According to the application for the permit submitted by Big

Spring's John Scott, the planned traffic associated with the facility should amount to 10 to 12 commercial trucks per week, and 25 additional cars per day during the facility's hours of operation, Thursday through Sunday. Later in the meet-

ing, the council will vote on a resolution to approve the permit, which would allow

the council will hear a presentation from 9-1-1 Director Pepper Sullivan regarding the proposed annual budget for the 9-1-1 Communication District.

According to the proposed budget, total planned expenditures for the district in the 2018-2019 fiscal year are \$259,156, down \$16,150 from the current year's \$275,306.

Services for McCain set for Phoenix. Washington, **Annapolis**

WASHINGTON — Sen. John McCain's service to his country began more than six decades ago at the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis and will end there in a cemetery overlooking Maryland's Severn River.

A private burial service next Sunday will conclude nearly a week of events honoring the Navy aviator, prisoner of war, congressman, long time senator and presidential contender. The Arizona Republican died of brain cancer Saturday at 81 at his ranch near Sedona.

Plans taking shape called for McCain to lie in state Wednesday in the Arizona State Capitol on what would have been his 82nd birthday. A funeral will be conducted Thursday at North Phoenix Baptist Church with former Vice President Joe Biden speaking. In Washington, McCain will lie in state Friday in the Capitol Rotun-

da with a formal ceremony and time for the public to pay respects. On Saturday, a procession will pass the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and arrive for a funeral at Washington National Cathedral. Former Presidents George W. Bush and Barack Obama are expected to speak at the A private funeral is planned for Sunday afternoon at the Naval Acad-

emy Chapel followed by a private burial at the academy cemetery. As he wished, McCain will be buried next to a Naval Academy classmate and lifelong friend, Chuck Larson. President Donald Trump was not expected to attend any of the servic-

es. McCain had long feuded with Trump, and two White House officials

said McCain's family had asked, before the senator's death, that Trump

not attend services. Vice President Mike Pence is likely to attend, said the officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity to describe private Trump noted the senator's death in a tweet Saturday: "My deepest

sympathies and respect go out to the family of Senator John McCain. Our hearts and prayers are with you!" First lady Melania Trump tweet-

ed thanks to McCain for his service to the country. Bush and Obama had been McCain's political opponents, too, block-

> ing his White House ambitions in 2000 and 2008, respectively. "These were bitter contests, both of them," Sen. Jeff Flake, R-Ariz., said Sunday on CBS' "Face the Nation," and "to ask them to speak at your funeral, and for them to be honored at the opportunity, that tells you all you need to know." One of McCain's long-serving Senate colleagues

Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., said Sunday, "The nation mourns the loss of a great American patriot, a statesman who put his country first and enriched this institution through many years of service."

With McCain set to be honored in Arizona's Capitol, GOP Gov. Doug Ducey said in a tweet, "This is a rare and distinct occurrence for a truly special Ducey did not plan to announce his selection of

a Senate successor to McCain until after McCain's burial. Under state law, the governor's appointee to serve until the next general election, in 2020, must come from the same political party. Tributes poured in from around the globe. French

President Emmanuel Macron tweeted in English that McCain "was a true American hero. He devoted his entire life to his country." Israel's prime minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, said McCain's support for the Jewish state "never wavered. It sprang from his belief in democracy and freedom." And Germany's chancellor, Angela Merkel, called McCain "a tireless fighter for a strong trans-Atlantic alliance. His significance went well beyond his own country.'

McCain was the son and grandson of admirals and followed them to the U.S. Naval Academy. A pilot, he was shot down over Vietnam and held as a prisoner of war for more than five years. He went on to win a seat in the House and in 1986, the Senate, where he served for the rest of his life.

"He had a joy about politics and a love for his country that was unmatched," Sen. Amy Klobuchar, D-Minn., told CNN's "State of the Union." "And while he never made it to the presidency, in

Astros get fifth straight win, 3-1 over Angels

ANAHEIM, Calif. — The Houston Astros made themselves at home in California this season, posting a record of 18-5.

After punctuating that success with their seventh win in nine games at Angel Stadium, the Astros are ready to take the momentum back home for a critical three-game series against second-place Oakland.

Framber Valdez gave up one run over five innings in his first career start, Carlos Correa drove in two runs and the Astros beat the Los Angeles Angels 3-1 on Sunday for their fifth

SAN FRANCISCO — Derek Holland got a little extra pleasure out of beating the Texas Rangers, a team he believes gave up on him two years ago.

The veteran left-hander pitched three-hit ball into the seventh inning against his original club, Steven Duggar hit a two-run triple and the San Francisco Giants topped Texas 3-1 on

"I wanted to go out there, make sure I continue with what we've been doing this whole year, continue the same game plan and just kind of go from there," Holland said. "Obviously, a win is great. To go against my former teammates and those guys, it is a little bit better — so now I can maybe say some stuff to them.'

Holland, who won 62 games over eight seasons with the Rangers after they drafted him in 2006, was mostly sharp while notching consecutive victories for the first time this season.

He vielded one run and three walks with four strikeouts, then left to a standing ovation from the San Francisco crowd.

"Just pitched a beautiful game," Giants manager Bruce Bochy said. "It's great to see players like Derek, who it looks like they may be toward the end of their career, bounce back and show that there's a lot of game left in what they have."

Four days earlier, Holland (7-8) gained national attention after making a racially insensitive joke while appearing on MLB Network alongside Giants massage therapist Haro Ogawa in a bit that was meant to be fun. Holland later apologized for his comment.

Watt, Suh back on field in Rams' 21-20 win over Texans

LOS ANGELES — Even after everything J.J. Watt has accomplished in football, he still relished the chance to walk on - and off - the field for his first game action since breaking

Todd Gurley, Jared Goff and the rest of the Los Angeles Rams' offense won't get any action at all in this preseason, but they insist they'll still be ready for the games that count.

Rookie John Kelly rushed for 64 yards and two touchdowns, and the Rams briefly debuted their new defensive stars in a 21-20 preseason victory over Watt and the Houston Texans on Saturday.

Watt started and made a tackle roughly 10 1/2 months after he got hurt in the Texans' fifth game last season. The chance to catch up with former defensive coordinator Wade Phillips was just a bonus on an exciting day for the veteran superstar.

"I liked that I came off (the field) under my own power," Watt said with a grin. "It's football. It's where I feel the most natural. It's where I feel at

Houston's first-team defense looked sharp, but the Rams' backup offensive players put together enough points to win it. Watt and Jadeveon Clowney were long finished by the time Nick Rose missed a 57-yard field goal at the

gun in the Texans' first loss of the preseason.

"I mean, they didn't have Todd Gurley out there, or Jared Goff," Watt said. "But we flew around. We had fun. We did what we're supposed to do. We had three series and held them to 2 yards, and we got a pick. We'll take that. That's what we expect to do with their offensive all-stars sitting

The Texans were thrilled to see Watt looking healthy and happy.

"He's really worked hard to get back to where he's at right now," Houston coach Bill O'Brien said. "I think he's playing at a real high level, from what we've seen every single day. From what I could see today, the first-team defense went out there and did a nice

job." Watt is a three-time NFL Defensive Player of the Year, but he didn't get to see the current holder of the award. Aaron Donald is still deep in his second consecutive contract holdout from the Rams.

Los Angeles' first-team defense also excelled despite Donald's continued absence. Ndamukong Suh and cornerbacks Marcus Peters and Aqib Talib all got their first action with the Rams early in the first quarter, and Suh managed to hit Deshaun Watson as the quarterback uncorked a long throw that was intercepted by Lamarcus Joyner on the Texans' second se-

But the Rams rested 10 of their presumptive offensive starters for the third straight week, keeping the wraps on the team that led the NFL in scoring last season. The decision all but ensures Gurley and Goff will go into the regular season without taking a snap in a preseason game.

"When you balance the risk/reward, we felt like as a coaching staff this was going to be the best thing for us," Rams coach Sean McVay said. "You do have 10 of 11 starters returning (from last season). You don't take anything for granted ... (but) this is what we felt like is best for our football team. Might not be for everybody. Might be disagreements, but this is what we talked about as a coaching staff, and this is the decision we made."

This Date In History

Today is Monday, Aug. 27, the 239th day of 2018. There are 126 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On August 27, 1928, the Kellogg-Briand Pact was signed in Paris, outlawing war and providing for the peaceful settlement of disputes.

On this date:

In 1776, the Battle of Long Island began during the Revolutionary War as British troops attacked American forces who ended up being forced to retreat two days later.

In 1859, Edwin L. Drake drilled the first successful oil well in the United States, at Titusville, Pa.

In 1883, the island volcano Krakatoa erupted with a series of cataclysmic explosions; the resulting tidal waves in Indonesia's Sunda Strait claimed some 36,000 lives in Java and Sumatra.

In 1892, fire seriously damaged New York's original Metropolitan Opera House. In 1949, a violent white

mob prevented an outdoor concert headlined by Paul Robeson from taking place near Peekskill, New York. (The concert was held eight days later.) In 1962, the United States

launched the Mariner 2 space probe, which flew past Venus in December 1962.In 1964, the Walt Disney

movie musical fantasy "Mary Poppins," starring Julie Andrews and Dick Van Dyke, premiered at Grauman's Chinese Theater in Hollywood.

In 1967, Brian Epstein, manager of the Beatles, was found dead in his London flat from an accidental overdose of sleeping pills; he was

In 1975, Haile Selassie (HY'-lee sehl-AH'-see), the last emperor of Ethiopia's 3,000-year-old monarchy, died in Addis Ababa at age 83 almost a year after being

overthrown. In 1979, British war hero Lord Louis Mountbatten and three other people, including his 14-vear-old grandson Nicholas, were killed off the coast of Ireland in a boat explosion claimed by the Irish Republican

Armv. In 1989, the first U.S. commercial satellite rocket was from launched Cape Canaveral, Florida Delta booster carrying a British communications satellite, the Marcopolo 1.

In 2006, a Comair CRJ-100 crashed after trying to take off from the wrong runway in Lexington, Ky., killing 49 people and leaving the copilot the sole survivor.

Ten years ago: Barack Obama was nominated for president by the Democratic National Convention in Denver. A federal judge in Boise, Idaho, sentenced longtime sex offender Joseph Edward Duncan III to death for the 2005 kidnapping, torture and murder of 9-year-old Dylan Groene (GROH'-nee).

Five years ago: Maj. Nidal Hasan, the Army psychiatrist who'd fatally shot 13 people at Fort Hood, Texas, in 2009, rested his case without presenting any evidence during his trial's penalty phase. (Hasan ended up being sentenced to death.)

One year ago: Hurricane Harvey sent devastating floods into Houston, with rising water chasing thousands of people to rooftops or higher ground; streets became rivers navigable only by boat. A rally in Berkeley, California, was disrupted when scores of anarchists wearing black clothing and masks stormed the demonstration and attacked several supporters of President Donald Trump.
