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Fifth annual DAV Dove Hunt banquet honors four American heroes

Another successful Disabled American Veterans Dove Hunt is in the books. This year marked the fifth annual hunt, during which the DAV invites four veterans to come to Big Spring, do a little hunting, shoot a little skeet and target practice, talk and share their experiences with each other, and receive the acclaim of a grateful public at a banquet in their honor.

"It went really well," said local DAV Senior Vice Commander Mike Tarpley. "Every year it gets better and better. The amount of stuff they got, it looks like we may have to tell them they need to bring a trailer with them to

bring it back home." At the banquet, the honorees received a veritable mountain of swag, including hunting supplies and carry bags, a piece of original art, a pocketknife, hatchet, flags that have flown over the Texas and U.S. Capitol Buildings, a brand new shotgun, and hand-sewn quilts from the Quilts of Valor project.

Unfortunately, the turnout at the banquet was a bit lower than last year, possibly due to a combination of rain and numerous other activities taking place in the area at the same time.

"There's a lot going on in Big Spring tonight," Tarpley said. "Hopefully we can get the word out that people need

to show up. With all of the presents and stuff that they get, the weekend that they got, people feeding them, having them at their homes, the trap and skeet and long-range shooting, there's still nothing like somebody here to say 'Thank you.' And the more 'Thank you's, the better.'

The hunting and target shooting went well, said Tarpley, despite the rainy weather.

"We got a little bit today, but they are soldiers, so..." he said. "Yesterday was really good. Today was mediocre because of the weather. Wishbone Ranch that hosts us every year...if there's gonna be birds, they're gonna be on the Wishbone."

The honored veterans this year included four U.S. Army veterans.

- Sgt. First Class Daniel Martinez served as the senior engineer sergeant for a reconnaissance/sniper detachment with military free fall capabilities. Sgt. First Class Martinez served for 23 years, from 1987 to 2010, including a direct combat deployment to Afghanistan during Operation Enduring Freedom. During his tour in Afghanistan, he was wounded in action by an Improvised Explosive Device during a convoy operation. Today, Martinez lives in Big Spring with his family, and is employed at the West Texas VA Health Care System.

Martinez earned many decorations, including the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Afghanistan Campaign Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, and many others.

"I already knew Carlos from the VA, but it was a great pleasure to meet Elliott and Robert," Martinez said. "In all honesty, the community of Big Spring, thank you for opening your doors and letting us into your homes, the ranches, the clay shooting, and of course all the dove hunting, the long-range shooting today. Thank everyone, and thank everyone for being here tonight."

- During his military career, Staff Sgt. Carlos O. Torres served as a patient administration specialist, a tracked vehicle specialist, an infantryman, a field artilleryman, and in signal intelligence. During his career, Torres served on several overseas tours, including a two-week medical support in Panama in 1995, a four-month tour in Kuwait in 1996, a hardship tour in South Korea in 1998, a second hardship tour in South Korea in 2004, a deployment to Iraq in 2007, and a deployment to Afghanistan in 2008.

Torres received the Army Achievement Medal, the Army Commendation Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal, the Global War on Terrorism Medal, and many others.

"Mike (Tarpley) is the one who invited me to this. Maybe it's something that we don't think we need, but I came to realize that it is something I did need:

That time to come out here and meet these guys," Torres said. "This weekend, I realized how strong the military community in this country is. Just meeting these guys, which is the guys who are part of this, Mike and everybody else that I got a chance to talk to. I already knew Danny, but these other two. We got a chance to know each other and talk and bring out things that usually we don't because we've done it, it's done. But it's in there. Whoever has served, it's part of your life and it's always going to be in there."

- Major Elliott R. Vann served as an orthopedic surgeon in the U.S. Army. During his military career, he completed his residency in at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio from 2003 to 2008, where he helped provide care for injured military during the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts. After completion of his medical training, he served on the orthopedic staff at Fort Bragg, N.C. from 2008 to 2012. He deployed to Baghdad in 2009 in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, where he provided trauma and orthopedic care to detainees and American personnel. Upon returning to Fort Bragg, he served as Chief of Orthopedics from 2010 to 2011. He now practices orthopedics at Abilene Bone and Joint, with a focus on arthroplasty, sports medicine, and trauma.

During his career, Vann received the Army Commendation Medal, the Army Achievement Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, the Iraq Campaign Medal, and the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal.

"I too would like to thank you all for coming out here. Obviously there's other places you could be on a Saturday night," said Vann. "I was reluctant to accept Mike's offer. I felt like the fact I was able to leave the military with no scars and no injuries was reward enough. But I think this was an incredible opportunity to spend time with the brotherhood that is the military community. When I look back at my orthopedic career, there's no question that my most meaningful time has been the times I've taken care of injured soldiers, marines, sailors and airmen. This was an incredible weekend. I could not have imagined. I feel like I have gained some additional brothers. I felt like I was taken back, almost in a time machine, to a time when America was great, and we had great respect for the flag and for the country, and for the values that made America stand out among the nations."

- Sgt. First Class Robert R. McBride served as an indirect fire infantryman. He served for 21 years from 1987 to 2008, including both peacetime deployments and combat during Operation Desert Storm and Operation Iraqi Freedom. McBride received the Silver Star for actions taken in Iraq, when his actions facilitated the capture and destruction of an enemy heavy mortar emplacement in a culturally sensitive location in the city of An-Najaf, Iraq. Today, McBride lives with his family in Roscoe, Texas, where he serves as a city councilman and as the Veterans Service Officer for Nolan County.

In addition to the Silver Star, McBride received the Meritorious Service Medal, the Army Commendation Medal, the Joint Service Achievement Medal, the Army Achievement Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, and many others.

"I was real reluctant to take Mike up on his offer, because about three months ago, I had a shoulder repaired, so I was debating whether I could come out here and shoot a shotgun. I'm really glad I did," McBride said. "Big Spring and I go way back. 1983, Dad died up here in the VA hospital. That's not a horrible thing, it's just part of life. One of the things that struck me during that time, I was pretty young, and I was getting on the elevator to go up and see him, and at that time, the hospital policy was, I was too young to go up and see dad. There was a young doctor, I don't remember his name, and he challenged me on the elevator. But he had a little compassion for me and he let me go up and see dad, and spend those last few minutes with him. Sometimes the rules might be hard and fast, but it's all about compassion. Compassion's something I saw all through this weekend. I'd like to thank the citizens of Big Spring and the DAV for putting this on, and the folks out there...it was just an incredible time and I'm glad I said 'yes.'"

At the banquet, the honorees and guests dined on barbecue brisket and sausage with all the fixings, provided by the Howard County Volunteer Fire Department.

John Crawford and **B. Jay Becker** were respectively North-South for the U.S. and wound up in six diamonds. Ricci, having listened attentively to the bidding, then led the ace and another spade, ruffed by East for down one. As the East-West cards were divided, the U.S. pair could have made six spades.

At the second table, where an Italian pair held the North-South cards, six diamonds was also reached — but the outcome was not the same. Here, the bidding went:

This deal occurred during the match between Italy and the United States in 1951. The Italians scored heavily on the hand but lost the match by a wide margin on one of the few occasions through the years that an American team triumphed over Italy.

The bidding at the first table went as shown. Eugenio Chiaradia's

The Italians at that time always bid their shorter suit first with a very promising hand, which accounts for North's initial response of two diamonds.

The effect of this was that North wound up as declarer at six diamonds instead of South. With East on lead, six diamonds could not be defeated, and Italy gained 1,470 points on the deal.

This Date In History

Today is Monday, Sept. 17, the 260th day of 2018. There are 105 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 17, 1787, the Constitution of the United States was completed and signed by a majority of delegates attending the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia.

On this date:

In 1862, more than 3,600 men were killed in the Civil War Battle of Antietam (an-TEE'-tum) in Maryland.

In 1920, the American Professional Football Association -- a precursor of the National Football League -- was formed in Canton, Ohio.

In 1939, the Soviet Union invaded Poland during World War II, more than two weeks after Nazi Germany had launched its assault.

In 1964, the James Bond movie "Goldfinger," starring Sean Connery, premiered in London. The fantasy sitcom "Bewitched," starring Elizabeth Montgomery, debuted on ABC-TV.

In 1971, citing health reasons, Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black, 85, retired. (Black, who was succeeded by Lewis F. Powell Jr., died eight days after making his announcement.)

In 1978, after meeting at Camp David, Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin (men-AH'-kem BAY'-gihn) and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat signed a framework for a peace treaty.

In 1980, former Nicaraguan president Anastasio Somoza (suh-MOH'-sah) was assassinated in Paraguay.

In 1987, the city of Philadelphia, birthplace of the U.S. Constitution, threw a big party to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the historic document; in a speech at Independence Hall, President Ronald Reagan acclaimed the framing of the Constitution as a milestone "that would profoundly and forever alter not just these United States but the world."

In 1996, former Vice President Spiro T. Agnew died in Berlin, Maryland, at age 77.

In 1999, President Bill Clinton lifted restrictions on trade, travel and banking imposed on North Korea a half-century earlier, rewarding it for agreeing to curb missile tests.

In 2001, Six days after 9/11,

stock prices nosedived but stopped short of collapse in an emotional, flag-waving reopening of Wall Street; the Dow Jones industrial average ended the day down 684.81 at 8,920.70.

In 2011, a demonstration calling itself Occupy Wall Street began in New York, prompting similar protests around the U.S. and the world.

Ten years ago: Defense Secretary Robert Gates met with Afghan President Hamid Karzai and offered the people of Afghanistan his "personal regrets" for U.S. airstrikes that had killed civilians and said he would try to improve the accuracy of air warfare. A suicide attack on the U.S. Embassy in Sanaa (sah-NAH'), Yemen, killed 19 people, including an American woman and six militants.

Five years ago: Engineers declared success as the Costa Concordia cruise ship was pulled completely upright during an unprecedented, 19-hour operation to wrench it from its side where it had capsized off Tuscany in 2012. Eiji Toyoda (cq), 100, a member of Toyota's founding family who helped create the super-efficient "Toyota Way" production method, died in Toyota city, Japan.

One year ago: British authorities said a second suspect was in custody in connection with the bomb that partially exploded two days earlier on a packed London subway. The top series prizes at the Emmy Awards went to "The Handmaid's Tale," "Veep" and the ever-topical "Saturday Night Live"; the ceremony took almost non-stop aim at President Donald Trump in awards and speeches.
