Rancher Builds Helicopter

Ranchers do different things in their spare time. Some spend it on the golf course, some at the domino hall or the cafe and some spend their leisure time at one of the wool houses. Gene Perry is a different kind of rancher. He is spending his spare time building a helicopter.

Gene, an engineer by profession, is patiently and precisely building a helicopter on the Perry Ranch east of Ozona. Gene said he wanted to build something complicated and hit upon the helicopter idea because he thought it would be useful around the ranch.

He got plans for a Scorpion 133 and has purchased his parts and materials from the same company where he secured the plans in Tempe, Ariz. He began the work in November of 1975 and he has progressed to the point of installing the engine. Gene figures he has about a year and a half to go before he is using the ship to oversee ranch work.

When asked if he was a helicopter pilot, Gene said "No, as a matter of fact, I've never been up in a helicopter." However, he feels that by the time he finishes the copter and has gone through government licensing procedures, he will have ample time to take lessons and get his license.

The windshield and doors will be molded plexiglass. The blades will be attached as the finishing touch, being the most precise of all procedures.

ARSON SUSPECTED-

8 Persons Trapped As Steak House Bursts Into Flames

Eight Ozona young people almost experienced a Towering Inferno of their own early Wednesday morning, May 18, when the Way Back When Steak House burst into flame in the lobby area and quickly sent smoke and intense heat up the stairwell and into the club atop of the lobby, where the occupants were.

Three couples were preparing to leave the club shortly after 12 midnight when one of the girls' remarked she smelled smoke. The boys quickly investigated and upon arriving at the door leading to the downstairs area one of the boys opened it to find heavy smoke and intense heat blocking the way. He slammed the door and while the group was attempting to find a way out, located the door to the half-finished fire escape outside the building.

In attempting to escape from the upstairs balcony door they found flames leaping up from the downstairs door. After locating the fire escape door, they managed to throw the bolt, but another bolt was holding the door locked. They broke the door down just before being overcome with smoke. One fireman remarked if the young man who discovered the fire had not closed the door again, the occupants would have been overcome by smoke before they were able to get the fire escape door open.

The men were not injured in the drop of about 12 feet from the end of the fire escape, but Carla Colin, an Ozona school teacher, suffered painful injuries to the back and ribs, and Pat Sanker, an employee of the club, suffered a sprained ankle. Ms. Colin was rushed to Crockett County Hospital and then to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo where she was in intensive care for several days. Her injuries were not as bad as reported and she was in good condition in the hospital here Monday with three broken ribs and some injury to the spine.

Firemen arrived on the scene at 12:28, notified by the DPS. One of the men called the DPS communications just as he was making his exit from the building. Firemen found the front of the building in flames, licking above the second story porch ceiling and onto the roof. Flames were shooting out the door and a window which had been melted by intense heat. Firemen extinguished the fire on the exterior and entered the flaming lobby. They discovered the fire was contained in the lobby, stairwell and service

area and made short work of extinguishing the flames. However, the remainder of the interior was heavily damaged by smoke and intense heat. Heat melted glass, copper and set off a fire extinguisher in the kitchen area.

The fact that the fire started abruptly in the lobby just inside the door, spread so quickly, with intense heat and heavy black smoke, led the firemen to investigate further, and they spent several hours in the smoldering ruins of the lobby. They determined that the fire had started just inside the door and was of suspicious origin. A state fire investigator was called and arrived in Ozona Monday afternoon to investigate further.

The owners, Bill Price and Joe Boy Chapman, were called at their residences and went directly to the hospital where they followed the ambulance bearing the injured girl to San Angelo.

Since this was the second fire in the lobby of the restaurant-club within three months, along with the facts pointing to the Wednesday morning fire being deliberately set, the department felt justified in calling in a professional investigator.

The last fire started at approximately the same time February 21. Several persons were in the upstairs club

when Joe Tobar called attention to smoke in the area of the dart room. Price, who was on duty at the club at that time discovered smoke in the stairwell. He grabbed a fire extinguisher and rushed down to extinguish a blaze at the bottom of the stairs. The blaze had been put out by the time firemen arrived. Price insisted the fire had been started by a cigarette. However, this fire was also listed as "suspicious origin." There was no apparent cause and there had been trouble among club members several nights before. It was duly noted that the waitresses had left the restaurant at 11 p.m., Mrs. Chapman, who was on duty at the cash register, left at 11:30 and the cook and dishwasher at 11:45. No one had noticed anything amiss, including a patron who left the club area around midnight.

Conditions were the same in the latest fire. Two couples left around 11:30 prior to the blaze. They chatted for awhile in the lobby and saw no cause for alarm. A customer who left almost immediately before the fire, returned to tell firemen that he had noticed nothing wrong in the lobby as he left.

Earlier in the night before the restaurant fire, firemen had been called to the hospital where a cooling-heating unit had shorted out and caused some smoke.

Officers Make Big Dope Bust Here

Two months of work paid off for three state narcotics officers and local law enforcement officers Thursday night when three men were arrested, their plane impounded, and 540 pounds of marijuana confiscated at a ranch about 20 miles south of Ozona.

Jay McKinley of Mesa, Ariz., Gerald Algood of Las Vegas, Nev., and Tom Estes of Winneago, Ill. were taken into custody by officers as they landed their dope-loaded plane on the ranch runway about 9 p.m. Thursday night. They are in Crockett County Jail under \$40,000 bond each.

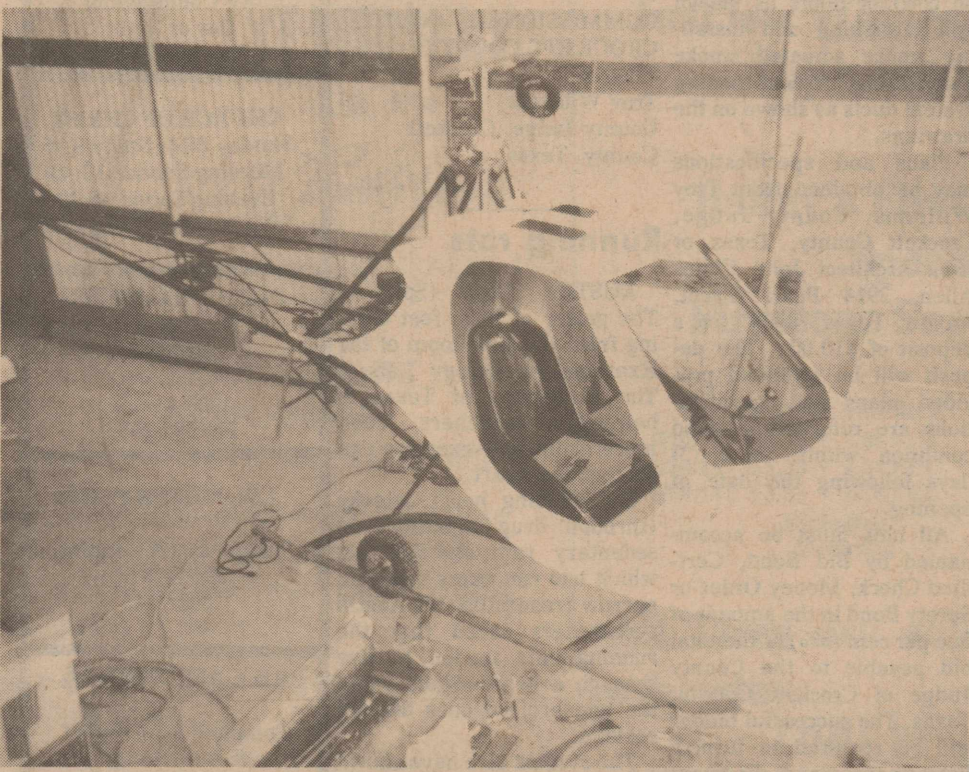
The marijuana, loaded in plastic bags, boxes and other containers, had a street value of at least \$50,000. The plane, registered in Colorado, was outfitted for dope smuggling and had several thousand dollars of radio equipment in it. All told, the action resulted a substantial dollar loss to the dope ring.

Officers had the cooperation of the rancher in this

case, but at least two dope-loaded planes have crash landed in the area within the past two months, one at Big Lake where the dope was confiscated and three men arrested, and another at Brackettville, where the pilot and personnel unloaded the dope and got away before authorities arrived on the scene. After a crowd gathered at the Brackettville crash site, the pilot asked them to stay back from the plane as it was loaded with an inflammable substance. Then the smugglers transferred the dope to other vehicles and sped away in full sight of the onlookers.

Authorities have speculated the recent crack down by law officers in the Rio Grande Valley area has forced operations to move further north in the state.

Taking part in the local operation were the three state narcotics officers, Crockett County Sheriff's Department personnel and a Texas Parks and Wildlife officer.

Minimum Wage Increases

WASHINGTON—A curious brand of economic theory persists in Washington these days. Its tenets include: larger federal spending to 1.) bring down the rising cost of government, which would then, 2.) rein-in inflationary pressures, and 3.) create enough temporary public service jobs to have some impact on high unemployment—caused by excessive government spending.

The goal behind this circular logic is real enough—to place a cap on runaway consumer prices. But if you fail to follow the line of flabby reasoning as liberals in Congress continue to present it, be assured it represents the same economic theory which has given us a decade of inflationary upheaval and reduced the real purchasing power of every Texan, and indeed every American.

Past spending sprees should have served as painful object lessons. Yet the Democratic Administration and Congress still cling to the principle that America's economic difficulties can be solved with regular raids on the Federal treasury.

It's this same misguided economic logic which obscures the obvious in current Democratic proposals to raise once again this country's minimum wage.

A bill is under consideration in the House of Representatives now, proposing to raise the hourly minimum wage from the current \$2.30 to as much as \$3, over successive years.

If passed intact, the bill also would provide for automatic yearly wage increases based on an index of wages generally, removing the ability of Congress to assess the fairness of such increases.

An increase in the minimum wage would touch off a new wage-price spiral and Congress would be powerless to forestall the obvious results on the economy.

The reasons are basic to this country's wage system. The minimum wage represents the foundation on which all wage scales are determined. Adjusting the minimum wage upward would have an automatic escalating effect: other wage levels would rise in order to maintain existing differentials.

The impact on unemployment is clear. Texas farmers and small businessmen, hard pressed already to keep costs within reason, would find little incentive to add to their payrolls because additional costs would more than offset benefits to production. In the face of rising wages, good business practice would mandate streamlining and other efficiency measures—not more hiring.

Jobs creation, for targeted youth and minority groups would be discouraged. And those who did find jobs requiring limited skills would be only the most qualified. As wages rose yearly in automatic indexing jumps, those most in need would find themselves increasingly priced out of the job market.

Such proposals to raise the minimum wage are all the more puzzling given the fact that Congress has passed the President's public works jobs bill. It is intended to stimulate a slumping economy and reduce chronic unemployment with the injection of federal money to those states most in need through an intricate allocation system.

It's far from certain, however, if this could be the result. At the same time public works jobs money began to pour into states in an effort to bolster the job market, a minimum wage increase would have an equal and opposite effect. It would dampen the very hiring stimulus projected with the President's jobs bill.

Texas consumers and others nationwide again would bear the brunt of shortsighted government policy. Prices for basic goods and services would rise precipitously, and we could expect increases at regular intervals because indexing provisions would be automatic regardless of economic conditions.

There are plenty of forces at work in the American economy which threaten another round of double-digit inflation. Texans have only to look at the Administration's energy package to realize inflationary pressures are mounting. An increase in the minimum wage is one pressure Congress can avoid now, by voting increases down.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — The 65th legislature is winding down, with most of its major finance chores unfinished but with significant legislation clearing both houses at a fast clip. As the last week of the session began, lawmakers had still to accept a conference committee's version of a \$15.4 billion 1978-79 state budget.

They also had yet to resolve differences between the House's \$700 million school finance bill and \$373 million teacher pay raise measure and the Senate's \$820 million wrapup of both subjects. Among issues on which both houses came to terms were the bill to bring Texas unemployment compensation laws in line with federal statutes. The measure also increases maximum unemployment benefits from \$63 to \$84 a week (with an escalator feature to cope with inflation).

Its passage assures Texas employers of retaining \$600 million a year in federal unemployment program tax credits and retains \$60 million in administrative aid to Texas Employment Commission. The legislature has also passed and sent to the governor a bill to grant Texas motorists an exemption from insurance and drivers license "penalties" for speeding violations in the 55-70 miles per hour category.

Major casualties of the legislative session may be bills dealing with property tax reform and the medical malpractice crisis. A variety of law and order compromise bills are finding their way through the legislative maze to Gov. Dolph Briscoe's desk.

Agencies Merged Merger of three major state water agencies has legislative approval. The consolidation act (SB 1139) combines the Water Development Board, Water Rights Commission and Water Quality Board under a new three-member State Department of Water Resources. The six-member Water Development Board, effective September 1, will exercise legislative functions of the merged department. An executive director will handle administrative functions. A three-member Texas Water Commission will exercise judicial functions of the department. Veteran Texas Water Quality Board Executive Director Hugh Yantis Jr. acknowledges an interest in heading the big new agency.

Appointments Gov. Dolph Briscoe named Bill Wallace Jamar Jr. of Brownwood, Edmar Bruce Street of Graham and A.M. Willis Jr. of Longview (reappointment)

AG Opinions County officials drawing travel allowances are not required to account for every mile traveled but must show a "reasonable relationship" to actual expenses, Atty. Gen. Hill said. In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: A court must find that all inheritance taxes due the state have been paid prior to distribution of a ward's estate on closing of a guardianship where the estate will not be administered further. The Animal Health Commission authority to reclassify on proclamation by the governor, counties within an inactive quarantine area. The commission also may impose a limited quarantine in any area formerly subject to the action and may restrict movement of livestock in a tick eradication area.

to the North Texas State University Board of Regents. Briscoe picked Rudolph Garza Jr. of Corpus Christi for the Texas A&I University board. Charles A. Hallmark of Houston was Briscoe's new selection to the Credit Union Commission, while Jimmy R. Williams of San Antonio was reappointed. E.B. "Tex" Mayer of La Grange replaced E.J. Urbanovsky of Lubbock on the Texas Conservation Foundation. Beeman Fisher of Fort Worth was assigned another six-year term on the Texas Turnpike Authority board of directors. All three members of the board of regents Texas State University System whose terms expired this year were reappointed. They are Mrs. Edward A. Clark of Austin, Lee Drain of Dallas and James L. Powell of Fort McKavett.

Courts Speak A divided Supreme Court held in a 5-4 decision that a divorce court cannot award one spouse's separate property to the other. The high court upheld lower court findings in favor of a Dumas family doctor in a \$626,000 suit alleging malpractice. A \$75,835 judgment against the state in a case where a highway department truck injured a woman near Mexia was upheld by the Supreme Court. The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the burglary conviction of a Bryan man who complained officials took a blood sample from him and used it as evidence. The Court of Criminal Appeals also threw out the life sentence given a young Dallas man for killing a Dallas policeman and upheld the death penalty assessed another in the shooting death of an Atascosa County deputy sheriff.

Elderly approve meals in a box AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — A new meal system that permits an elderly person to prepare a tasty, nutritious meal in 10 minutes at home has been developed by The University of Texas Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs and NASA. Field tests of the single-meal-in-a-box system (using food technology from the space program) found high favor among the elderly. They liked almost everything but English peas contained in the pre-packaged box of foil and flex pouches of freeze-dried or dehydrated items or canned foods. If proved commercially feasible, the meal system could help some elderly persons continue living in their own homes.

'Aging' attitudes AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — Modern society, which is oriented to productivity and youth, tends to lump the elderly into the negative stereotypes of "senile" and "cantankerous," says a University of Texas associate professor of nursing. Dr. Ruth Gallman says those stereotypes cause younger people "to withdraw very subtly and cease to identify with their elders as human beings."

for both buyers and sellers has passed both houses and gone to the governor. Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed May city sales tax rebate checks totalling \$22 million to 867 Texas cities and towns levying the one per cent tax. A bill to revive the presidential preference primary in Texas passed the House but had difficulty stirring enthusiasm in the Senate. 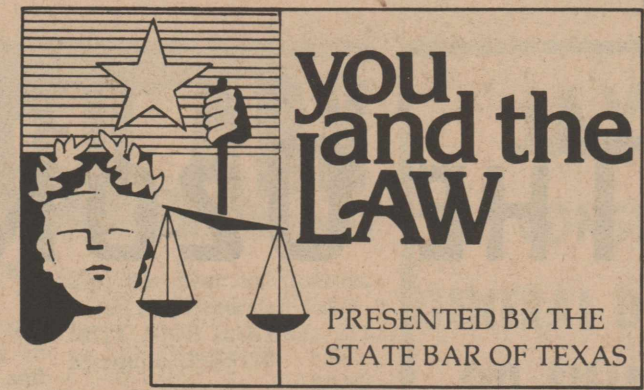

Running rats AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — The patter of little feet coming from the Rat Room of the Exercise Physiology Lab at The University of Texas is helping researchers learn more about how exercise can protect the heart. By inducing heart attacks (through drug injection) in sedentary rats and in rats which had run many miles on narrow treadmills, UT Austin researchers found that the running rats tended to live through a heart attack while the unexercised ones did not survive. The studies also have shown that pregnant rats that swam produced babies with stronger hearts.



you and the LAW

PRESENTED BY THE STATE BAR OF TEXAS

Q: Can my insurance company cancel my family automobile policy? A: According to the State Board of Insurance, your insurance policy can be cancelled 60 days after its effective date for only two reasons. Your insurance company can cancel the policy if you fail to pay the premiums or if your drivers license is revoked. One more thing... your insurance company can refuse to renew your policy, but they must give 30-days notice of their intentions not to renew.*

Q: My wife and I separated for about 11 months and then got a divorce. While we were separated, she lived with another man, although she continued to see me from time to time. She had a son who is now 2 1/2 years old, and she wants me to sign the birth certificate as the father. If I do, will I be liable for child support? Could I get custody of the child? A: OK. Let me first give you a definition. A child is the legitimate child of a man if the child is born or conceived before or during the marriage of his mother and the man. So, you could be liable for child support. Custody of the child is entirely dependent on a jury verdict in a custody hearing, based on facts presented. The qualifications of the respective parents to be managing conservator will be considered by the jury without re-

gard to the sex of the parent. Q: Can I get a loan without my husband as co-signer? A: Yes, if you can satisfy the lender that you are financially responsible. In Texas, most lenders will base their decision on whether you own sufficient separate property or earn enough money yourself to make you a satisfactory credit risk. Recent federal legislation provides that a woman cannot be denied a loan by reason of sex alone. Q: If I leave my husband taking only my personal things, do I jeopardize or forfeit my chances to claim my part of our community property when I sue for divorce? A: Well, yes. Property in his possession not subject to evidence of ownership could be sold to a third person. If that person buying the property from your husband is not party to a fraud upon you and if the buyer didn't have what's called "actual" or "constructive notice" that your husband lacked the authority to sell the property, you would have a hard time getting it back. *You & The Law regrets the discrepancy in the number of days in answer to this question in an earlier column.

**Tips
For Gardeners**

From the
Ozona Garden Club

I'm sure everyone has enjoyed the most popular of all flowering plants this month—the roses all over our city have been unusually full and beautiful. This should encourage you to plan your rose bed for this fall or you may want to try them as patio plants in containers.

The most important chore of all to do now is to stir your soil in both flower and vegetable gardens. Be careful not to disturb the roots, but this cultivation helps growth and protects tender plants from damage by wind of the soil is packed and crusted. Cultivate after each rain or watering as soon as the soil is workable.

Beginning gardeners hate to thin plants because it seems wasteful. But if you let every sprouting seed grow, none will develop properly.

Select the strongest plants to save and determine the proper space required.

Geraniums are hard to beat for a continuous supply of brilliant color throughout the long growing season. These natives of South Africa are today represented by many hybrid forms, varying in foliage and in color, size, and shape of flowers. In addition, many varieties have fragrant foliage. Despite their differences, however, all varieties require the same growing conditions.

Geraniums give no advance warning of their need for water; instead of wilting, the lower leaves may turn yellow and fall. Keep soil only moist; do not overwater. They will not tolerate prolonged wet soil conditions. Because summer temperatures are high in most of our area, it is best to keep geraniums in filtered light or semi-shade. Do not try to grow geraniums in a container that is too large. These plants flower best when slightly pot bound, so grow better when not in the flower bed. I left mine in pots, but placed them in the border deep enough to almost cover the top of the pot.

Watch for bagworms on evergreens, junipers and trees. They are easily controlled while they are small by spraying with malathion or sevin.

Now is a good time to start new plants to have for winter, or for the plant sale in August for the Garden Club booth at the Fair.

Save Energy While On Vacation

A home can save energy for its vacationing owners—if they will take five conservation steps before walking out the door.

Turn off all unnecessary appliances. Unplug an "instant-on" TV or timed coffee pots and clock radios.

If you'll be gone more than a week, consider turning off your refrigerator. If you do, remember to unscrew the interior light bulb and prop the door open so mildew won't form. If you prefer to leave the refrigerator running, put it on a warmer setting—and be sure no foods are left that will spoil at the warmer temperature.

Turn off the air conditioner, but be sure to move any house plants to a friend's house—if warmer temperatures in your house would harm them. Consult a horticulturist about temperature range the plants can withstand.

Turn off the electric or gas supply to your hot water heater.

One appliance you may want to leave on is a timed light to discourage burglars.

Protein-Power Sipper
Beat 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter and 1/2 cup honey in mixing bowl or blender. Add one quart milk gradually. Chill, stir before serving. Yield: approximately 5 cups.

Milk Julep
Mix 4 tablespoons mint jelly with 1/4 cup milk in mixer or blender. Gradually add 1 3/4 cups milk and 1-2 drops green food coloring. To serve, pour 1 cup mint mixture in each glass, add 1/2

Orange Energizer
Combine 2 eggs, 1/4 cup frozen concentrated orange juice and 1 tablespoon sugar in mixing bowl or blender. Gradually add 1-14 cups milk. Yield: 2 cups.

Lush Lime Cooler
Beat 1/2 pint (1 cup) lime sherbert in blender or mixing bowl. Add 1 can (6 oz.) frozen concentrate for limeade. Add 3 cups milk. Pour into glasses. Top each with scoop of lime sherbert, garnishing with fresh mint or cherry. Yield: approximately 5 cups.

Chocolate Orange Blossom
Blend 2 cups chocolate milk with 1 tablespoon frozen concentrated orange juice. Yield: 2 cups.

Vanilla Ice Milk
This is another delectable summer treat suggested by USDA. It is made with skim milk instead of cream and provides only about half the calories of ordinary ice cream. To make 26 servings of 1/2 cup each, you will need:

2 cups sugar
1/4 cup cornstarch
8 cups skim milk
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 eggs, beaten
1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin

1 1/2 tablespoon vanilla
Mix sugar, cornstarch, and salt in the top of the double boiler. Blend in 4 cups skim milk gradually. Cook over hot water, stirring occasionally until thickened, 12 to 15 minutes.

Stir a little of the hot cornstarch mixture into the beaten eggs; then stir the eggs into the remaining cornstarch mixture. Cook over hot water, stirring constant-

ly 4 to 5 minutes longer, or until the mixture is about the consistency of soft custard.

Soften gelatin in 1 cup skim milk. Stir into hot mixture. Chill thoroughly. This step is essential for a smooth ice milk.

Stir in vanilla and remaining 3 cups skim milk. Pour into a 1-gallon ice cream freezer canister; fill not more than two-thirds full.

Freeze in a hand-cranked or electric ice cream freezer, packed with a mixture of 1 part ice cream salt and 6 parts crushed ice.

Remove dasher. Repack ice cream freezer with a mixture of 1 part salt and 8 parts ice.

Allow to ripen about 2 hours before serving. Or, pack ice cream in freezer containers and harden in a home freezer.

Fruit Ice Milk
Stir 2 cups crushed or pureed sweetened fruit into the ice milk after the dasher is removed.

Honey Drops 27 Per Cent

AUSTIN--Both natural and man-made problems contributed to the 27 per cent drop in Texas honey production in 1976, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

"Bees were late in stirring due to the cool, wet spring in the state last year, while the extremely dry summer greatly diminished blooms available to the insects," White explained.

Accidental death due to insecticide drift also accounts for an annual loss in total bee numbers.

Texas moved from third to fourth place nationally in honey production with the state's 200,000 colonies producing an average of 47 lbs. in 1976 compared to 62 lbs. the year before.

Total value of the state's 1976 honey and beeswax production, at \$4,475,000, also dropped by \$1,676,000 from a year earlier.

Place toast slices in a 9-inch square baking dish; top with shredded cheese. Cover; set aside.

Melt 2 tablespoons Blue Bonnet Margarine in a large saucepan. Add onion and sauté, stirring, until tender (about 5 minutes). Drain beef; add to sautéed onion

mixture. Brown lightly; toss in pimiento. Divide mixture evenly among sandwiches, covering cheese and spreading to edges.

In same saucepan, melt remaining 3 tablespoons Blue Bonnet Margarine. Blend in flour, salt, pepper and dry mustard. Cook mixture, stirring, until thick and bubbly, about 1 to 2 minutes. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) for 20 to 25 minutes. Serve garnished with chopped parsley. Makes 4 sandwiches.

Salad, Fresh From Garden Good Dinner Accompaniment

A fresh garden salad may be the perfect dinner accompaniment. Mrs. Sally Coble, a foods and nutrition specialist, suggests.

Ingredients can be lettuce, other salad greens and fresh vegetables—plentiful in spring gardens now, she said.

"Greens and other raw vegetables are best served clean, cold, crisp and dry—except for salads of wilted lettuce or spinach in which a hot dressing is poured on the raw vegetables," she advised.

To prepare vegetables for a salad, wash them well under running water. Use cold water for most items, but try lukewarm water for crinkly leaves—as it opens the creases in leaves to let sand and soil wash out easily.

Cut or tear salad greens before serving. Cut raw vegetables immediately before serving the salad—to avoid loss of nutrients.

Cooked vegetables in salads are best if they are tender, but firm enough to hold their shape. Some salad favorites are green beans, asparagus and pickled beets.

Other salad items—for variety—include raw fruits, nuts, crisp bacon, anchovies, olives and croutons. For more interest, add onions, cut fine or in rings—or herbs, either fresh or dry.

For a mild garlic flavor, add cut cloves of garlic to salad dressing and remove them just before serving—or use cut garlic cloves to rub on the salad bowl just before adding the salad ingredients.

To top a "Green Garden Salad," made with lettuce, cucumbers, tomatoes and mushrooms, the specialist suggests "Sesame Seed Dressing."

Green Garden Salad
Romaine lettuce
Leaf lettuce
Cucumbers

Tomatoes
Mushrooms

Tear lettuce into bite-size pieces. Slice cucumbers, tomatoes and mushrooms and add to lettuce. Just before serving, add Sesame Seed Dressing.

Sesame Seed Dressing
(1 cup)

1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon onion juice
3/4 cup salad oil
1/2 cup vinegar
1/4 cup toasted sesame seeds

Thoroughly combine sugar, seasonings and onion juice in bowl. Add oil; beat well; add vinegar; beat well; keep covered in refrigerator. Pour dressing on salad; add sesame seeds and toss well. Serve immediately.

Screwworms Show Up In Crockett Co.

Maggots taken from two calves in Terrell County by Jess Marley of Ozona reached the Screwworm Eradication Program laboratory May 16 and were identified as screwworms.

They bring Texas' 1977 screwworm case count to 16, including one in a sheep in Hidalgo County, says Dr. M.E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr., director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) program.

On May 13 Marley collected larvae from an infested navel of a calf one mile south of the Highway 290 Pecos River Bridge on the Pecos-Terrell County line—about five miles southeast of Sheffield.

On May 14 he took maggots from an infested castration wound in a calf six miles southeast of Sheffield on the Pecos River.

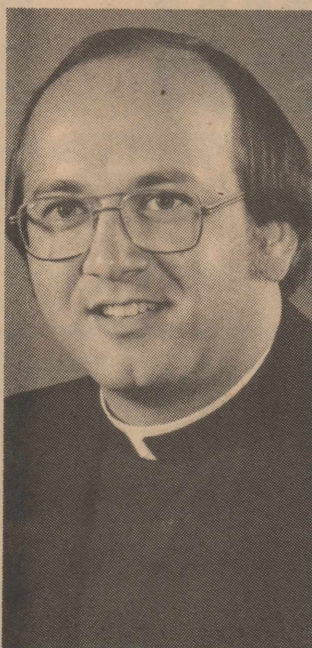
Earlier in the month a screwworm case had been found near Brackettville in Kinney County.

Noting that May and June were the months with the most severe screwworm outbreaks in years before the Screwworm Eradication Program began, Meadows urges livestock owners to watch closely for signs of infestations. He asks that samples of any worms found infesting wounds be sent immediately to the lab for identification.

The Governor's "Stamp Out Screwworms" or "S.O.S." campaign is on course, says Meadows. Rancher care of livestock and prompt submission of samples is proceeding well. Sterile flies produced in Mexico are augmenting production at Mission and giving the industry an opportunity to achieve total eradication this year.

New Pastor For Ozona Catholics

Fr. Larry J. Droll has recently been assigned by Bishop Stephen A. Leven of San Angelo as the new pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church in Ozona. He will begin his duties in Ozona on June 1. Also included in the assignment is Good Shepherd Mission in Sheffield.

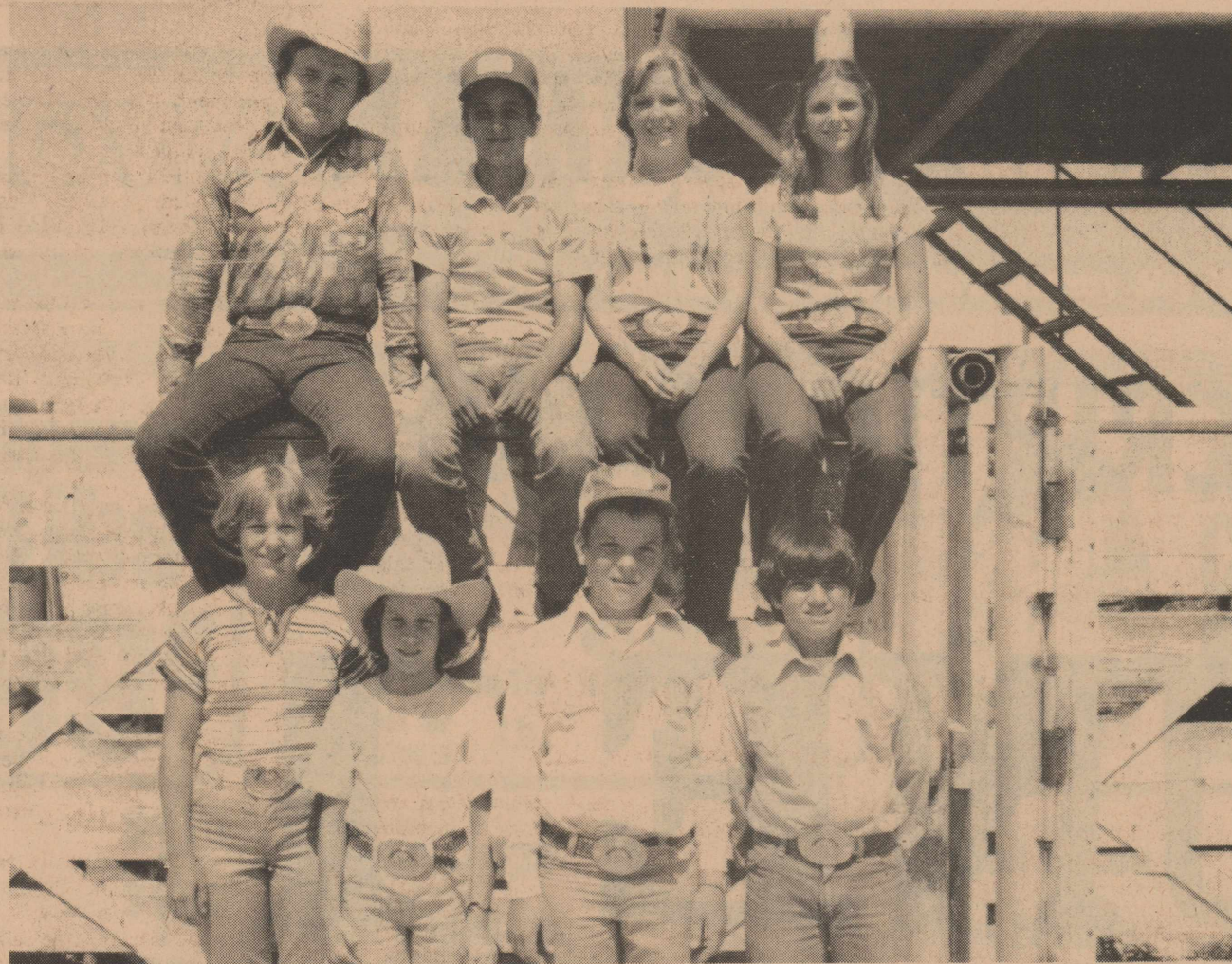

Oil Discoveries In County

W.H. Hudson, Dallas, No. 1 Strauss, et al, Crockett County, Grayburg-San Andres oil discovery 1 1/8 miles south of the Weger field and 1 1/2 miles southwest of the Farmer field, both producing from the San Andres, and 13 miles south of Big Lake, was fined for 41.66 barrels of 34.7 gravity oil, plus 5.74 barrels of water daily, with gas-oil ratio of 1,440-1.

Production was through a 3/8 inch choke and perforations at 2,261-2,475 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons and fractured with 37,500 gallons and 57,500 pounds of sand. The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,640.3 feet, Yates, 1,630 feet; Seven Rivers, 1,751 feet; Queen, 1,924 feet; and Grayburg-San Andres, 2,195 feet.

Drilled to 2,575 feet, with 4 1/2-inch casing set at 2,574 feet, it is plugged back to 2,529 feet.

Location is 467 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east lines of 1-9-D&SE.

Fourth Strawn producer and a location northeast extension to that pay was assured in the Bouscaren multipay field of Crockett County with the swabbing and flowing of 12 barrels of oil, along with two barrels of water, in 1 1/2-hours at Gulf Oil Corp. No. 3 Parker Ranch Co., Ltd., State, in 52-HH-GC&SF, eight miles north of Iraan.

Flow was through a 48-64-inch choke and perforations at 7,754-765 feet.

Operator was taking potential.

Production Index Up

The Texas industrial production index rose in March at a 4.7 percent annual rate, seasonally adjusted, to a level 3.1 percent above a year earlier. The rise resulted from an increase in manufacturing output that more than

compensated for a small decline in manufacturing output.

Although increased crude oil production accounted for a rebound in mining production, crude output failed to recover to the January level. Drilling activity also continued to rise sharply.

The decrease in manufacturing centered in the durable goods industries

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Beef Referendum Vote Explained For Producers

Texans who own beef or dairy cattle--and other cattlemen of the nation--will soon have an opportunity to register and then vote on whether or not they want a new research and promotion program for the beef industry.

The occasion will be the upcoming referendum on the Beef Research and Information Act--an Act signed into law on May 28, 1976, by former President Ford. The Act is Public Law 94-294 and serves as enabling legislation that authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct the referendum among beef producers to determine whether they want a beef development plan.

The referendum will be similar to others conducted in recent years for various agricultural commodities. Public hearings on the proposed program were conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in six major cities across the nation, including Dallas, from mid-September to mid-October of last year. Additionally, the proposed order and notice of hearing locations were published in the Federal Register, August 1976. The final Beef Research and Information Act decision and order, along with the proposed referendum rules, appeared in the April 15, 1977 Federal Register.

According to the referendum rules announced, livestock producers who want to express themselves on this issue first need to register at their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices during June 6-17, and then vote also at the local ASCS offices during July 5-15. At least 50 per cent of the cattle owners who register must vote in order for the referendum to be valid, and two-thirds of those voting must vote affirmatively for the program to carry.

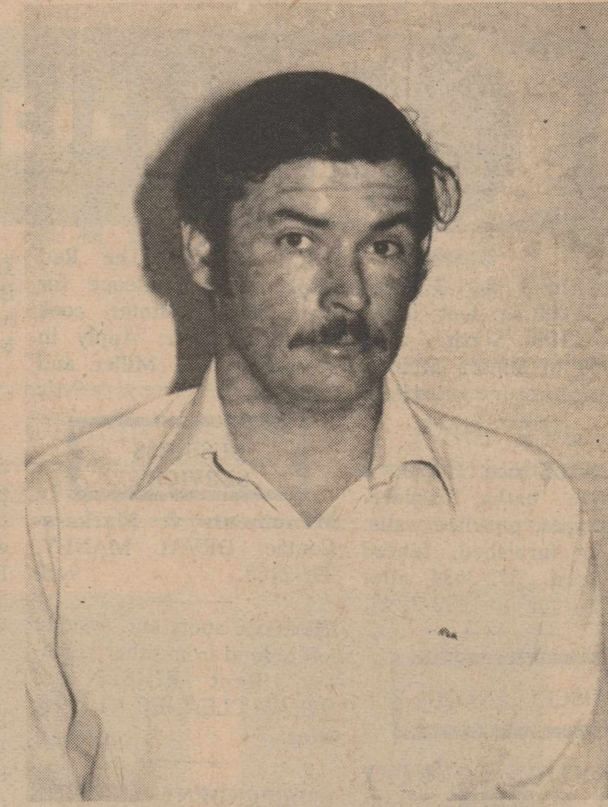
County meetings for beef producers presently are being held in all counties of Texas to acquaint producers with the program. Generally, these meetings are being called by county chairmen of the Beef Development Task Force. The Beef Development Task Force is an organization of key leaders in the beef industry who have organized to promote the program. Educational meetings are also being sponsored by some of the general farm organizations.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has been invited to participate in these meetings to present the provisions of the law.

As with past referendums, the Extension Service of each state has the educational responsibility to present facts about the proposed program, while at the same time maintaining a stance of strict neutrality. The Extension Services of land-grant institutions of the nation have been assigned the educational responsibility for the referendum through their USDA affiliation. Efforts of the State Extension Services have been directed both toward creating awareness of the referendum and explaining the law as it applies to the proposed program for the beef industry.

Just as the Extension Service was asked to assist with the educational efforts, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices at the local level have been asked to assist with the registration of beef producers in each county during the sign-up period. The ASCS offices also will have the responsibility for conducting the election during the designated dates established by the USDA.

Thus, preparation for any referendum conducted at the national level becomes a cooperative project for a number of federal-state agencies working in conjunction with local leaders and producers to provide facts upon which to base decisions.

Post Planting Care For Shade Trees

Summer is a critical period for recently planted shade and ornamental trees, so they often need special care to withstand hot, dry weather, says a landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Water is the prime need of young trees during the summer season since a great deal of moisture is lost from the leaves and stems," points out Everett Janne. "Since young, transplanted trees have a limited root system, they can only use water close by. If this soil area becomes dry, the leaves wilt, turn brown and drop. Death of many branches or even the entire tree can follow."

Janne suggests watering at regular intervals all trees planted within the past year. If the soil is sandy, water about once a week; if it is clay or loam, thorough watering every 10 days to two weeks should suffice.

Using an open-end hose, regulate the water flow so there is no run-off and let it run until the soil around the tree is saturated. To determine whether or not you are supplying the proper amount of water, take soil samples between waterings at depths of 12 to 18 inches; the soil should be moist but not muddy.

"Insect control is also an important part of post planting care of trees," notes the horticulturist. "Since even a light infestation can cause severe damage to a newly planted tree, control measures should be taken promptly when insects are found. This means applying appropriate insecticides according to the manufacturer's instructions."

Promoting steady, vigorous growth through the proper use of fertilizers once trees are established will reduce the chance of insect damage, especially from borers, adds Janne.

Give Coffee A Break

Give your coffee "a break" - replace it with more nutritious snacks and beverages throughout the day, a foods and nutrition specialist suggests. Instead of a "coffee break," have a "snack break" and try a glass of fruit juice, an orange, apple or other fruit in season, says Mrs. Sally Coble, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "These snacks are low in calories and high in nutrients. Fresh fruits also supply fiber-which most Americans need in larger amounts. "Also, milk and cheese foods make good snacks. A glass of skim milk supplies only 90 calories and is packed with nutrients. Cheese cubes with fresh fruit are good choices, too," she said.

Other ideas that may require a bit more preparation time are celery and carrot sticks, green pepper rings, cucumber slices and radishes. If calories are not a problem, other tasty items are nuts or peanut butter and crackers, Mrs. Coble added. "Finally, try drinking just a glass of plain cool water. This is refreshing and thirst-quenching with the least cost and calories."
