

Fifth annual DAV Dove Hunt honoring veterans scheduled Sept. 14 and 15

Dove hunting season starts Saturday, so that must mean it's about time for the local Disabled American Veterans' annual Dove Hunt.

This year marks the fifth yearly installment of the hunt, which brings military veterans to West Texas to hunt doves, shoot skeet, visit with each other and share their experiences, and receive accolades from citizens full of gratitude for their service.

"They'll come in Thursday night. We'll house them out on a private ranch and let them get to know each other. Friday morning, we'll meet at the DAV. They'll be fed breakfast by Birdwell Lane Church of Christ. At that point all the...we call them 'bird dogs,' the people that want to go hunting with the veterans... we'll feed everybody and then we'll leave and go to Wishbone Ranch in Stanton. We'll hunt 'til noon, and then and noon we'll come back in. Al's Barbecue will feed everybody. Then we'll go to Moss Creek Ranch See HUNT, Page 3

University of North Texas professor makes meth for research

The Dallas Morning News DENTON, Texas (AP) — A University of North Texas professor and one of his graduate students have spent the last nine years making meth, fentanyl and PCP in a lab.

The Dallas Morning News reports it's all legal — the feds signed off on it — and they've used the drugs to test a new device they're developing: a breath analyzer that can identify marijuana, cocaine, methamphetamine and other drugs in people's systems.

Guido Verbeck, a chemistry professor, created the device with the help of grad student Tom Kiselak.

The device isn't yet ready for the market. But Frisco-based InspectIR has been working with the researchers and sees law enforcement and medical uses for the device.

"The demand is going to be off the charts," said John Redmond, one of the founders of InspectIR.

The device they are working on is bulkier than a traditional alcohol Breathalyzer. The size is because a mass spectrometer, a device that analyzes the chemicals, is contained within the device.

A mass spectrometer usually remains stationary and is about the size of two home printers stacked on top of each other. Verbeck has managed to make a smaller spectrometer that can fit into the palm of a person's hand.

The device is designed so that when a person breathes into it, a carbon mesh captures the organic chemistry, eliminates the air and water from the breath, and sends the rest to the mass spectrometer. Within 15 seconds, the screen lights up with the results.

Verbeck has tested the gadget with the drugs he's made and a machine that can imitate human breath.

Once they work out the kinks, the duo will need to win approvals and go through clinical trials with humans. Verbeck expects to be finished with the process by the end of the year.

If they're successful, InspectIR can take the gizmo to market. Verbeck estimates the commercial version of the device will cost between \$20,000 and \$40,000. Over time, he expects the price to fall to about \$10,000 as production becomes more efficient.

DPS Increases Traffic Enforcement for Labor Day Holiday



AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will be joining law enforcement efforts from across the state to increase traffic enforcement during the Labor Day holiday weekend. From Friday, Aug. 31, through Monday, Sept. 3, DPS Troopers will be looking for drivers who violate traf-

fic laws, including impaired drivers, speeders and safety belt violators.

"DPS is committed to protecting travelers on our roadways, and Troopers will be working aroundthe-clock this Labor Day weekend to keep impaired and dangerous drivers off the road," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "We are urging all drivers to do their part to keep our roads safe by simply obeying Texas traffic laws and driving courteously."

DPS offers drivers the following tips for enhancing safety on our roads during the Labor Day holiday:

• Do not drink and drive. Make alternate travel plans if you are consuming alcohol.

• Slow down – especially in bad weather, construction areas, heavy traffic and unfamiliar areas.

• Eliminate distractions while driving, including the use of mobile devices. Texas law prohibits using a portable wireless device to read, write or send an electronic message unless the vehicle is stopped.

• Buckle up everyone in the vehicle – it's the law.

• Slow down or move over for police, fire, EMS and Texas Department of Transportation vehicles and tow trucks stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated – it's the law. Also, show the same courtesy to fellow drivers stopped along the road.

• Drive defensively, as holiday travel may present additional challenges.

• Don't drive fatigued – allow plenty of time to reach your destination.

• If you see a road hazard or if you observe anything suspicious, report it to the nearest law enforcement agency.

• Before your trip begins, make sure your vehicle is properly maintained and always double check to make sure all cargo is secure.

• Monitor weather and road conditions wherever you are traveling. For road conditions/closings in Texas, visit https://drivetexas.org.

As part of Operation CARE (Crash Awareness and Reduction Effort), police agencies across the country will also increase enforcement efforts over the Labor Day holiday weekend.



DEALING WITH SIN His Easy Yoke

In Matthew 18, our previous studies have focused on what Jesus taught about sin. First, Jesus said that those in the kingdom

of heaven are those who turn to him in humility and child-like trust. He then warned anyone who would cause a young follower to stumble in their faith. We made the point that we must take sin as seriously as the Lord does, and we must be willing to take even drastic measures to eliminate temptations to sin from our lives.

Next, we observed how precious each and every person is to the Savior. Jesus, the Good Shepherd, goes out seeking the

one lost sheep that goes astray. If our Lord is so concerned for each of his followers, then we should be just as concerned for one another. So, if God's desire is that none should perish, then that should be our desire as well. We must do all that is in our power to keep ourselves from temptation and sin, as well as helping others who may be caught up in sin.

But what about when someone sins against us? Does that change how I should respond? To talk about sin in a general sense is one thing, but when it is done against you, it becomes very personal. If someone I know and love wrongs me, it hurts. The fact that it is someone I care for, and not just a random individual, makes it hurt all the more. That personal aspect of the transgression may cause me to not want to deal with it because of the extra emotions involved.

What we need to remember is that Jesus still loves that person. They are that sheep that went astray and Jesus wants them back. Do we want them back as much as he does? It's difficult sometimes, but we must not allow our hurt feelings to cause us to lose sight of the

fact that we need to do all that is in our power and ability to help this person be right with God again.

Matthew 18:15-20, If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother. But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every charge may be established by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church. And if he refuses to listen even to the church, let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector. Truly, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall have been bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall have been loosed in heaven (ESV footnote). Again I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything they ask, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I among them (ESV).

Sin must be dealt with whether it is our own sin or that which has committed against me. Again, we must be as serious about sin as God is. We cannot ignore it nor excuse it. God desires reconciliation with us when we sin against him, so, likewise, we should desire reconciliation with others when they sin against us. How terrible it would be if God would have abandoned humanity when we went astray in sin! May we all have the heart of God and the courage to lovingly confront sin our lives and in the lives of those who wrong us.

Thankfully, we have the assurance that if we deal with sin the way Jesus tells us to, he stands with us and we have the Father's blessing as well. May we always take sin seriously and deal with it properly in a spirit of love and humility.

gentle, not heavy or burdensome.


Is religion easy? No!



I don't think I remember when I first heard the words "pray, tell," so it was probably a phrase I grew up with. My mother would come into a room where we six children would be playing with games all around us.

"Pray, tell, what do you think you are doing?" She would exclaim in her frustration. The games were in disar-

ray as we would go from one to another without putting anything back where it belonged. We would then spend at least the next six hours cleaning and putting everything back in the "game closet" of the hallway. Well, it seemed that long.

Another time my mother would catch me "cleaning my room." I would put everything on the floor either under the bed or in the closet where she couldn't see it.

Again, "Pray, tell what are you doing?" would be her choice words. And I would spend the next large amount of my Saturday pulling everything out from under my bed and from the closet where I had stuffed debris, clothes, shoes, etc. I think I may still have that syndrome of clutter in my own house today.

Many times in a person's life, mine especially, I find my self in the flesh. I do things I shouldn't. I say things I shouldn't. I launch plans and programs I shouldn't. And my Father God has to say to me, "Pray, tell, what do you think you are doing?" The question isn't asked in frustration, but in loving kindness. He wants me to know the mess I've made following my own desires.

Like the disciples asked Jesus, in Luke 11:1, "Lord, teach us to pray...," we need to pray. It's funny that all my life I thought the model pray called

The Lord's Prayer was how I should pray. But the disciples desire was for the Lord Jesus to teach them to pray, not how to pray.

So when messes happen because of my own sinful ways, I need to pray and tell God about it. When burdens become too great to bear, I need to pray and tell God about it. When loved ones are lost in death to me, I need to

run to my God with my loss and loneliness and tell Him. When I am at the point of death, I need to pray and tell my God about it.



He is the only One who truly understands my heart. Even when it is desperately wicked, God knows my heart. He wants me to talk to Him. He wants me to have a relationship with Him through His Son Jesus Christ Who reconciled us to Himself through His death on

the Cross. He wants fellowship with us every minute.

Not long ago someone told me I needed to pray like Daniel in the Old Testament, three times a day. I told him I couldn't do that. I had to pray and tell God things, without ceasing. If I only pray three times a day, in between times I would be sinning way too much.

So God wants to teach us to pray, not how to, but just to do it. We can ask Him anything, in Jesus' Name, and He will hear us. The main problem is with us, not with Him. He wants us to pray.

In the Jewish temple of Solomon's day the sweetest incense was mixed with the prayers of God's chosen people. Today the Holy Spirit carries our prayers and tells them in the presence of Almighty God. He is always listening. Will you talk to Him? He's listening.

Reflections: The Death of Decency?

Like most Americans I have been reflecting on the life and legacy of John McCain since his death two days ago. I have always admired the Senator, especially for his courage and heroism as a Vietnam POW.

I am reading his books, his own assessments regarding himself and his life: his 1991 memoirs, Faith of My Fathers and then his recent book, written just before his death, The Restless Wave. Both books are well written, engaging, inspiring and, in some cases, prophetic.

The first book opens with words from the hymn, "Faith of Our Fathers." In the second he states, "What God and good luck provide we must accept with gratitude.

Our time is our time. It's up to us to make the most of it, make it amount to more than the sum of our days."

What stands out in my mind regarding John Mc-Cain is his decency, his respect for other people,

I remember that moment during his 2008 campaign for the Presidency. He was speaking in a high school near Minneapolis, taking questions from the audience. A woman

McCain quickly reached for the mike and

corrected her. "No ma'am." He said, "He's a decent family man and citizen that I just happen to have disagreements with." When others tried to label Obama as a terrorist and a Muslim, McCain stated, "He is a decent person and a person you don't have to be scared of as President of the United



Now, lets talk football!


Forsan received the opening kickoff and had a 10-play, 33-yard drive in which the Buffs picked up two first downs. To keep the drive alive, Forsan converted a key fourth and three situation on the Bulldogs 46 yard-line to give the Buffs great field position. A bad snap over Buff quarterback Kobe Richardson's head on the ensuing first down play put the Buffs behind the chains and led them to punt for a touchback to end the opening drive.

The Bulldogs answered with an 11-play, 80yard scoring drive capped off by a three yard plunge from Coahoma's Isaac Murillo to put the first points of the game on the board and give the Bulldogs an early six-point advantage with 1:09 left in the first quarter of play. Coahoma picked up three first downs on the scoring drive and converted a big fourth and one with a 20 yard delayed keeper by Bulldog quarterback, Zack Schneider. This pushed the ball deep into the Buffs territory.

Schneider had another impressive 11-yard scamper on a read option around the left tackle to put the Bulldogs in a first and goal situation, which untimately led to that first score that capped Coahoma's opening drive. Despite the great drive, the Bulldogs failed to convert the extra point which left the door open for Forsan to take the lead with another score. After falling on a short rolling kickoff by Coahoma at their own 46 yard-line, it took the Buffs just three plays to answer the Bulldogs opening score. After a procedure penalty on first down, followed by a short six yard out route from Richardson to Dylon Kligora, the Buffs sat at a second and nine situation. Richardson pulled the ball on a run-pass-option play and threw a strike to his receiver Zane Riffe, who finished the play with a great run after the catch for a 53-yard score down the middle of the field. This tied the game 6-6 with 20 seconds left in the first quarter. Richardson added the extra point to take advantage of the earlier missed extra point by the Bulldogs which now gave Forsan the lead. Coahoma started their next drive on their own 44 yardline after a short kick-off by the Buffs. A short two yard run by running back Gaige Hill closed out the opening quarter. Despite a nice throw and catch on second and eight from Schneider to Gage Clark for 11 yards, the Bulldogs fumbled the ball away on the ensuing first down play at the Forsan 41 yard-line. Following the fumble recovery by Buff defensive back Aaron Gutierrez, Forsan was unable to capitalize on the Coahoma's turnover going three and out with a procedure penalty putting them behind the chains on third down. Richardson punted the ball down to the Coahoma 21, but a nice 14 yard punt return to the 35 yard-line by Braxton Chandler gave Coahoma good field position to start their drive. The Bulldogs couldn't get anything going on the drive. The Buffs defense tightened and their big defensive line dominated at the point of attack. Forsan's defense stepped up to protect their one point lead, and forced a critical three-and-out to give the ball back to their offense. After a short punt that was touched dead by the Bulldogs on the Forsan 37 yard-line, The Buffs put together another impressive 10-play, 63-yard scoring drive capped off by a two yard rushing touchdown from Buff running back, Trey Brockman, to extend the Forsan lead to







One trait that distinguishes the accomplished player from the run-ofthe-mill player is that he won't give up when he appears licked. This applies just as much to a defender as a declarer. The governing principle is always to try to succeed, even when the outlook is gloomiest.

Consider this deal where West led the spade jack against three notrump, East playing the discouraging deuce and South the king. Declarer returned a diamond, taken by West with the king, and the outcome of the hand now hinged on West's next play. There was only one card in his hand he could lead to defeat the contract, and West found it — the heart ten!

Once West returned the ten, declarer's goose was cooked. If South played dummy's ace, the defenders would subsequently score three hearts and two diamonds. If dummy played the jack instead, East would win with the king and return a heart to achieve the same result. And if dummy played the three, East would signal with the six and then play his king on the heart continuation. In all three cases, South was certain to go down one.

The winning defense was based on practical considerations. West realized he couldn't afford to "play safe" by returning the spade ten at trick three. Dummy's diamonds were much too threatening for West to simply stand pat with another spade lead

His only realistic hope was to find East with the king of hearts, and he geared his defense to that one hope. Moreover, to cater to the possibility that South had the nine, it was necessary for West to lead the ten. If he had led the five instead, declarer would have played low from dummy and wound up with an overtrick.

Note that the lead of the queen by West at trick three would also have proven ineffective. Declarer wins with dummy's ace, returns a diamond and again cannot be stopped from scoring 10 tricks if he plays correctly.

seven. With 3:06 remaining in the first half, Forsan lead 13-6.

The Buffs picked up three first downs on their next drive and converted a big third and nine when Richardson, under pressure by Coahoma defensive lineman, Keegan Dobbs, avoided the sack and scrambled for a big 12-yard gain to move the chains and keep the drive alive. Dobbs was relentless in his pursuit of the quarterback and put pressure on Richardson throughout the entire game. Later in the drive, Kligora made another key 12-yard run on a third and three

play which brought up the first and goal that led to the score by Brockman. Richardson put through the extra point to push the Buffs to a 14-6 lead with just over three minutes remaining in the half.

The Bulldogs' special teams struck again on the ensuing kick-off. Chandler, who had a nice 14-yard punt return earlier in the half, fielded the kick at the Coahoma 26 yard line, broke two tackles and returned the kick all the way to the Forsan 30 for an impressive 44-yard kick

The big return set up the Bulldogs for a big opportunity to get into the end-zone before the half. On the first play of the drive, from the Forsan 30 yardline, Coahoma's star QB Zack Schneider made a big time run breaking multiple tackles on

With 1:25 left on the clock in the second quarter, Coahoma reduced their deficit to 12-14. The Bulldogs tried to tie the game with a two point conversion, but they were ultimately stopped short leaving the Buffs with a narrow two point lead.

The Buffs offense came back on the field and took a shot deep on the first play of the drive that almost led to an interception. On second and 10, Richardson kept the ball on a read-option to the right and picked up 14 yards with some nice running through traffic to pick up a first down, and gave the Buffs a chance to make something happen in the closing seconds of the half. After another incomplete pass on first down, and a huge drive stalling sack on second down by Coahoma's Dobbs, whose relentless pursuit of the quarterback finally paid off, Forsan was content to run the ball and end the half with a thin two point advantage.

With the game being such a defensive slug fest in the first half and really only a few big offensive plays by both teams, it was clear that the outcome of the game would come down to stamina and the half-time adjustments made by each team.

Following defensive stops by both teams, Forsan's special teams brought excitement to the stands and their sideline. During a Buff punt, Richardson kicked a beauty of a kick and with great special teams coverage, Forsan pinned Coahoma on their own three yardline.

With terrible field position and a Buff defense that had been stout all night, Coahoma put together their best drive of the ball game. On the first play of the drive, Schneider gashed the Forsan defense on a game altering 56-yard run. Schneider broke multiple tackles and made multiple players miss while taking the ball all the way to the Buff's 42. Schneider continued to carry the load for the Bulldogs as he carried the rock four more times in the drive for another 23 yards. He also threw for 11 yards. Schneider put the finishing touch on the drive with a 7-yard touchdown burst up the middle, which gave Coahoma an 18-14 lead with 6:02 remaining in the third quarter. The Buffs again held the Bulldogs out of the end-zone on a two point conversion to hold the lead to four. Schneider accounted for an incredible 90 combined yards on the momentum shifting-97 yard scoring drive. Schneider was unstoppable in the second half, putting himself on everybody's "players to watch" list again this year. That said a lot of credit goes to the Bulldog coaching staff as well. Coach Joslin and his staff made a key adjustment in their offense as they started the long drive. They motioned multiple backs and tight ends into the backfield, created mismatches and got great blocking from their backs and tight ends as they shifted into a

power run game to counter the dominant play by the Buffs front four on defense up to that point.

Forsan returned the kick 14 yards to their own 38, giving them good field position to start their next drive. However, a false start on first down followed by a three-vard loss on second down put the Buffs in a clear passing situation. On third and 14, Richardson dropped back to pass, and right on cue, Coahoma's outstanding defensive end Dobbs made another great play to get his second sack of the game. This forced Forsan to punt.

The Bulldogs again started deep in their own territory after a holding call on their punt return team put them back at their 23 to start their drive. On first down with all the momentum seemingly on their side, Cobut fatigue from being on the field so much in this game finally started to show and they just couldn't keep the Bulldogs out of the endzone.

Schneider capped off the drive with another tough short-yardage TD run for Coahoma. The Bulldogs again failed on the extra point, making it a 24-14 game with 3:30 left on the clock.

With only a little over three minutes left to play and the ball on their own 25, Forsan fought hard all the way to the whistle as they compled passes and fought for yards until once again, the Buffs fumbled and lost the ball with only 2:14 remaining in the game.

Coahoma took four straight knees and turned the ball over on downs after Forsan used up all their time outs to stop the clock with 1:25 remaining. Again, the

> Buffs kept fighting, completing multiple passes in the closing seconds as they tried desperately to mount a miracle comeback as the clock ran out.

> The Bulldogs won the game in impressive fashion, playing fundamentally sound football on both sides of the ball and controlling the clock and tempo with their run game. The Buffs did everything they could on defense holding up to a powerful run game, despite their offense missing opportunities to score off turnovers multiple times in the game.

Despite the loss, the players and coaches of Forsan put it all out there and played hard with class until the final whistle. A few plays here and there and this game could have gone the other way, but credit is due to Coahoma for coming out and ex-

goal.The Dogs lined up at the Buffs' nine with under two minutes left in the half. Schneider carried the rock three more consecutive plays, and punched the ball in on a third and goal from the one.

ahoma coughed up the ball on a fumble on their own twenty and Forsan made the recovery to give them a chance to regain the lead. On first down, the Buffs got stuffed for a loss on

a run up the middle. After two incomplete passes around the goal-line on a fourth and 12 play, Richardson found himself under heavy pressure again from Dobbs. Richardson threw an ill advised ball into traffic around the three yard-line and was picked off by Bulldog linebacker, Isaac Murillo.

Murillo, who returned the interception all the way out to the 23 yard line, stole the momentum right back from Forsan and put the pressure back on the Buffs exhausted defense.

True to form, the gutty Buffs defense showed their heart and will to win, and returned the favor just two plays later. Forsans' Cayden Morgan picked off Coahoma QB, Schneider, on the Bulldogs' 47. Again, the Buffs were unable to capitalize on the turnover and lost another fumble just two plays later at the 41 yardline, with less than a minute remaining in the third quarter.

The Bulldogs took over and ran two straight running plays to end the third quarter still ahead 18-14. After a quick three and out to start the final quarter, Coahoma punted the ball perfectly and pinned Forsan to their own two yard-line.

The Buffs couldn't get a first down, despite a great catch made deep down the sideline that was called incomplete as the receiver didn't get a foot down. Richardson punted from his own end-zone and got off a really nice kick to the 50, but with a 14-yard return, the Bulldogs started of their next drive already well into Forsan's territory. With a chance to make it a two score game and the ball already in the Buffs territory, Coahoma put together a 12-play, 36-yard game sealing touchdown drive with only 3:30 left in the game. The drive was an impressive one that required two fourth down conversions to get the ball across the goal-line. The Buffs defense did all they could and showed a ton of heart,

ecuting their game-plan and implementing their second half adjustments on offense while continuing to execute on defense.

Both teams played incredibly hard, with class and heart, either team had a chance to pull off the win showing once again why these two teams are the perfect fit for such a big time game and big time atmosphere.

Congratulations to both these teams for an amazing game and an amazing opener to football in West Texas. They set the standard for how it can and should be done every week.

A special congratulations to the 2018 Howard County Bowl Champions, the Coahoma Bulldogs, for an outstanding win against a more than worthy opponent.
