More rain likely later in week

As one weather front moves out and another prepares a weekend onslaught, beleaguered farmers are hoping for a dry spell.

With almost 10 inches of rain recorded in the past 10 days (and more in some places in the county), corn and cotton growers hope the weather gives them a break.

"The corn is about half out of the fields," said Rick Auckerman, county extension agent. "Growers are just going to have to wait for it to dry up to get back in the

"Cotton is in different stages right now. We need some heat units for the bolls to open. It's going to be a-waitand-see deal. It'll have to dry up before we can get in an assess the fields."

At the Dimmitt Country Club's golf course, the playa lake in the center of the course has encompassed much of the playing area.

"I don't know how long it will take before the water goes away," said Alli Thrasher, who with her husband, Chip, and her parents Larry and Sharon Squier, own the club. "We were getting water off Halsell, Bedford, 11th and 12th streets.

"We have six holes that are inundated - three are impass-

"None of our greens are in jeopardy anymore, just the low-lying areas. Everyone says they've seen it before and everything will be alright."

On Sunday, Juan and Margarita Rodriguez felt the brunt of the rainfall, as a drainage ditch off Halsell overflowed and flooded their home on 11th Street.

Schaeffers make contribution to WTAMU Ag-Education lab

CANYON — Stanley and Geneva Schaeffer of Dimmitt and Roy and Arlene Bryan of Happy are partners in several agriculture-related enterprises in the Texas Panhandle. They are teaming up once again; this time, providing \$110,000 to West Texas A&M University for a new Agriculture Education Learning Laboratory.

It is the first major contribution to the University's effort to raise \$450,000 to construct a new home for the two-yearold Bachelor of Science in Agriculture-Teacher Certification program. The lab will be located northeast of campus on the site of the old dairy. The pre-engineered metal building will contain 10,000 square feet of classrooms, office space and an ag-mechanical shop. Livestock holding and handling facilities could be added at the 120-acre site sometime in the

County Commissioners OK budget, two jailers eliminated

After hours of budget workshop meetings, Castro County Commissioners approved a budget that will cut two of the 10 jailers from the Sheriff's Department.

During the budgetary process, commissioners had to start trimming resources after Cargill filed suit in district court contesting its property taxes. If the suit is

successful, the county will lose about \$110,000 in revenue. The commissioners had earlier decided to cut three positions, but on Saturday decided to leave one of the jobs intact. Another aspect of the budget is an across-the-board increase to full-time county employees of \$50 per month. The original figure was \$100, but the Cargill suit See TAXES, Page 2

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YOUR EYES

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One of the most common visual symptoms people have is glare. Those annoying reflections will make you squint and struggle with your otherwise good vision. Glare is caused by light being broadly scattered as it bounces off a highly reflective surface, such as water, your car's windshield, or even your own glasses.

The most recent advancement used to reduce glare has been the antireflective coating. This lens coating is usually applied to your spectacle lenses in a dust-free vacuum chamber. It's very effective for the majority of patients, from outdoors men to rush-hour drivers. Another solution may be polarized lenses. With polarized lenses a microscopic "screen" within the lens acts to filter out and diffuse glare entering the eye. It's especially helpful for those who are bothered by glare around the water.

This problem is only made worse by dirty lenses and an appropriate prescription. If you truly hope to avoid glare, be certain to clean your lenses regularly and keep your prescription up-to-date.

Neugebauer's claims don't stand up to scrutiny

To the editor:

U.S. Rep. Randy Neugebauer's, R-Lubbock, guest column in the Abilene Reporter News on Aug. 15 sounded fishy. I have checked the Congressional Record to find out what really happened.

Neugebauer claimed he got \$28.6 million in family housing for Dyess Air Force Base and \$3.3 million for a refueling maintenance center there. The truth is, U.S. Rep. Charlie Stenholm, D-Abilene, worked to secure the financing for both projects, while Neugebauer did nothing on either but claimed credit for the work of others. Charlie has proven his ability to work with Republicans Sens. Hutchison and Cornyn for Dyess funding.

Neugebauer says the criticism of his voting against additional military housing construction funding was a misunderstanding over procedure. Really, this was not merely a procedural vote, but a vote of substance on how we treat our troops.

Voting with the Hastert/DeLay House leadership - as Neugebauer did and Charlie did not - knocked out the additional provision for military housing.

Neugebauer also claims credit for increasing the B-1 bombers at Dyess, but the truth is that was a result of work by Charlie and others for B-1s in defense bills that passed in May and July 2003. Neugebauer didn't even arrive in Congress until June 2003, not in time to influence these.

caused the court to reconsider.

The tax rate for the coming fiscal year will be .654 cents per \$100 valuation, an increase of about 3 percent.

"These guys have worked harder on this budget than they've ever worked as commissioners, as have the auditor and the clerk," said County Judge Bill Sava. "I'm very appreciative of what they've done."

Commissioner Larry Gonzales said that the court didn't set out to eliminate jobs and reduce raises, but was forced to because of the lawsuit.

"It's Cargill that will decided what the county is going to do next year," Gonzales said, noting that barring any positive changes, more cuts may be necessary next year.

The commissioners also met in regular session on Monday, where they approved a 75 percent tax abatement for Pioneer Dairy Lab.

That abatement will be for five years after the lab is up and running.

The county will continue to collect property taxes on the land itself at the same rate, but will not collect full taxes on the improvements for the lab's first five years.

The city and hospital district will consider the same proposal when they meet later this week and next week.


country and abide by its laws, we live our lives by a different law.

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
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Swifts overwhelm Clarendon, 49-14





The third score of the quarter was another pass from Furgason, this time for 2-yards to John Bryan; the PAT failed, but White Deer led 27-0 at the half.





future, according to Dr. Don Topliff, head of the Division of Agriculture. "The main thing right now, though, is to get this program into a home of its own," Topliff said. "We want to provide the kind of facility that our students are likely to encounter in the communities where they choose to teach and, thanks to the Schaeffers and the Bryans, it appears that we will. "We'd like to break ground in the next six or eight months, if possible."

Stanley Schaeffer and Roy Bryan presented checks totaling \$110,000 on Thursday, Sept. 23 in the office of Dr. James R. Clark, dean of the College of Agriculture, Nursing, Science and Engineering. "This is a generous contribution, a great foundation upon which to build," Clark said. "We believe in our agricultural teacher certification program, and so do Stanley Schaeffer and Roy Bryan."

The program is under the direction of Dr. Lance Kieth, assistant professor of agriculture education. It was approved by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board in 2002. The University presently has 76 students in its agriculture education program, 56 of whom are on the teacher-certification track.

"We're pleased to help West Texas A&M with their project to teach students to be teachers of agriculture," Schaeffer, a graduate of WTAMU, said. "A lot of colleges are getting away from that and moving into other specialties. A program like this just helps broaden the agricultural base in our region. I am largely in favor of that."

Public hearing on paving set

Mayor Wayne Collins is urging the public to participate Monday night when the City Council holds a public hearing on street paving. The meeting will start at 6:30 p.m., with the public hearing to lead off.

"We want the public to come and express their desires," Collins said. "There are about 35 blocks of streets, located in the

northeast and southwest parts of town that need paving."

Collins said he wants home owners in the affected areas to understand the costs associated with paving a street. On an average, with oil prices as they stand, a homeowner would owe around \$4,000 to pave in front of his home, Collins said. "Paving uses a lot of asphalt and crude oil prices are almost at \$50 a barrel,

which impacts paving costs," he said. "Right now, it costs \$40-to-\$45 per linear foot for each side of the street,

including curb and gutters. "The way it works, the city pays for the alleys and intersections, but the individual homeowners will have to pay for the part that goes across their lot. We're

looking at options." Any paving work that is approved won't start until next summer, he said.

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
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
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
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
