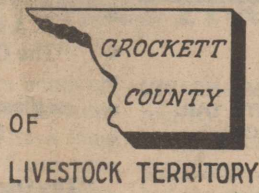

Texans To Vote On Seven Proposed Amendments Nov.

Seven more patches to the already tattered Texas constitution are proposed by the Texas Legislature to be voted on at the General Election November 8, 1977. Any or all of the proposed amendments, if approved, will become a part of the state's constitution, effective Jan. 1, 1978.

Amendment No. 1 as proposed would increase the State Court of Criminal Appeals from the present five members to nine members, and permit the court to sit in panels of three judges for the purpose of hearing cases. This procedure is not mandated but permitted for the proposed nine judge court, the concurrence of two judges necessary for a decision. An amendment adopted in 1966 increased the court from three to five members. An increase in the number of appealed criminal cases has prompted the legislature to again suggest an increase in the number of judges.

Amendment No. 2 would authorize the issuance of an additional \$200 million in state bonds or obligations for the Veterans Land Fund from the existing \$500 million to \$700 million and providing

that the unmarried spouse of a veteran who died in line of duty would become eligible to apply for purchase of a tract through the board, provided the deceased veteran meets the requirements set out in the article.

Training Set For 4-H Horse Leaders

Adult 4-H leaders who work with horse project clubs and groups are invited to participate in "Horse Leader Training" at the Texas 4-H Center near Brownwood on Friday evening, September 23, through Sunday noon, September 25, according to Billy Reagar, County Extension Agent.

"Those attending the week-end training sessions will receive instruction in horse judging, horsemanship, horse program management, related handicrafts, and 4-H record book tips," Mr. Reagar adds.

Amendment No. 3 would allow a district court to deny bail to a person accused of a felony committed while he was on bail for a prior felony indictment or to a person who has been previously convicted of a felony and is accused of using a deadly weapon in the commission of a second felony. All of which sounds fair enough but it would seem the issue could be provided in the state's criminal code.

Mrs. Davidson Dies At Home Here Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. Charles E. Davidson, Jr. were scheduled for 5 p.m. Wed., Sept. 21, at Ozona United Methodist Church with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

Mrs. Davidson died suddenly early Tuesday morning at her home here following an apparent heart attack.

Mrs. Davidson, known affectionately as 'Happy' to her friends, was born in Houston Jan. 14, 1908 and was married Nov. 27, 1927, to Charles E. Davidson, Jr., son of Crockett County's first county judge who served in that capacity for more than 50 years.

Born Edna Elizabeth Barron, Mrs. Davidson grew up in the home of her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. E.K. Williams of Temple. Mr. Williams was for many years publisher of the Temple Daily Telegram. Mrs. Davidson enjoyed the renewed companionship of her cousin, Pearl Morris, the former Pearl Williams, with whom she grew up as sisters, in the Williams home. Mrs. Morris had made her home here with Mrs. Davidson for the past several years.

Mrs. Davidson was in nurse training in Scott & White Hospital in Temple as a young girl and it was there that she met her future husband. After their marriage in Temple, the couple returned to Ozona where Mr. Davidson was in the ranching business from young manhood to his death Dec. 31, 1965.

Surviving Mrs. Davidson are two children, Charles E. Davidson, III, of Ozona, and Mrs. Steve (Edna Beth) Stephenson of Guyton, Okla.; six grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

History Appreciation Week Starts With Program Mon.

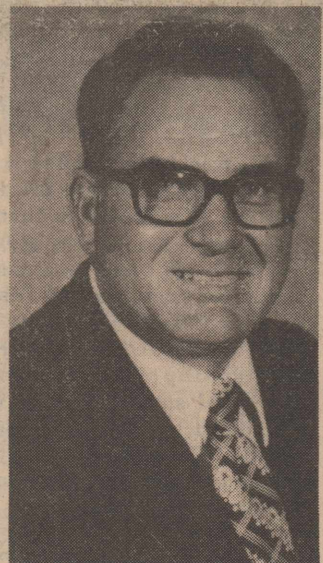

This has consisted of a full range of archeological activities from location, identification, and protection of sites, field investigations, laboratory analysis, and archival research to dissemination of information by three series of technical reports, lectures and films.

The Crockett County Historical Commission has designated the week of September 26 through October 1, as County History Appreciation Week as designated by Governor Dolph Briscoe.

Lions Destroy Eagles 49-0

Ozona's Lions literally demolished the Eldorado Eagles in their own nest Friday night. The score was 49-0, as all 31 Lion varsity players got into the contest.

The Lions scored on five of their first six possessions and amassed an amazing 599 yards total offense while holding the Eagles to 134 yards and no score.

The Lions will host a vastly improved McCamey Badger team Friday. Coach Sewell reports the Badgers are very tough on defense and will give the Lions all they can handle. The Badgers are 2-1 on the season as are the Lions and have eight starters returning from last season.

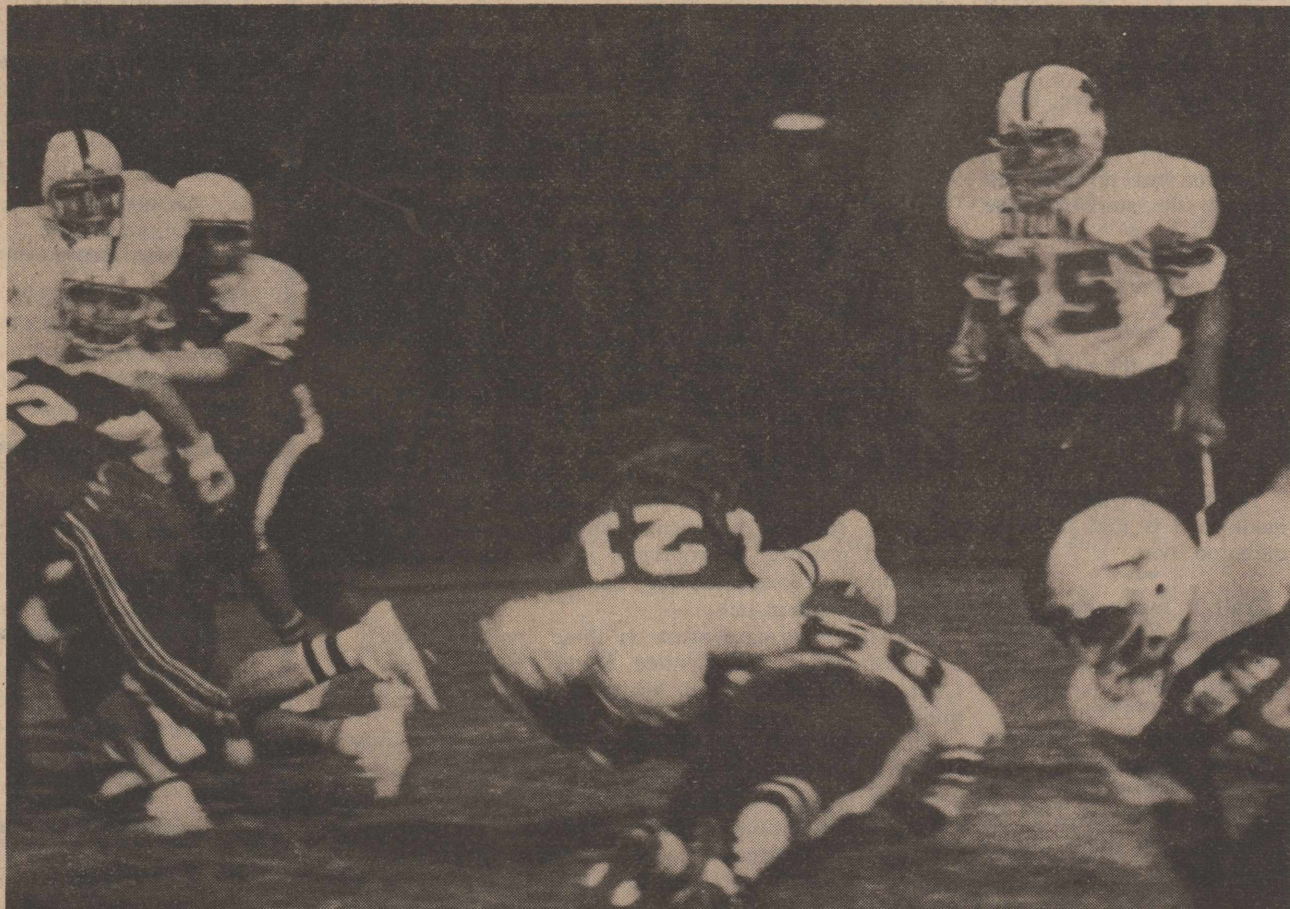
Blake Moody scored five touchdowns and rushed for 260 yards on 22 carries to lead the Lion attack against the Eagles. Highlight of the game was a beautiful 90 yard run by Moody early in the second quarter. Ozona blockers cleared the path right through the middle of the Eagles and Moody outran

the last defender to score the longest run from scrimmage in 10 years.

The Lion defense was responsible for several exciting moments, recovering 3 Eagle fumbles, blocking a punt for a 2-point safety, and allowing only 33 yards on 4 of 16 pass completions.

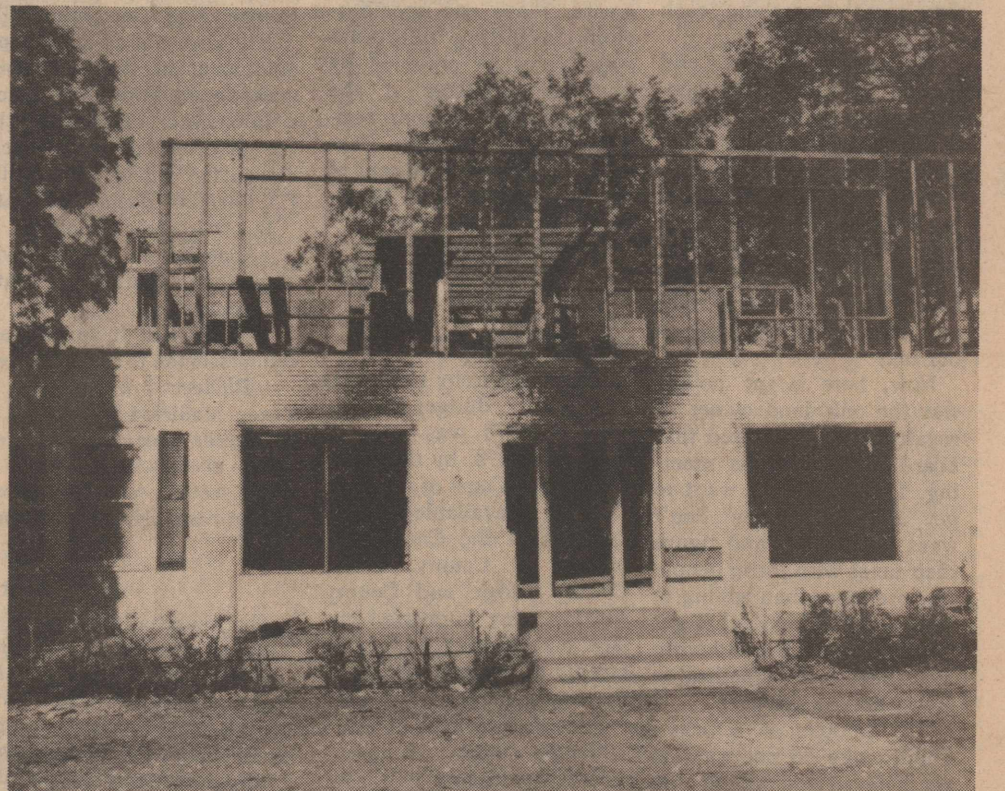
Moody had five touchdowns and 5 extra points to score 35 of the 49 points scored by the Lions. Steve Pagan carried 8 times for 89 yards. Dan Sewell had a 6 yards on 3 carries and was 2 out of 4 in the passing department for 17 yards. Junior halfback Joey Borrego carried 19 times for 116 yards and a touchdown. Max Schroeder blocked an Eagle punt for a safety.

Leading tackler for Ozona was Jeffrey Young with 14 tackles and a fumble recovery. Schroeder had 13 tackles along with his blocked punt. Manuell Longoria had 8 tackles. Jim Bob Sosa recovered 2 Eldorado fumbles.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

After reading Mrs. Debbie Williams' letter to the Stockman, praising the stand Ewart White took on the Commissioners disregarding a petition of 700 signatures for county judge, I too want to thank Mr. White for being involved.

The people of Crockett County who have not been involved are the cause of all the bad government that has and is being made in Crockett County. They don't want to be involved, they do nothing, they do not want to be involved.

If the 700 persons who signed the petition stay involved, county government will change for the better. There is a bunch in Crockett County who don't mind being involved and they are running the show, because in the past most citizens didn't want to become involved.

In 1975 I found a big mistake in my oil taxes. I raised so much hell about it and found so many errors, we had a public meeting with the people who figured our taxes. The courthouse was full of people who had oil and gas taxes in the county. The people who had made our taxes for that year offered some of the most childish excuses for their mistakes. I replied to them but got nothing done. Nobody, not one person would help me or say one word, they did not want to get involved.

Now, this year, 1977, at the board of equalization meeting the courthouse was full of representatives from oil companies. They did not mind being involved. The oil representatives all had their hope with them, and it took just a few minutes for them to leave satisfied, I suppose.

In my mind, they got through too quick to have gone over anything. Now, I had my gas consultant who is not a tax man there, as our gas taxes are set by what is left in the hole. This man had a record from the Railroad Commission on each of our wells each month, and he knew how fast they were decreasing each month.

We had an engineer and two auditors from the people who made my taxes sit down with us at 9 a.m. and we got through at 1 p.m. There was \$5,000 difference. The people who made our taxes. The representatives from the firm agreed we were right and allowed the decrease in our tax.

Now, here is my point-I was the only land owner or royalty owner to attend that board of equalization meeting. The rest didn't want to get involved. They don't want to sit down and figure their taxes with these people who are more than willing to do so. It is no big deal to get the board of equalization meets and be ready.

The people of Crockett County who do not want to get involved deserve the kind of government they are getting. If the 700 who got involved and signed the petition, continue to be involved and follow up at elec-

tion time, they will soon have a ruling body responsive to the people who elected them. Congratulations to those who signed the petition for becoming involved and may they continue the good work.

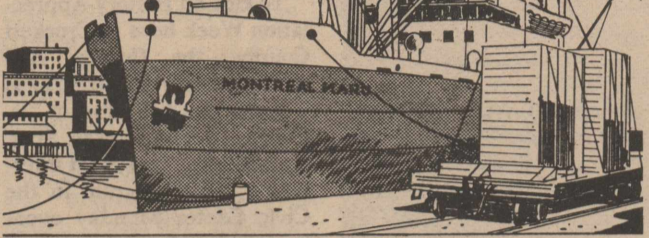

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Lyndell Williams TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN-Gov. Dolph Briscoe now has two announced challengers in the Democratic primary governor's race. Atty. Gen. John Hill made official his long-expected candidacy at news conferences in Austin, Houston, Dallas and San Antonio this week.

A few days earlier, former Gov. Preston Smith (1969-72) revealed his comeback effort in mailings to newspapers all over the state.

Both candidates predictably slammed Briscoe for not exerting stronger leadership and zeroed in on the fact that the incumbent will serve 10 years in office if re-elected.

They also pointed to steep increases in state government spending during the last six years.

Hill and Smith immediately began initial campaign swings through the state.

Briscoe continued to shrug off the attacks and predicted he will win a third term without a runoff.

"I view the future with great optimism," said Briscoe at a news conference. "My record speaks for itself. I am proud to run on it."

Meanwhile, U.S. Rep. Robert Krueger of New Braunfels and former Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie of El Paso focused statewide interest on the race to unseat U.S. Sen. John Tower. Christie is still not an announced candidate, but a \$100-a-plate fund-raising dinner to bankroll start of his expected campaign is set here October 18.

Federal, State Courts Speak A federal court held 40 children of illegal aliens should be allowed to attend Tyler schools free. The Tyler school board voted to appeal the decision by U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice that it could no longer charge the children of non-citizens \$1,000 tuition.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals stayed the first scheduled execution by drug injection. Kenneth Granviel had been sentenced to die September 16 for murder of three women and two children. His attorneys challenge constitutionality of the injection law because it does not specify the lethal substance to be used.

A district court jury in San Antonio ordered Southwestern Bell Telephone Company to pay \$3 million for slandering two former executives in an internal investigation. The company is appealing.

State Textbooks Approved The State Textbooks Committee unanimously ordered publishers to eliminate the generic use of "he" from future schoolbooks.

The committee adopted 90 new books, after voting to strike the generalized masculine pronoun.

The State Board of Education will vote on final adoption of the \$31 million in new books here November 12.

Porn Booming A legislative committee studying child pornography was advised to recommend tough state laws to deal with the problem.

A Los Angeles author told the committee, producers, distributors and shippers of pornographic films and photographs of children should be prosecuted vigorously.

The writer described Los Angeles as main production point for the films and Houston as a leading distribution center. He said most of the child performers are runaways but "there is a higher degree of parental knowledge and participation than we would like to think about."

Attorney General Opinions A final DWI conviction automatically suspends a driver's license, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

Hill also said an audit report on purchase of wiretapping equipment in the Jefferson, Orange and Hardin county areas is available for public scrutiny.

In another opinion on the open records act, however, the attorney general concluded a University of Texas committee report on possible reduction in personnel at UT Permian Basin is not subject to required disclosure.

In other recent opinions, Hill found: -Identity of persons who complain about child care standards violations at state-licensed day care centers is confidential.

-The Board of Pardons and Paroles can require a parole commissioner to accept a new duty station.

-Bidders' proposals for administration of a portion of Texas Medicaid submitted to the Department of Human Resources generally are exempt from public inspection as "trade secrets."

-A county can levy a road and bridge tax though it has no road bond indebtedness.

Short Snorts The seasonally-adjusted index of total construction in Texas during July hit the third highest level ever recorded. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Bill Clayton are "road show" participants in a series of area meetings to discuss local impact of legislation enacted this year-including highway finance and education bills.

Ray Hutchison stepped down as chairman of the Texas Republican Party while deciding whether he should run for governor.

The Conservative Union is helping form a committee to study feasibility of a constitutional amendment to limit taxation.

WASHINGTON-Foreign policy decisions must be based on understanding between the Administration and the Congress that each has a responsibility in determining the course of American foreign affairs.

Unfortunately, that partnership has been ignored all too often in the past.

We witnessed another example of its disregard recently as the White House attempted a political two step, announcing first, terms for renegotiating the Panama Canal treaty, and then a plan leading to normalization of relations with the Castro regime in Cuba-both while Congress was in its August recess.

The objective, of course, was to blunt expected congressional opposition and buy time to build up popular support for what are very unpopular ideas.

Both issues require a sober assessment of the implications for the United States, and the Congress while considering such questionable departures in long-standing policy, must not be pressured into hasty judgments.

The Panama Canal treaty, though formally signed in Washington last week with pomp and circumstance, has yet to be submitted to the Senate for ratification. It faces an uphill battle on the Senate floor and I remain unconvinced such a treaty is in our best national interest.

Normalization of relations with the Castro regime in Cuba raises more disturbing questions about the course of the Administration's foreign policy.

Travels throughout Texas in August reaffirm my belief that most Texans are opposed to normalization of relations with Cuba unless and until the Communist government there backs away from its campaign to spearhead revolution among the so-called Third World countries.

Certain conditions must be met, before normalized relations are considered, the first of which must be assurances from the Castro government that Cuba has removed its troops from the African continent, where their presence is merely an instrument of Soviet aggression. Cuba itself, has no role to play in African politics, except to serve as a symbol of intransigence.

Perhaps as important must be American insistence that the Castro government cease exporting its brand of Marxist revolution to democratic Latin American countries. If we are serious about improving the political climate and our relationships with other countries in our hemisphere, halting the spread of authoritarian regimes certainly is preferable to ratifying a treaty clearly detrimental to American interests and to the community of nations.

Before proceeding with serious discussions of normalized relations with Cuba, we should also demand compensation for the American companies and individuals who had property expropriated in the aftermath of the communist takeover, and the release of all political prisoners held in Cuban jails.

Until there is agreement on these conditions, there is no advantage to the United States resuming relations. Cuba, on the other hand, has nothing to lose and everything to gain, economically and diplomatically.

This is the same Cuban government, we should remember, that participated in the interrogation of American prisoners in Vietnam, and points to the alarming double-standard the Administration seems to have adopted in dealing with oppressive governments. The pressure for human rights in our relations with other countries must not be applied selectively.

And this is where the Congress of the United States must maintain vigilance to assure that consistency in foreign relations remains the underpinning of American policy.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

What a difference rain can make on the landscape appearance of this Southwest area of Texas. This time last year we had had bountiful rains for several weeks so our country was really beautiful and green. Quite a contrast in the dead winter look we have now. I'm optimistic enough to believe we will have moisture in time to green up the pastures before frost.

Already there is a faint tinge of Autumn in the early mornings, so everyone should enjoy their gardens and outdoor chores for two more months.

Prepare pansy bed by working in plenty of manure. Stir several times before planting.

Plant or transplant peonies at this time, and be sure the holes are large enough and filled with good soil. These plants can remain undisturbed for years if properly planted. Nurseries will furnish three-to five-eye root divisions. These are best for general planting. A peony should have full sun and a well-drained soil. The ground should be dug to a depth of about one and one-half feet. Old manure is placed in the bottom of the hole and then a layer of earth containing the plant is placed in the hole so that the buds are about two inches below the surface of the soil. Care should be taken that the plants roots do not touch the manure. Use a good garden soil with plenty of plant food. If commercial fertilizer use about 4-8-8. Varieties of the heavy double blooms require staking. For garden decorations and arrangements, the lighter type of bloom, either those of the Japanese type or the semi-double blooms are popular.

Look for liatris this month. It is a hardy perennial native to Texas that is well worth using in a wild flower garden or border. The colorful purple wand-like spikes present one of the most spectacular wild flowers.

It will grow in poorer soil than most garden plants, but thrives best in a good, rich soil mixture. These plants multiply by off-sets from their corn-like base, or may be grown from seed sown in late autumn.

Another colorful plant on display now is the native purple eryngo. This is not a thistle, as is often called, but a carrot. It has few rivals for its own peculiar kind to beauty in its late summer flowering period. Eryngo is very difficult to transplant, but if seeds are sown as soon as ripe, a colony may be established in the garden. You can expect flowers 2 years later.

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Debra Says

September may be carpet-buying month. Many stores offer sales with price reductions of 10 to 30 percent or more available. But before you buy, know what kind of carpeting you need and what you can afford.

Be cautious of advertising that claims fantastic savings. Price is usually a pretty good indication of quality in carpeting.

High traffic areas will need a tough durable carpeting, so buy the best grade of carpeting you can afford. Low traffic areas such as a bedroom or dining room may not need as high a quality carpet, so look for middle and economy grades.

To judge the quality of a carpet or rug, examine the surface pile and the backing. Look for a dense, deep pile, with tufts that spring back when crushed. Some good shag carpets may be less dense than other types of pile carpeting.

Also, check the backing on a carpet. Jute, the most common fiber, is strong and provides a good foundation, but it may mildew. Any area susceptible to moisture—such as a bathroom, kitchen, or laundry room—will need a carpet backing of synthetic material.

If economy or mobility are important, consider an area rug that can provide the comfort of a carpet.

Many stores offer an in-home shopping service, so take advantage of this to really see how carpeting will look in the home. However, be wary of door-to-door or telephone sales.

COCOA SHEET CAKE
4 tablespoons cocoa
1/2 cup margarine

Combine cocoa, milk and margarine; bring to a boil. Stir in sugar and vanilla. Spread on cake. Sprinkle with pecans and coconut.

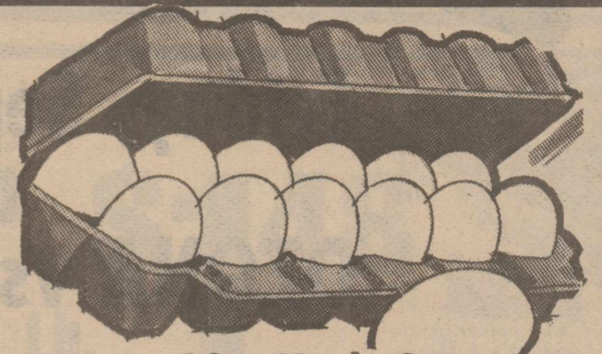

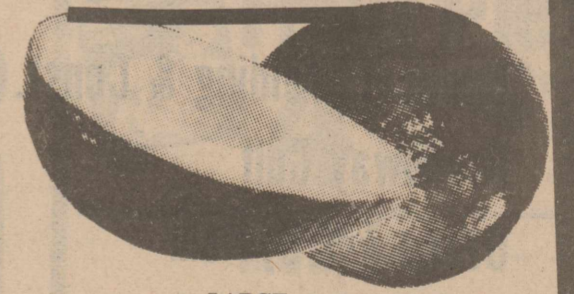

2 Producers Completed In SW Crockett

The Wyatt (Grayburg) oil field of Crockett County gained its fourth and fifth producers with completion of two projects in the southwest portion, 15 miles northwest of Ozona, by Amoco Production Company.

The No. 10-A J.S. Todd "A", 1/2 mile west-northwest and the same distance east-northeast, was finished to pump 80 barrels of 24 gravity oil, plus 41 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 512-1 through perforations at 1,384-424 feet, which had been acidized with 1,500 gallons.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 2,030 feet from the east lines of 30-WX-GC&SF.

The No. 11-A J.S. Todd "A", 5/8 mile northeast and northwest, was finished to pump 121 barrels of 23.2 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 330-1, through perforations at 1,226-282 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons.

Location is 1,880 feet from the south and 2,200 feet from the east lines of the same section.

West Texas hospitals.

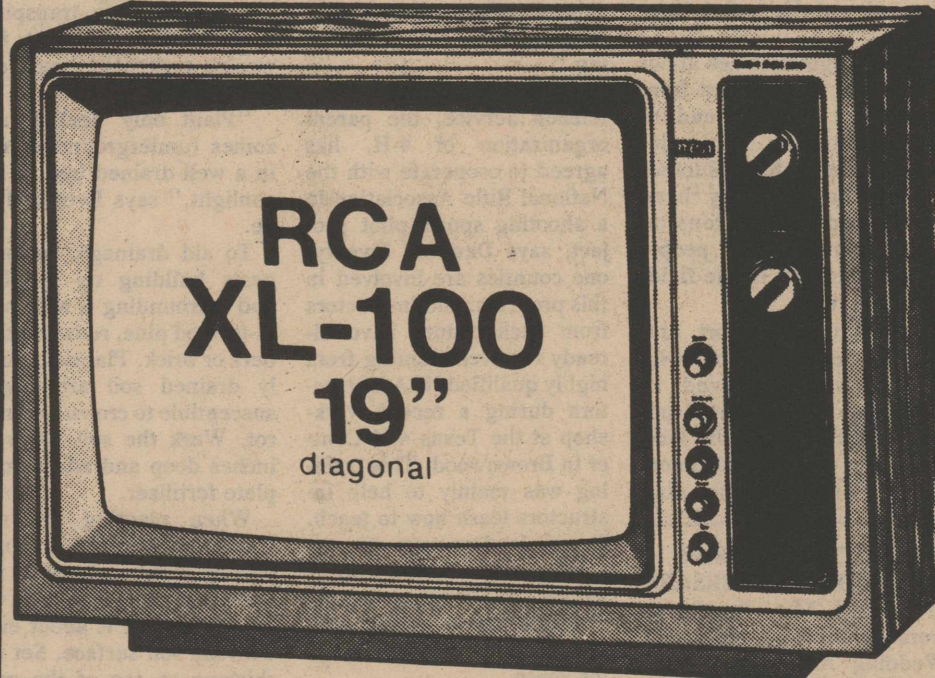
A community blood program, such as the one serving this area, is the link between the total volunteer donor and the patient who requires transfusion therapy. However, without the

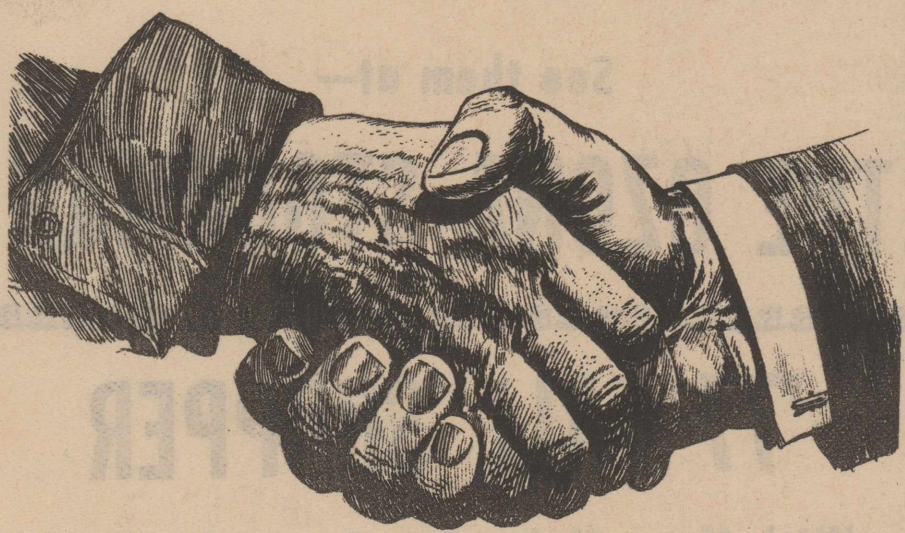

Shooting Sports Are Added To 4-H Plans

Shooting Sports has been added as a new 4-H project area in Texas, announces H.T. Davison, 4-H and youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This program comes about as a result of a request from volunteer adult leaders across the state. Two training programs for volunteer leaders have already been conducted by Extension specialists and other people who are experts in the field, notes Davison.

"Shooting is a sport, and in many cases, people who are actively involved in shooting do not hunt," points out Davison. "In fact, there are more participants engaged in target shooting

than in any other phase of shooting sports. 4-H will offer an all-around program in shooting sports, including BB and air rifle marksmanship, 22 rifle marksmanship, and shotgun target shooting."

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the parent organization of 4-H, has agreed to cooperate with the National Rifle Association in a shooting sports pilot project, says Davison. Twenty-one counties are involved in this program, and instructors from each county have already received training from highly qualified NRA instructors during a recent workshop at the Texas 4-H Center in Brownwood. This training was mainly to help instructors learn how to teach. County leaders were encouraged to return home and organize a shooting sports program which would offer many various opportunities for youth.

"There will be a number of competitive activities for young people in shooting sports," says Davison. "These will include county, district and state rifle marksmanship contests and state trap and skeet competition. Other activities likely to evolve include light 22 caliber rifle matches, silhouette shooting and air rifle matches.

"Emphasis will be placed on helping the individual youngster learn how to shoot and to seek out those activities which he or she best enjoys," contends Davison. "The intent of the program is to help people learn about and enjoy the sport of shooting. It is a sport that an individual can enjoy throughout his lifetime."

Local county Extension agents have information on organizing a 4-H Shooting Sports Club.

Transplant Irises In Near Future

The bearded iris will boast colorful flowers for years with only limited care. For best performance, transplant irises during the next few weeks, suggests a landscape horticulturist.

"Plant only healthy rhizomes (underground stems) in a well-drained bed in full sunlight," says Everett Janne.

To aid drainage, he suggests building up the bed and surrounding it with penta-treated pine, redwood timbers or brick. Plants in poorly drained soil are highly susceptible to crown and root rot. Work the soil 12 to 18 inches deep and add a complete fertilizer.

When planting the rhizomes, first build a cone-shaped mound of soil in the bottom of a hole so that the top of the cone is about even with the soil surface. Set the rhizome on top of the cone and allow the roots to spread downward. Then fill in with soil, and water to settle the soil around the roots. Space transplants 12 to 18 inches apart.

"Since growth occurs from the leaf end of the rhizome, place the leaves in the direction of desired growth," notes Janne. "Also trim back the foliage to one-third its original height.

"By getting irises well established this fall, they will be ready to burst forth in bloom next spring," adds the horticulturist.

Problem students

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — Two University of Texas educational psychologists are trying to uncover what factors lead to rowdy classroom behavior or dropouts from Texas secondary schools.

Drs. Melvin Sikes and Philip Powell hope to find out how problem students perceive the educational process and what experiences — from school, family and peers — tend to hold or not hold students in school.

Part of the study will use high school students to conduct interviews with other high schoolers to gain information adolescents might not reveal to adults.

Decorative Fireplace Ashes May Cause Cancer

Decorative fireplace "fires" using asbestos-emberized materials may cause cancer, reports Lynn White, family resource management specialist.

A new Consumer Alert from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission reports that artificial fireplace ashes made from asbestos-emberizing materials will be banned, and urges consumers to remove the ashes from their homes.

However, extreme caution is necessary in removing these asbestos ashes. Read all instructions, urges the specialist, and make sure you understand them BEFORE you start to remove the ashes.

If you also have gas-burning or non-burning artificial fireplace logs on which asbestos ashes are scattered or glued, then treat the logs as carefully as you treat the ashes, the commission warns.

The equipment you will need is two heavy duty plastic bags, two pieces of string or "ties" for fastening the bags, one flat bottom scoop (sugar scoop, dust pan or small plastic toy shovel), a covering for the nose and mouth (this could be a dust face mask, available in most drugstores, or a single-use respirator. Most hardware stores carry respirators, one pump spray-type bottle (window cleaner bottle, plant mister, etc.), a generous supply of paper towels or pieces of cloth (for wiping up), a supply of newspaper and washable clothing.

To prepare properly remove and dispose of the ashes. This requires you to be careful not to create dust from the ash and embers in the fireplace, clear the room of all other people and pets, close all windows and doors which might cause a draft, close the fireplace flue hamper, fill the pump spray bottle with water and two or three drops of liquid detergent. Do not make a lot of suds in the bottle.

Put one plastic bag inside the other, cover your nose and mouth with a respirator or face mask. (Do not try to disconnect the gas line as this should only be done by licensed plumbers or gas

company personnel.) Do not try to vacuum this material. Lightly spray the ash and embers with the water and detergent mixture until the ash is thoroughly dampened. Do not pour water on the Ash and Embers. Be careful not to stir up the ash and embers while spraying.

Using the scoop or small shovel, put the ash and embers into the double plastic bag. (If the ash and embers are in a pan located under the grate, put the entire pan into the bag.) Put the scoop or shovel into the plastic bag.

With wet paper towels or pieces of cloth, wipe the remaining ash and embers from the fireplace floor and surrounding area, two times. Also, wipe all fireplace tools and the artificial logs with damp paper towels or cloths to remove any possible ash and embers. Put the cloth and towels into the plastic bag.

Put the face mask or respirator into the plastic bag. Use one piece of string or a tie to close the inside plastic bag tightly. Do not try to get the air out of the bag. Use one piece of string or a tie to close the outside plastic bag.

All clothing worn while cleaning up should be washed immediately after use. This clothing should be washed separately from other clothing or household articles. Do not shake clothing before washing. Take a bath or shower immediately following clean up.

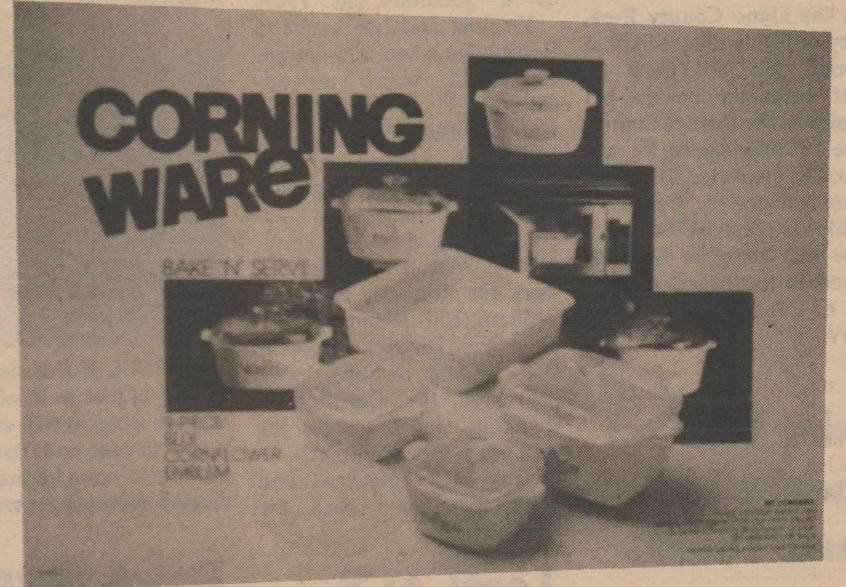
To dispose of the plastic bags, attach the following label to the bag. Print in large letters:

Caution: Contains Asbestos. Avoid breaking or puncturing the bag.

Do not burn the bag in a trash barrel, do not take the bag to an incinerator, do not put the bag in a trash compactor. Call local environmental services agency, sanitation or health department for instructions on disposal.

Fake logs, usually made of pressed wood, which can burn, are not included in the CPSC ban, Mrs. White says.

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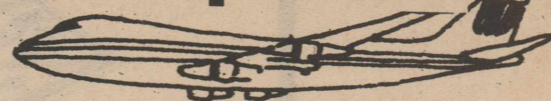

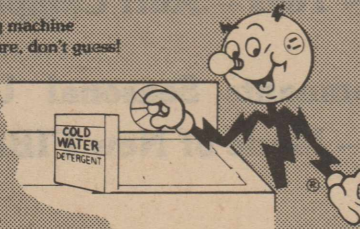

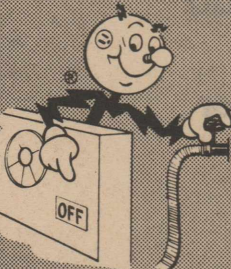

you and the LAW

PRESENTED BY THE STATE BAR OF TEXAS

Q: A while back I had a company "fix" the roof on my house for \$250. They guaranteed the job for 90 days. Well, it rained three days after the job was finished, and it leaked worse than before. Though I've called them every week since then, they refuse to do anything about it. Is there any way I can get my \$250 back?

A: Your best course of action is through the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Consumer-Protection Act. If you are successful in your suit, you can be awarded three times the actual damages, plus court costs and reasonable attorney's fees. You'll need to show that the company agreed to fix the roof and guaranteed that it wouldn't leak for a certain period. You'll also need to show that the roof did leak during the guaranteed period. Finally, you'll need to prove that you paid the \$250.

Q: My mother is now in her middle sixties. She and my dad were married for 18 years, and then they divorced about 10 years ago. Since my mother has no steady income or savings for her later years, this question has come to mind. We were wondering if she could draw social security in my father's name?

A: No, I'm sorry, but she can't draw social security in this instance. According to the law, she would be entitled

to social security payments only if she had been married to him for a period of 20 years immediately prior to the date the divorce became effective.

Q: My parents have withdrawal privileges on both my checking and savings accounts. If I should die, will my parents have any trouble withdrawing the money I leave them?

A: Assuming you are single, you can have what's called a joint tenancy with right of survivorship for your parents. You might want to take a look at the bank card you signed when you opened the accounts. If you do have such a contract with the bank and your parents, then the money would be theirs if you should die.

Q: I'm 77 years old and I would like to claim the homestead exemption from property taxes for persons over 65. The deed to my home is in the name of my five daughters who helped me buy it 21 years ago. Is it possible for me to obtain the tax exemption even though my name isn't on the deed?

A: In deciding whether to grant a homestead exemption from property taxes for a person over 65, the county tax assessor can award the exemption to a person only if the property deed is in that person's name.

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Livestock Studies Benefit State's Livestock Producers

Livestock studies conducted by Texas A&M system research facilities have long been of benefit to Texas producers and may prove even more crucial to Texas sheepmen in the future, current low sheep numbers offering little incentive for commercial firms to invest in research and new product testing.

Too, some research is simply not commercially applicable in the first place, except in a very roundabout way. Bitterweed studies, for example, might or might not lead to development of a commercially viable bitterweed antidote. Meanwhile, the A&M people are attacking the problem from various other angles.

The first step, of course, was to identify the true culprit. This was done on a broad scale by the fellow who first determined that bitterweed, and not one of the scores of other plants, was killing his sheep. Much more recently, A&M scientists isolated "hymenoxon" as the actual toxic agent in the plant.

This information opened the way for numerous other lines of attack and made it possible to determine if some of them might work. So far, an amino acid, cysteine, seems to work as a counteragent to hymenoxon. Thus, we have what could be a useful treatment, but it also has its drawbacks.

Rumen action tends to break down cysteine before it can reach the intestine, rendering it useless. Researchers, however, have had some success with encapsulation, thus protecting the amino acid long enough for it to reach its destination.

A lack of encapsulating equipment, in turn, has limited research along these lines, so tests at the present time involve injection.

Other bitterweed studies include testing the effects of herbicides both in controlling

the weed and in reducing its toxicity.

Weed control by herbicide treatment is nothing new, but the principle has certain specific drawbacks when used on bitterweed. For one, bitterweed, where it is a problem, grows right alongside other more desirable forbs. Many of them are extremely important for sheep grazing, and a herbicide that kills bitterweed will also eliminate these more desirable plants.

Too, the most widely used herbicide, 2-4-D, has almost no residual effect and bitterweed can crop out again almost immediately. Current testing involves a search for other herbicides with better residual action.

As for using herbicides to reduce the toxicity of bitterweed, test results conflict. Field tests indicate that 2-4-D can greatly reduce the level of hymenoxon, but laboratory experiments have given just the opposite results. Field samplings also indicate that hymenoxon levels in individuals plants may vary from one time to the next.

As present, we have no cure or positive treatment for bitterweed, but we do have a respectable number of dedicated researchers looking for both. And they're not trying to sell us their results, so they're not overly concerned with the size of the market we can give them.

Amendment four would authorize the legislature to provide for tax relief to encourage the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources. Proponents see in this amendment needed protection for historical treasures but opponents see in it a possible tax discrimination and a threat to the tax support in many older communities rich in historical sites.

Amendment No. 5 would add a section to the constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize producers of poultry, livestock and other raw agricultural commodities to form associations and collect assessments on their product sales. An unworthy clutter of the constitution in the opinion of many opponents.

Amendment 6 would authorize banks in the state to set up a system of electronic terminals at remote locations. The amendment is seen as a method of side-stepping the state's provision against branch banking except as authorized. Opponents see in the installation a huge expense that most likely would be passed on to customers.

The final proposed amendment on the ballot is an apparent outgrowth of the difficulty the judiciary encountered in its effort to dislodge former Supreme Court judge Don Yarbrough from office on serious misconduct charges. The amendment would change the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and would change the membership of the commission to include four citizen members instead of three and to add one justice of the peace. Recent events, proponents point out, have shown a need for additional powers to make the method for disciplining judges quicker and more effective.

Canyon oil production was re-opened in the Olson multipay field of Crockett County with completion of Marathon Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-A Noelke, 3/4 mile northwest of the depleted opener and 17 miles southeast of Iraan, for 224 barrels of 41 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 846-1.

Production was through perforations at 5,647-650, 5,680-687, 5,740-743 and 5,750-762 feet, which had been acidized with 200 gallons.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,692 feet; Dean, 4,912 feet; Pennsylvania lime, 5,664 feet; Strawn, 6,490 feet; Bend, 6,710 feet; and Ellenburger, 6,800 feet.

Drilled to 7,090 feet, with 5 1/2-inch casing set at 6,418 feet, it is plugged back to 5,835 feet.

Location is 2,238 feet from the south and 1,771.5 feet from the west lines of 10-GG-H&OB.

The Canyon opener, Plymouth Oil Co. No.13-AJ.W. Owens "M", was finalized Jan.23,1958 for 145 barrels of 36 gravity oil, plus 2.5 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 524-1, through a 3/16-inch choke and perforations at 5,820-30 feet.

Confirmer Reported In Howard Draw

The Howard Draw, Northeast multipay field of Crockett County gained its fourth 1165 San Andres oil producer and an 830-foot north extension to that pay with completion of James L. Lamb, Jr., Midland, No. 2-25 University, 15 miles northwest of Ozona, to pump eight barrels of 33 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 125-1.

Production was through perforations at 1,332-48 feet and 1,365-77 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons.

Location is 330 feet from the south and east lines of 25-30-University Lands.

The field also has one San Andres gas well and also produces gas from the Queen.

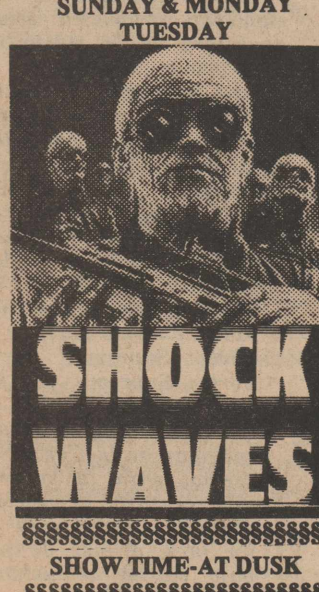
