Every day in Texas, children ride in car seats that have been installed incorrectly or are wrong for their ages and sizes. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 59 percent of car seats are used improperly. With National Child Passenger Safety Week taking place this past week, Sept. 23 through 29, the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) will close things out by offering free car seat safety checkups in areas such as Alpine, Brady, Van Horn and our very own Big Spring.

Texas Health and Human Services, located at 501 Birdwell Lane, right down from the Dollar General, will be hosting a FREE Car Seat Safety Check on Friday, Sept. 28 from 8 a.m. to noon. Also during the car

seat safety check, attendees can learn about health information, healthier eating habits of children, goodies for the kiddos, and of course, car seat education.

According to DSHS, car seat checkups will help parents and caregivers make sure their children ride as safely as possible, every trip, every time. If the technician determines that someone's current seat is unsafe, it will be replaced at no cost, as long as supplies last.

To help prevent unnecessary injury or death, here are some reminders on child passenger safety from DSHS:

- Both adults and children are required by state law to be buckled up, whether in the front or the back seat.
- Children two years old

or older who have outgrown the rear-facing seat should ride in a forward-facing seat up to the upper height or weight limit of the car seat.

- Children can ride in a booster seat once they have reached four years old and weigh over 40 pounds, but the seat should have an adult lap and shoulder belt.

- When children reach 8 years of age or 4'9" they can then use an adult safety belt.

- Children younger than 13 years old should ride in the backseat properly restrained.

"Child Passenger Safety Seat" violations can result in a fine of up to \$257. Parents and legal guardians must make an appointment in advance by calling the local DSHS office, and must have their child with them at the checkup. Ted Cruz takes unlikely role as a bulwark of stability

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Ted Cruz is talking again about chaos in Washington, only this time he's not the one causing it.

"If the next two years are nothing but a political circus of impeachment that paralyzes the federal government, that effectively locks every federal agency in gridlock, then I think we will see little to no meaningful legislation for two years," Cruz said after a recent campaign event, adding that things may devolve into "simply naked political warfare. Mad Max at Thunderdome."

Only five years ago, the same Ted Cruz rode a wave of tea party outrage to the Senate with the declared intention of wreaking havoc on the status quo. And he did, for establishment Republicans as much as President Barack Obama — helping to spark a government shutdown, calling the chamber's majority leader a liar and inciting a pack of conservatives that later toppled House Speaker John Boehner, who later branded Cruz "Lucifer in the flesh."

But with GOP analysts now worried that turmoil around the Donald Trump White House is hurting the party's midterm election chances, Cruz is suddenly casting himself as a bulwark against the forces of political anarchy.

He'll help keep Congress' wheels turning, he insists. To that end, the onetime bomb-thrower is trying to soften his image, saying he's misunderstood and actually quite funny. Cruz's often incendiary father, who made a splash in the 2012 campaign with controversial statements, also has stayed out of the spotlight.

The change reflects more than a political pro's talent for adapting to circumstances. Now, there's the pressing matter of keeping his job.

After an anonymous New York Times op-ed piece and journalist Bob Woodward's book portraying a reckless president, polls have shown the GOP's ability to hold the House increasingly in doubt amid concerns by troubled moderate voters. And Cruz finds himself in a surprisingly close race against Democratic challenger Beto O'Rourke.

White House budget director Mick Mulvaney implied that Cruz's lack of likeability could make him vulnerable.

"There is a very real possibility we will win a race for Senate in Florida and lose a race in Texas for Senate," Mulvaney said recently. "How likable is the candidate? That still counts."

How can Cruz reassure the more centrist voters

Attorney: Family of Dallas police shooting victim will sue

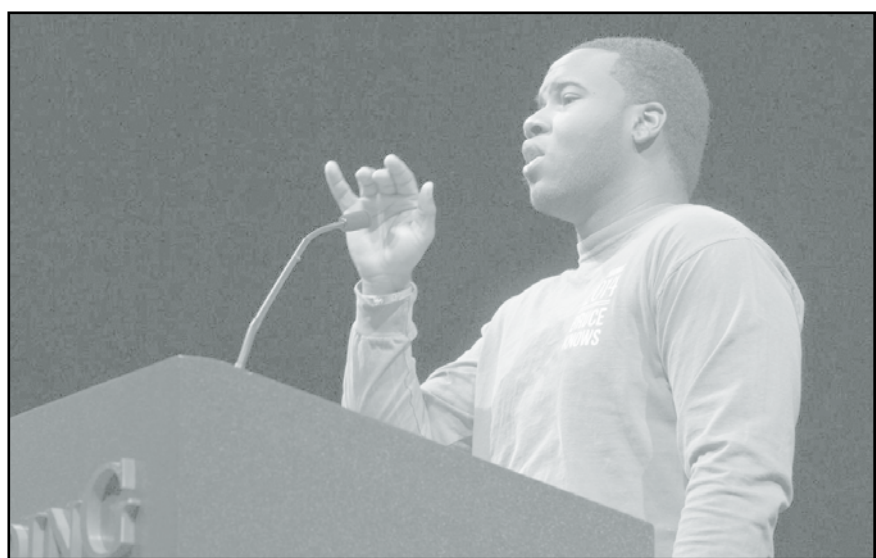
DALLAS (AP) — The family of a 26-year-old black man who authorities say was fatally shot by a white Dallas police officer after she mistook his apartment for her own intends to file a federal lawsuit claiming excessive use of force.

Attorney Lee Merritt said Wednesday that Botham Jean's family will name Amber Guyger and the city of Dallas as defendants in the lawsuit.

Merritt didn't say when the lawsuit will be filed.

Guyger told investigators she had just ended her shift Sept. 6 when she returned to her apartment complex, but she went to the wrong unit. The door was ajar and swung open to reveal a figure in the dark apartment. Investigators say Guyger drew her service weapon moments later and fired twice, striking Jean.

Guyger was fired Monday.

Congress could negate stronger state efforts on privacy

WASHINGTON — Congress wants to pass national rules governing how companies can use consumers' data — though a major goal might simply be to block states from enacting stronger privacy protections on their own.

It will be tricky to reconcile the concerns of privacy advocates who want people to have more control over the use of their personal data — where they've been, what they view, who their friends are — and the powerful companies that mine that information for profit.

The approach being pondered by policymakers and pushed by the internet industry leans toward a relatively light government touch. That's in contrast to stricter European rules that took effect in May and a California law that takes effect in 2020. Other states are also considering more aggressive protections.

During a Senate hearing Wednesday, several Democratic senators warned that a national law could simply be used to override state efforts. Call-

ing that pre-emption the "Holy Grail" for the industry, Democratic Sen. Brian Schatz of Hawaii said it won't get the bipartisan support it needs if it's just to replace California's law with a "non-progressive federal law."

Senior executives from AT&T, Amazon, Apple, Google, Twitter and Charter Communications all told senators that they support a federal proposal that could negate "inconsistent" state privacy laws.

Apple, which doesn't rely on advertising for revenue, was the most vocal at setting conditions for that support. Bud Tribble, Apple's vice president of software technology, said the bar would have to be "high enough in the federal legislation" to provide meaningful consumer protections.

The Senate Commerce Committee hearing comes amid increasing anxiety over safeguarding consumers' data online and recent scandals that have stoked outrage among users and politicians. The committee's chairman, Republican Sen. John Thune of South Dakota, said both Republicans and

Arizona city ends contract for immigrant detention center

ELOY, Ariz. (AP) — A small city in Arizona has ended its role in an unusual contract that allowed the Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency to

run a family detention center in Texas.

Eloy already had a contract with ICE and the private detention company CoreCivic for a detention facility in Eloy when it entered the contract involving the South Texas Family Residential Center in Dilley.

The new contract

was approved in 2014 to allow the government to bypass a procurement process and open the Texas site quickly during a surge of children and families coming across the border.

A report by the Department of Homeland Security's Office of Inspector General in February slammed ICE over the

contract, saying it didn't follow federal procurement guidelines.

Eloy City Manager Harvey Krauss said the contract netted about \$1.5 million in revenue for the city and was always intended to be temporary.

ICE didn't immediately respond to a request for comment.

Gaines' Magnolia Market at Silos in Waco to host church

WACO, Texas (AP) — The stars of TV's "Fixer Upper" have invited a congregation that worships under a Texas highway bridge to use the lawn of nearby Magnolia Market at the Silos for services during road construction.

Pastor Jimmy Dorrell welcomed the offer from Chip and Joanna Gaines

as Church Under the Bridge in Waco faces relocating next year. The \$300 million Interstate 35 widening project begins in March.

Officials say Church Under the Bridge, which this month celebrated its 26th anniversary, usually draws 200 to 300 people on Sundays. The focus has remained on

the marginalized who may feel unwelcome elsewhere.

Chip Gaines told the Waco Tribune-Herald that he admires Dorrell, heard the I-35 project would impact the church and offered the Silos lawn for Sunday services for a year, at no charge.

Father charged with beating toddler, gluing mouth, eyes shut

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — A father suspected of gluing shut the eyes and mouth of his 1-year-old daughter has been arrested in West Texas.

El Paso County records show 29-year-old Johnnie Lee Carter is being held Wednesday on a charge of injury to a child causing serious bodily injury.

On Sept. 16, Odessa police called to a domestic disturbance found the girl with facial injuries and her mouth

and eyes glued. According to an affidavit, the toddler's mother told police that Carter choked and punched the girl then applied adhesive. A super glue stick was found nearby. Carter had fled.

Carter was arrested Monday at a motel in El Paso. He faces extradition to Odessa, some 270 miles (435 kilometers) away.

Online records didn't list an attorney who can speak on Carter's behalf.

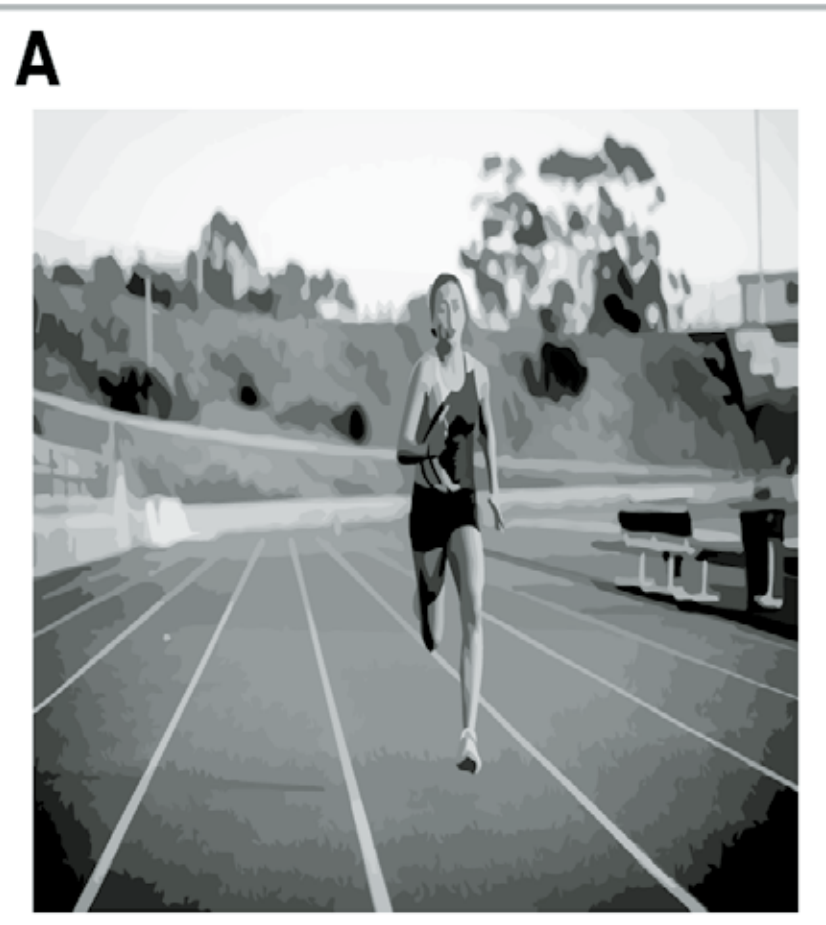

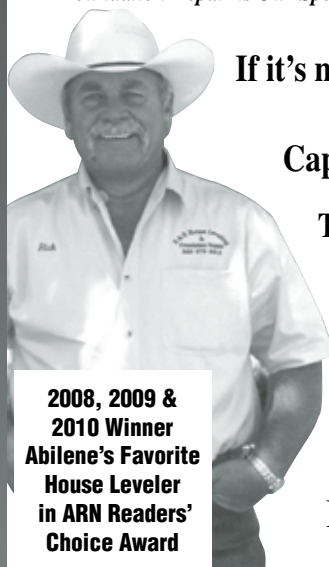

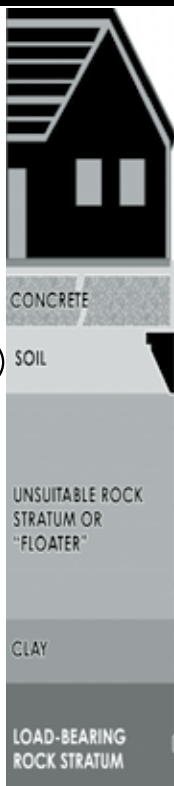

The Skills to Pay the Bills

Dear Annie: I wish I had listened to my mom when she told me to go to college. I was 18 and didn't want to do it. I really liked working with machines, so I got a job doing that. Also, not everybody went to college back then. Five years later, my girlfriend got pregnant, and I stayed at the same job because I made pretty good money and the company had family medical plans. Now I'm 40 years old, and we have three kids. We need more money, but my company can't give me more.

I'm really good at my job, but I don't have as many different skills as people who

went to trade school or went to school for engineering. Looking for another job has been hard, and I feel that people who have less experience than I do have gotten the jobs because they have special degrees. So it's a weird situation. Do I keep going with the job that pays less? Go back to school to get a degree? I would have to get loans, and that doesn't seem smart because we have a mortgage, cars and all that. What do you think? -- Better Late Than Never?

Dear Better Late Than Never: I am always for getting more education -- but it doesn't have to mean quitting your job. See what skills are most in demand in your field

and what corresponding coursework could help you develop those skills. You may not need to get a whole degree to earn higher pay. You may just need a certificate. I'd also encourage you to look into getting the most out of your current skill set -- for example, by doing freelance work on the side.

Dear Annie: I would like to offer some suggestions to "Desperate in Delaware" and to others who are having difficulties dealing with their children's frustrating behaviors. As a psychologist, I have found that positive reinforcement always works better than negative. Parents can take control again without screaming. The following token

economy is an effective system:

Children are told that they will receive a chip when they behave. The chips can be turned in for rewards. If they are misbehaving, they are told that they will get a chip if they stop the behavior. The children are told ahead of time what behaviors will earn chips. If they continue to misbehave, they should get a timeout.

This is the tried-and-true method of behavior management, and it prevents some very nasty interactions between parents and children. -- Vermont Psychologist

Dear Vermont Psychologist: I appreciate your expert insights, and I agree that a token economy

is a really effective and positive method of establishing good behavior in children. Thanks for writing.

Dear Annie: I would like to respond to the woman who is upset about people's use of her surname. My family name also is Gross. There are thousands of other people with that last name. This is a German name, and I tell people it means great, but it also can be used to mean large, many, impressive, grand and several other things.

It is not possible to change the English language on your own, so the best thing to do is to change your attitude and turn a bad situation into something good. Once you learn a bit about your ances-

tral heritage and learn the real meaning of the word, you will be proud to hold your head high and say to yourself, "I am great." -- Proud Gross

It pays to go with the odds

carded a diamond. Since South had to lose a spade trick eventually, the fate of the contract hinged on avoiding a trump loser.
Declarer was fully familiar with the standard play with this suit combination, but was equally aware that the percentages could easily be altered by information gained anywhere along the line. In the present case, he learned from the first three tricks that West had started with six clubs and East only two.
This in turn meant that West held seven other cards that were unknown, while East held 11. Taking this a step further, South reasoned that if the defenders hold 18 cards that are unknown, the player with 11 of them is much more likely to have a specific missing card than the player who has only seven.
Accordingly, declarer led a heart to the ace at trick four and returned a heart toward his hand. After East followed low, South finessed the jack and so brought home the contract.
It is true that the jack could easily have lost to the queen, as there was certainly no guarantee that the finesse would succeed. But it was the right thing to do in this case because it was the percentage play.
When all you have is favorable odds to rely on, you should do as they dictate, and you will win many more times than you lose.

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, Sept. 27, the 270th day of 2018. There are 95 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On September 27, 1939, Warsaw, Poland, surrendered after weeks of resistance to invading forces from Nazi Germany and the Soviet Union during World War II.

On this date: In 1825, the first locomotive to haul a passenger train was operated by George Stephenson in England.

In 1854, the first great disaster involving an Atlantic Ocean passenger vessel occurred when the steamship SS Arctic sank off Newfoundland; of the more than 400 people on board, only 86 survived.

In 1917, French sculptor and painter Edgar Degas died in Paris at age 83.

In 1928, the United States said it was recognizing the Nationalist Chinese government.

In 1942, Glenn Miller and his Orchestra performed together for the last time, at the Central Theater in Passaic, New Jersey, prior to Miller's entry into the Army.

In 1962, "Silent Spring," Rachel Carson's study on the effects of pesticides on the environment, was published in book form by Houghton Mifflin.

In 1964, the government publicly released the report of the Warren Commission, which concluded that Lee Harvey Oswald had acted alone in assassinating President John F. Kennedy.

In 1979, Congress gave its final approval to forming the U.S. Department of Education.

In 1991, President George H.W. Bush announced in a nationally broadcast address that he was eliminating all U.S. battlefield nuclear weapons, and called on the Soviet Union to match the gesture. The Senate Judiciary Committee deadlocked, 7-7, on the nomination of Clarence Thomas to the U.S. Supreme Court.

In 1994, more than 350 Republican congressional candidates gathered on the steps of the U.S. Capitol to sign the "Contract with America," a 10-point platform they pledged to enact if voters sent a GOP majority to the House.

In 1996, in Afghanistan, the Taliban, a band of former seminary students, drove the government of President Burhanuddin Rabbani out of Kabul, captured the capital and executed former leader Najibullah.

In 2004, NBC announced that

Tonight Show

"Tonight Show" host Jay Leno would be succeeded by "Late Night" host Conan O'Brien in 2009. (O'Brien's stint on "The Tonight Show" lasted just over seven months.)

Ten years ago: China marked its first spacewalk as astronaut Zhai Zhigang (zheyeh zhu-dawng) floated outside the Shenzhou 7 for 13 minutes.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama and Iranian President Hassan Rouhani spoke by telephone, the first conversation between American and Iranian leaders in more than 30 years. The U.N. Security Council voted unanimously to secure and destroy Syria's chemical weapons stockpile.

One year ago: President Donald Trump and congressional Republicans unveiled the first major revamp of the nation's tax code in a generation, a plan that included deep tax cuts for corporations, simplified tax brackets and a near-doubling of the standard deduction. Maria regained strength and became a hurricane again, pushing water over both sides of North Carolina's Outer Banks. Playboy founder Hugh Hefner died at the age of 91.

Democrats now want to reach consensus on a national privacy law that "will help consumers, promote innovation, reward organizations with little to hide and force shady practitioners to clean up their act."

An early move in President Donald Trump's tenure set the tone on data privacy. He signed a bill into law in April 2017 that allows internet providers to sell information about their customers' browsing habits. The legislation scrapped Obama-era online privacy rules aimed at giving consumers more control over how broadband companies like AT&T, Comcast and Verizon share that information.

Allie Bohm, policy counsel at the consumer group Public Knowledge, said examples abound of companies not only using the data to market products but also to profile consumers and restrict who sees their offerings: African Americans not getting access to ads for housing, minorities and older people excluded from seeing job postings.

What is needed, privacy advocates maintain, is legislation to govern the entire "life cycle" of consumers' data: how it's collected, used, kept, shared and sold.

The 28-nation European Union put in strict new rules this spring that require companies to justify why they're collecting and using personal data gleaned from phones, apps and visited websites. Companies also must give EU users the ability to access and delete data, and to object to data use under one of the claimed reasons.

A similar law in California will compel companies to tell customers upon request what personal data they've collected, why it was collected and what types of third parties have received it. Companies will be able to offer discounts to customers who allow their data to be sold and to charge those who opt out a reasonable amount, based on how much the company makes selling the information.

Andrew DeVore, Amazon's vice president and associate general counsel, told the Senate panel Wednesday that it should consider the "possible unintended consequences" of California's approach. For instance, he said the state law defines personal information too broadly such that it could include all data.

The California law doesn't take effect until 2020 and applies only to California consumers, but it could have fallout effects on other states. And it's strong enough to have rattled Big Tech, which is seeking a federal data-privacy law that would be more lenient toward the industry.

"A national privacy framework should be consistent throughout all states, pre-empting state consumer-privacy and data security laws," the Internet Association said in a recent statement. The group represents about 40 big internet and tech companies, spanning Airbnb and Amazon to Zillow. "A strong national baseline creates clear rules for companies."

The Trump White House said this summer that the administration is working on it, meeting with companies and other interested parties.

The goal is a policy "that is the appropriate balance between privacy and prosperity," White House spokeswoman Lindsay Walters said. "We look forward to working with Congress on a legislative solution."

that he's even-keeled and responsible while still exciting Trump supporters who thrive on the Washington tumult?

Dave Carney, a Republican strategist who worked for Cruz's 2012 Texas Republican primary opponent but also for Cruz's largest super PAC during the 2016 presidential race, said Cruz's campaign is crafted to bridge the difficult divide.

That's because "no one wants more gridlock," he said.

"I think even people who may not be super fans of Ted surely don't want Congress to be worse," Carney said.

Cruz rejects the idea of being "wild-eyed" during his early Senate days, and this isn't the first time he's tried to show a softer side. In 2015, the senator made a video for Buzzfeed where he famously did character voices from "The Simpsons." He's also re-enacted scenes from his favorite movie, the sappy and romantic "Princess Bride."

"I like to have fun. I enjoy life. I like to make jokes," Cruz told GQ magazine recently.

And, whereas his 2012 speeches sounded like fiery tea party rallies, Cruz now spends much of his time on the campaign trail highlighting his work inside government to secure post-Hurricane Harvey rebuilding funds and his determination to protect Trump administration accomplishments, including tax cuts and reduced regulation.

As a former Ivy League debate champion, Cruz is especially well suited for the task of stroking different camps while not having it sound like a contradiction. But not everyone is buying it.

"Pot, meet kettle," laughed Manny Garcia, the Texas Democratic Party's deputy executive director, who noted that Cruz "has used obstructionism as the primary driver for his national fame."

"He presented himself as a person driven by principle but has now revealed himself as a politician who will say anything to hold onto power," Garcia said.

Still, Cruz pollster Chris Wilson says the candidate has always been ready for this new role.

Today, "It's a different time that calls for a different type of leadership," Wilson said. "The beauty of Ted Cruz is, I think he's well positioned for both of those."

Also adjusting is Cruz's 79-year-old father, Rafael, who spent years barnstorming Texas and often turned heads with inflammatory comments, like when he called for sending Obama "back to Kenya," and suggested black people "need to be educated" to stop supporting minimum wage laws. He continues campaigning, but without so much fanfare. The elder Cruz still insists, however, that the stakes have never been higher.

"If we lose Texas," Rafael Cruz is fond of telling rallies "then we lose America."

Prosecutor picked to question Kavanaugh, accuser called fair

PHOENIX (AP) — Senate Republicans are bringing in a female prosecutor from Arizona with decades of experience prosecuting sex crimes to handle questioning about allegations of sexual assault against Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh, describing her as tough, experienced and objective.

Rachel Mitchell, a Republican, was expected to question both Kavanaugh and the first woman to accuse him of sexual misconduct at Thursday's Senate Judiciary Committee hearing.

Christine Blasey Ford's allegation that Kavanaugh drunkenly assaulted her when they were teenagers has predictably raised a political storm in the #MeToo era and the GOP's all-male presence on the panel made some want a woman to question Ford.

Allegations from two other women have since emerged, but Republicans have not announced any plans to focus Thursday's session on those claims. Kavanaugh has denied all the accusations.

Mitchell works in the Maricopa County Attorney's Office in Phoenix as the chief of the Special Victims Division. She supervises attorneys who handle cases involving child molestation, sexual assault and computer crimes against children in Arizona's most populous county.

Mitchell "has been recognized in the legal community for her experience and objectivity," committee Chairman Chuck Grassley, a Republican from Iowa, said in a statement Tuesday.

Maricopa County Attorney Bill Montgomery, Mitchell's boss, praised her experience in an interview with The Arizona Republic, calling her an "objective prosecutor" who has a "caring heart" for victims. He said he was contacted by staff members of the Judiciary Committee over the weekend about Mitchell's qualifications.

In July 2014, Mitchell prosecuted a former church baby sitter and camp counselor in the Phoenix suburb of Scottsdale who molested children in his care over a seven-year period. He was sentenced to 30 years in prison with lifetime probation.

"People want to go to a church on a Sunday and feel safe," Mitchell said at the time, adding that the settings of his actions "should be taken into account."

In 2015, Mitchell prosecuted

a 13-year veteran of the Mesa Police Department who groped two women, one of whom had passed out.

She has been named Arizona's Outstanding Sexual Assault Prosecutor as well as Maricopa County Attorney's Office Prosecutor of the Year.

The county attorney's office introduced a sex crimes protocol last year — the first in its history. The new policy manual will ensure that prosecutors have a guide "so that we can do the best we can for victims," Mitchell told a local NPR station in January.

"It's always hard to know which victims were not victims or which people were not victims because your system worked," Mitchell said in an interview with Phoenix radio station KJZZ.

Coach Dana Jones, who helps students develop sportsmanship and dexterity, also had positive things to say about White.

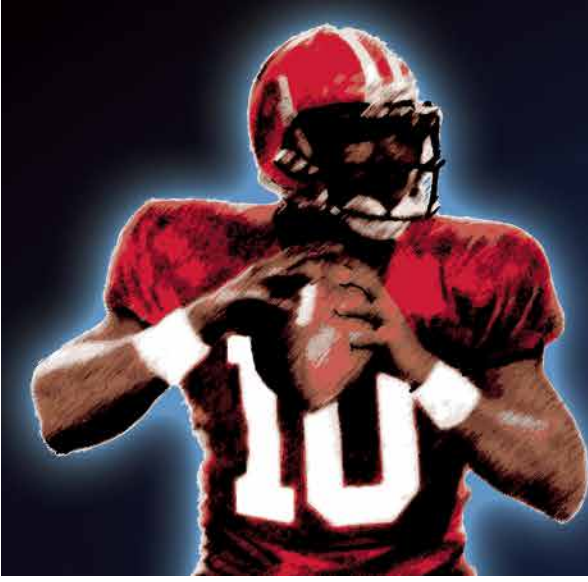
"Noah is motivated and more mature than most freshmen," she said.

After an impressive performance last week in a 39-20 win over Pecos, the Steers (2-2) head to Wall this week to take on the Hawks and their vaunted run game.

Big Spring had great balance last week against the Eagles with 134 rushing yards and 186 passing yards in the game as well as six touchdowns spread amongst five players. With that type of balanced attack, it makes it difficult for opposing teams to key on one player or to try to take away one part of the Steers offense. If Big Spring can continue that trend and keep the Wall' defense playing honest they have a real opportunity to get over the hump this week and get their team to a winning record.

The Hawks (1-2) head into this week's matchup coming off a big 40-20 win over Sonora last Friday. Wall put up 373 total yards of offense against the Broncos last week with 330 of those yards from the ground. Hawks' running-back, Sutton Braden, led the team with 149 yards on 18 carries and

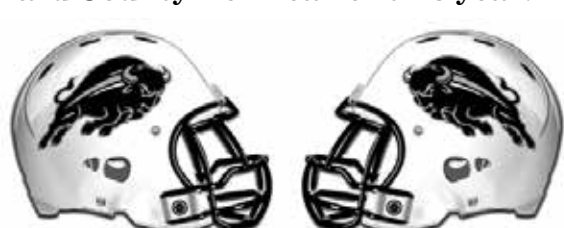

The Buffs and the Owls are set to kickoff at 7:30 p.m. this Friday in Big Lake.

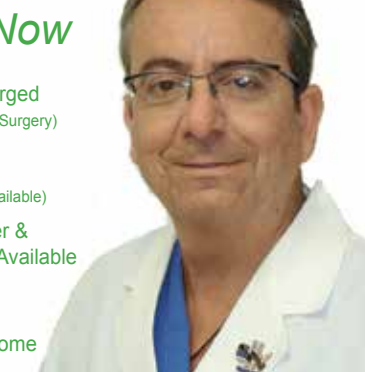

Williams hard-nose style of play and never back down attitude earned him this week's Buff Defensive Player of the Week honors.

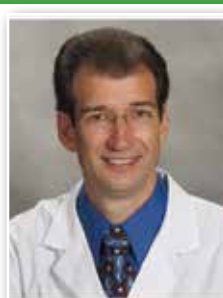
