## **Christian Socialists And Profit**

Many well-meaning, devoted Christian Socialists are disturbed and angry. They see about them great wealth, often wasted and ostentatiously displayed, in the midst of bitter poverty. They blame capitalism, the profit system, and wealth wherever they find it. They complain that "the goal of life is to make money and accumulate possessions."

They say "the Biblical mandate to seek first the Kingdom of Heaven is replaced by the quest for a complacent, comfortable life with little or no regard for the needs of others or the cultivation of spiritual values."

They speak of greed, selfishness, moneygrubbing, excess profits. The general impression is that profit is wicked and is, in fact, something gouged out of consumers or held back from workers. They seem to think that profit is sinful, selfish and bad.

This is because they do not understand profit. They do not know that it is useful, constructive and improves the quality of life for all.

More profit has been earned in the United States than anywhere else. At the same time, more has been done in our country to relieve suffering and conquer poverty and disease. If profit is bad, why is life better in the countries complishments in response where the most profit has been earned?

One can almost determine the standard of living by the number of millionaires in the country being examined. It is always true that the more millionaires a country has, the higher its standard of living.

Profit is not something withheld from workers or added to prices. It is something taken out of costs. It makes merchandise cheaper and therefore benefits all the people.

Harvesting machinery made a few millionaires, but probably 99.9 percent of the benefit resulting from it accrued to the people. If grain had to be sown, cultivated, reaped, transported, milled into foodstuff, and distributed,

all without the aid of expensive machinery, we would have very little bread, and it would be extremely costly.

In Yugoslavia I have seen every member of the family gathering a few straws of wheat in their left hands and cutting them off with sickles held in their right hands. They would work from dawn till dark. Even so, bread was very costly in comparison with food produced, processed and distributed by mechanical processes.

A few men became millionaires as a result of the development of the steel industry. But the public was the big gainer. Without steel, there would be no precision tools, no skyscrapers, no locomotives, no linotypes, no computers, no typewriters. Most of the things that improve living conditions would not be here if a few extraordinary men had not developed the processes and the means of manufacturing steel from iron.

It is the same with nearly all of our industries. Profit makes possible the great labor-saving machines that raise the standard of living.

Without profit, the vast aggregations of capital, that produce in quantity the things which create a high standard of living, would be impossible. Destroy profit, and we would return to the handicraft age. Probably half the people would have to starve because not enough could be produced to keep them alive.

#### Part II

Our critics never tire of reminding us that the top 20 percent of families in the United States receive 42 percent of the national income and the upper 5 percent get 19.6 percent of the total. The bottom 20 percent receives only 5 percent.

They do not realize that efforts by government to equalize income and wealth, in general, succeed only in destroying income. It does not make the poor richer, but does make the rich poorer.

In doing the latter-and drying up the sources of capital for greater production and more jobs for more workersit increases poverty for all.

When people spend their time arguing about how to divide the wealth instead of trying to find ways of increasing the quantity of it, the assembly lines slow down and poverty becomes general.

If this were not true, then why is it that all socialist countries have much more poverty than the capitalist countries?

Sweden and Scandinavia in general are cited as examples of where socialism has been successful. The fact is that these countries accumulated substantial wealth before they became socialistic. They have made a showing because they have been using up wealth originally created under capitalism. Our country is now rapidly doing the same thing. Debts are mounting, our machinery is growing old and is not being adequately replaced, while the ratio of equity capital to debt capital is lower than it has been in a generation.

Poverty, disease, and suffering can be remedied only by increased quantities of capital for greater production. It takes about \$40,000 of capital to supply one good industrial job. If the capital is not saved from year to year, jobs will not be ready for our young people who come out of our schools every spring.

Writing in the Journal of the American Scientific Affiliation, Professor Richard V. Pierard repeats all the old cliches, and rings the changes upon them. He says "free market economists bitterly protest all expansion of social services as socialistic redistribution of wealth, yet the amount allocated for defense and national security matters in the federal budget consistently is four to five times that laid out for items like education, programs for the needy, housing and health."

Nothing could be more inconsistent with the facts. With America's military presence, and South Korea's military strength, any threat from the North would be countered. This is understood. Without that presence, perceptions of South Korea's overall strength would change drastically. There is ample reason to believe that an American troop withdrawal might be just the spark needed to ignite the tinderbox that is the Korean peninsula.

The North Koreans have made clear their objective to unify the two Koreas. Undoubtedly, a wavering American commitment to the Seoul regime would be perceived as an opportunity to achieve that objective.

History has shown us that ill-considered foreign policy decisions reap consequences that may not fully unfold until years later. South Korea's carefully developed strategic defenses have assured stability in that portion of the Asian mainland. Withdrawing American troops, and by implication our commitment to maintain peace there, would heighten tensions that could create the same climate for hostilities which incited the North Korean attack 27 years

Future generations of Americans could pay the price for today's errors in judgment.

If we are to avoid in Korea the tragic miscalculations of foreign policy which long-characterized American involvement in Vietnam, the American people must be fully apprised of developments, and the Congress must be a full partner in the decision-making. Up to this point, that joint consultation has been virtually nonexistent.

For over a quarter century, the American presence in South Korea has represented the only hope for peace and stability for that Nation's people. Their belief in us should not be undermined now

Tips For Gardeners From the **Ozona Garden Club** by Mrs. Bailey Post

With the passing of July, the last summer month, August is right upon us, so begin your fall planning and planting. If it proves to be as dry, the monotonous chore...of watering daily will have to continue.

Pecans need supplemental irrigation to assure optimum kernel development during this dry time. Water deeply, from out beyond the dripline to half the distance to the trunk.

With so much dust in the air to settle on all plants, and especially your potted plants, they need a good strong spray once a week in the early morning, to clean the foliage so they can breathe.

You may need to water young seedlings of vegetables and annual flowers twice daily until they are 2 to 4 inches tall, then reduce to once a day.

If you have a new yard or want to replace some of your favorite shrubs, try rooting softwood cuttings this next month. Spring growth has become mature enough to root if the stems snap when bent double. Among the many shrubs that can be rooted at this time are abelia, althea, aucuba, azalea, barberry, beauty bush, Chinese and Japanese hollies, cotoneaster, crepe myrtle, jasmine, mock orange, photinia, pittosporum, waxleaf ligustrum, mahonia, wisteria and loquat.

Gather 3 to 7 inch tip or stem cuttings from healthy shrubs. Using a sharp knife, make a slightly diagonal cut just beneath a node (small bulge in the stem that will become a leaf bud). Remove leaves from the lower half of the cutting.

Fill a shallow container with moist sand, and form small planting holes by forcing a pencil into the sand. Dip base of cutting into rooting hormone, and tap off excess. Place cutting into hole so that about half the stem is submerged. Form sand around base of stem. To help retain moisture and humidity, cover the cuttings and their container with clear plastic. Support the plastic so

that it does not touch the cuttings. Place where they will receive filtered sunlight. The beginning of new growth often indicates that roots have formed. Keep moist. When transplanting, keep some of the sand around the roots to reduce shock to the plant.

If old poinsettias have grown tall and leggy, cut plants back now to make growth more compact and flowers more abundant. Pruning about 6 inches from the tip of each branch should be sufficient, but don't leave over 10 or 12 inches tall.

Garden Club members are reminded to be grooming their plants for the booth at the Fair August 6. Any items that are for growing inside or outside, driftwood, attractive rocks, dried material containers or anything that might be used for arrangements. This is one of the projects to promote civic beautification for Ozona. Anyone that wishes to bring a plant you don't want or need, it will be appreciated.




Our Texas flag doesn't look too great, either. I always thought Texas was just as proud as America. It is a shame to marr a

## **Insect Venom Can Be Fatal To Some Persons**

Bees, wasps and spiders headache, vomiting, diarrsend many people running. hea, a feeling of heat But a small percent of the population should run for all over the body, breathing their lives, the Texas Med-

ical Association says. Estimates show about 2% or 3% of the population is hypersensitive to insect stings and bites. These hypersensitive reactions are more serious than the usual ness, faintness and pale, pain, itching and swelling around a bite site. Check with a physician if a victim has any reactions other than localized problems. Or if there is a severe local

reaction on the face and neck, some doctors recommend administering drugs to prevent more serious reactions.

Hypersensitive reactions to insect bites can include

throughout the body, itching difficulty and anaphylactic shock. This last condition can occur in the very small percentage of people supersensitive to insect venom. It may the center. be fatal. Anaphylactic shock symptoms can include weak-

cold, clammy skin. Many severe reactions occur within 20 minutes to an hour after a bite. But a few severe reactions may not occur until about two weeks after a sting. Sometimes hypersensitive reactions hit people who never have had major problems with insect bites previously.

Most reactions to insect bites are caused by ants, bees, wasps, hornets and spiders. However, some people have hypersensitive reactions to lice, flies, bed bugs and other insects. Bees seem to be the most common offender. Bees also have the distinction of being one of the few insects to leave the stinger in the victim. Attached to the stinger is a venom sac that can keep pumping venom into a victim for awhile. The best way to remove the stinger is to gently scrape across it with a fingernail or knife edge or carefully pull it out with tweezers so more venom will

not be injected. Treatment for bee and other insect stings also may include applying cold compresses to slow venom absorption and reduce swelling. Calamine lotion often can relieve itching. Other lotions may be used but victims need to be careful not to apply anything that will further irritate the skin.






