level. Then you'll relax in a comfortable chair while a technician collects your blood donation. After donating, you'll be invited to rest and drink some water, and then donors may then resume their usual routine.

"Should the need

arise, it's good to be proactive and make sure the blood bank is stocked. These blood drives give the community an opportunity to help out, donate, and possibly to save a life.' said Grace. "O negative is considered a universal blood type since it can theoretically be given to any person regardless of his or her blood type. This especially comes in handy when someone is in an situation emergency and needs a blood transfusion to stay alive and there is not time to perform a blood type. They can use this type safely. Also, premature babies can only receive this blood type."

Grace also stated that each and every blood donation is screened for HIV, hepatitis B and C, HTLV, West Nile virus, Chagas' disease and syphilis. "For the most part,

donors must be at least 16 years old and weigh at least 110 pounds. All 16 and 17 year-olds must have parent or guardian permission to donate," said Grace. "There is no upper age limit." United Blood Servic-

es is a nonprofit community blood center, providing blood and blood products for local area hospitals throughout the United States. Existing to make a difference in people's lives by bringing together the best people and getting together like Parkview to help raise awareness and get involvement.



Reflections: Was Jesus Right?

Jesus is universally respected. Even the followers of Islam claim him as a prophet. And millions who have no use for the church still like Jesus. But the question remains, "Was Jesus right?" "Did he know what he was talking about?"

It is often difficult to reconcile the attitude and actions of professing Christians with Jesus' words and instructions. When I was eighteen, I worked in a warehouse that shipped products to stores where they would be sold. I worked with older workers who, like me, worked for minimum wage. Some of my co-workers, who were professing Christians, heard that I planned to become a "preacher." They tried to be nice and encouraging. They told me it was a good thing for me to become a preacher, but reminded me that those things "don't work here.'

I interpreted their comments to

but the teachings of Jesus were out

of touch with the real world. They were like many Christians I have encountered over the years. Dallas Willard called them "vampire Christians." They want a little of Jesus' blood, just enough to forgive their sins and assure they are going to heaven, but they don't think Jesus knew what he was talking about when it comes to everyday

you will keep my commandments." Clearly, he thought he knew what he was talking about, and he expected that anyone who placed their faith in him would do everything they could to obey him. Jesus made it clear that it is impossi-

ble to love him, and, at the same time,

Jesus said, "If you love me,

mean that they believed in Jesus ignore or disobey his instructions. Either Jesus was the smartest per-

son who ever lived and knew better than anyone else how life should be lived on this earth, or he was a delusional pretender who has misguided millions for more than two thousand years. If Jesus' instructions for living will not work in the courtroom, the schools, the factory and the family, neither will they work to get us to heaven.

BILL Our personal conclusion Tinsley about whether we believe Jesus was right will not be reflected in what we profess about who he is, but in what

we do when we are going about our day to day activities at work, at school and at home. Are we bringing our lives into alignment with his life and teaching? Do we act like Jesus acted?

Do we forgive like Jesus forgave? Are we truthful and faithful like Jesus was truthful and faithful? Do we love like Jesus loved?

Following Jesus' instructions has nothing to do with earning our way to heaven. It has every thing to do with loving Jesus and living a meaningful life. If you want to know what Jesus expects, you can find his instructions in Matthew chapters 5-7.

Jesus told us how to know whether he was right or not. He said, "If you abide in My word [hold fast to My teachings and live in accordance with them], you are truly My disciples. And you will know the Truth, and the Truth will set you free." (John 8:31-32. Amplified Bible).

I remember as a younger sister when my older sister and I would aggravate my older brother. We would only do it when Momma wasn't at home. He would get so angry, he would chase us with the intent of bodily harm.

My sister and I would take refuge in the only room in the house with an old fashioned lock on the door that you could hardly get open with a sledge hammer. You remember the kind that was like a

flat metal box with the little mechanism on top that would lock it. Well, he couldn't get in and consequently in his anger, he would break the panels on the old fash-That would break the anger cycle, and

he would run outside and hide in fear that Momma would get him for what he did. The first time, nothing happened to the sisters. The second and many times after that,

we all learned by experience not to get angry or aggravate each other to the point of making each other angry. I remember one day after this happen-

ing, my brother had to help the landlord fix the door by replacing it with a new one. He had to pay for it out of his allowance. My brother was thirteen when a change

took place in his life. He was in church and dealing with a lot in his young life with anger issues. He fought a lot of boys in his class be-

cause they picked on me, his younger sister. But the day his anger got the best of him was when he lost control and really beat up a boy pretty bad.

As I said he was in church, and the sermon must have gotten to his young heart. He went up to the preacher and gave his life to Jesus. I don't think I have ever seen

him angry since that time. Jesus tells us in His Word that He will change our hearts to be clean, and pure, and holy before Him, if we will only surrender it to Him. 

Won, won and won! Browns beat Jets for first win since 2016

CLEVELAND — For the first time in 635 days, the Cleveland Browns

Baker Mayfield showed them how. The No. 1 overall pick replaced injured starter Tyrod Taylor and sparked the Browns, who got two 1-yard touchdown runs from Carlos Hyde and beat the New York Jets 21-17 on Thursday night for their first win since Dec. 24, 2016.

"I've just been waiting for my moment," Mayfield said. "I'm just getting

And so ends Cleveland's 19-game winless streak, the NFL's second-longest since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

The Browns (1-1-1) trailed 14-0 in the first half before Mayfield came in for Taylor and led four scoring drives while winning an unexpected matchup against Jets rookie quarterback Sam Darnold. Cleveland passed on taking Darnold in the draft and instead chose Mayfield, the Heisman Trophy winner from Oklahoma.

Mayfield finished 17 of 23 for 201 yards in a little more than a half after coming in after Taylor suffered a concussion.

Darnold had one last chance, but was intercepted by Terrence Mitchell with 11 seconds left.

When the final seconds ticked off the clock, Cleveland fans, who had endured a 0-16 season and waited nearly two years to see their Browns win, erupted in celebration.

Refrigerators around the city stocked with Bud Lights were finally unlocked, and there figured to be more than a few beverages consumed in the hours ahead.

This was just one win, and while it was an ending, it also felt like a beginning — because of Mayfield.

"Dilly, dilly to the Cleveland fans," Mayfield said, using the beer's commercial slogan. "It's not the only win we're going to celebrate."

Isaiah Crowell had two touchdown runs for the Jets (1-2), who seemed in control when they took a 14-0 lead and knocked Taylor from the game.

Newly signed Browns kicker Greg Joseph made field goals of 45 and 27 yards after being signed just three days ago.

1. Pass. Opening bids of one of a suit normally contain 12 to 21 highthe bidding with one of a suit, your partner has no idea whether your opening is of the weak, strong or intermediate class.

Most of the time, you get to identify the strength of your hand at your next turn to bid. In the present case, that time is now. Since your opening bid was clearly of the minimum class, you can best indicate those values by passing one spade, implying that you opened a minimum and that you have no clear-cut action over East's bid.

2. Two hearts. Standing by itself. this is also a minimum hand, but it has risen appreciably in value because of the A-Q-x in partner's suit. Such excellent trump support should not be suppressed even though

you have only 13 high-card points and only three cards in the suit.

3. Three clubs. This hand is in the intermediate range (16 to 18 points) and can best be described by jumping to three clubs (invitational). Game is likely in clubs, hearts or notrump, but partner can pass with a minimum (six or seven points). The final contract depends on what he does next.

4. Two notrump. This hand is also in the intermediate class, but the available information — at least for the time being — indicates that notrump is probably the right spot. or 19 points, notrump distribution and stoppers in both of the oppo-

nents' suits. However, the final contract is still an open issue. Partner may be able to raise notrump, or may prefer a suit contract. Wherever he leads, you follow, because your values are flexible and can fit any type of hand he

holds. 5. Three hearts. Your four-card trump support, singleton diamond (worth three points) and potential four or five club tricks all combine to put your hand in the intermediate class, so you jump to three hearts to invite partner to go on to game. Partner is allowed to pass with the skimpiest of values, but will seldom do so in actual practice.




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

On Sept. 21, 1981, the Senate unanimously confirmed the nomination of Sandra Day O'Connor to become the first female justice on the Supreme Court.

On this date:

In 1792, the French National Convention voted to abolish the monarchy.

In 1893, one of America's first horseless carriages was taken for a short test drive in Springfield, Mass., by Frank Duryea, who had designed the vehicle with his brother,

In 1937, "The Hobbit," by J.R.R. Tolkien, was first published by George Allen & Unwin, Ltd. of London.

In 1938, a hurricane struck parts of New York and New England, causing widespread damage and claiming some 700

In 1970, "NFL Monday Night Football" made its debut on ABC-TV as the Cleveland Browns defeated the visiting New York Jets, 31-21.

In 1977, after weeks of controversy over past business and banking practices, President Jimmy Carter's embattled budget director, Bert Lance, resigned.

In 1983, in a speech to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, Interior Secretary James G. Watt jokingly described a special advisory panel as consisting of "a black ... a woman, two Jews and a cripple." Although Watt later apologized, he ended up resigning.

In 1985, In North Korea and South Korea, family members who had been separated for decades were allowed to visit each other as both countries opened their borders in an unprecedented family-reunion

program. In 1987, NFL players called a strike, mainly over the issue of free agency. (The 24-day walkout prompted football owners to hire replacement players.)

In 1989, Hurricane Hugo crashed into Charleston, South Carolina (the storm was blamed for 56 deaths in the Caribbean and 29 in the United States). Twenty-one students in Alton, Texas, died when their school bus, hit by a soft-drink delivery truck, careened into a waterfilled pit.

In 1996, John F. Kennedy Jr. married Carolyn Bessette in a ceremony Cumberland Island, Georgia.

The board of all-male Virginia Military Institute voted to admit women. In 2001, Congress again

opened the federal coffers to those harmed by terrorism, providing \$15 billion to the airline industry, which was suffering mounting economic losses since the Sept. 11 attacks. Ten years ago: South African

President Thabo Mbeki (TAH'boh um-BEH'-kee) announced his resignation. "Mad Men" became the first basic-cable show to win the top series Emmy; "30 Rock" and its stars Tina Fey and Alec Baldwin won comedy awards. The United States took back the Ryder Cup with a 16 1/2-11 1/2 victory over Europe. Baseball said farewell to the original Yankee Stadium as the Bronx defeated Bombers Baltimore Orioles 7-3.

Five years ago: Days after mass shootings in Washington and Chicago, President Barack Obama urged the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation to help push stalled legislation out of Congress so dangerous people wouldn't get their hands on guns. Islamic militants attacked an upscale shopping center in Nairobi, killing at least 67 people in the deadliest terrorist attack in Kenya in 15 years. An Afghan wearing a security forces uniform turned his weapon against U.S. troops, killing three in eastern Afghanistan.

One year ago: Millions on Puerto Rico faced the prospect of weeks or months without power in the aftermath of Hurricane Maria. President Donald Trump and Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe met on the sidelines of the U.N. General Assembly to discuss the ongoing crisis involving North Korea. Facebook said it would provide congressional investigators with the contents of 3,000 ads that had been bought by a Russian agency; it had already released the ads to federal authorities investigating Russian interference in the U.S. presidential election. 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Texas Tech arrives as Cornelius leads No. 15 Oklahoma St

Oklahoma State quarterback Taylor Cornelius has made an unexpected impression as a runner.

The 6-foot-6, 225-pound senior looks like he's lumbering his way down the field, but he's tough and surprisingly agile and fast. Last Saturday, he rushed for 41 yards and two touchdowns to help the Cowboys knock off then-No. 17 Boise State 44-21. "I think he's comfortable when he's

running the ball, when he gets into the flow of the game," Oklahoma State coach Mike Gundy said. "Like a three-point shooter in basketball hits a couple threes, gets hot and you give it to him and he starts hitting a few more.'

Cornelius has been pretty good throwing the ball too — he has completed 65 percent of his passes for 971yards and seven touchdowns in three games. Oklahoma State's offense ranks sixth nationally as the 15thranked Cowboys (3-0) head into their conference opener Saturday against Texas Tech (2-1).

"A month ago, I said he was on the tee box or the driving range, and we didn't know what he would do on the tee box on No. 1, but he's done pretty well on the first two or three holes," Gundy said. "He's getting into a different part of the course now, and hopefully he'll continue to play well. I think he's developing into being a pretty good college quarterback."

Cornelius will need to be at his best Saturday. Texas Tech enters Saturday's game with the nation's No. 1 offense. Alan Bowman threw for 605 yards and five touchdowns in his second career start, a 63-49 win over

Houston . He broke former Texas Tech star Patrick Mahomes' previous Big 12 record for yards passing by a freshman in a game and missed the NCAA freshman yardage record by 6. Since replacing the injured McLane Carter in the first quarter of the season opener, Bowman has passed for 1,160 yards and eight touchdowns with no interceptions.

"This league will be disappointed to see him for the next three or four years, or however long it'll be," Gundy said. "He seems to understand their system and looks like he gets it.

They're moving the ball and scoring lots of points."

WESLEY EMERGES

Tech has found another star receiver in Antoine Wesley. The 6-foot-5 junior had 13 catches for a school-record 261 yards and three touchdowns against Houston.

"Breakout game," Texas Tech coach Kliff Kingsbury said. "Unbelievable plays. We got to keep him coming. He's a long ways from where he can be. He knows that. Hopefully that builds some confidence moving for-

NEXT MAN UP

Tylan Wallace has emerged as the downfield threat that has filled in for Biletnikoff Award winner James Washington. The 6-foot sophomore caught five passes for 105 yards against Boise State a week after catching 10 passes for 166 yards against South Alabama.

RESPECT FOR HILL

Oklahoma State's Justice Hill has rushed for 277 yards and four touchdowns and is averaging 8.2 yards per carry this season. "He's as good as anybody in the

country, I think, as far as a total back," Kingsbury said. "Can catch the ball, finish runs, fast. Has gotten better and better as we've seen him. He's going to be as good of a back as we'll play all year." Hill has had success against Tech

in the past, rushing for 127 yards and a touchdown as a freshman and 165 yards and a score last season as a sophomore.

TECH'S KRYPTONITE

Texas Tech has lost nine straight to Oklahoma State and hasn't won in Stillwater since 2001.

"It's obviously a tough place to play," Kingsbury said. "I think you ask anybody in the conference, those fans are right on top of you, have a great fan base, a great program. Coach Gundy has built a powerhouse. ... They beat a lot of people there."

SACK MASTERS

The Cowboys lead the nation with 5.33 sacks per game with new defensive coordinator Jim Knowles' aggressive 4-2-5 defense. They pressured Boise State quarterback Brett Rypien all day last Saturday and tallied seven sacks in a 44-21 victory.

Texas looking to end run of TCU domination in Big 12 rivalry

AUSTIN, Texas — Texas cornerback Kris Boyd said perhaps the last thing Longhorns fans want to hear right

"I ain't gonna lie," Boyd said after Texas crushed then-No. 22 USC last week. "I kinda feel like we proved that we're

It's time to test that bravado Saturday against No. 17 TCU. Any talk of Texas being "back" just three games into the season is likely to make Longhorns fans cringe. Why? They've heard it before and

the fallout was embarrassing. A television announcer's "Texas is back!" declaration in 2016 turned into a national punchline in a 5-7 season that got former coach Charlie

And now here come the Horned Frogs (2-1). TCU will be another critical test to see if second-year coach Tom

Herman really has the Longhorns (2-1) primed to break out in the Big 12, or if they're still just scrapping around the middle of the league.

TCU has dominated Texas since 2014 with four straight lopsided wins as the Horned Frogs became a Big 12 heavyweight and Texas fell to three straight losing seasons before Herman guided them to 7-6 and a bowl win last year. That's quite a run in a rivalry that has Texas dominated historically. Texas won 28 of 29 meetings between 1968 and

But since joining the Big 12 in 2012, the Horned Frogs and coach Gary Patterson are 5-1 against the Longhorns, and Saturday will be the Big 12 opener for both teams.

'We've played hard against Texas. You would think that we would do the same thing again," Patterson said. "We have a younger football team, though. Going on the road, this is going the first time on

the road with a little bit more of a hostile crowd. How will they react to all of that?"

TCU is coming off a tough loss to No. 4 Ohio State when a second-half lead collapsed under a string of turnovers. While Texas has to move past the euphoria of a big win and any talk of being "back," TCU must deal with the fallout of letting a big win get away.

"We understand that last week doesn't matter anymore," Texas quarterback Sam Ehlinger said. "In order to be the team we want to be we have to put big wins and stack them on top of each

Some things to watch for when the Longhorns play the Horned Frogs:

STEADY EHLINGER: The sophomore didn't have a turnover last week against USC but he completed just 15 of 33 passes. Two of those went for long touchdowns. He also ran for a score. He didn't play against TCU last season

because of an injury. "He's a running back playing quarterback," Patterson said. "He beats you with his feet. He's won a lot of ballgames because of taking off, running draws, powers, quarterback stretches, all of those kind of things."

GROUND GAME: TCU has rushed for more than 200 yards in each game this season, led by the speed of tailback Darius Anderson who went 93 yards against Ohio State last week. Texas smashed USC's running game last week, holding the Trojans to minus-5 yards, one of the best performances in school history. That included a fourth-and-goal stop from the Texas 1. "That was a proud moment. Is it sustainable? I don't know," Texas senior defensive end Charles Omenihu said.

TCU TURNOVERS: Mistakes killed the Horned Frogs last week against Ohio State as TCU quarterback Shawn

Robinson had a fumble recovered in the end zone and a shuffle pass intercepted for a touchdown. His confidence could erode quickly if he has another big mistake early against Texas.

Browns coach Hue Jackson got just his second win in 35 games since being hired by owners Dee and Jimmy Haslam, and this win will ease some of the pressure he's been feeling to get Cleveland turned around. Jackson could also be faced with a difficult choice — either stick with Mayfield or go back to Taylor when he's healthy.

The decision might not be as tough now.

Jackson wouldn't commit to staying with Mayfield, but referred to the performance as "his coming out party" several times.

Mayfield made his NFL debut with 1:42 left in the second quarter, replacing an injured Taylor after Cleveland's starter was sacked for the third time. Taylor struggled getting to his feet after being dragged down by linebacker Avery Williamson, but he had absorbed several hard blows before that - and had been ineffective.

With Cleveland's crowd roaring, Mayfield completed a 14-yard pass to Jarvis Landry on his first pass as a pro and then found tight end David Njoku for 17 yards. Mayfield drove Cleveland into fieldgoal position and Joseph, who signed with the team on Monday following a tryout, drilled a low line drive to pull the Browns within 14-3.

Cleveland's plan was to have Mayfield watch and learn this season.

Taylor's injury may change everything. For Darnold, a promising start ended with his

second loss in three games. He completed 15 of 31 passes for 169 yards, but threw two picks late in the fourth as he tried to rally the Jets. "I feel like I've got to play better and make better

reads," Darnold said. "I need to be more decisive. We've got to make them pay and put the ball in our playmakers' hands."

Hyde's 1-yard TD run pulled the Browns within 14-12 and Cleveland tied it with a trick 2-point play . Mayfield shifted to the left and the ball was snapped directly to running back Duke Johnson, who ran right and gave the ball to Landry on a reverse. Landry then lofted a pass into the end zone to

Mayfield, whose conversion tied it and sent Cleveland fans into a frenzy.

Crowell scored his second TD with 7:54 left in the second quarter, and was flagged for excessive celebrating when he squatted and wiped the ball on his backside before flinging it into the crowd.

Crowell's untouched 7-yard run TD run came five plays after Jets linebacker Kevin Pierre-Louis got a hand on Britton Colquitt's attempted punt and New York took over at Cleveland's 28.

On the first play of the second quarter, Crowell took an inside handoff and raced into the end zone before firing the ball into the stands in celebration. Crowell spent four seasons with the Browns before signing a three-year, \$12 million free agent contract with New York as a free agent in March. OH, BABY
