## City council to consider permit for microbrewery

Discussion and a vote on a microbrewery and brewpub planned for South Scurry will lead off Tuesday night's Big Spring City Council meeting.

The meeting will be held in the City Council Chambers, 307 E. Fourth St. at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday.

A public hearing on whether to grant a specific use permit

for the microbrewery and brewpub is the first business item on the agenda. Local residents will have the opportunity to address the council on whether they should approve the permit for the business, which would craft and sell beer on the southwest corner at the intersection of 14th and South Scurry streets.

According to the application for the permit submitted by Big

Spring's John Scott, the planned traffic associated with the facility should amount to 10 to 12 commercial trucks per week, and 25 additional cars per day during the facility's hours of operation, Thursday through Sunday.

Later in the meeting, the council will vote on a resolution to approve the permit, which would allow the

the council will hear a presentation from 9-1-1 Director Pepper Sullivan regarding the proposed annual budget for the 9-1-1 Communication District.

According to the proposed budget, total planned expenditures for the district in the 2018-2019 fiscal year are \$259,156, down \$16,150 from the current year's \$275,306.

Total projected revenue remains steady at \$280,850, leaving the district with an unspent balance of \$21,694 for the upcoming year.

Among the changes in the budget is a planned \$20,000 reduction in salaries and benefits for district employees, with an accompanying \$2,000 reduction in payroll taxes.

The council will also:

- Hold a public hearing and vote on a request for a zoning change from Heavy Industrial to Single-Family Dwelling for three lots in the 900 block of Ohio Street.

- Consider awarding a bid for a wheeled excavator with a 60-inch Diamond Mower Attachment to Cisco Equipment of Odessa. According to a memo published with the meeting's agenda, bid packets were sent out to four companies, and three bids were received. Of those, Cisco's bid of \$228,506 for a Hyundai HW180/Diamond 60-inch rotary mower was the low bid.

- Consider approving the South Plains Association of Governments' proposal on an request for qualifications for Community Development Block Grant administrator. According to the agenda, South Plains was one of two replies the city received on their request for qualifications.

- Hear a presentation from Howard County Elections Administrator Jodi Duck on upgrades to election equipment.

- Discuss a request to have alcohol served and sold in a fenced area in front of the Comanche Trail Amphitheater to VIP patrons at the Country Rocks concert, scheduled Sept. 29.

- Consider on first reading an ordinance restricting \$1.9 million of the General Fund balance for street construction and sealcoating.

- Consider on first reading an ordinance adjusting water rates in response to an increase in water delivery charges from the city's water supplier, the Colorado River Municipal Water District.

# Services for McCain set for Phoenix, Washington, Annapolis

WASHINGTON — Sen. John McCain's service to his country began more than six decades ago at the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis and will end there in a cemetery overlooking Maryland's Severn River.

A private burial service next Sunday will conclude nearly a week of events honoring the Navy aviator, prisoner of war, congressman, longtime senator and presidential contender. The Arizona Republican died of brain cancer Saturday at 81 at his ranch near Sedona.

Plans taking shape called for McCain to lie in state Wednesday in the Arizona State Capitol on what would have been his 82nd birthday. A funeral will be conducted Thursday at North Phoenix Baptist Church with former Vice President Joe Biden speaking.

In Washington, McCain will lie in state Friday in the Capitol Rotunda with a formal ceremony and time for the public to pay respects. On Saturday, a procession will pass the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and arrive for a funeral at Washington National Cathedral. Former Presidents George W. Bush and Barack Obama are expected to speak at the service.

A private funeral is planned for Sunday afternoon at the Naval Academy Chapel followed by a private burial at the academy cemetery. As he wished, McCain will be buried next to a Naval Academy classmate and lifelong friend, Chuck Larson.

President Donald Trump was not expected to attend any of the services. McCain had long feuded with Trump, and two White House officials said McCain's family had asked, before the senator's death, that Trump not attend services. Vice President Mike Pence is likely to attend, said the officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity to describe private discussions.

Trump noted the senator's death in a tweet Saturday: "My deepest sympathies and respect go out to the family of Senator John McCain. Our hearts and prayers are with you!" First lady Melania Trump tweeted thanks to McCain for his service to the country.

Bush and Obama had been McCain's political opponents, too, blocking his White House ambitions in 2000 and 2008, respectively. "These were bitter contests, both of them," Sen. Jeff Flake, R-Ariz., said Sunday on CBS' "Face the Nation," and "to ask them to speak at your funeral, and for them to be honored at the opportunity, that tells you all you need to know."

One of McCain's long-serving Senate colleagues, Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., said Sunday, "The nation mourns the loss of a great American patriot, a statesman who put his country first and enriched this institution through many years of service."

With McCain set to be honored in Arizona's Capitol, GOP Gov. Doug Ducey said in a tweet, "This is a rare and distinct occurrence for a truly special man."

Ducey did not plan to announce his selection of a Senate successor to McCain until after McCain's burial. Under state law, the governor's appointee to serve until the next general election, in 2020, must come from the same political party.

Tributes poured in from around the globe. French President Emmanuel Macron tweeted in English that McCain "was a true American hero. He devoted his entire life to his country." Israel's prime minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, said McCain's support for the Jewish state "never wavered. It sprang from his belief in democracy and freedom." And Germany's chancellor, Angela Merkel, called McCain "a tireless fighter for a strong trans-Atlantic alliance. His significance went well beyond his own country."

McCain was the son and grandson of admirals and followed them to the U.S. Naval Academy. A pilot, he was shot down over Vietnam and held as a prisoner of war for more than five years. He went on to win a seat in the House and in 1986, the Senate, where he served for the rest of his life.

"He had a joy about politics and a love for his country that was unmatched," Sen. Amy Klobuchar, D-Minn., told CNN's "State of the Union." "And while he never made it to the presidency, in the Senate, he was the leader that would see a hot spot in the world and just say, we need to go there and stand up for that democracy."

## Astros get fifth straight win, 3-1 over Angels

ANAHEIM, Calif. — The Houston Astros made themselves at home in California this season, posting a record of 18-5.

After punctuating that success with their seventh win in nine games at Angel Stadium, the Astros are ready to take the momentum back home for a critical three-game series against second-place Oakland.

Fraber Valdez gave up one run over five innings in his first career start, Carlos Correa drove in two runs and the Astros beat the Los Angeles Angels 3-1 on Sunday for their fifth straight win.

"I don't think we need a lot of spark," Astros manager AJ Hinch said. "The spark is really trying to finish this off and win the division. Clearly we need to beat Oakland this week. It's not going to be decided this week. We'll be ready to play and we're excited to play

those guys, but we have a number of games moving forward that if we continue to play this kind of baseball, I don't care who we play, we're going to win."

The Astros went 6-3 during their West Coast road trip and improved to 47-21 away from home. Houston also matched their 1998 counterparts for the best record in franchise history through 130 games at 80-50.

Valdez (2-0) struck out three while allowing two hits and three walks in his first career start, making his case for the spot in Houston's rotation left vacant because of Lance McCullers Jr.'s forearm injury.

Correa had two RBIs on a line-drive single to centerfield with the bases loaded in the third inning that put the Astros in front 2-0. Marwin Gonzalez made it 3-0 with a base hit through the gap at first to score Alex Bregman.

## Holland, 3 relievers pitch Giants past Rangers 3-1

SAN FRANCISCO — Derek Holland got a little extra pleasure out of beating the Texas Rangers, a team he believes gave up on him two years ago.

The veteran left-hander pitched three-hit ball into the seventh inning against his original club, Steven Dugger hit a two-run triple and the San Francisco Giants topped Texas 3-1 on Sunday.

"I wanted to go out there, make sure I continue with what we've been doing this whole year, continue the same game plan and just kind of go from there," Holland said. "Obviously, a win is great. To go against my former teammates and those guys, it is a little bit better — so now I can maybe say some stuff to them."

Holland, who won 62 games over eight seasons with the Rangers after

they drafted him in 2006, was mostly sharp while notching consecutive victories for the first time this season.

He yielded one run and three walks with four strikeouts, then left to a standing ovation from the San Francisco crowd.

"Just pitched a beautiful game," Giants manager Bruce Bochy said. "It's great to see players like Derek, who it looks like they may be toward the end of their career, bounce back and show that there's a lot of game left in what they have."

Four days earlier, Holland (7-8) gained national attention after making a racially insensitive joke while appearing on MLB Network alongside Giants massage therapist Haro Ogawa in a bit that was meant to be fun. Holland later apologized for his comment.

## Watt, Suh back on field in Rams' 21-20 win over Texans

LOS ANGELES — Even after everything J.J. Watt has accomplished in football, he still relished the chance to walk on — and off — the field for his first game action since breaking his leg.

Todd Gurley, Jared Goff and the rest of the Los Angeles Rams' offense won't get any action at all in this pre-season, but they insist they'll still be ready for the games that count.

Rookie John Kelly rushed for 64 yards and two touchdowns, and the Rams briefly debuted their new defensive stars in a 21-20 preseason victory over Watt and the Houston Texans on Saturday.

Watt started and made a tackle roughly 10 1/2 months after he got hurt in the Texans' fifth game last season. The chance to catch up with former defensive coordinator Wade Phillips was just a bonus on an exciting day for the veteran superstar.

"I liked that I came off (the field) under my own power," Watt said with a grin. "It's football. It's where I feel the most natural. It's where I feel at home."

Houston's first-team defense looked sharp, but the Rams' backup offensive players put together enough points to win it. Watt and Jadeveon Clowney were long finished by the time Nick Rose missed a 57-yard field goal at the

gun in the Texans' first loss of the pre-season.

"I mean, they didn't have Todd Gurley out there, or Jared Goff," Watt said. "But we flew around. We had fun. We did what we're supposed to do. We had three series and held them to 2 yards, and we got a pick. We'll take that. That's what we expect to do with that. That's what we expect to do with their offensive all-stars sitting out."

The Texans were thrilled to see Watt looking healthy and happy.

"He's really worked hard to get back to where he's at right now," Houston coach Bill O'Brien said. "I think he's playing at a real high level, from what we've seen every single day. From what I could see today, the first-team defense went out there and did a nice job."

Watt is a three-time NFL Defensive

Player of the Year, but he didn't get to see the current holder of the award. Aaron Donald is still deep in his second consecutive contract holdout from the Rams.

Los Angeles' first-team defense also excelled despite Donald's continued absence. Ndamukong Suh and cornerback Marcus Peters and Aqib Talib all got their first action with the Rams early in the first quarter, and Suh managed to hit Deshaun Watson as the quarterback uncorked a long throw that was intercepted by Lamar Marcus Joyner on the Texans' second series.

But the Rams rested 10 of their presumptive offensive starters for the third straight week, keeping the wraps on the team that led the NFL in scoring last season. The decision all but ensures Gurley and Goff will go into the regular season without taking a snap in a preseason game.

"When you balance the risk/reward, we felt like as a coaching staff this was going to be the best thing for us," Rams coach Sean McVay said. "You do have 10 of 11 starters returning (from last season). You don't take anything for granted ... (but) this is what we felt like is best for our football team. Might not be for everybody. Might be disagreements, but this is what we talked about as a coaching staff, and this is the decision we made."

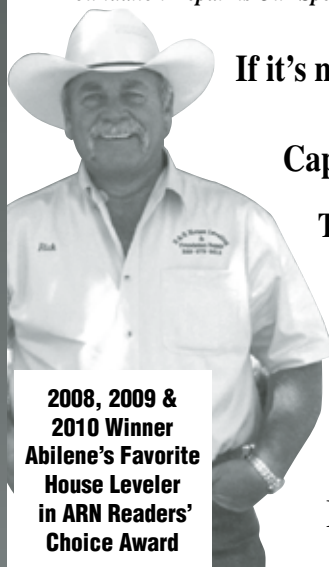

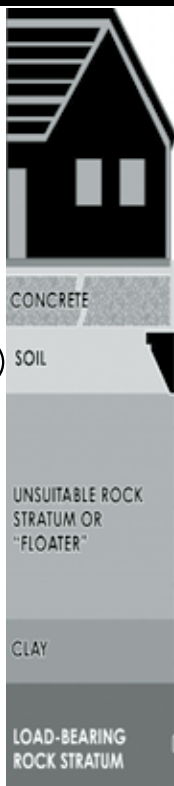

This deal from the 1995 Spingold Knockout teams dramatically demonstrates how a slight difference in judgment can radically affect the outcome of a deal.

The auction was identical at both tables. South arrived at three notrump after East opened with a weak two-heart bid. Both Wests led the heart ten, and both declarers played the eight from dummy.

At one table, Mike Passell, East, elected not to take his king in order to stop declarer from scoring three heart tricks. This could have been the winning play on another layout, but on this occasion it proved very costly.

Declarer, Lew Stansby, won the ten with the queen and played the A-Q-7 of clubs. West took his king on the third round and returned a low spade to East's queen, which held. The nine-of-spades return was also ducked by declarer, who still needed a ninth trick.

West won the spade with the king but found himself badly placed. He could not return a spade from the 10-7 into Stansby's A-8, so he shifted to a diamond. This helped South establish dummy's diamonds, and with the heart ace still in dummy as an entry, he had nine tricks.

At the other table, East, Zia Mahmood, grabbed the heart king at trick one and continued with a second heart, dislodging dummy's ace. Declarer, Chuck Burger, led a club to the queen, but West, Michael Rosenberg, did not take his king. Burger tried the ace and another club, but he was fighting a losing battle.

After winning the club king, Rosenberg returned the king of spades, ducked by declarer. A second spade was covered by the jack and queen, ducked again by South, and a third spade was taken by the ace.

Burger could do no better than cash his Q-J of hearts and exit with a spade, hoping West would win and be forced to yield a diamond entry to dummy. But with East holding the diamond K-J, declarer had no chance, and he finished down two.

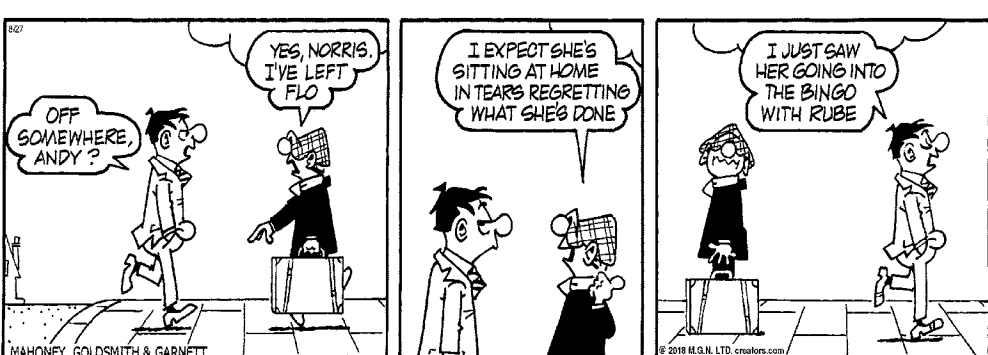

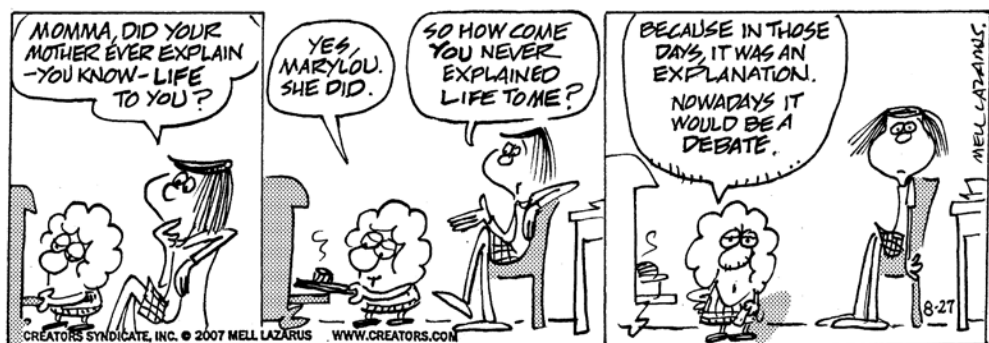

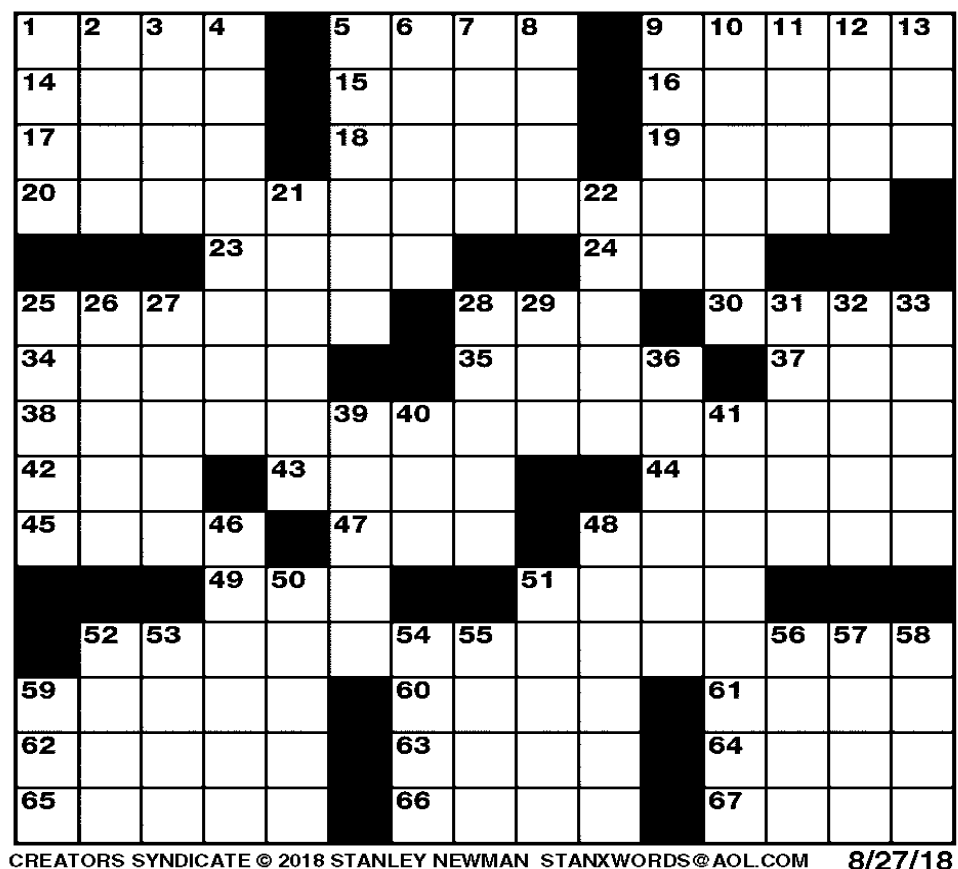

# Cards take 27-3 preseason win as Cowboys stars sit

ARLINGTON, Texas — Patrick Peterson hasn't faced a starting quarterback in the preseason.

The three-time All-Pro cornerback for the Arizona Cardinals is getting himself in regular-season form anyway.

Peterson returned an interception 30 yards for a touchdown after Dallas decided to sit quarterback Dak Prescott and running back Ezekiel Elliott in what was supposed to be the dress rehearsal, and the Cardinals rolled to a 27-3 exhibition victory over the Cowboys on Sunday night.

The Cardinals (3-0) forced eight turnovers to give them 16 takeaways in the preseason. That included two muffed punts by Dallas (0-3), the second recovered for a touchdown by

Trent Sherfield to open the scoring in the first quarter.

Prescott's absence made it three straight weeks that Arizona didn't face the opposing starter. San Diego's Philip Rivers skipped the opener, and Drew Brees sat for New Orleans last week.

"I definitely wish we would have seen some A-1 talent at the quarterback position," Peterson said. "But we still know if we play sound defense, that can happen to any of them."

Sam Bradford led two largely ineffective series for the Cardinals after completing all seven of his passes in the first two preseason games. Playing without running back David Johnson and receiver Larry Fitzgerald, Bradford was 1 of 4 for 6 yards as Arizona generated just one first down.

Albert Pujols got his 3,082th career hit and passed Cap Anson for

sole possession of 23rd place all-time. The single in the sixth inning broke an 0-for-17 slump by Pujols.

TROUT TRAPPED

Angels slugger Mike Trout went 0 for 4 with three strikeouts and did not reach base for the first time in 13 games. Hinch praised his pitchers for staying out of trouble against Trout, which allowed them to attack up high in the strike zone with two strikes.

"You go down in the zone to him, you know you're asking for it," Hinch said. "We crowded him one at-bat. We did something different to him almost every at-bat to get to the put-away pitch."

Rams: Finish the preseason at the New Orleans Saints on Thursday.

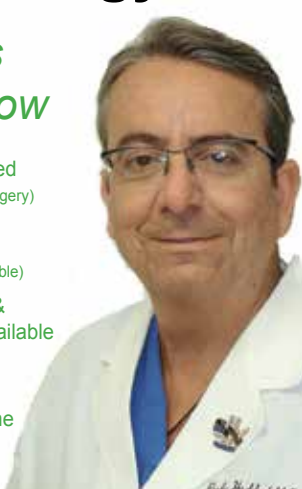
