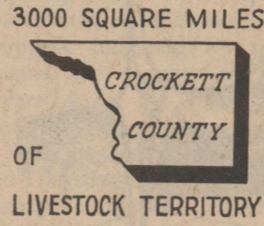

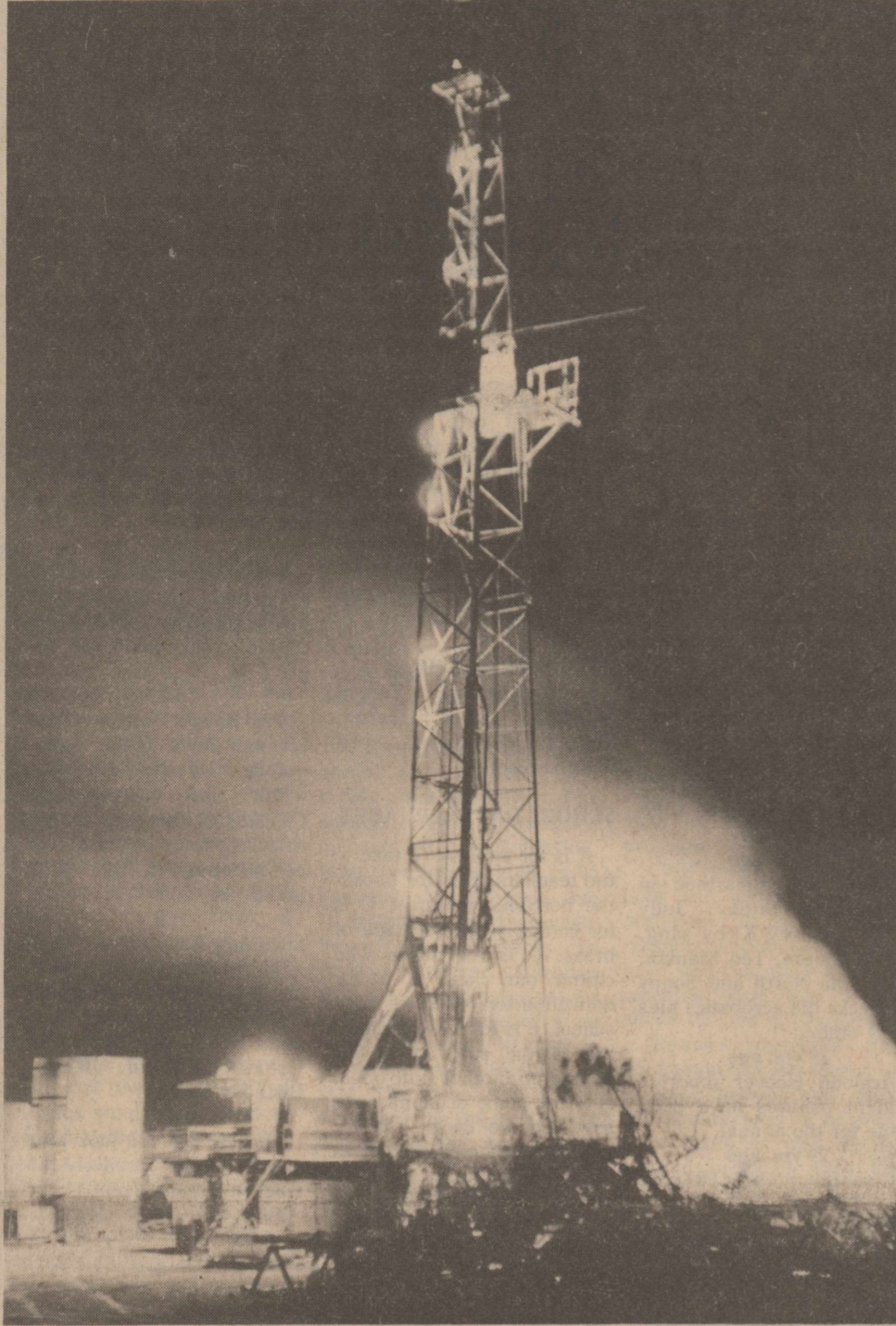

County Property Owners Receive 1978 Tax Bills

Crockett County tax bills for property owners went out the first of this month with an increase in valuations of approximately \$19,000,000 over that of last year. According to Chief Deputy Tax Assessor-Collector Tom Stokes the total valuation for 1977 is \$115,745,000. Of this amount, the county will collect 3,467,864 in taxes. Stokes said the increase was due in most part to an increase in gas activity over last year.

Taxpayers are reminded that they have the remainder of this month to take advantage of a 3% discount on their tax bill. The discount takes in all but the school tax. In November the discount decreases to 2%

and to 1% in December. The total amount is due in January and after that taxes become delinquent and penalty is added. Those who wish to pay their taxes in two parts may pay one-half by November and the other half prior to June without penalty.

Stokes said tax collections were running ahead of this date last year by a considerable amount. So far this month a total of \$400,000 has been collected in comparison with \$250,000 this time last year.

The total tax bill for the taxpayer is \$3.05 per \$100 valuation. Of this amount 10c goes to the state, down 2c from last year; the county gets \$1.25, which is up 13c

over last year, and the school will receive \$1.70, up 48c due to the school improvement bond passed earlier this year.

County Pecan Show Is Coming Up

Now is the time to begin selecting nut samples for the Crockett County Pecan Show. Do not remove from shucks so early that the shells are still white but make sure you work on sample selection before you sell most of your crop.

The dates of the Crockett County Pecan Show are November 18 and 21.

Lions Open Dist. Play In Crane Friday

The Ozona Lions will travel to Crane Friday night where they will play their first district game of the season. Going into district play the Lions are 5-2 and the Golden Cranes are 2-5. However, Coach Rip Sewell warns that the season records do not necessarily tell the tale. The Cranes overtook the Lions in offense according to statistics sent out in the district week before last, and Coach Sewell says they are probably the best offensive team in the district. He expects them to play tough, especially in their own territory.

The Lions will board the bus to Crane following the pep rally Friday. A large contingent of Ozona fans is expected to follow them to the game, as they especially need the support of their fans this first district game.

As far as injuries, the team is intact, in spite of the fact they have been plagued with flu and colds. They have had a week to rest up, having an open night last Friday. However, Crane should be rested too, since they also have had a week off.

This game might very well decide the district winner, although Kermit has been tagged as the team to beat. With only four teams in the district, and all showing strength, at this point it is a toss-up. Most Lion fans think they have a good chance to repeat winning the district again this year. Kermit, picked to win in pre-season polls, has not lived up to expectations, and the Lions will have the advantage of playing them here on their own field. Sonora, after a strong start, has fallen to the cellar and at this point pose no threat.

LULAC Dist. Meet Draws Crowd of 200

Around 200 persons were on hand here Sunday for the District V LULAC meeting at the Civic Center, when charters were issued to members from Eola, Ballinger and Ozona.

Principal speaker was Ruben Bonilla, state LULAC director, who asked for "a new awareness and political sophistication" among Mexican Americans in Texas.

Overall theme for the meeting was the expansion and organizational efforts made by LULAC (League of United Latin-American Citizens: members in the Mexican-American community, especially in the field of politics.

Precinct Lines Go Back To Pre-1974 Boundaries

A map of pre-1974 precinct boundaries for both city and county will be found in this issue of the newspaper, as ordered by a panel of three federal judges, who decided against county officials and for the four plaintiffs in a civil suit which has been pending for about a year. The final action was taken and the judgement filed Sept. 23, 1977 in U.S. District Court. The order, in full, signed by the three judges is also published as ordered.

The new/old precinct lines as set out will not affect those who vote in the Proposed Amendment election November 8, as all Crockett County voters will vote at the courthouse for this election, with the exception of those voting in the Powell Field and Power Plant boxes out of the city.

In the special election, called for December 10, voters will abide by the lines set out on the map. Precincts 1 and 4 will be separated by Monterey St. north to 14th, east to Ave. E or Hwy 163 then north to 11th St. and west to Johnson's Draw. Precinct 4 continues up 11th street and on over the hill.

Rainfall Comes To Dry Ozona

The first general rains since June came to Ozona over the weekend with a total of 1.65 recorded for the two-day period. The rain was spotted throughout Crockett County, with some parts reporting only a trace while others reported up to 2.5 inches.

Crockett County has suffered through an unusually hot, dry summer, and rainfall since 1.76 inches in June has been almost nil. The heat and drought has been a big factor in range fires which have ravaged the area. There was no rainfall, not even a trace in July. August followed up with only .19 of an inch while September was not much better with .30 of an inch recorded.

October looked promising when .23 of an inch fell Oct. 5, and cloudy conditions prevailed. However, the remainder of the month saw clear skies with hot days and cool nights until a front moved through last week and set off the showers which brought relief to the area and the first good rain. So far in October the rainfall total for Ozona is 1.88 inches.

Precinct 1 travels north up the draw to 8th St. and then east to the high school complex where it takes in the band hall and home economics building and travels north where it zig-zags in a northwesterly manner separating it from Precinct 2. Precinct 3 is very well defined on the map. In fact everything north of 11th St., west of the draw is precinct 3, with the exception of the elementary school block and the lines jut out to take the school and grounds into Precinct 3. Everyone living east of the draw and north of 8th St. is in Precinct 2, from these lines to those defined for Precinct 1.

Those having a question about their voting precinct need to call the tax assessor's office for more information. There will be only 2 precincts voting in the special election Dec. 10, Precincts 1 and 3. Precinct 1 voters will vote at the courthouse and precinct 3 voters will cast their ballots at the Civic Center. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Tuesday another candidate had filed for commissioner in Precinct 3, Charles Huffman, local auto parts dealer. His candidacy brought to five the number running in that precinct. Precinct 1 did not draw another name for the election over the past week.

At the present it seems that the Precinct 1 and 3 commissioners' posts will remain vacant until the election and a winning candidate is certified. Officials differ in their interpretation of section (12) in the order which declares the posts vacant and orders new elections. By state law, a candidate remains in office until another candidate is certified, but according to County Judge Johnny Jones, federal law supercedes state law, and he feels appointments to fill the posts would not be in line with the federal order.

In the same section, it provides that the precinct boundaries for the special election will be in effect only for the special election to fill the unexpired terms of Commissioners' Precincts 1 and 3. A more equitable plan, based on a special census taken recently, has been submitted to the Justice Department for approval, but there has been no ruling so far.

Those voters who have not moved their places of residence, can remember their precincts will be the same as they were before the reapportionment took place in 1974, and may vote accordingly. Those who have moved and are unable to determine what precinct they reside in, may go by the tax office for clarification.

The Senate's Deregulation Vote

WASHINGTON—The Senate's action last week deregulating newly discovered natural gas from Federal price controls may be the first positive indication government is beginning to understand the nature of energy shortages in this country.

It hasn't come any too soon. By voting to deregulate the price of natural gas, the Senate lessened the prospect that future winters like last year's will be remembered for industry layoffs, economic disruption, and fuel allocations—all because of insufficient supplies of natural gas to go around.

And contrary to what the Administration repeatedly misrepresents, deregulation of natural gas will not lead to excessive fuel bill increases as the market seeks its own price level based on the more realistic laws of supply and demand. Much more importantly, interruptions in supply will no longer pose a threat to the economy and to the everyday lives of Texans and all other Americans.

The Senate vote, 50-46, on the so-called Pearson-Bentzen amendment, is a modest but very practical measure, recognizing the twin goals of supplying the natural gas needs of the Nation on the one hand, and providing real energy security for all consumers on the other. It represents the considered judgment of a majority of the members of the Senate that the Federal price controls too long in effect have finally reached an intolerable level. And thus, the Senate vote was a vote both for the consumer and the producer.

The measure now goes to a House-Senate conference committee to iron out differences in language and undoubtedly there will be a concerted effort from the Administration and others to strike the deregulation provisions from the final bill, and keep the folly of Federal government price controls intact.

This short-sighted view would legislate needless shortages, and merely perpetuate the mistakes of the past 20 years in national energy policy.

If the Senate legislation prevails, strictures on the market will be eliminated and production can move to keep pace with the national need for gas resources. The amendment provides that new onshore natural gas would be subject to a temporary price ceiling, followed by complete deregulation at the end of a two year period. For five years, new offshore natural gas would be subject to a ceiling determined by various factors other than cost, but until that price is determined, the ceiling would be the BTU equivalent of upper tier domestic crude oil, or approximately \$1.95 per Mcf. Complete deregulation would come at the end of five years.

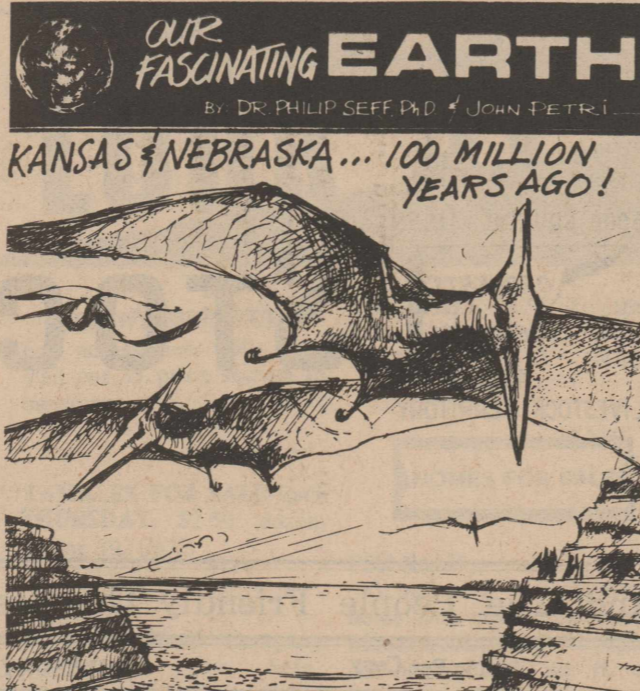
The Senate measure also provides a definition of new natural gas, maintains controls on old natural gas which now apply, provides for statutory curtailment priorities for natural gas use such as for farming, and extends the present Emergency Natural Gas Act for two years.

It is not an extreme measure, despite hysterical and irrational claims to the contrary. In point of fact, this country cannot afford any other energy policy.

AUSTIN—Two more well-known Texas names are now on the definite list of candidates for statewide office. Former State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie, who served in the State Senate from El Paso 1966-1972, announced for U.S. Senate in the Democratic primary.

Mark White Jr., a Houston lawyer who has been serving as Gov. Dolph Briscoe's secretary of state since 1973, entered the Democratic race for attorney general.

White's resignation opened another sought-after appointed position. A long line of applicants for the secretary of state's job formed quickly outside Briscoe's door.

Christie, 44, will meet U.S. Rep. Bob Krueger of New Braunfels, 41, in the senatorial primary. The winner will take on veteran U.S. Sen. John Tower in November 1978.

White, 37, collides with Price Daniel Jr., 36, 1973-74 Speaker of the House and son of former Gov. Price Daniel in the attorney general's race.

State Republican Chairman Ray Hutchison, meanwhile, formally resigned his position and reportedly has signed on a campaign consultant to make a race for governor.

James Baker III of Houston has filed forms with the secretary of state indicating an interest in running as a Republican for attorney general.

Enrollments Are Climbing

Texas college and university enrollments are up nearly four per cent over last fall. The total is expected to reach 720,679 compared with 696,005 in 1976.

Senior college campuses reported increases ranging from less than one per cent to 45 per cent. Thirty seven private senior colleges grew 2.1 percent to about 73,200.

Public community college enrollments on 56 campuses total 304,966—up 4.6 per cent over 1976. Private junior colleges declined 2.8 per cent.

Barnhart New GOP Head

Ray Barnhart of Houston was elected chairman of the state Republican party 37 votes to 26 over Collin County Judge Nathan White of Plano.

Morris Atlas of McAllen was appointed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission to succeed R. L. Thornton Jr. of Dallas who resigned.

Briscoe named 20 members to the Greater South Texas Cultural Basin Commission.

Commission Sets Hearing

The Railroad Commission ordered a December 16 hearing here on Arkansas Louisiana Gas Company's proposal to increase gas service rates in environs of 28 East Texas cities by 55.47 per cent.

Cities in the Arklia service area are Atlanta, Avinger, Bloomburg, Daingerfield, DeKalb, Douglassville, Gilmer, Hooks, Hughes Springs, Jefferson, Leary, Linden, Lone Star, Maud, Mt. Pleasant, Mt. Vernon, Naples, Nash, New Boston, Omaha, Ore City, Pittsburg, Queen City, Talco, Uncertain, Wake Village, Winfield and Winnsboro.

Texas Courts Speak

The Court of Criminal Appeals heard arguments on constitutionality of the new Texas death-by-injection law governing future executions of condemned criminals.

A steel buildings firm lost a \$331,400 death benefits suit filed against the company by families of two men killed in a collision with one of its trucks near Austin a decade ago. The Supreme Court upheld lower courts.

The high court rejected a \$52,500 damage suit in which a mother claimed a monkey's bite crippled her young daughter's finger and retarded her musical abilities.

Attorney General Opinions

It is unlawful to take shrimp from any water in Chambers, Galveston, Harris and Victoria counties within a mile of a city by use of trawl, Atty. Gen. John L. Hill held. In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

A city hall memorandum collecting information comparing wage rates in public and private employment is exempt from disclosure under the open records act. However, if a city possesses raw data on salary rates of private positions which do not reveal that the city staff has determined that those positions are comparable to the city fire-fighting positions, the raw data must be revealed.

Short Snorts

Dr. Robert B. Sheldon was removed as superintendent of Rusk State Hospital following an investigation. Dr. Robert M. Inglis, San Antonio State Hospital superintendent, will assume additional duties as acting superintendent at Rusk.

The Railroad Commission approved \$8.6 million in land reclamation bonds to cover surface damage at three of the state's largest lignite strip-mining sites—Big Brown near Dallas, Martin Lake in Panola County and Monticello in Titus and Hopkins counties.

The School Land Board and other boards for lease will hold an oil, gas and sulphur lease sale in the General Land Office February 7.

Building construction is continuing to boom, and 177 new and 196 expanded manufacturing firms were reported during the first three quarters of 1977.



Q: I understand that a married woman can retain her maiden name as well as take on her married name. How can this legally be done?

improve her husband's home.

A: In choosing whether to use a married or maiden name, a wife's choice should take into consideration the effect on creditors. Merchants and other business institutions base their credit transactions on the name given when credit is established. State law provides a simple procedure for filing a name change petition in district court if a wife wishes to stop using her married name and begin using her maiden name. If the wife is merely continuing to use her maiden name after marriage, no court order is necessary.

Q: My husband left me a year ago and moved to another state. I have no money to pay for a divorce. I'm elderly and ill and my friends urge me to borrow money to obtain a divorce since my husband is completely irresponsible and I might be held liable for his debts and any other problems he gets into. What should I do?

A: A wife may be liable for her husband's debts. Creditors attempting to collect a husband's debts would have to obtain a court judgment to be met by a levy against the wife's property, depending on the amount of the wife's property eligible for such a levy. A divorce would relieve the wife of further liability. Legal aid offices or lawyer referral services could help resolve problems concerning legal fees.

Q: When my father passed away, he left a home to my mother in a will. After she remarried, she sold the home and invested the proceeds in improvements to her husband's home. If she should pass away before her husband, would her children by her first marriage be entitled to recover any of the investment? If the husband's home is sold without the children's consent, could the sale be voided?

A: Unlike some states, Texas does not have a law of forced heirship requiring property to be left to children. Property received by a mother from her relatives would be her separate property and could be left by will to her husband or anyone else, denying her son any claim on the property.

A: A wife's children from a previous marriage could not prevent the sale of her and her second husband's home. If these children wished to claim a right to improvements to the home financed by the wife's separate property, their recourse would be to bring a suit for judgment against the husband to recover the wife's separate holdings used to

Now is the time to observe colorful shrubs and trees that you may want to add to your new and growing plants. A portion of the landscape should be plants with fall in mind, considering colorful flowers and foliage.

Available are many fine plants with brilliant fall color that are attractive during the entire year. One is "Autumn Sunset" American red maple (acer rubrum), which rivals the older varieties of sugar maples and grows faster in the south.

Though fruit trees may not live too long here, the "Bradford" pear leaves make a colorful fall show and the mass of white spring blooms gives an extra bonus. Fruit will set from this tree if planted within 200 feet of other pear trees.

Three other Southern Charmers are from the evergreen family Rapiholepis (Indian Hawthorn). Varieties 1. "Magestic Beauty" R. has a strong branching habit covered by huge foliage with spectacular springtime display of large, soft pink apple blossoms. 2. "Enchantress" R. for border plantings, planter boxes, patio containers or mass plantings, displays masses of rich pink blooms. It has tight branching habit on a low mounding form. 3. "Springtime" R. is a medium sized shrub, a size between the above varieties, with a profusion of rich pink blooms on graceful branches. This variety does well here.

Your mums still need care with regular attention during this time of no rain. If you have been fertilizing each week continue to do so until color shows.

If you are planning to move a native tree or shrub this winter, tag it now while leaves are still on the plant and you can easily identify it. Be sure to select a site location as near like the one it has grown in.

This year the mood is soft gathers. Styles are soft blouses, dirndl skirts, ruffled trims or dresses that hang gently from the shoulder. Fabrics are featherweight knits, challis, crepe de chine or flannel. But gathers are the major structural detail. These tips will help make gathering easier and attractive:

For even and small folds, use a stitch that is only as long as necessary. Woven or knitted fabrics that are thick and closely constructed usually need longer stitches than do woven or knitted fabrics that are lightweight and loosely constructed.

When gathering heavy or bulky fabrics, stitch to each seamline, stop and start again on the other side of the seam. Push seam allowances to the opposite side so that the gathering stitches can go all the way to the seamline. To gather a long area, divide into several sections that can be drawn separately.

Before drawing up the gathers, pin the matching notches or seamlines together. Draw the gathering threads to fit the area. Distribute the fullness evenly.

The gather with a straight stitch can be done by first slightly loosening the upper tension so the bobbin thread will draw easier. Use heavy duty bobbin thread such as silk or nylon to minimize breakage. Run two rows of stitching for better control and evenness. Stitch from the right side. If ripped stitches leave their marks in the fabric, stitch along the seamline and again 1/4" within the seam allowance. If ripped stitches don't show, consider making each row of stitches 1/8" on each side of the seamline.

To gather with a zigzag, adjust the machine for medium to wide stitch width. Place fabric under pressure foot wrong side up. Take one stitch through the fabric so that all zigzagging will be within the seam allowance but next to the seamline. Pull the bobbin thread up through the fabric. Pull both the bobbin and top threads together to be the length of the area to be gathered. Zigzag over these threads without catching them in the stitches. Gather by pulling the encased threads.

CARROT-APPLE SALAD
Makes 6 servings, 1/2 cup each

- 1 large carrot, shredded
- 3 cups diced apples
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice, if desired
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- Combine ingredients and mix well.

- CABBAGE-APPLE SALAD**
6 servings, 1/2 cup each
- 2 cups shredded cabbage
 - 2 cups diced apples
 - 1/2 cup salad dressing
 - 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 - 1 teaspoon sugar
 - 2 tbs. silvered almonds, toasted
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - Combine ingredients and mix well.

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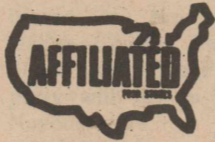
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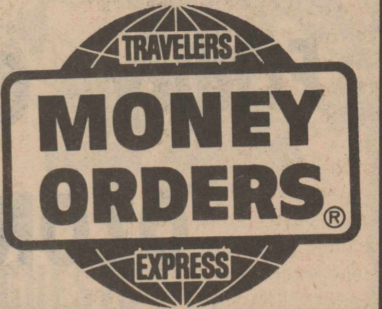

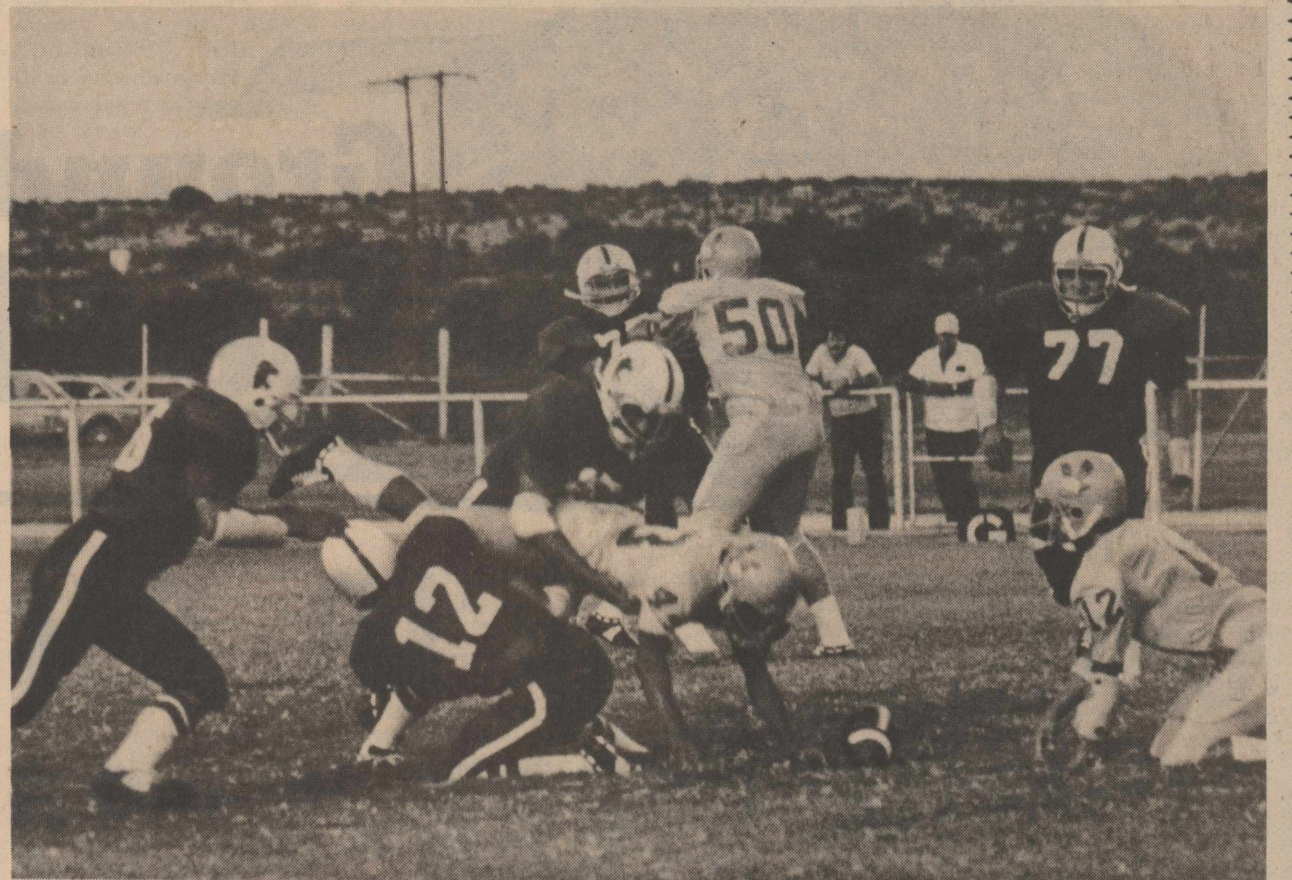

Public Notice

ORDER

In accordance with the order entered on July 12, 1977 the Court hereby enters final judgment as follows:

- (1) That this Court has jurisdiction of this action pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1973j (f) and 28 U.S.C. §§1343 and 1345.
- (2) That the plaintiffs sue individually and as residents of Crockett County, Texas; and the individual defendants are officials of Crockett County, Texas.
- (3) That the defendants are sued in their individual and official capacities.
- (4) That voting changes enacted or sought to be administered within Crockett County, Texas after November 1, 1972, are subject to the preclearance requirements of Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended.
- (5) That Crockett County adopted a plan on August 12, 1974, reapportioning the County's Commissioners' Precincts. Said plan was amended November 10, 1975.
- (6) That Crockett County's reapportionment plan constitutes a change affecting voting within the meaning of Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 1973c.
- (7) That before Crockett County may implement said change, it must obtain a declaratory judgment from the United States District Court for the District of Columbia that the change "does not have the purpose and will not have the effect of denying or abridging the right to vote on account of race or color or in contravention of the guarantees set forth in Section 4(f)(2), "except that such change may be implemented if it has been submitted to the Attorney General and he has not interposed an objection within 60 days.
- (8) That the defendants have not obtained a declaratory judgment from the District Court for the District of Columbia.
- (9) That the defendants submitted the reapportionment plan to the Attorney General pursuant to Section 5 and the Attorney General, within the 60-day period prescribed by statute, interposed an objection to the implementation of the reapportionment plan.
- (10) That the reapportionment plan of Crockett County adopted on August 12, 1974

is legally unenforceable since it has not received Section 5 preclearance.

(11) That notwithstanding the fact that the voting change occasioned by the reapportionment has not met the preclearance requirements of Section 5, the defendants implemented the plan in primary elections May 1, 1976 and June 5, 1976, and in the general election November 2, 1976 for the offices of members of the Commissioners Court from Precincts One and Three.

(12) That because the offices of members of the Commissioners Court for Precincts One and Three were elected pursuant to a legally unenforceable apportionment plan, they are declared vacant and new elections are ordered to be held under the plan of apportionment in effect as of November 1, 1972, according to the following schedule attached as Exhibit "A". Provided however that such schedule shall be in effect only for the election to fill the unexpired terms of Commissioners' Precincts One (1) and Three (3).

(13) That the defendants are enjoined from implementing any reapportionment plan or other voting change unless and until the voting change has satisfied the preclearance requirements of Section 5.

(14) All questions relating to attorney's fees will be subject to a subsequent order.

SCHEDULE "A"

A. The opening date for candidate qualifications shall begin at 7:00 o'clock A.M. on the day following the date of this Order, and shall continue until 6:00 o'clock P.M. on the 8th day of November, 1977.

B. The period for the request of an absentee vote by mail shall begin with the date of this Order and continue until 5:00 o'clock P.M. on the 6th day of December, 1977. To be counted, such ballot must be received not later than 5:00 o'clock P.M. on the 6th day of December, 1977.

C. The period for absentee

voting by personal appearance shall begin on November 20, 1977, at 7:00 o'clock A.M. and end on December 6, 1977, at 5:00 o'clock P.M.

D. The first election shall be held on December 10, 1977, from 7:00 o'clock A.M. to 7:00 o'clock P.M. The Writ of Election for this election shall be sent out by the County Judge on or before November 21, 1977, and the notice for said election shall be posted at the Courthouse and in the manner prescribed in Article 4.05 of Vernon's Texas Election Code on or before November 18, 1977.

E. Not later than the 12th day of December, 1977, the Commissioners Court shall canvass the returns of the election and declare the results. If one person has received a majority of the votes cast at the election, the County Judge shall immediately make out, sign, and deliver a certificate of election to him for the unexpired term of the office for which he was a candidate.

If no candidate has received a majority of the votes cast at the election, there shall be a second election on the 7th day of January, 1978; and the Commissioners Court shall immediately after the canvass of the December 10, 1977, election certify to the County Clerk the names of the two candidates who are eligible to participate in the second election, and the clerks shall make up the ballot for election according to the certificate. Notice of the second election shall be given in the manner provided by law, and the County Judge shall notify each presiding Judge of his duty to hold the election. The returns of the second election shall be canvassed and the results declared in the same manner as provided for the first election, and the County Judge shall issue to the candidate who receives the largest number of votes in the second election a certificate of election to the unexpired term of the office for which he was a candidate.

F. In the event of a second election the period for request for an absentee ballot by mail shall begin the day after the canvass of the returns of the first election and must be received by the County Clerk not later than 5:00 P.M. on the 3rd day of January, 1978.

G. If a second election is held, the period for absentee voting by personal appearance shall begin on December 17, 1977, at 7:00 o'clock A.M. and end on January 3, 1978, at 7:00 o'clock P.M.

H. Any person who shall receive a certificate of elec-

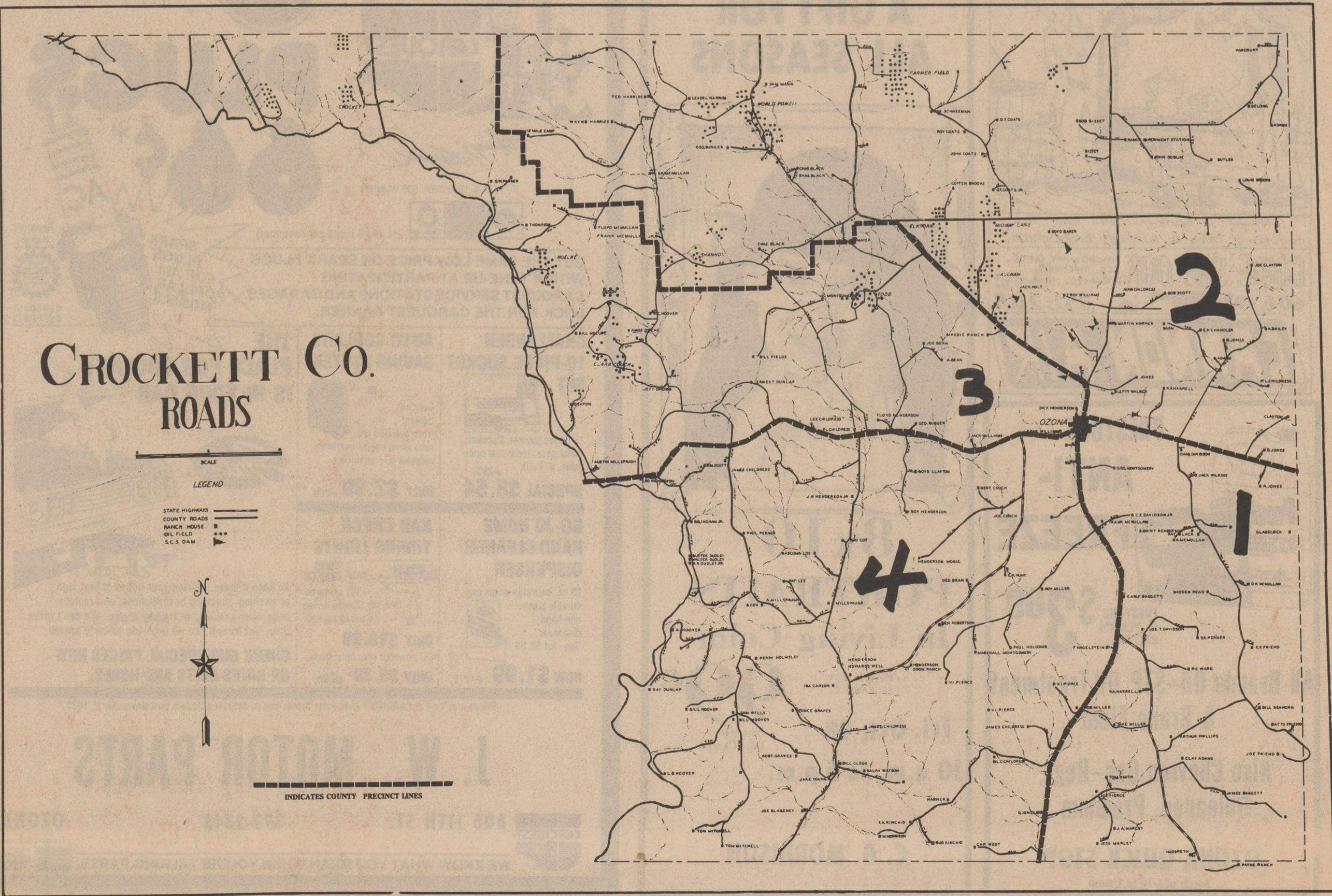
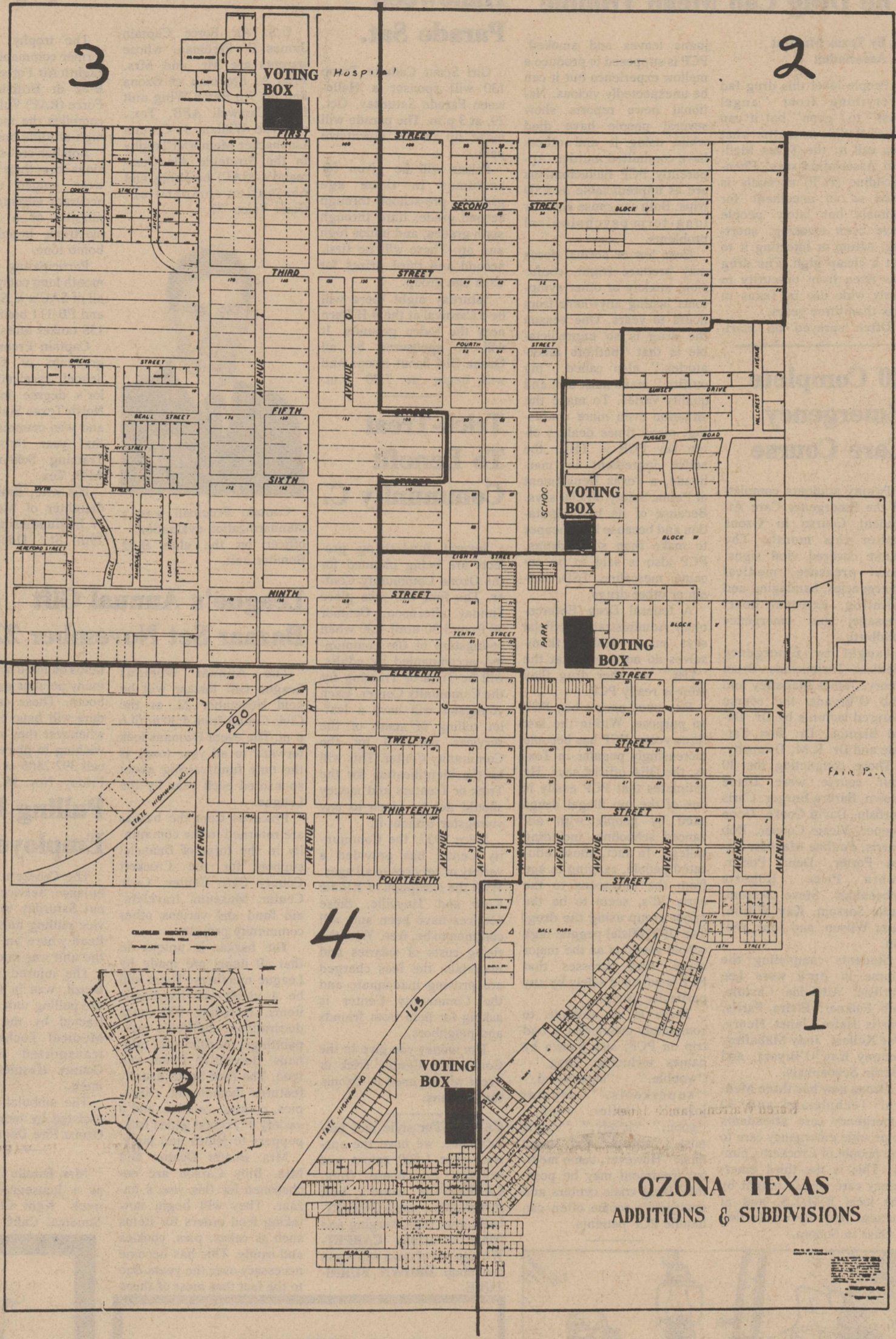
tion from the County Judge shall take and assume office immediately upon receipt of such certificate.

Angel Dust' Or Whatever, The Drug Can Mean Trouble

People label this drug fad everything from "angel dust" to "goon" but it can mean trouble no matter what you call it, the Texas Medical Association says. Phenylcyclidine (PCP) normally is used as an anesthetic for animals but lately people have been smoking, snorting, eating or injecting it to get a cheap high. The drug has risen from obscurity to fairly wide use in Texas in less than three years.

Even low or normal doses may produce fright, confusion, anxiety or other symptoms lasting anywhere from hours to years. One reason the drug is so unpredictable is that "bathtub laboratories," also called "pig outfits," make most of it and quality varies. To make the situation even more confusing, many times dealers often say PCP is THC, the active ingredient in marijuana, a Texas Department of Public Safety official says. Because of its bad reputation and because it is cheaper to make than some drugs, PCP also is said to be cocaine, mescaline, LSD, heroin or other drugs.

20 Complete Emergency Care Course

Twenty students completed the Emergency Care Attendant Course in Ozona earlier this month. The course covered vital signs, blood pressure, medical emergencies, bandaging and splinting, external heart massage, and emergency childbirth.

Taught by Emergency Medical Technicians Brian Henry, James Mahaffey and Dub O'Bryant, the course featured lectures by Dr. David Blanton, Dr. Don Carlisle and Dr. R.M. Owensby. Those completing the 30 hour course were Diane Brown, Barbra Burger, Chris Carlisle, David Cooke, Gene Cooper, Vickie Cooper, Bob Harris, Pauline Maness, David Porter, Dena Porter, Debra Price, Roberta Schoenhals, Steve Sessom, Jodie Sessom, Kay Wilson, Buzz Wilson, and Jene Wilton.

Students completing the course in April were Lee Carlisle, Adelaide Castulo, Bob Falkner, Elvira Farris, Dorris Haire, Janet Henry, Dee Keilers, Judy Mahaffey, Tommy Kay O'Bryant, and Merlin Schoenhals.

Ozona now has three Medical Technicians and 30 Emergency care attendants to provide emergency care to the people of Crockett County. This is the third emergency care course taught by the local E.M.T.S. and at present they are conducting a class in Sonora.

A federal Drug Enforcement Administration official says many dealers themselves do not know that the "THC" or other drug they offer is really PCP. But many people buy PCP on purpose. Within the last three years, PCP has become increasingly popular in Texas, the DEA official says. He estimates that PCP easily is one of the top illegal drugs used by people with advanced schooling, including college. In fact, these educated people, ranging in age from the mid-teens to the early 30's, seem to be the major group using the drug. The DPS official pegged high school students as the major users. Both stresses that PCP is not used solely by any particular group.

There is no antidote to completely counteract a bad trip on PCP, also known by names including "hog," "wobble," "superweed," "superkools," "crystal joint," "killer week," "goon," "lovely," "magic mist," "sheets," and "angel dust." However, some medical treatment may be possible. Drug crisis centers and emergency rooms often can handle PCP patients.

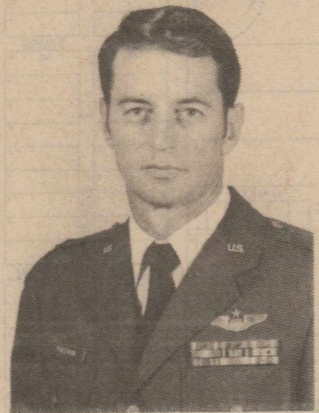

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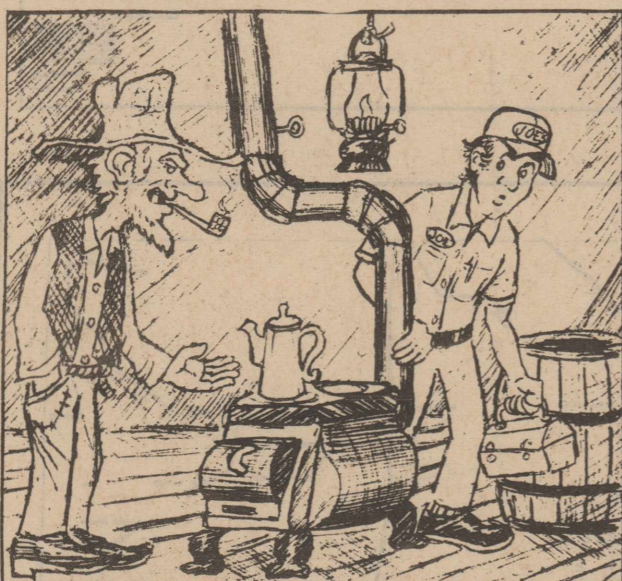

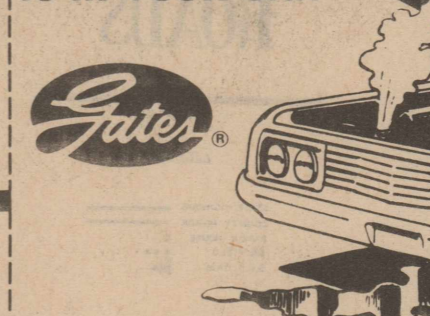

Machine Embroidery Creative Art

Freehand machine embroidery is one of the most popular creative pastimes. It is fast, easy and fun to do. With practice, you can develop skills to embroider just about anything, says Beverly Rhoades, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

For freehand embroidering, clean and oil your sewing machine, remove the pressure foot and lower the feed dogs (or cover with metal plates, depending on the features of your sewing machine). Choose a tightly woven fabric for freehand embroidery, the specialist says.

While regular thread may be used, machine embroidery thread (size 30, 50 or 60) may give a fuller, nicer look. To accommodate larger thread, use a size 14 or 16 (90 or 100) needle. Beginners may want to use polyester or cotton-covered polyester thread to help eliminate thread breakage. As skill is developed, cotton embroidery thread gives a beautiful luster to the finished product.

Less expensive, white basting thread is appropriate for the bobbin unless stitching will show from both sides.

To prevent puckering in freehand embroidery, use an embroidery hoop. Choose one that is large enough to provide a good working surface, but small enough to maneuver easily. A plastic or wooden hoop with an adjustable screw is best. Avoid metal hoops which may damage the machine and hoops that will not hold fabric tightly. The fabric should be tight enough to sound like a drum when it is tapped.

Supermarket Prices To Remain Stable

Expect fairly stable supermarket prices for the rest of the year, says Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist. Pork is trending down, along with adequate supplies of fresh seasonal vegetables and a number of fresh fruits--with apples in the lead.

Pork--as the supply increases--costs slightly less: Boston butt and loin-end roasts, shoulder steaks, quarter-loin cut into chops, liver and roll sausage. In beef, aside from ground beef, features are chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks and beef liver.

In poultry and dairy products: egg supplies are ample--at least until holiday baking time, and currently Grade A large eggs are the best buy. Prices on fryers are reasonable, and turkey parts are low priced in some markets. Also, some dairy departments feature yogurt, sour cream and a variety of cheeses.

In produce, dry onions--now in good supply--cost less, along with new-crop cabbage and potatoes in 5, 8 and/or 15 pound bags. Broccoli, cooking greens, sweet potatoes and hard and soft shell squash are good buys. Also carrots, cauliflower and pumpkins. And in canned vegetables, features are corn and all tomato products.

Apples are the main attraction at most fruit counters. Cranberries--of excellent quality--are priced about the same as last year, and Texas grapefruit is increasing in supply and in sugar content. Oranges are generally best priced by-the-bag; red grapes are in good supply and have attractive price tags.

Consumer Watchwords
Here are some "apple figures":

- one bushel=42 pounds
- one bushel=96 to 144 medium size apples
- one pound=2 large, 3 medium or 4 small apples
- 6 to 8 medium size apples= one 9" pie or 3 cups sauce

Bad Grades May Mean Poor Health

Is your child having trouble keeping up his or her grades in school?

The American Medical Association points out that there may be a physical reason for the poor record.

Does the child squint, strain, rub his eyes or complain that they hurt, water or itch? Does he hold his book very close to his face when he reads? Has it been some time since his last eye examination? He may have defective vision. He may not be able to read the teacher's notes on the blackboard.

Does he often ask you to repeat a question or statement? Does he sometimes miss, or seem to miss, a point made in a movie or on television by the spoken word? Does he turn his head to one side as he listens? He may have defective hearing. It might be as simple as impacted wax in the ears, which can be removed by your physician in a simple office procedure. Of course, the inattentive child may have no hearing problem at all. Children know we will repeat the question or instruction, thus encouraging a habit of not listening.

Has he had an infection, disease or accident whose effects may be lingering on? Is there a possibility that poor nutrition may be holding him back? He may be eating considerable quantities of food and still be undernourished, if he eats improperly, or if his tastes in food are too limited.

If your child isn't performing properly in his school work, ask yourself whether it is time for an examination to determine whether his problems are caused by a physical problem that might be corrected.

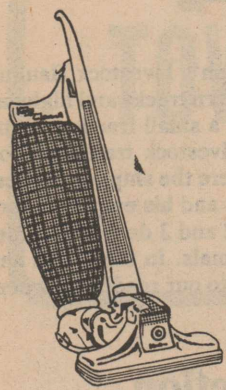

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — Most people mistake the whole of psychology for the one portion of that discipline that studies abnormal behavior, the chairman of The University of Texas Psychology Department says. While everybody is fascinated with abnormal psychology, says Dr. Phillip Gough, what is really "remarkable" is normal behavior. He says, for example, "people should be equally mystified that we can recognize a face of a friend." Many of UT Austin's experimental laboratories in psychology are set up to study such normal behavior as how humans read, hear and sleep, or how their eyes adapt to light and dark.

Bobcat Is Major Topic Of TS&GRA Discussion

The bobcat was a major topic of discussion during the predatory animal committee session at the recent Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association meeting in Junction.

TS&GRA executive secretary Bill Sims told committee members that the current proposal to add the bobcat to the Endangered Species list is apparently undergoing gratifyingly tough sledding, though the fight can in no way be considered over. Even if that proposal is defeated, another slightly less drastic but nevertheless damaging plan is afoot.

Letters to the Interior Department commenting on the endangered species inclusion move are so far running against the proposal, Sims said. In addition, the relatively long comment period allowed by Interior suggests that the department itself is none too keen on the idea, either. Most plans favored by Interior are rushed through rapidly, he explains, opposition forces often being granted only a month to voice disagreement. Still, producers are urged to write the department before Nov. 1, to help insure the proposal's defeat.

County Gains Gas Producer Another Set

One Crockett County field was re-opened and a re-entry and a confirmer were slated in other fields.

Clearfork oil production was re-opened in the Ozona, North multipay field of Crockett County with dual completion of Tamarack Petroleum Co., Inc., Midland, No. 4-13 Hoover, Canyon sand gas producer, 25 miles south-southwest of the depleted Clearfork opener but separated by Clearfork oil production in the Refoil, Ozona and Ozona, Southwest fields and 15 miles southwest of Ozona, to pump 42 barrels of 35 gravity oil, plus seven barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 643-1.

Production was through perforations at 3,009-033 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons and fractured with 36,000 gallons and 42,000 pounds of sand. It was finaled from the Canyon for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,850,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 20,16-1, through perforations at 6,480 502 feet.

Drilled to 6,651 feet, 5 1/2-inch casing was set at 6,589 feet, the plugged back depth. Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 13-R-TCRR.

Continental Oil Co. will re-enter and plug back 1,500 feet for recompletion attempt as the second current Queen gas producer and a one-mile south extension to that pay, separated by the depleted Queen gas opener, at its No. 14-A J.M. Shannon, former Ellenburger oil producer, in the Elkhorn field, 14 miles northwest of Ozona.

Location is 2,003 feet from the north and 2,069 feet from the east lines of 22-UV-GC&SF.

The queen re-opener, the firm's No. 18-A J.M. Shannon, also a former Ellenburger oil producer, was re-completed Jan. 21 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4,900,000 cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 1,158-73 feet.

Juveniles Arrested In Club Breakin

Several juveniles were arrested about 1:00 a.m., Sat. as they were attempting to break in the golf cart sheds at the country club. They were taken to the Crockett County Jail and turned over to their parents.

Several nights before the cart sheds were broken into, and several carts heavily damaged as they were raced across the golf course in the dead of the night. After the incident, a stake-out was placed on duty at the club and as expected, the young vandals showed up, only to be caught before further damage was done.

There will be someone on duty throughout the night in the future.

If defeated, the proposal could always be resurrected at a later date, and meanwhile a lightly watered down attempt to curtail bobcat control is already rearing its head. Offered for comment by the federal Endangered Species Scientific Authority, this measure would ban export of bobcat furs. The rationale for this regulation, and also the strongest argument against it from the sheep and goat producers' standpoint, is the fact that Europe is the ultimate market for almost all the bobcat furs taken in the United States.

Sealing access to this market would virtually eliminate the fur price structure currently existing. The end result would be to curtail private trapping for bobcats by making their skins almost worthless. With increasingly restrictive limitations on predator control methods, producers have come to view private fur trappers as essential allies; the producer alone simply cannot afford the manpower and expense necessary for control with the tools he is allowed to use.

Sims said that if the ban goes through, a court injunction against it might be effective, but acquiring the injunction would probably be too expensive in itself.

He favored an attempt to take off a little heat-head the ban off at the pass, as it were. Both Sims and Extension Service wildlife specialist Milo Shult suggested placing the bobcat on the fur-bearer list; a classification that would allow bobcat control year-round but would limit sale of furs to a certain period of the year. Shult described the plan as good public relations-evidence that ranchers favor responsible environmental concerns. After all, ranchers are increasingly viewing themselves as the only realistic environmentalists left in the country.

Such a measure would also set up the mechanism for taking an accountable bobcat census-a must if we are ever faced with proving to the unenlightened that the bobcat is indeed safe from extinction in Texas.

TS&GRA Has High Numbers At Predatory Animal Meet

The Predatory Animal Committee session was one of the best attended committee gatherings at the recent Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association meeting in Junction.

Milton Caroline, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service official in charge of predator control in Texas, told committee members that appropriations from the State of Texas for the joint state-federal control program have increased by \$100,000, but added that changes in the program swallowed up the extra money and then some.

Caroline explained that per diem expense allowances for trappers had been raised from \$22 to \$30, and the mileage reimbursements had also increased. The mile-

age rate increase was not accompanied by an increase in the total mileage that personnel could claim, however, meaning that many trappers were still having to make up mileage expenses out of their own pockets.

Those pockets received a little aid in the form of increased salaries, said Caroline, though the raise was not enough to run much danger of fueling the nation's inflation problem.

Caroline left the impression that the combined increases would fall short of providing individual trappers with a large personal fortune after taxes, but he said the increased costs combined with the lower-than-requested state appropriation meant less expansion and program improvements.

In the final analysis, he explained, the program was actually \$22,000 poorer than it had been, rather than \$100,000 richer. Federal appropriations remain about steady.

Caroline also outlined a problem the service has been experiencing with the M-44, primarily due to a breakdown in quality control.

The springs used in the device to eject sodium cyanide are too weak, he said, and clearances in the units' barrels are not being precisely maintained. The springs, originally designed to carry 40 pound tension, must now rate as high as 65 pounds to work properly, due to drag from the inaccurate barrel measurements. In reality, however, Caroline says the springs being placed in the units actually offer no more than about 30 pounds of thrust. As a result, he said, "We have cases where a coyote trips the unit and it doesn't fire for several minutes."

Committee members, responding to Caroline's review of the predator control program's financial status, proposed a resolution called for county extension agents to receive predator control training before being assigned their counties. Their reasoning was that a withdrawal of federal funds from the program would mean the loss of numerous trappers. The

federal share of the program is an estimated 25-30 percent. They fear such a withdrawal sometime in the future because of the increasingly pro-predator, anti-livestock attitudes taken by various federal officials.

Terrell County Agent Ellis Helmers reported on the success of predator control projects by his county's 4-H program.

"We've had several of our boys and girls catch more predators than the adult trappers, and many ranchers have said that their kids are teaching them new things about the art of trapping." Helmers explained that the youngsters are scored on a point system and must maintain records on all predators taken as well as the method in which they are taken.

Trapping, he said, offers them a way to earn money as well as develop a skill that they've "got to learn if they're going to stay in the livestock business when they grow up." Naturally, the program also benefits livestock producers now, since a predator taken by a youngster is just as deceased as one taken by an adult.

Vegetable Growers Told National Support Necessary

"We had all better realize that our nation's very economic survival depends on the support and help we give farms and ranches--not 10 years down the road, but today."

This message was expressed Thursday by State Representative Joe A. Hubenak of Rosenberg, Chairman of the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee and Texas' foremost authority on agriculture.

Hubenak, candidate for Agriculture Commissioner of Texas, who addressed the first annual meeting of the Texas Vegetable Association here, said he could think of "no point more important than to educate all Americans to the fact that we are all in this together."

"Those of us in agriculture," Hubenak said, "find ourselves in a rather awkward situation. On one hand we have achieved miracles in production. The American people enjoy the highest standard of living of anywhere in the world because of our agricultural abundance and efficiency."

"Yet at the same time, we find ourselves in trouble. Our farm prices have declined by almost 10 percent in a year. Production costs have risen by 5 percent. A great many of our agricultural producers are in trouble today because of this financial squeeze that threatens them."

Hubenak said he is "convinced that agriculture has a bright future."

There are five items, Hubenak said, that he thinks Texas agriculture is definitely going to need in the 21st Century to maintain a high incentive to produce.

"Those items," Hubenak continued, "are qualified agricultural leaders; expansion and development of more

markets, both domestic and foreign; additional agricultural research; taxation of agricultural lands, stressing their productive value rather than their speculative value; and assuring that young people interested in farming and ranching can secure adequate credit to finance their operations."

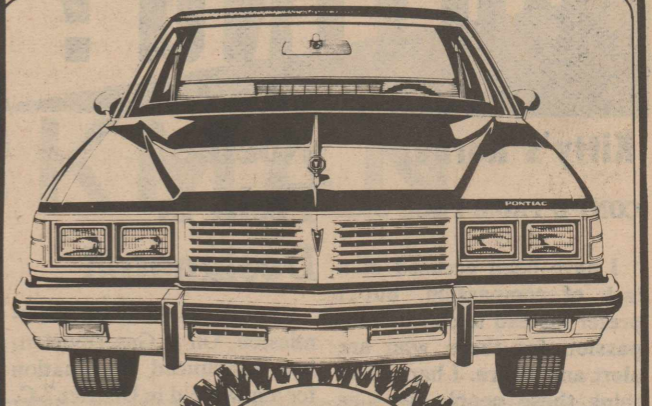
The Commissioner of Agriculture in Texas can be a tremendous help in "assuring that our state successfully cultivates these five areas," Hubenak reminded. The selection of the next Commissioner of Agriculture must not be taken lightly, for he can assert a positive influence in the development of agriculture in Texas," Hubenak stated.

Hubenak has been Chairman of the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee for the last six years.

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Cattle Feed Picture Is Improving

The cattle feeding picture is brightening somewhat due to an improved fed cattle market and declining grain prices, says a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Thus, cow-calf producers might want to consider feeding their calves or yearlings this year," says Dr. Ed Uvacek. "If they do, they need to remember to carefully price the feeders at current market prices, instead of at their actual cost."

Due to reduced calf supplies, producers will likely be paying higher prices for light-weight feeders. However, Uvacek cautions producers not to overpay.

"A 400-pound animal bought for \$4 more per hundredweight than a 600-pound animal has a higher break-even cost when finished if the cost per pound of gain is about the same. At current feeder prices, if the cost per pound of gain is more than 38 cents, even a \$2 premium for the lighter weight animal might mean a higher break-even price," emphasizes Uvacek.

For comparison, Uvacek offers some break-even figures for producers interested in feeding calves. The break-even price of a 400-pound feeder bought at \$40 per hundredweight would be \$37.39 if the cost of gain was 36 cents, \$38.70 if the cost of gain was 38 cents, and \$40 if the cost of gain was 40 cents. For the same weight feeder bought at \$44, the break-even price at the three different costs of gain would be \$38.78, \$40.09 and \$41.39, respectively.

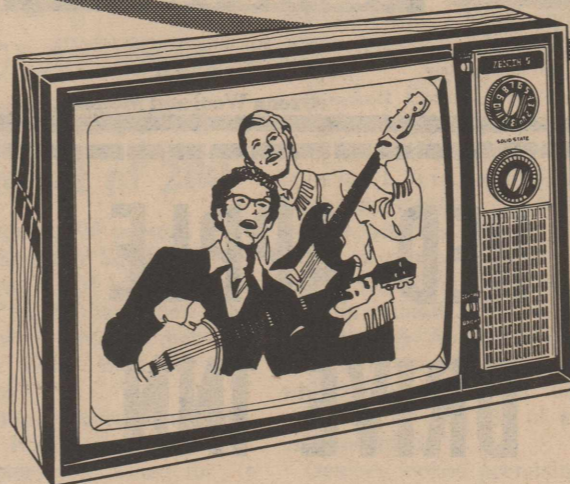

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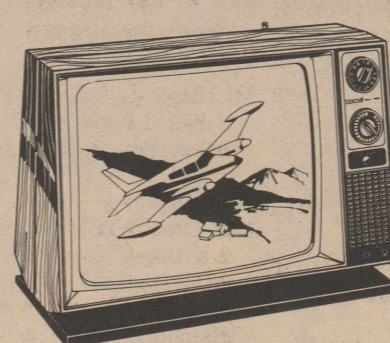
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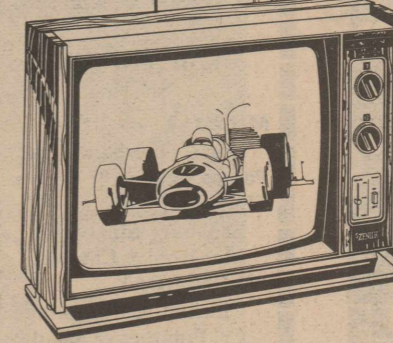
