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DIAL 473-2131 BRONTE, TEXAS particulary peach trees. Trees such as peach, particulary the peach, should be pruned in the period from January 15 to February 15. As long as the buds are not pushing and the sap is not rising you can pru-

ne with no problems. In pruning peaches, the recommended procedure is to shape the tree like a wagon wheel (if you were looking down from the top) with an opening in the center of the top of the tree. Then take out 1/2 to 2/3 of last years growth. Leave one-third to produce this years well watered and fertilized and a late freeze does not get the fruit, this will help insure a good crop year after

While I am on fruit trees, if you are bothered with scale (mainly) on pecans) now is a good time to spray with dormant oil. Do this before the buds push and get

Also, many people are bothered with curculio and twig borers in their peaches. You need to get ready to start spraying for these insects when the peaches are blooming. If you would like a copy of the "Homeowners Fruit and Nut Spray Schedule", give us a ring. It does not have all the answers, but it does include information on curculio control.

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

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Tips from a pro on driving to survive.

Q: Just out of curiosity, how many miles of roads are in the Texas highway system? -R. Q., Midland

A: A lot of miles. The Texas highway system includes 71,558 miles of designated highways, of which 40,504 are farm-to-market and ranch-to market roads. Along the way are 1,100 roadside rest areas to help you avoid fatigue on long trips. (Experts recommend a brief rest stop at least once every two hours.) And there are 700,000 signs and markers to tell you stop, slow down, speed up, turn, don't turn, and which way is Dallas . . .

Q: What do I do if my car has a blowout while driving at high speed? —B.B., Austin

A: Don't slam on the breaks, which might make you lose control completely. Grip the steering wheel firmly to guide the car on a straight path. Ease up on the gas pedal slowly, not suddenly. When the car has slowed down, pump lightly on the brake; then when things are well under control, the car running slowly, pull gently off the

Q: Are there special precautions, besides not smoking, to take when cleaning things with gasoline?-M.M., Dallas

A: The main precaution is to never use gasoline as a cleaner. Or a solvent. Or a charcoal starter. Gasoline is dangerous, tricky stuff. It vaporizes easily and the invisible vapors are heavier than air. They can spread along along the floor for quite a distance to a water heater, electric motor, car engine. If you use gasoline anyway, for heaven's sake don't stay in the garage but get outside into a well ventilated, open space. Never refill a small engine, like your lawnmower, when it is running or still hot. The heat can ignite the vapors. If you store gasoline, buy a safety can. Never carry extra gasoline in your car trunk.

ter series on Save Home Energy currently offered to Coke County residents by the county Extension office.

"As much as 30-50 percent utility reduction

can be realized by carring out a complete project on a poorly or partially weatherized home--and this letter series tells them how," Miss Kathy L. Jobe, Coke County Extension Agent, said.

"This letter series discusses insulation, ventilation and moisture control, caulking and weatherstripping, treatment of windows and other glass areas and heating and cooling", she said. The series, Save Home Energy, is available from Miss Jobe by writing P.O. Box 186, Robert Lee, Texas 76945 or by phoning 453-2461.

"The letters--mailed weekly-will discuss selection, installation and maintenance of each topic and features products that will reduce utility consumption while increasing personal comfort", the agent said.


