$50 two years ago, but it plunged in late July after the company reported weak quarterly results, announced the retirement of its CEO, and said it will consider selling one business. The stock is down 32 percent in 2018.

Exceptions are made for minors accompanied by their parents, working, at a school event, or involved in an emergency, among others.

Section 14-29-1 of the ordinance, adopted Sept. 8, 2015, extended the curfew until Sept. 1, 2018. Now, the council will vote on whether to extend the ordinance another three years, until Sept. 1, 2021.

The proposed amendment would simply delete the year "2018" from the relevant section, and replace it with the year "2021."

A public hearing will be held on the issue at the start of the meeting.

In other business, Big Spring's Finance Director Donald Moore will present the proposed Fiscal Year 2018-2019 tax rate of 72.9311 cents per \$100 valuation to the council, who will consider placing a proposal on the agenda of their Sept. 11 meeting to adopt the rate. The rate includes Maintenance and Operations rate of 58.5269 cents per \$100, and a debt service rate of 14.4042 cents per \$100.

Rays holding their own with creative pitching approach

No team has gotten more innings from its starting pitchers this season than the Cleveland Indians. No team has gotten fewer than the Tampa Bay Rays.

Yet the Indians and Rays have ended up in a similar spot. Cleveland's team ERA is 3.84. Tampa Bay's is 3.82.

The Rays have been unorthodox in their approach, eschewing a normal starting rotation in favor of a system in which one of their usual relievers might take the mound at the beginning of a game. Right now, Tampa Bay's depth chart on MLB.com only lists three pitchers in the rotation — yet the Rays are 60-58 and have a chance for their first winning season since 2013.

Tampa Bay has tried using an "opener" at the start of games. One of the team's relievers might start the game and pitch an inning or two. Then another pitcher — who might normally have been the starter — comes in and perhaps pitches through the middle innings. If his outing begins in the third, for example, he may benefit from not having to face the top hitters as often.

The result is that the Rays' stats are significantly skewed. Tampa Bay's starters have thrown only 485 1/3 innings in 118 games. Cleveland, led by its stellar foursome of Corey Kluber, Trevor Bauer, Carlos Carrasco and Mike Clevinger, has gotten 737 1/3 innings from its starters. The Indians are atop the AL Central, but the Rays are comparable in terms of run prevention.

The starting pitchers for the 2012 Colorado Rockies threw only 765 innings, and according to the database at Baseball-Reference.com, that's the lowest total since at least 1908 in any season that wasn't shortened by a work stoppage. The

Rays appear well on their way to finishing below 700.

Other developments from around the majors:

NO REST

E.D. stands for Edwin Diaz, and it also stands for every day.

The Seattle closer saved all four games of his team's series sweep of the Houston Astros. The last victory came in 10 innings Sunday.

Diaz now has 46 saves for the playoff-chasing Mariners, and he could threaten Francisco Rodriguez's record of 62, set in 2008. Diaz has also posted a 1.98 ERA.

Problem is, his career high in innings is 66, set last season. He's already at 59 this year. Diaz has also made 59 appearances. Only Jose Alvarez of the Angels (60) has more.

HIGHLIGHTS

David Bote and Cesar Hernandez both circled the bases in memorable fashion.

Bote, pinch-hitting for the Chicago Cubs, won Sunday night's game over Washington with a grand slam in the bottom of the ninth. The Cubs were down 3-0 with two outs before Bote's drive to center.

Hernandez went all the way around the bases after dropping a bunt in Philadelphia's 5-2 win over Arizona on Tuesday night. There were two throwing errors by the Diamondbacks on the play. The Phillies play the Mets next weekend in the Little League Classic at Williamsport, Pennsylvania, so Hernandez should already be in the right spirit after taking advantage of Arizona's carelessness.

LINE OF THE WEEK

Mookie Betts of the Boston Red Sox continued his push for the American League MVP award, hitting for the cycle in an 8-5 win over Toronto on Thursday night. He completed the cycle in style, with a home run in the ninth inning.

Bote's grand slam in 9th lifts Cubs over Nationals 4-3

CHICAGO — The celebration was under way by the time David Bote flung his helmet high into the air on his way home.

Teammates were already jumping up and down, ready to mob him at the plate. The fans were in a frenzy, too.

Nothing like a game-ending grand slam to get the festivities started.

A pinch-hitting Bote smashed one against Ryan Madson with two outs in the ninth inning to lift the Chicago Cubs to a 4-3 victory over the Washington Nationals

on Sunday night. Bote's long drive to center field came after dominant starts by Washington's Max Scherzer and Chicago's Cole Hamels.

Madson (2-5) entered with a 3-0 lead to start the ninth and quickly ran into trouble.

He gave up an infield single to Jason Heyward with one out and hit Albert Almora with a pitch. Madson then retired Kyle Schwarber on a foul pop before hitting Contreras to load the bases.

With a 2-2 count, Bote drove a knee-high fastball well beyond the center-field wall, setting off quite a scene.

Teammates off his jersey at the plate.

He also had a cooler emptied on him as he gave an interview on the field while fans chanted "Bote! Bote!"

"It's magical," he said. "It's incredible. It's an unbelievable feeling. It couldn't happen to a better team, a better group of people in that clubhouse. And I'm so blessed and honored to be part of it."

He won the spade lead with the king and immediately returned a diamond, playing low from dummy on the assumption that East had the ace for his opening bid. East won with the jack and returned a spade to dummy's ace.

Franco now ruffed a low diamond, led a trump to the ace and ruffed another low diamond, felling East's ace. He then cashed the K-A of hearts and king of diamonds, discarding a heart from his hand.

All these maneuvers were not without purpose. Franco next conceded a trump to West's queen, and poor West was forced to return either a spade or a diamond, handing declarer a ruff-and-discard. So Franco never lost a heart trick, and the contract was made.

The hand demonstrates once again how a diligent declarer can sometimes salvage what appears to be a hopeless contract. Three losers seem certain at the start, but declarer first utilizes the knowledge gained from the bidding, and then visualizes a distribution of the adverse cards that will allow him to escape one of his losers.

In the present case, after taking the proper preliminary steps, Franco led a trump at trick 10 and hoped that the defender who won did not have a heart to return. As it happened, this hope materialized.

This deal occurred in Stockholm, Sweden, during the 1983 world championship match between Italy and the United States.

The U.S. won the match by a very slim margin, despite exceptionally fine play on this deal by the Italian declarer, Arturo Franco. Three notrump would have been much easier to make, but Franco would up in five clubs as shown.

Making five clubs appears to be an impossible task, since declarer seems destined to lose a heart, a club and a diamond. But Franco managed the

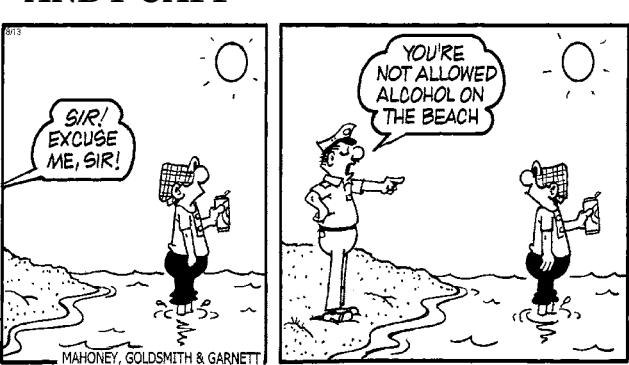

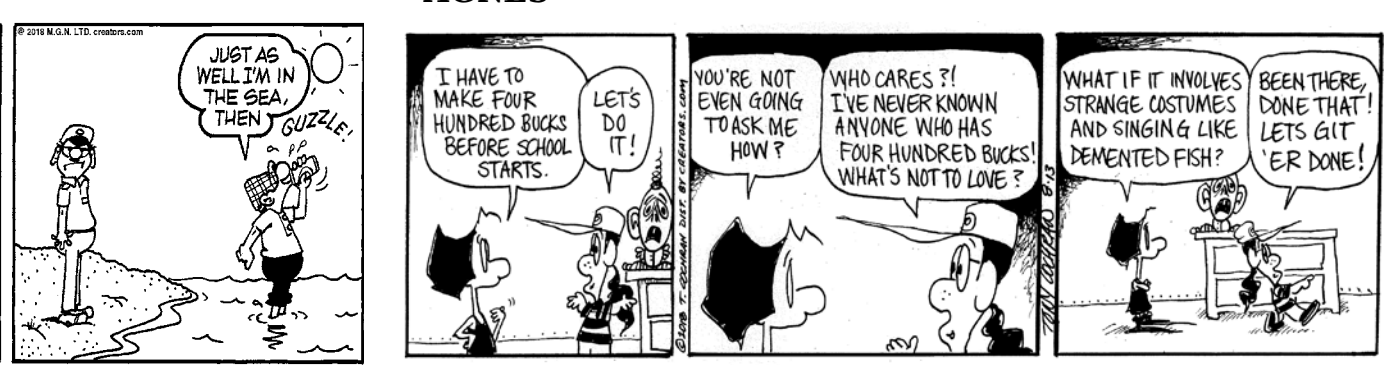

This Date In History

Today is Monday, Aug. 13, the 225th day of 2018. There are 140 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On August 13, 1961, East Germany sealed off the border between Berlin's eastern and western sectors before building a wall that would divide the city for the next 28 years.

On this date:

In 1521, Spanish conqueror Hernando Cortez captured Tenochtitlan (teh-natch-teet-LAHN), present-day Mexico City, from the Aztecs.

In 1792, French revolutionaries imprisoned the royal family.

In 1846, the American flag was raised for the first time in Los Angeles.

In 1910, Florence Nightingale, the founder of modern nursing, died in London at age 90.

In 1932, Adolf Hitler rejected the post of vice chancellor of Germany, saying he was prepared to hold out "for all or nothing."

In 1942, Walt Disney's animated feature "Bambi" had its U.S. premiere at Radio City Music Hall in New York, five days after its world premiere in London.

In 1960, the first two-way telephone conversation by satellite took place with the help of Echo 1. The Central African Republic became totally independent of French rule.

In 1967, the crime caper biopic "Bonnie and Clyde," starring Warren Beatty and Faye Dunaway, had its U.S. premiere; the movie, directed by Arthur Penn, was considered shocking as well as innovative for its graphic portrayal of violence.

In 1979, Lou Brock of the St. Louis Cardinals became the 14th player in major league baseball history to reach the 3,000th career hit plateau as his team defeated the Chicago Cubs, 3-2.

In 1981, in a ceremony at his California ranch, President Ronald Reagan signed a historic package of tax and budget reductions.

In 1989, searchers in Ethiopia found the wreckage of a plane which had disappeared almost a week earlier while carrying Rep.

Mickey Leland, D-Texas, and 14 other people — there were no survivors.

In 2003, Iraq began pumping crude oil from its northern oil fields for the first time since the start of the war. Libya agreed to set up a \$2.7 billion fund for families of the 270 people killed in the 1988 Pan Am bombing.

Ten years ago: A man barged into the Arkansas Democratic headquarters in Little Rock and opened fire, killing state party chairman Bill Gwatney before speeding off in a pickup. (Police later shot and killed the gunman, Timothy Dale Johnson.) Michael Phelps swam into history as the winningest Olympic athlete ever with his 10th and 11th career gold medals. Phelps won the 200-meter butterfly, then swam the leadoff of a runaway victory by the U.S. 800 freestyle relay team. Sandy Allen, who was recognized as the world's tallest female at 7 feet, 7 inches tall, died in Shelbyville, Ind., at age 53.

Five years ago: Israel released 26 Palestinian inmates, many convicted in grisly killings, on the eve of long-stalled peace talks, angering families of those killed by the prisoners. Tompall Glaser, 79, a country music singer, publisher and studio owner best known for his association with the outlaw movement against record labels, died in Nashville.

GOLF

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Brooks Koepka won his first PGA Championship, playing poised and mistake-free golf down the stretch amid ear-splitting roars for Tiger Woods and a late charge from revitalized Adam Scott.

The U.S. Open champion closed with a 4-under 66 to reach 16 under for the tournament. That left Koepka three shots clear of Scott and two ahead of Woods, whose Sunday charge electrified the packed grounds of Bellerive Country Club as if it was a decade ago.

Woods capped a 6-under 64 with a long birdie putt at the 18th, pumping his fist as if he had won. It was the four-time PGA champion's lowest final round in a major.

Meanwhile, the unflappable Koepka became the fifth player to win the U.S. Open and the PGA in the same year. The others are Woods, Jack Nicklaus, Ben Hogan and Gene Sarazen.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL

BALTIMORE (AP) — The attorney for the family of the University of Maryland offensive lineman who died after a strenuous offseason workout is calling for Terrapins football coach DJ Durkin to be fired, citing the abusive culture of the program and the team's failure to properly react after Jordan McNair fell ill on the practice field.

The 19-year-old McNair was hospitalized May 29 and died June 13. McNair family attorney Billy Murphy Jr. said Sunday he's seen the preliminary death certificate and has concluded, "This is an obvious heat-stroke case."

Durkin was placed on administra-

tive leave Saturday in the wake of reports that he and his staff verbally abused and humiliated players since his arrival in College Park, Maryland, two years ago.

PRO FOOTBALL

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The Jacksonville Jaguars suspended All-Pro cornerback Jalen Ramsey and defensive end Dante Fowler on Sunday for violating team rules and conduct unbecoming a Jaguars football player.

Neither one will make the trip to Minnesota on Tuesday for two days of joint practices and a preseason game. The teams play Saturday.

Fowler was involved in several fights Sunday, including one after practice with fellow defensive end

Yannick Ngakoue. Ramsey shouted profanities at media members who captured the altercation on video and later threatened reporters with "war" for releasing the video. Ramsey made his threat via Twitter.

The team released a one-sentence statement Sunday evening announcing the suspensions.

AUTO RACING

BROOKLYN, Mich. (AP) — Kevin Harvick broke a tie atop NASCAR's Big 3 with a dominant performance, easily winning at Michigan International Speedway for his Cup-high seventh victory of the season. His No. 4 Ford finished 3-plus seconds ahead of Brad Keselowski's No. 2 Ford on Sunday.

Kyle Busch, who started the day

with the points lead, finished third in his No. 18 Toyota — more than 4 seconds behind Harvick.

Busch has won six races this year and Martin Truex Jr. has finished in first four times. The rest of the field has combined to win just six of 23 races.

Truex Jr., the third driver in NASCAR's Big 3 with Harvick and Busch, was 14th in the 40-car field in his No. 78 Toyota.

TENNIS

TORONTO (AP) — Rafael Nadal won his 80th ATP World Tour title Sunday — and spoiled Stefanos Tsitsipas' 20th birthday.

The top-ranked Nadal beat the unseeded Greek upstart 6-2, 7-6 (4) for his fourth Rogers Cup crown and fifth victory of the year. He has 33 ATP World Tour Masters 1000 titles.

The 32-year-old Spanish star also won the Rogers Cup in Toronto in 2008 and Montreal in 2005 and 2013.

Nadal later announced that he would skip a Masters tournament in Cincinnati this week to rest and get ready for the U.S. Open.

MONTREAL (AP) — Top-ranked Simona Halep outlasted third-ranked Sloane Stephens 7-6 (6), 3-6, 6-4 on Sunday to win her second Rogers Cup title.

The 26-year-old Romanian star also won the hard-court event that rotates between Toronto and Montreal in 2016 in Montreal.

In a rematch of Halep's French Open final victory, she overcame Stephens in the match that had 15 service breaks. Halep has won her last six meetings with the 25-year-old American. Stephens, preparing for her U.S. Open title defense, is 0-8 against No. 1-ranked players.
