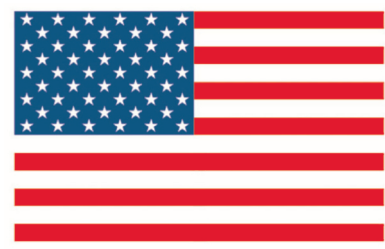

Armed faculty and staff members ready to defend Big Spring schools

In May, the Big Spring ISD Board of Trustees approved the Guardian program to start in the 2018-2019 school year, allowing some faculty and staff members to carry concealed firearms on campus during the school day to defend against the possibility of school shootings.

Since then, district personnel involved with the program – whose identities are kept confidential – have been selected, tested and trained; and signs have gone up at schools throughout Big Spring warning that there are armed people on campus.

BSISD Superintendent Jay McWilliams says the program is ready for the new school year.

"It's coming together great," he said. "First of all, we have all of the signs basically letting anyone coming into the building know that we are participating in that program and we do have staff members armed. As of right now, every campus except two have the signs in front, and plans are that they'll be done by Monday. Our guardians, and that's what we call them, let's just go down the list. They all have their license to carry."

Anderson Accelerated orientation gets kids ready for school year

Students planning to attend Anderson Accelerated filed through the school doors for orientation Thursday evening.

Anderson is a school of choice located here in Big Spring. The school houses Big Spring Independent School District's Alternative Education programs, including the voluntary "Accelerated" alternative program and the Disciplinary Alternative Education Program (DAEP), and serves students in grades 7-12.

While students have the choice to opt into the Accelerated Alternative Program at Anderson, the goal for students in DAEP is to help them remain current in their coursework while being removed from their prospective schools for disciplinary reasons.

Staff work with all students and provide individual tutoring as needed to ensure students complete

their school work and related studies. In addition, staff work with students to build self-esteem by focusing on social, emotional skills through group and individual talks.

Upon entering the orientation, students and parents were greeted by the principal, assistant principal, and staff with smiling faces who were eager to meet new and returning students. Pizza, cookies, and refreshments which were served by Anderson's own instructional aide Randy Sanders and wife Rhonda Sanders were handed out to students and parents while they were filling out all the proper documentation and meeting with teachers.

"We have an amazing group of staff members, we call the A Team, here at Anderson. They are dedicated to serving the youth in our community. We are lucky to have some additional staff members this year and can't wait to get the school year started," Anderson Accelerated principal

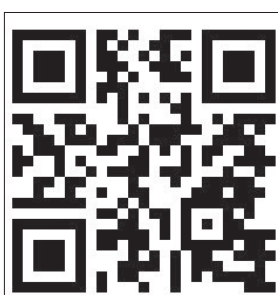

"We had departments spread out through different areas. We had (Distribution and Collection), which is utilities, and Warehouse out at the Airpark; and we had Code Enforcement and Permits and Planning and Mapping over here at old City Annex," said Assistant City Manager John Medina. "We have that central area for the park that we wanted to go into partnership with the Ryan Group, the Caprock people. Part of that project was, we would have to vacate that building, because all of that would be

You have to do that. They all went through a psychological exam very similar to an exam that is given to a prospective police officer. They have all completed a two-day, intense, rigorous ALERRT (Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training) training. It deals with active shooting, real-life situations, scenarios that you could be put in. From what I was told, the number-one word that comes to mind is 'intense.' And that's good, because we want to make it as realistic as possible so that these are the type of people we want in the program."

Although the identities of participants in the program are confidential, the group's Director is Jim Wommack, associate principal at Big Spring Junior High School. McWilliams said Wommack has nothing but praise for the contributions of the Big Spring Police Department and How-

ard County Sheriff's Department to the program.

"(Guardians) also spent time on a firing range with our police and our Howard County Sheriff's Department. Let me just give a little bit of a shout-out that our Campus Carry Director told me, and I can tell you as well, the Howard County Sheriff's Department and Big Spring Police Department have bent over backward to help us," said McWilliams. "They have been of great assistance, and I really, really feel good about the partnership with those two groups."

Guardians are required to provide their own weapons, which must meet school district specifications, and must either be a 9-millimeter or .380-caliber handgun, McWilliams said.

"The guns they carry are under the specifications of our school board, which is either a 9 millimeter or a .380," he said. "The ammunition is supplied by the school district in terms of what they carry, because we wanted a specific type of bullets, and they've got them."

McWilliams said plans are already underway to expand the program over the coming school year.

"During this first semester, we'll get together and I'll send out another, for want of a better word, invite email to everybody in Big Spring ISD, and see if there are people who are interested in being part of the next group going through the training," he said. "We've already had several people ask us, who already have their license to carry, that they would like to be part of it."

Existing Guardians will retake the training classes along with new recruits, he said.

"That training, we've already decided, if we send some new people through ALERRT, we're going to send our other people there again, because it's good practice," he said. "It's kind of like everything else, the more you practice, the better you get. If we're going to do this, we want to be the very, very best in the state at going about it."

McWilliams said he has every confidence in the Guardian Program per-

sonnel that are in place for the start of school.

"I'd prefer that we never even had to talk about this topic, of course. But unfortunately, circumstances, things that have happened in the United States and around the world have told us that it's better to be proactive in this situation than to sit back and say, 'Well, it's never going to happen to us,'" he said. "We hope that it never does, but we're going to be proactive in our approach. If something were ever to happen, at least we'll have a front line. We are not the police. We are not the sheriff's department. We are not taking their place. We are just there to lessen any damage until they show up. Do I feel confident in the people we have? Very confident."

green area, as part of that Plaza. So we had to find a place. We had to plan, 'What are we going to do?'"

The city considered a few options before opting to buy the new building.

"We looked at moving service back to Polly Mays, where the Water office is, behind the Post Office. Then this building came up on the market, and we said, 'Hey, instead of paying rent over at the Airpark, let's just consolidate and get everybody in a 'one-stop shop' kind of area," Medina said. "That's kind of what drove the decision to purchase that building, was to move out of the City Annex, and then we said, 'Well, this building's big enough to hold other departments,' and here we are."

The new building is across the street caddy-corner from the old City Annex, Medina said.

"They're moving in there now. It's kind of a work in prog-

ress," he said. "You know when you move, you still have boxes here and there and everywhere. They're trying to get organized. It's going to take a little while to get us all settled. Right now we're trying to move our Warehouse operations from the Airpark to the new city annex. Hopefully by the end of September we'll be in there."

Medina said the move should save the city money.

"Expense-wise, it's more economical for us to have more city services in one location and less cost," he said. "We kind of did minimal renovations there, more of a kind of 'paint and patch' kind of a thing. We didn't need to do a lot of major renovations."

1 killed, 3 hurt in North Texas plane crash

RHOME, Texas (AP) — The pilot of a small plane was killed and his three passengers, two of them children, were injured when the single-engine aircraft crashed on takeoff from a rural North Texas airfield.

The Texas Department of Public Safety says the Cessna 172 aircraft was taking off around 7:30 p.m. Thursday from the Rhome Meadows Airport, about 30 miles (48 kilometers) north of Fort Worth.

The DPS said the pilot was killed outright, while an adult male passenger and a child were airlifted to Fort Worth hospitals with severe injuries. Another child was taken to a Fort Worth hospital by ambulance. Their identities and conditions are unknown.

The cause of the crash remains unclear, and the National Transportation Safety Board will investigate.

Murder trial to begin for Texas officer who killed teen

DALLAS (AP) — A murder trial for a former Texas police officer who killed a black 15-year-old teenager highlights the heightened role video evidence plays in high-profile police shootings that have stirred discourse and triggered protests nationwide over issues of race and law enforcement.

Former Balch Springs officer Roy Oliver, who is white, opened fire

last year into a moving car filled with five black teenagers, killing high school freshman Jordan Edwards. Oliver, 38, joined the department in 2011 and was fired after the fatal shooting, an incident that was thrust into a national conversation on the shooting of African Americans by police.

The jury trial is scheduled to begin Thursday in Dallas, but Oliver's defense attorneys on Wednesday filed an emergency stay to delay its start. A spokesperson for the Dallas County district attorney's office said the trial is expected to last about two weeks.

Following the shooting, the Balch Springs police chief reported that police video had contradicted his agency's original statement on the incident. Police first said the vehicle backed up toward officers "in an aggressive manner," but police later reported video showed the vehicle was moving forward as officers, after responding to a report of underage drinking at a house party, approached.

Gal Pissetzky, a Chicago defense attorney, says he does not see any downsides for prosecutors heading into the case, particularly because the case will be heard in front of a jury instead of a judge. Judges, he said, often seem more lenient to police officers.

Other legal experts said securing a conviction against an officer is a challenge because crimi-

nal culpability in these cases is subjective and jurors are more inclined to believe police testimony.

Philip Stinson, a criminologist at Bowling Green State University in Ohio who tracks police shootings, said officers can testify they were in fear for their life, and jurors are often reluctant to second guess the decisions of an officer faced with an intense street encounter.

By Sinton's count, there have been 93 non-federal law enforcement officers since 2005 arrested for murder or manslaughter in on-duty fatal shootings as of Monday.

Even when armed with video evidence, attorneys can fail to deliver a conviction against an officer, he said.

"Video alone is not (going to) win the case for prosecutors," he said.

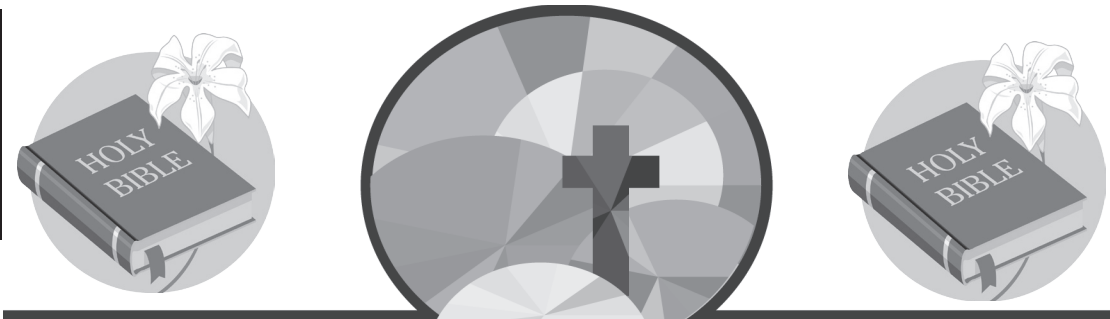

Reflections: Dog Theology

Over the years our family has included both cats and dogs that helped us raise our kids. They became our companions. Our cats seemed willing to allow us the privilege of living with them. Our dogs seemed grateful for the privilege of living with us. They taught us the difference between dog theology and cat theology.

It might sound strange, even sacrilegious to a few, but Bob Sjogren and Gerald Robison have developed whole seminars and books around "cat and dog theology." (www.catndogtheology.com). Simply put, cats say, "You feed me, shelter me and care for me. I must be god." Dogs say, "You feed me, shelter me and care for me. You must be god." If you have ever had a cat and a dog you know what I mean. Cat theology is me-centered. "What can God do for me?" Dog theology is God centered. "What does God want me to do?" Here are a few things I am learning about

"dog theology" from my dog, Buddy.

Buddy trusts me. Whenever I get in my truck he jumps in and takes his place, ready to go. He doesn't know where we are going or what we are going to do. But he believes that if I am driving it is okay. I need to be more like that with God. I always want to know where we are going, when we are going to get there and what we are going to do once we arrive. I need to jump in the truck with God and give him control of my life.

Buddy wants to be with me. He doesn't care if he is at the lake running, splashing and rolling in the mud, sitting in a chair next to me on the patio or in my study lying at my feet while I write. He just wants to be where I am. I need to spend time with God. What made the early disciples different was the fact they had been with Jesus (Acts 4:13).

Buddy follows me. He even follows me from room to room in the house. Whenever we go for a walk on an empty beach, I let him off his leash and he runs free. But he keeps an eye on me. He has developed a radius of his own, about thirty yards from wherever I am. Within that radius he feels com-

fortable sniffing washed up driftwood and marking sand dunes. Occasionally he gets out of eyesight. But, when I call his name he comes running. Not real fast, but as fast as he can. After all he is a Corgi. It reminds me of what Jesus said to His disciples, "Come, follow me!" "My sheep know my voice."

Buddy waits for me. If I am writing, he lies down, rests his head on his paws, keeps one eye on me and waits. If we are walking and I stop, he sits down with his tongue hanging out and waits. If I go to the store, he waits in my truck until I return. Buddy never complains about waiting on me. He never gets in a hurry. Maybe I should be more like that with respect to God and those I love.

Buddy has his own book, *Buddy the Floppy Ear Corgi*, on Amazon that tells how he was rescued off the streets and how he learned to love himself and others just the way God made them. Since God has rescued me, I can love myself and others too, just the way He made us.

since 2016, then took the loss Wednesday at Dodger Stadium.

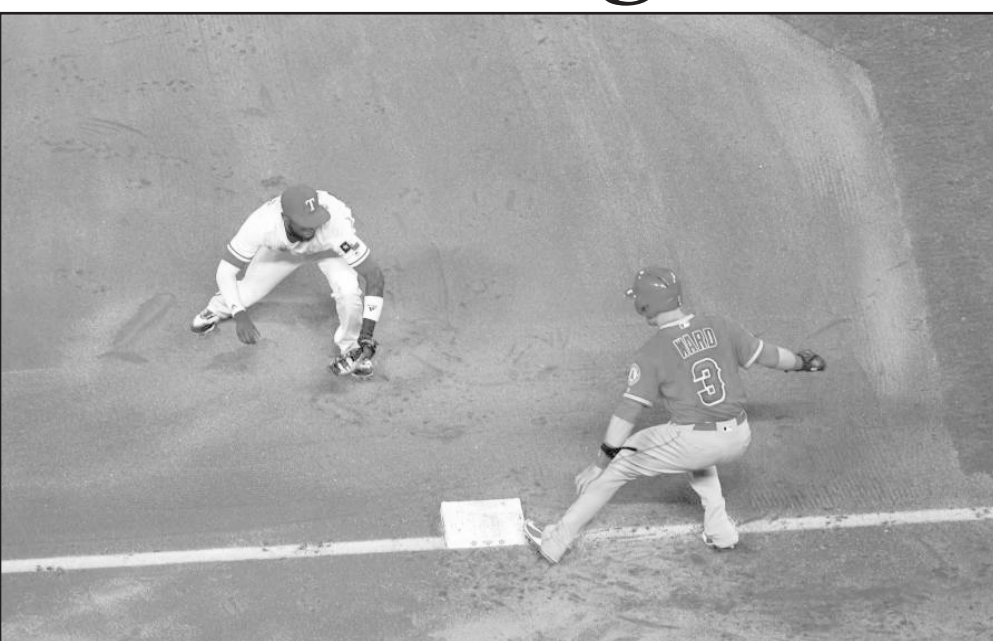
CENTRAL SHOWDOWNS

Profar starts triple play and homers, Rangers rally past LAA

ARLINGTON, Texas — Triple plays are rare enough to begin with. Jurickson Profar and the Texas Rangers turned one that was especially unusual Thursday night.

In fact, it had been more than a century since there was another one like it in the majors.

"It was an all-around heads-up play by Profar," Texas manager Jeff Banister said. "Very slow heartbeat in that moment."

Profar started the defensive gem at third base and later homered to help the Rangers rally from an early five-run deficit for an 8-6 victory over the Los Angeles Angels.

Texas pulled off the sixth triple play in franchise history in the fourth inning. With the bases loaded, David Fletcher hit a low liner toward third that Profar picked on a short hop with a dive to his right. Playing near the bag, he quickly stepped on third to force out Eric Young Jr. and tagged Taylor Ward, who had stumbled off the base into foul territory. Pro-

far then threw to second baseman Rougned Odor for the third out.

Just to be sure, Odor chased down Kole Calhoun and tagged him between first and second.

"Every runner thought it was a line drive," Profar said, "so that's why we got the triple play."

It was the majors' first triple play without retiring the batter since June 3, 1912, when the Brooklyn Dodgers turned the trick against the Cincinnati Reds.

"Yeah, it was kind of confusing the way it happened," Fletcher said.

Odor singled home the go-ahead run in the eighth after an out call that would have ended the inning was reversed. Nomar Mazara went deep in his return from the disabled list, and Joey Gallo also homered for the Rangers.

Texas scored three runs in the eighth as Justin Anderson (3-3), the seventh of eight Angels pitchers in a "bullpen game," allowed the first four batters to reach base.

Kingsbury not nervous about Texas Tech's QB uncertainty

Texas Tech coach Kliff Kingsbury was asked if he was nervous about the uncertainty at quarterback for the Red Raiders.

"Just because they're young or inexperienced, to me you never know how they're going to respond," Kingsbury said. "I wouldn't say nervous. I think excited to not really know who it is and be able to work with those guys and try to have one guy really step up."

Sophomore Jett Duffey is a dual-threat option with some similarities to Patrick Mahomes, who bypassed his senior season at Tech for early entry into the NFL draft and was succeeded last year by Nic Shimonek (3,963 yards passing, 33 TDs) in his final season. Shimonek finished the regular season-ending win over Texas that solidified Kingsbury's return as coach after McLane Carter got his first start in that game.

Along with Duffey and junior Carter, the Red Raiders have talented true freshman Alan Bowman, who was there for spring drills.

"We'll stress them, put them in a lot of high-stress situations over camp to see who responds," said Kingsbury, who threw for 12,429 yards and 95 TDs in 43 games for the Red Raiders from

1999-2002, and is 30-33 overall (16-29 in Big 12) in five seasons as their coach.

While making no wild predictions about his current quarterbacks, Kingsbury brought up his first year as head coach in 2013 with freshman Baker Mayfield and Davis Webb, now with the New York Giants after ending his college career at California.

"Those two true freshmen that we didn't know, and those guys turned out to be pretty decent," said Kingsbury, who before that was offensive coordinator at Texas A&M with Heisman Trophy-winning freshman quarterback Johnny Manziel.

In Kingsbury's first game as Tech's coach, Mayfield became the first walk-on true freshman quarterback to start a season opener for a BCS school. Mayfield was at Tech only one season before transferring to Oklahoma, where he led the Sooners to three consecutive Big 12 titles, won the Heisman Trophy last season and was the top overall pick in the NFL draft.

With David Gibbs going into his fourth season as defensive coordinator, and the defense greatly improved in that time, Kingsbury can put more attention into the quarterback situation. The defense could also take some pressure off of the offense.

Contract Bridge

Bidding quiz

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

West	North	East	South
1 ♣	1 ♠	Pass	?

What would you bid with each of the following hands?

- ♠ Q853 ♥ AQJ64 ♦ 72 ♣ 95
- ♠ J5 ♥ AQ ♦ AQ973 ♣ KJ84
- ♠ AJ72 ♥ KQ832 ♦ 96 ♣ A3
- ♠ A8652 ♥ 7 ♦ AK9843 ♣ 5

- 1. Two spades.** Before going into the answers, it might be best to first clarify the meaning of partner's spade bid. Generally, an overcall on the one-level indicates a good five-card or longer suit and about eight to 16 points in high cards. It is most often intended as a competitive bid aimed mainly at achieving a partscore, and at depriving the opponents of bidding spaces. The partner of the overcaller responds accordingly, bearing in mind that the overcall may be based on as little as eight or nine high-card points. With this hand, the proper action is a single raise in spades, which invites partner to continue bidding if he has significantly more than a minimum overcall. It would be wrong to bid two hearts, which is not forcing and might be passed all around.
- 2. Three notrump.** It is highly likely that game can be made, and the surest way of getting there is to take the direct route. Whatever the nature of partner's spade bid, your hand figures to produce a game opposite it. Partner might have bid largely on distributional values, in which case he is free to correct to four spades, but if he accepts three notrump as the contract, it will probably be made. A jump to two notrump would not be forcing and would show a lesser hand. Nor is there any point to bidding diamonds with a hand so pre-eminently satisfactory for notrump.
- 3. Four spades.** Regardless of the type of hand partner has for his overcall, game must be undertaken. It is hard to imagine a one-spade bid opposite your hand that would be likely to lose four tricks. Three spades — a mere invitation to game — would not be sufficient with a hand of this magnitude.
- 4. Four notrump.** Despite West's opening bid, slam is a distinct possibility with this hand opposite partner's overcall. How many high-card points partner actually has is not important, but whether he has an ace is. The best way to determine this is via Blackwood. If partner responds five diamonds, showing one ace, you plan to bid six spades. Partner may have as little as ♠ KJ973 ♥ A52 ♦ 75 ♣ 862, and yet even this sad collection is a strong favorite to produce 12 tricks.

"I think with the younger quarterback, hopefully you're not (feeling) you've got to out and score every possession to try to keep up," Kingsbury said. "If your defense is keeping you in the game, that alleviates some of that pressure on a young quarterback."

RARE FOURTH

Gibbs is the first Texas Tech defensive coordinator in two decades to stay four consecutive seasons. Gibbs is under contract through 2019. The last defensive coordinator to stay that long was John Goodner, the DC from 1995-99 while on Spike Dykes' staff.

"We have a chance to be a better defense than we've been," Kingsbury said. "I think just the continuity has a lot to do with that."

Texas Tech will open and close its regular season in NFL stadiums. The

They host Kansas on Oct. 20, then go to Iowa State before back-to-back home games against Oklahoma and Texas. After the neutral site opener, Tech's other two non-conference games are at home, against Lamar and Houston.

HEALTHY KICKER

Clayton Hatfield made 27 of 30 field goal attempts his first two seasons for Tech, but was only 6-of-10 in six games last year while dealing with nagging injuries. He missed inside of 40 yards (31-yard attempt) for the first time in his career.

Kingsbury said he felt Hatfield "was trying to kind of overcompensate and do some different things because he was injured and didn't get back into a rhythm until after the season when he was fully healthy."

Rangers 3B Adrian Beltre missed his second straight game after leaving Monday's game with a hamstring injury. The team will wait a few days before deciding whether to put the 39-year-old on the

disabled list for the third time this season — each because of an injured hamstring. "I don't feel that bad," Beltre said. "So, wait a couple days to make a decision on that."

CALHOUN STAYS HOT

Calhoun went 3 for 4 with his 17th homer and is hitting .304 with 16 home runs in 50 games since returning from the disabled list on June 18. He previously hit .145 with one homer in 50 games.

Rangers OF Willie Calhoun was optioned to Triple-A Round Rock to make room for Mazara. Angels LHP Ty Buttrey and RHP Osmer Morales made their major league debuts, giving Los Angeles a club-record 14 players who have done so this season and a team-record 56 players who have appeared in a game this year. ... Texas acquired RHP Kelvin Gonzalez from Kansas City for international slot money.

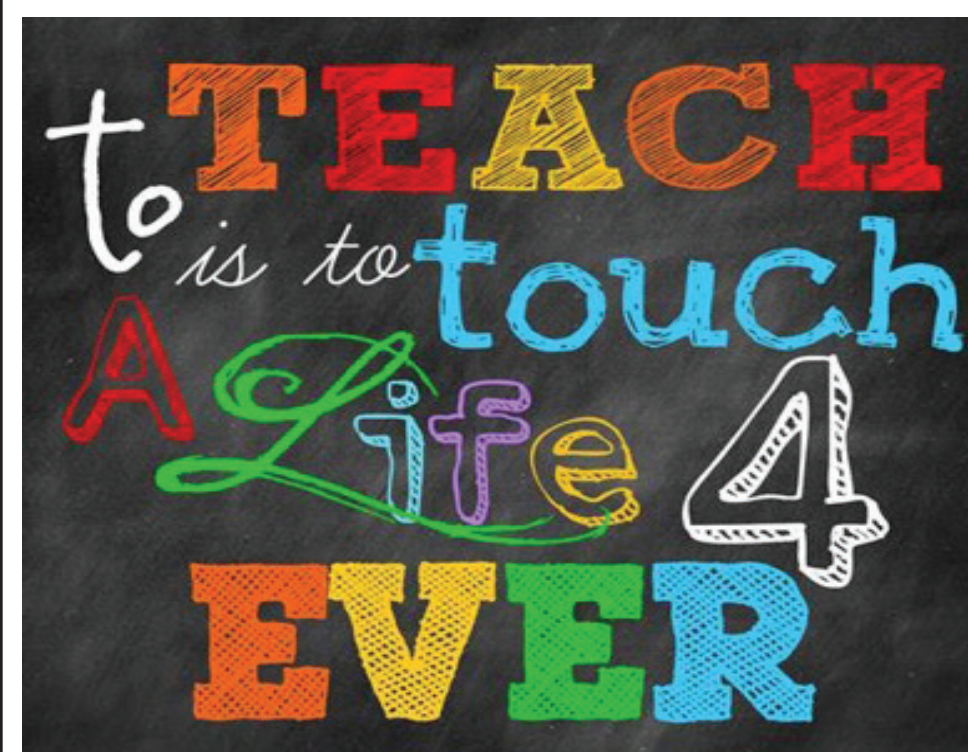
