## Burglaries **And Theft Solved Here**



# The Big Lie About the U.S. - And How It Grew and Grew

It's a pity the Guinness Book of World Records doesn't deal in political superlatives. Then it could note the most successful-and damnable-Big Lie since Adolph Hitler and Joseph Goebbels were in the mendacity business:

To wit, that the United States of America is the prime villain in world affairs. How did this whopper come to be widely believed about

this nation that, 30 years ago, was almost universally regarded as a benefactor to humanity? The first part of the answer is easy. As the powerhouse not

only of capitalism but also of democracy, the United States had to be discredited if possible by the Soviet Union. With a party monopoly of information and propaganda in their own vast land and in their East European satellites, the Soviets had the means to get the job done there....

China drummed into its people's heads the same message of American iniquity, moderated slightly in recent years as fear of the Soviet colossus pushed Peking toward an alliance of convenience with the U.S....

The U.S. has certainly earned, though not always for dishonorable reasons, some animosity in the Third World. But the U.S. has not, by its own actions, come close to earning the amount of abuse heaped on it in the Third World. It has done many things that should have earned goodwill there-such as being nearly always first with the most

emergency relief in time of famine, flood or earthquake. Part of the explanation is simply envy and resentment of the poor and weak toward the rich and powerful. Now we come to the stangest and saddest part of the story, which is how free and democratic people have fed the Big Lie and .. helped discredit the main champion of freedom.

With few exceptions, the Western news media have done this quite innocently, by going about their business the way they know how, covering the news as it happens and when available. And about 99 per cent of it is available only in open societies like the United States. Totalitarian states like the Soviet Union and China simply deny access to everything they don't want reported.

When this unbalanced access is combined with the critical, negative tradition of Western journalism-things that are would be necessary to put going well usually aren't news-the result is an immense, continuous distortion of the world picture...

In this sorry business of free people tarring Uncle Sam, I've given first place to the media only becuase we deserve it. But the contributions of academics and teachers shouldn't be

The academics gave us the revisionist historians who have selected and rearranged the events of the early postwar period to make the preposterous case that the United States launched the Cold War without serious provocation from the Soviet side. And many teachers of current events and history somehow failed to get it across to high school graduates that there's a fundamental difference, in the matter of citizen's rights and liberties, between countries like the Soviet Union and China on the one hand and countries like Canada and U.S. on the other...

They equate a Chile on the American side with 10 countries permanently subjugated by the Soviet Union.

This technique of the false equation is convenient. It relieves one of the responsibility of choosing sides between imperfect opponents, even where the differences in terms of

human decency and liberty are immense. Adapting the late John L. Lewis, I say it ill behooves those who shelter in freedom's house and dine at freedom's table to curse with equal fervor and fine impartiality both the chief

defender of freedom and its deadliest enemy. The United States, notwithstanding grievous errors and faults and occasional villainies, is committed by its whole history to fundamental human rights. The Soviet Union, on its record, is inexorably bent on the destruction of those rights...

For democrats of every persuasion-liberal, Socialist or conservative-anti-Americanism has become a costly indulgence.





## Tips For Gardeners From the

Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

This is the month that spring gardening gets into full swing. Since sanitation is an important part of garden maintenance, remove any debris, dead and broken limbs, and thatch from the lawn before new growth begins. Divide perennials, if needed, and plant hardy vegetables and bedding plants. Most pruning should be completed now, along with planting of bare-root trees and shrubs. Feed plants now to get them off to a good start. Delay tilling the soil until soil moisture is right-neither too wet nor too dry.

Finish planting pansies. snapdragons, and pinks. These like cool weather and will fade when hot weather comes. For the hot, sunny days ahead, try Vinca, portulaca, lantana, zinnia and marigolds. For color in the shade. plant coleus, impatiens, begonias and coladiums.

Complete pruning of bush type roses between now and March 15 or as danger of frost is past. Remove damaged and weakened canes first. Retain three to six healthy canes, cutting vigorous, fastgrowing varieties back to 12 to 18 inches. Delay pruning of climbers until after they have completed their spring-blooming cycle.

Hardy vegetables should be planted but warm-season vegetables should not be planted until danger of frost is over in our area. Prepare to cover early plants if frost is in forecast. Milk cartons make good covers.

Take cuttings this month. Succulent perennials and other plants you have been growing indoors all winter, can be rooted and enjoyed while rooting in water. Wash each container with warm soapy water and rinse. To control the growth of algae, it may be necessary to repeat washing the container every few weeks. It is best to place the container in indirect lighting to prevent this. Fill the container with warm water from the tap. Remove the leaves from the bottom half of each cutting. Only bare stems should be placed water level. Leaves of most plants standing beneath water will begin to rot and eventually cause the loss of the entire cutting. At frequent intervals, replace the water lost by evaporation.

Many plants can be propagated in this way. Some of these include aucuba, begonia, coleus, fatshedera, fuchsia, gardenia, geranium, hibiscus, ivy, impatiens, myrtle, oleander and jews.

A decision to buy life insurance should depend on needs of those who will receive its benefits, Lynn Bourland, a family resource management specialist, advises. "Adequate life insurance

is one way to have financial security for a family in case the wage earner(s) should die--and it provides protection from debt collectors to a single person's heirs.

"Also, life insurance enables anyone with a modest income and little savings to build an estate large enough for surviving dependents to continue their accustomed standard of living," she said.

Miss Bourland is with the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service The Texas A&M University System--and she is author of "Life Insurance" (MP 1262), a publication available through County Extension Offices statewide. Among its several topics, the publication includes a chart to help families "size-up" their insurance needs, she

In determining whose life should be insured, it is most important to first protect a family from losing the main wage earner's income.

family needs depends on the number and ages of children, the surviving spouse's earning power, and the amount of other resources dependents will have.

A minimum of four or five times the main wage earner's annual income is recommended by money management experts, Miss Bourland said.

"Also consider other financial factors that life insurance can protect.

"For example, in 1974, incomes were earned by 55 per cent of the wives in U.S. families. In addition to dollars earned, services provided by the homemakerthat would have to be replaced by paid help-should be considered.




