Burglaries And Theft Solved Here

Two burglaries were cleared up and a stolen vehicle was recovered over the past weekend.

Richard D. Siminski, Buffalo, N.Y., was arrested here Saturday morning and charged with the theft of tools, a stereo tape player and several tapes valued at \$650 taken from a vehicle parked behind the Shell Service Station last week. Local police also recovered \$150 worth of stolen Indian jewelry, taken from The Book Seller's.

Charles Huffman's van was recovered by police in Miami, Arizona Sunday. It had been stolen from the driveway in front of his home Friday night. Three men were picked up in the van in Arizona. Terry L. Hayes of Fort Worth will be returned to Ozona to stand trial on car theft.

In other police work for the month, the DPS personnel made five DWI arrests and one for no drivers license. Sheriff Department personnel made five arrests for public intoxication, three for assault, picked up two runaways, arrested three persons for disorderly conduct, and made one arrest each for carrying a prohibited weapon and burglary.

Community Center Youths Have Fun With Food Prog.

Fifty preschoolers at the Ozona Community Center are having fun with food. During the past three weeks, the preschoolers have learned about the basic foods that help them grow big and strong.

The preschool nutrition lessons were conducted by Debra Price, County Extension Agent employed with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in cooperation with Sylvia Covarrubias, Director of the Ozona Community Center. Nutrition lessons conducted at the Ozona Community Center have included: 1. The Basic 4 Foods, 2. Meet Molly Moo, 3. Gussie Goose and the Fruits and Vegetables, 4. Mary Mutton and the Meat Group, 5. Fred the Horse Who Likes Bread, and 6. Mr. Peanut's Groovy Breakfast.

The lessons are conducted with five or six children in a group for 15 minutes, in the kitchen at the center. Each group has a story, plays games, or identifies foods before they prepare their snack for the morning. The children have made their own Cheese Dip with vegetable dippers, Happy Face Salads, Deviled Eggs, Animal Toast and Cinnamon Toast.

The main purpose of the program is that the children have fun with the food experiments and learn to identify the foods that make them healthy. Studies tell us that

pleasant experiences with food are important during the preschool years. A child's food habits and attitudes will last throughout his life.

Invisible Path TV Microwave Signal Sought

Finding an invisible path of a microwave signal over the 38-mile distance between towers in Eldorado and Ozona was all that remained to be done Tuesday to turn in solid television signals for Ozona tv cable subscribers.

Slowly swinging the massive reflector screens atop the two towers in an effort to bring them into the minute focus necessary occupied the intrepid tower men Sunday and Monday, but without success. The path was scouted by air and by car Tuesday while the wind was too high for tower climbing and the electronic engineers were confident that the path would be found shortly when weather permits a resumption of the effort.

Meanwhile, Ozona patrons are awaiting the new service and the management of the system is begging their indulgence until the electronic brains can find the elusive microwave path.

Auto Accident Fatal To Iraan Child

Crockett County recorded its first traffic fatality shortly after noon Thursday when a four-year-old Iraan girl was killed in a one-vehicle rollover 36.2 miles northwest of Ozona on Texas 29 in Crockett County.

Pronounced dead at the scene by J.P. Al Fields was Kimberly Jeffers of Iraan. The body was taken to Shepard Funeral Home in Crane.

Injured was Barbara Blakesley, 35, driver of the Ford pickup, also of Iraan, she was taken to Iraan General Hospital where she was treated and released. Her daughter, Laura Blakesley, 2, was listed in good condition at Iraan General Hospital with bruises and abrasions.

The accident occurred when the vehicle ran off the road and the driver lost control. The vehicle overturned twice, coming to rest on its side in the barrow ditch. All passengers were thrown from the vehicle and the deceased was crushed by the cab of the pickup.

Investigating officer was Trooper Manuel Hartnett, DPS, Ozona, assisted by Trooper Dean Watson, DPS, Iraan.

\$4.1 Million Bond Issue Gets 10-Year Retirement

In a called meeting Wednesday, Feb. 23, the Crockett County Commissioners Court and Crockett County School Board officials met to officially set the election for the 4.1 million dollar school building program and at the same time agreed on a 10-year retirement program for the bonds.

School board officials and architects have been working on the renovation program for the past six months and presented it to the Commissioners Court at the regular meeting last month.

It has been determined that the present facilities are inadequate in many areas and some have reached thirty years of age, while others are nearing it. Present facilities will not meet the required flexibility of today's educational standards set forth by the Texas Education Agency.

The building and renovation program, as set forth, will allow the school district to up-date and provide modern facilities for Crockett County children.

Cost of the complete program as outlined will be 4.1 million dollars. Crockett County voters will determine the outcome in an election to be held Thursday, March 24.

Construction of new facilities and renovation of others will be accomplished through the issuing of bonds, depending on the outcome of the election March 24. Completion time has been set at 18 months from the time construction gets under way.

Previous articles in the Stockman have outlined the construction and renovation program. However, the school is in the process of making up a brochure to be distributed to the public and

describes the project in complete detail. There has been no decision on the future use of the present junior high building.

The bonds will be paid on a 10-year retirement schedule, which while costing a few cents more on the \$100 valuation, for the ten years, will save thousands of dollars in the long run. For instance, a 20-year retirement plan would cost the taxpayers interest in excess of \$1 million more than the 10-year plan.

Projected cost to property owners on a 10-year retirement schedule would increase their school tax 57c. The present school tax rate is \$1.22 per \$100 valuation. The present tax plus the bond rate would increase the tax to \$1.79 per \$100 worth of valuation.

Ranch lands are presently taxed \$31.23 for the purpose of school taxation. If the bond issue passes, the rate will be \$45.95 per section, or an annual increase of \$14.72. The per acre figure is .049c presently. The bond issue would increase this figure to .72c for a raise of only .023c per acre.

Several conditions have been made to assure the county gets what it pays for. First, architect's plans and specifications must meet with School Board approval. Competitive construction bids will be taken. Strict and complete supervision of all construction will be undertaken by the architect. The School Board will make a complete inspection of the facilities before accepting them. Also, competitive bids will be taken on the sale of bonds to assure the lowest possible interest rate. And

finally, an independent audit will be made which accounts for all expenditures.

Assisting the Board of Trustees in the preparation of the improvement program and pending bond proposal have been architects Atkinson & Atkinson Associates, of Lubbock; financial advisors, Underwood, Newhaus & Co., Inc. of Houston; legal counsellors, Dumas, Huguenin, Boethman and Morrow, of Dallas, and educational consultants have been the administration of the Texas Education Agency.

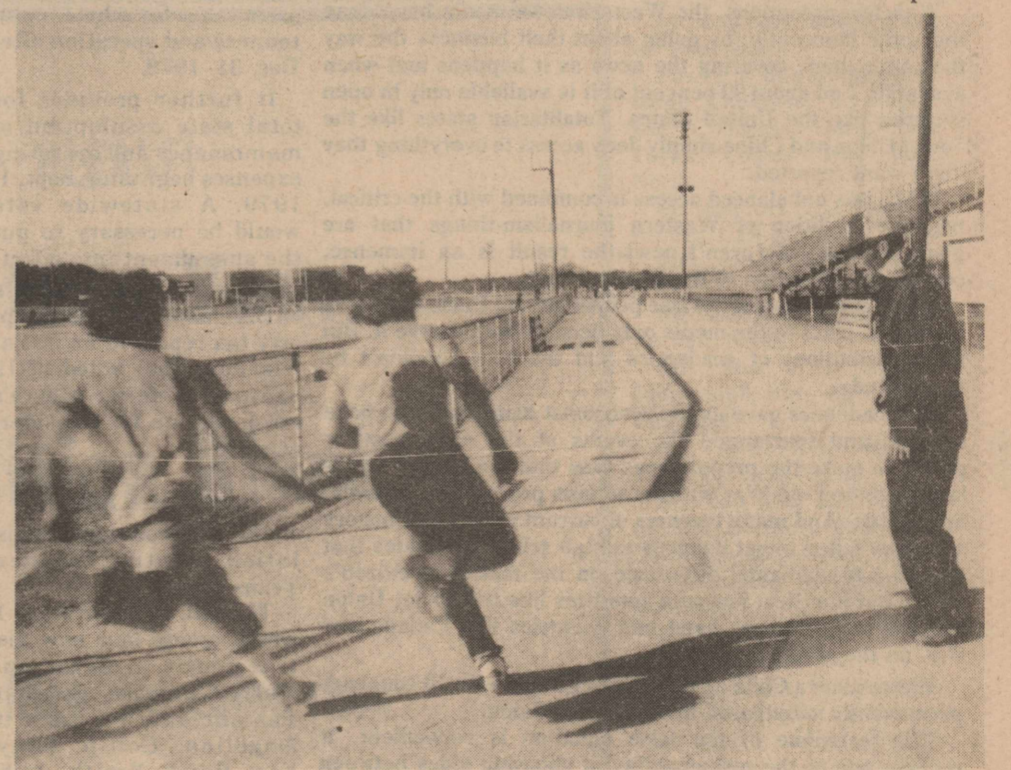

Voters may vote absentee at the county clerk's office Monday through Friday from March 4, through March 18. Any person who is a registered voter, and resides within the boundaries of Crockett County and was registered at least 30 days prior to the date of the election is eligible to vote. The ballots will be printed in both English and Spanish. A sample ballot appears elsewhere in the paper today.

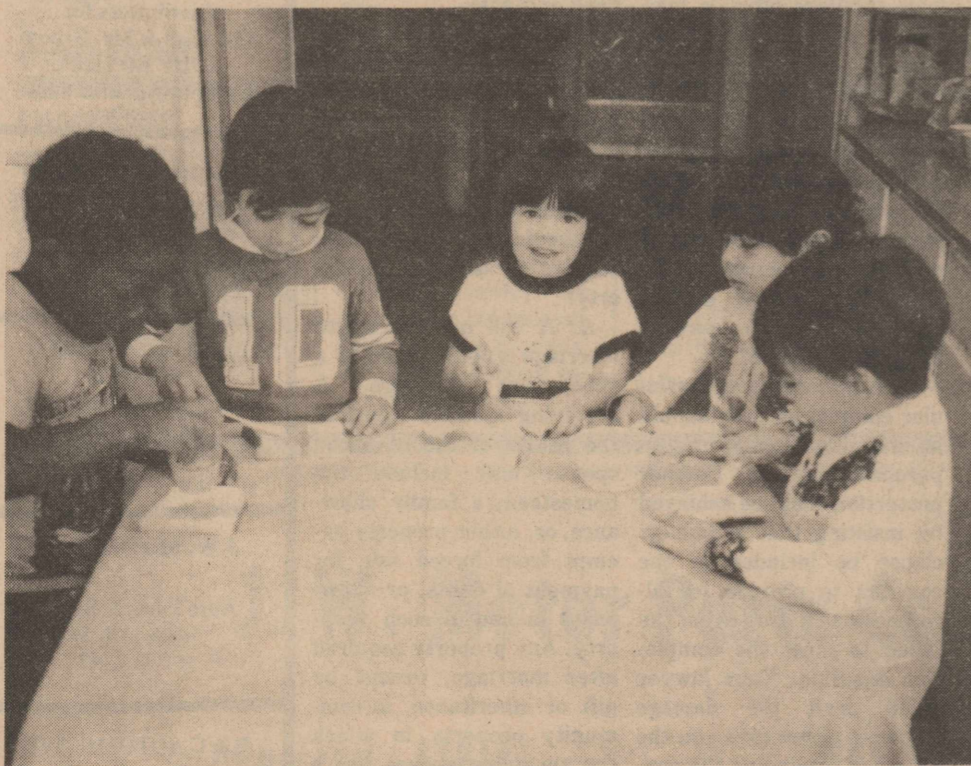

MORE AND BETTER TELEVISION VIEWING FOR OZONA CABLE SUBSCRIBERS

In spite of some technical difficulties and some unfavorable weather conditions at the beginning of this week, by the time you read this you should be enjoying your new and expanded television service over the Ozona cable system. All equipment has been installed on the new Television Enterprises tower at Eldorado and receiving equipment on our tower. Electronic experts were on both towers Sunday orienting the microwave screens and were to be back the first of the week as this is being prepared in an effort to overcome difficulties encountered the first day.

As you, no doubt, already know, we are bringing you three new television broadcast stations from the Dallas-Fort Worth area plus the five channels we already offer, and plus four FM music channels available through the cable connection. This new, expanded service

will bring Ozona TV subscribers two ABC stations, two NBC stations and two CBS stations, plus one independent station and one educational channel. The new channels to be added to the local system are WFAA [ABC], Dallas; KTVT [Ind.], Fort Worth; and KERA [Educational], Dallas. With the television signals from these new stations will go the engineering service from Television Enterprises, Inc. of San Angelo on the three new channels plus the two San Angelo channels, KCTV [CBS], and KACB [NBC], which should mean minimal interruption of service on these channels.

TS&GR Discuss Problems At Tri-Annual Meeting

In our increasingly complex society, agricultural producers are learning that the greatest problems they face are not always those posed by nature, but by people-while natural laws have remained constant and basic, laws created by man change frequently and become more and more capricious.

Much of the discussion during the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Tri-annual Meeting in Austin concerned itself with this problem. Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe offered an excellent example in his address at the meeting. "Having gotten into the eagle situation a bit," he remarked, "I am familiar not only with the difficulty of raising a kid and lamb crop, but also the difficulty of dealing with the Federal bureaucracy in trying to do so."

Briscoe, of course, was referring to federal laws limiting control of predatory eagles, but the problem is not confined to the feathered feasters.

Federal involvement in land use control is one area that concerns agricultural producers, and Tax and Labor Committee chairman Joe Mertz outlined new developments in this area. Mertz said that Congressman Morris Udall, chairman of the House Interior Committee, has increased the size of the committee and restructured the sub-committees. "All the new members," said Mertz, "Are environmentalists or conservationists. We will have no chance of defeating these bills in committee any more." With the Federal penchant for overkill, sheep and goat raisers, not to mention other producers, may someday face very detailed Federal control of their activities on their own land, all in the name of protecting agricultural land from urban sprawl. Federal estate tax provisions are greatly to blame for the loss of productive land in the first place.

One federal law, however, received offhand and relative approval by Mertz. While agriculture as a whole has fought inclusion under the National Labor Relations Act, Mertz pointed out that a recent California State Law gives union organizers free access to private lands for

the purpose of unionizing workers.

"We feel," he added, "That the National Labor Relations Act would have been of more benefit to them than what they are facing on a state level", referring to West Coast producers. Mertz said he feared the spread of such laws to other states.

Health and Product Development Committee Chairman Martin Wardlaw alluded to yet another governmental problem. New blue tongue and sore mouth drugs may never materialize, he explained, "Because it would cost about \$10 million to clear a new drug product." The clearance problem is based on the Federal opinion that no product is safe until proven so. Theory tells us that it is impossible to prove a negative assumption, though this must be done before a drug is approved for marketing.

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Tips For Gardeners
From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

This is the month that spring gardening gets into full swing. Since sanitation is an important part of garden maintenance, remove any debris, dead and broken limbs, and thatch from the lawn before new growth begins. Divide perennials, if needed, and plant hardy vegetables and bedding plants. Most pruning should be completed now, along with planting of bare-root trees and shrubs. Feed plants now to get them off to a good start. Delay tilling the soil until soil moisture is right—neither too wet nor too dry.

Finish planting pansies, snapdragons, and pinks. These like cool weather and will fade when hot weather comes. For the hot, sunny days ahead, try Vinca, portulaca, lantana, zinnia and marigolds. For color in the shade, plant coleus, impatiens, begonias and coladiums.

Complete pruning of bush type roses between now and March 15 or as danger of frost is past. Remove damaged and weakened canes first. Retain three to six healthy canes, cutting vigorous, fast-growing varieties back to 12 to 18 inches. Delay pruning of climbers until after they have completed their spring-blooming cycle.

Hardy vegetables should be planted but warm-season vegetables should not be planted until danger of frost is over in our area. Prepare to cover early plants if frost is in forecast. Milk cartons make good covers.

Take cuttings this month. Succulent perennials and other plants you have been growing indoors all winter, can be rooted and enjoyed while rooting in water. Wash each container with warm soapy water and rinse. To control the growth of algae, it may be necessary to repeat washing the container every few weeks. It is best to place the container in indirect lighting to prevent this. Fill the container with warm water from the tap. Remove the leaves from the bottom half of each cutting. Only bare stems should be placed beneath the water level. Leaves of most plants standing beneath water will begin to rot and eventually cause the loss of the entire cutting. At frequent intervals, replace the water lost by evaporation.

Many plants can be propagated in this way. Some of these include aucuba, begonia, coleus, fatsy, geranium, hibiscus, ivy, impatiens, myrtle, oleander and jews.

Wise use of color can help solve decorating problems of small size rooms and limited furnishings. Color cannot, of course, increase the actual size of a room, but it can create an illusion of spaciousness. Also, the wise use of color can enhance the least expensive furnishings. Color has three dimensions—value (its lightness or darkness), intensity (brightness or dullness) and hue (hues give warmth with yellow and reds or coolness with blues). By studying the dimensions of color, especially in relation to decorating problems, home decorators may find many simple, inexpensive decorating answers—with a can of paint.

A small room looks larger if painted a cool color, such as light blue. A feeling of spaciousness occurs when colors used within the room in furniture, draperies and accessories are of close or similar value—preferable light. Light values create the impression of distance. Close values have a quieting effect while strong contrasts appear busy.

Furnishings contrasting in value, intensity and hue tend to divide a room and make it look smaller. So, a small room needs little contrast in color. A difference in value is more contrasting than in a difference in hue. For example, a color scheme using orange and blue of the same value is less obvious than the use of one hue but in different values. When increasing the number of hues in a room, it's important to make them close in value.

While cool colors recede and make a room appear larger, they do have a formal feeling. Today's homes are more casual and most people prefer warm colors. If small rooms are to be decorated in

earth tones, these warm colors may be used if they are close in value and dull in intensity. When these warm colors are dull in intensity, such as warm tans, any hue looks good against them. These unifying hues (warm colors) make the most useful colors for backgrounds. Generally, duller intensities are best for large areas, such as walls, while bright intensities are best for accents (accessories).

Special furnishings or objects may be enhanced when placed against a background of a different value. But to make a piece of furniture, such as a sofa, as inconspicuous as possible, place it against a background which is of its own value. Dark values are often used for floors because they create an impression of stability. Warm and cool colors may be used advantageously in regard to the orientation of the house. Rooms located on the west side of the home will feel cooler if painted a cool color. Those located on the north will convey a feeling of warmth when painted a warm color. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon and from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

Absentee ballots shall be counted by a Special Canvassing Board and the persons hereby appointed to serve on said Board shall be as follows:

SECTION 3: That paper ballots shall be used for said election, which ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 4: That all resident qualified electors of the District shall be permitted to vote at said election. In addition, this election shall be conducted and held in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code except as modified by the provisions of the Texas Education Code; and as may be required by law, election materials and proceedings for this election shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 5: A substantial copy of this order shall serve as proper notice of said election, and said notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be published one time at least ten (10) days prior to the date set for the election

Local Men Attend Stamp Out Screwworm Conference Thurs.

Local Ranchmen and Agent Billy Reagor attended the conference in Austin on February 24. Representatives from Texas, U.S. and Mexico were on the program. This is the year to Stamp Out Screwworms! As in no other year since

the eradication program began in the southwest in 1962, is the simple truth. Sterile flies only work when the fertile population is kept low by rancher cooperation such as treating all wounds and postponing wounding operations. The screwworm program needs your help more than ever this year. It's an old refrain—Inspect, Collect and Treat—but this year it's the song of success.

1. The weather is on our side. The cold winter has kept most screwworm flies dormant, inhibiting mating and thereby reducing the fly population ranchers will have to face in the spring. Only if everyone—especially ranchers and pet owners—cooperates fully by inspecting animals frequently for screwworm infested wounds, by collecting worm samples and sending them in to the Mission plant for identification and by treating all wounds with approved insecticides, can the weather, the Mexico plant and the new fly strain make a difference.

2. The new screwworm production plant near Tuxtla Gutierrez, Mexico, opened in July 1976 and has been producing millions of sterile flies ever since. Over 200 million sterile flies now are being raised each week in Mexico. Added to the Mission production, that gives the program about 400 million sterile flies each week to use in the stamp out effort. So, if you own any animals at all: Inspect, Collect and Treat. Postpone until cool weather any livestock handling operation which could cause a screwworm attracting wound.

3. A new strain of sterile flies—many feel the best strain ever—was introduced last spring and seems to be a strain of "super flies." The weather is on our side. The fly strain is on our side. Mexico is on our side. A local S.O.S. Committee will assist in developing plans for educational and mass media activities in support of the program.

These three points, added to the ongoing hard work at the Mission, Texas, screwworm plant, make 1977 the year for ridding the U.S. of screwworms. Are you on our side? Join Mission '77 and help stamp out screwworms forever.

Life Insurance Is Financial Security

A decision to buy life insurance should depend on needs of those who will receive its benefits, Lynn Bourland, a family resource management specialist, advises. "Adequate life insurance is one way to have financial security for a family in case the wage earner(s) should die—and it provides protection from debt collectors to a single person's heirs.

"Also, life insurance enables anyone with a modest income and little savings to build an estate large enough for surviving dependents to continue their accustomed standard of living," she said. Miss Bourland is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service The Texas A&M University System—and she is author of "Life Insurance" (MP 1262), a publication available through County Extension Offices statewide. Among its several topics, the publication includes a chart to help families "size-up" their insurance needs, she said.

In determining whose life should be insured, it is most important to first protect a family from losing the main wage earner's income. family needs depends on the number and ages of children, the surviving spouse's earning power, and the amount of other resources dependents will have.

A minimum of four or five times the main wage earner's annual income is recommended by money management experts, Miss Bourland said.

"Also consider other financial factors that life insurance can protect. For example, in 1974, incomes were earned by 55 per cent of the wives in U.S. families. In addition to dollars earned, services provided by the homemaker that would have to be replaced by paid help—should be considered.

Inspecting Used Car Is Key To Making A Wise Purchase

Inspecting a used car—both on the lot and on the road—is the key to making a wise buy, Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

On the lot first, check the general condition. Is the car level? Are the seats and interior badly worn? Does the car's general condition correspond to the mileage shown on the odometer? Check tires for wear—uneven tire wear indicates an alignment problem, defective shock absorbers or brakes or perhaps a frame bent in an accident. Ripples and dents in the body mean there has been some sheet metal repair. Open and close all the windows and doors. If doors sag or windows stick, the car needs repair.

Check for rust on the body, at the base of door frames and wheel wells, and under the fenders and floor mat. Rust spots on the body could be minor, but if rust has gone through the body, repairs could be expensive. Look over the paint and chrome. If the car is freshly painted or has new chrome suspect an accident. Make sure the jack and spare tire are included and check to see if the spare is useable.

Check for worn shock absorbers by standing at one corner of the car and pushing down hard on the fender several times in rapid succession. If the car keeps rocking, it may need new shock absorbers.

On the road check acceleration: does the car pick up speed smoothly and fast? Hesitation, bucking or any mechanical noises could mean the car just needs a tune-up—or a major overhaul. As you step down hard on the accelerator, beware of heavy blue smoke from the exhaust pipe. Black smoke probably means the carburetor just needs an adjustment.

Transmission: drive forward and backward; with a manual transmission, the clutch shouldn't grab or grind, an automatic should shift smoothly and the engine shouldn't race between shifts.

Steering: shouldn't be tight and jerky nor loose and sloppy. More than two inches or "play" is too much.

Brakes: Check for swerving, scraping sounds or grabbing as you brake.

Also, as a final precaution, if the car passes your road test, take it to a mechanic or diagnostic center. Although it may cost \$20 to \$30 to have the car thoroughly checked by an expert,

it will be well worth the money spent if you can avoid several hundred dollars of unexpected repairs.

"Ask the mechanic for a list of needed repairs and their cost. If you still want the car, use this estimate for leverage in lowering the asking price," she said.

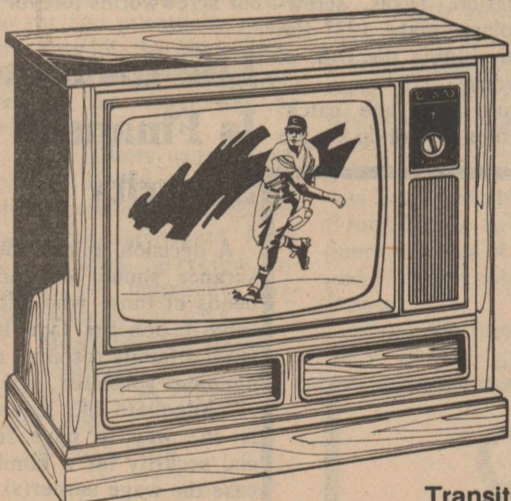

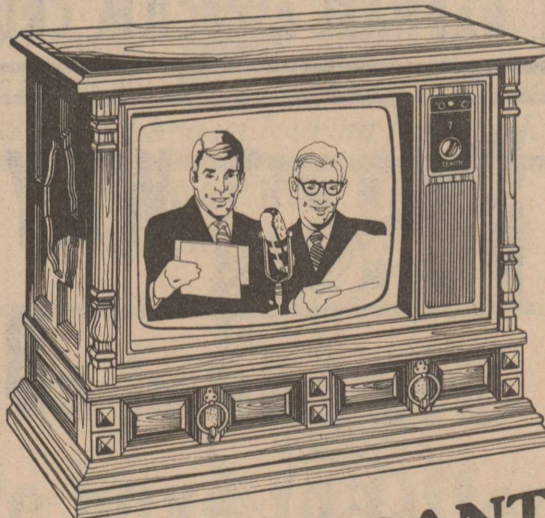

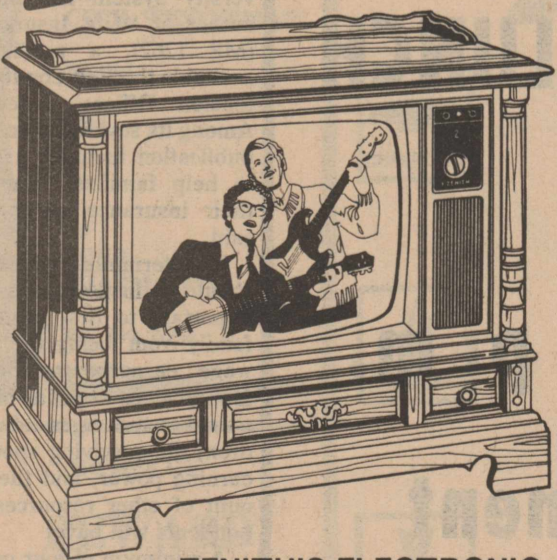

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40% Of New Marriages End In Divorce

Forty per cent of new marriages will end in divorce, if current trends continue, Debby Johnson, a family life education specialist, reports.

"Divorce, in most cases, is the result of an unpleasant commitment to a loved one— which taxes both financial and emotional resources. Divorce is never pleasant, and even the most amicable divorce is traumatic for one or both partners," the specialist explained.

"Women initiate the divorce action in 68 per cent of the suits, and over half these women are 28 years old or under.

"Although the proportion of children living with fathers is increasing, only 8.4 per cent of the children with divorced parents reside with their fathers," she noted.

To keep trauma due to settlement complications to a minimum, the specialist recommended that couples who foresee long, drawn-out negotiations—over money, children or property—seek lawyers who specialize in family law or at least handle a fair volume of divorce cases.

"They usually charge about the same fee and have had more experience in handling problematic situations.

"The lawyer each individual chooses must be good at dealing with the other side on his client's behalf. Negotiations center around a document called a 'settlement agreement' or a 'separation agreement,' which spells out the details of child custody and visitation, alimony and support payments, and division of property," she said.

For the names of family-law specialists, couples can contact the following sources—friends who are recently divorced, other lawyers, and the referral service of the local or state Bar Association.

Other sources include the "Martindale-Hubbell Law Directory" in the public library. In this volume, lawyers can pay to list the specialties in which they are interested. Or couples can ask for a recommendation from the American Academy of Matrimonial Lawyers, 900 Lake Shore Drive, Chicago, Illinois 60611.

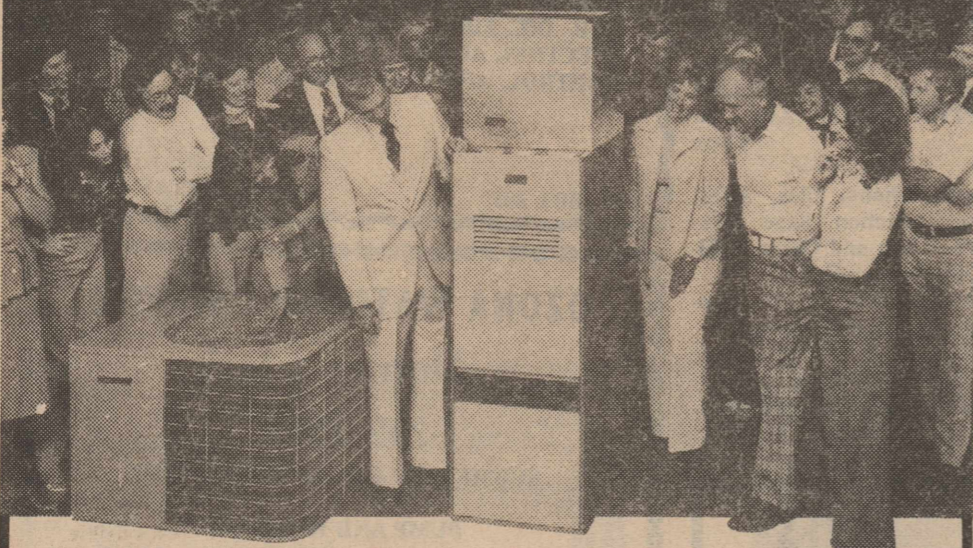

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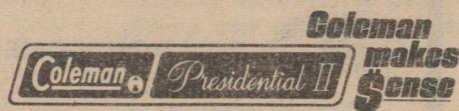

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
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
