Dedication of the 1979 Corral, Robert Lee year-book, was made at an assembly program last week with Jerry Gibbs, High School principal, receiving this year's honor.

Annual staff members released the following dedication statement:

"This year the annual staff has chosen to dedicate the 1979 Corral to a most deserving person. Mr. Jerry Gibbs has served us as principal of Robert Lee High School for the past seven years.

Weaver said the date of his leaving is pending, but he said, "Hopefully, I will be here until a replacement can be named."

Pre-K Day Set For Thursday

Pre-Kindergarten Day will be Thursday, May 3, from 8:45 to 11:45 a.m. at Robert Lee Elementary School. Children who will be five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1979, are eligible to attend the morning of activities and enroll in kindergarten next fall.

Parents are requested to bring the child's birth certificate and immunization records, which will be given to Prin. Bill Hood or Mrs. Joyce Rives at a meeting in the school cafeteria at 9 a.m.

Children should be brought to the kindergarten classroom at 8:45. They will be served a complimentary lunch at 11 o'clock and picked up from the kindergarten playground at 11:45 a.m.

Coke County commissioners' court in a called meeting last Friday morning voted unanimously to call a \$400,000 bond election to provide funds for seal-coating and repairing streets and roads in the county. The election will be held May 22 in all six voting boxes of the county.

County Judge D.W. Sims presided at the meeting. Also present were Bob Davis and Pat McMiccan, representatives of Fred Baker & Associates of Amarillo, the county's financial consultant. About 10 interested citizens were present.

Judge Sims read a letter from Mayor James A. Tidwell of Bronte, that the bond issue has the support of the Bronte city council. Mayor Robert Vaughan of Robert Lee was present and added the blessing of the Robert Lee city council to the proposal. Both mayors cited the deteriorating condition of streets in the cities and said they were not equipped to make

the needed repairs.

Davis explained payment schedules which were worked out by his firm. He said Coke County should be able to sell the bonds at a very favorable rate of interest, since the financial condition of the county is excellent. He noted that the county has more than enough

money in its interest and sinking fund to pay off the balance owed on the 1972 bond issue, which is the only indebtedness the county has.

Davis explained that the present 15 cents per \$100 valuation which has been allocated to the interest and sinking fund should provide sufficient revenue to pay off the new bonds in 10 years, with no increase in taxes.

The county entered into an agreement with Fred Baker & Associates to serve as financial consultants in taking care of issuance and sale of the bonds.

The bond issue will provide money for new paving on 11 blocks in Robert Lee and five in Bronte.

Hospital Seeks Tax Base Change

Members of the board of directors of West Coke County Hospital District hope to get a bill through the current session of the Texas Legislature which will give them more latitude in the assessment of taxes for the district.

Fern Havins, president of the board, and Carl Weaver, administrator of the district, were to go to Austin Wednesday to confer with Sen. W.E. (Pete) Snelson and Rep. Mike Ezzell about introduction and passage of the bill in the two houses of the legislature.

Weaver said this week that the proposed change did not necessarily mean a raise in taxes in the district, "but it will remove some of the restrictions contained in the statute which created the hospital district."

The original bill is very restrictive in the matter of valuations and tax rates and the directors hope the new bill, if passed, will give them more leeway in the operation of the hospital and nursing home.

Pet Vaccination Today at R-Lee

The Coke County 4-H Clubs will be sponsoring a rabies vaccination clinic at the Robert Lee park Friday, (today) April 27. Dr. Allen Williams, D.V.M., of San Angelo, will be present to immunize pets against rabies. Dr. Williams stated he would bring a few doses of distemper vaccine and DHL vaccine in case someone would want a pet vaccinated to prevent these diseases.

Everyone is encouraged to have pets immunized against rabies. A few cases have been showing up in West Texas. All pets should be vaccinated annually unless other conditions have been specified by a particular veterinarian.

Dr. Williams will also vaccinate horses for sleeping sickness while he is here if anyone wishes to bring a horse by the park.

Move Clock Up Saturday Night

Sunday will be a 23 hour day for Coke Countians, since it is the day to begin Daylight Saving Time. Actually, clocks should be advanced one hour before you retire Saturday night, since the official time for the change is at 2 a.m. on the last Sunday in April. The lost hour will be regained on the last Sunday in October when everybody will have a 25 hour day.

Persons who forget to make the change will be an hour late for any activity Sunday morning.

Daylight Saving Time was begun during World War II to allow for a longer work day. It was abolished after the war. Congress passed a bill during the energy scare of 1974, reinstating the later hour for the sun to go down, on a 12 month basis. In 1975, they decided eight months was ample time to conserve energy. Then, in 1976 the lawmakers decided enough energy could be saved on only six months out of the year. That's the way the matter stands now.

AN ORDER by the Commissioners' Court of Coke County, Texas, calling a bond election to be held within said County, making provision for the conduct of the election and other provisions incident and related to the purpose of this order.

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Coke County, Texas, deems it advisable to call an election to determine whether said Court shall be authorized to issue bonds of said County for the purpose hereinafter stated; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held in said County on the 22nd day of May, 1979, which date is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption hereof, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"WHETHER or not the bonds of said Coke County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of \$400,000 and to mature serially over a period of not to exceed THIRTY (30) years from the date thereof, in conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 52 of Article III of the Constitution, as amended, and Article 752a, et seq., V.A.T.C.S., for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof, in Coke County, Texas, and to bear interest at such rate or rates (not to exceed eight per cent (8%) per annum) as in its discretion the Commissioners' Court shall determine; and shall ad valorem taxes be levied on all taxable property in said County subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity?"

SECTION 2: That paper ballots shall be used for said election, which ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$400,000 AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 3: That the polling places and officers of said election shall be as follows:

Each Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than ten (10) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the respective Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge of his polling place shall be one of the Clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

Absentee voting shall be conducted at the County Clerk's Office in the Courthouse, in accordance with the provisions of V.A.T.S. Election Code, Chapter 5.

SECTION 4: All resident qualified electors of Coke County, Texas, shall be permitted to vote at said election. The manner of holding and conducting said election shall be governed by the

Texas Election Code of the State of Texas regulating general elections, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22, V.A.T.C.S., and, as may be required by law, election materials and proceedings for this election shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 5: That a substantial copy of this order shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be posted by the County Clerk at four public places in Coke County, one of which shall be the Courthouse door, for three weeks prior to said election, and said notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall also be published for three successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in said County, published therein, the first of said publications to be made at least three weeks prior to the date set for said election.

UN DECRETO por la Corte de Comisionados del Condado de Coke, Texas, declarando una elección de bonos a tomar lugar dentro de dicho Condado, estableciendo medidas para dirigir la elección y otras estipulaciones que acompañen o que sean pertinentes al propósito de este decreto.

VISTO QUE, la Corte de Comisionados del Condado de Coke, Texas, lo considera aconsejable llevar a cabo una elección para determinar si dicha Corte será autorizada a emitir bonos de dicho condado con el fin más adelante mencionado; por consiguiente,

SE DECRETA POR LA CORTE DE COMISIONADOS DEL CONDADO DE COKE, TEXAS:

SECCION 1: Que una elección tenga lugar en dicho Condado el día 22 de mayo de 1979 cuya fecha no sea menos de treinta (30) días a partir de la fecha de aprobación de esto y en cuya elección se presentara la siguiente proposición:

"¿Si de un modo u otro los bonos de dicho Condado de Coke, Texas, deberán ser emitidos por un total de \$400,000 y madurar en serie por un período no mayor de TREINTA (30) años a partir de la fecha de esto, en conformidad a la Constitución y a las Leyes del Estado de Texas, especialmente la Sección 53 del Artículo III de la Constitución como enmendada, y el Artículo 752a, et seq., V.A.T.C.S., para la construcción, el mantenimiento y funcionamiento de carreteras y caminos de portazo hechos de macadam, de grava o de pavimento o en ayuda de esto, en el Condado de Coke, Texas, y a devengar interés a tal porcentaje o porcentajes (no exceder el ocho por ciento (8%) al año) como sea determinado a voluntad de la Corte de Comisionados; y deberán ser gravados impuestos según el valor a todas las propiedades imponibles en dicho Condado para pagar el interés de dichos bonos y para proveer fondos de amortización para rescatar la deuda de esto cuando venza?"

SECCION 2: Que se usen balotas electorales de papel en dicha elección, las cuales balotas se prepararan de acuerdo con el Código Electoral, V.A.T.S. de manera de permitir que los electores voten "EN PRO" o "EN CONTRA" a la mencionada proposición que se presentara básicamente de la siguiente manera:

"LA EMISION DE BONOS POR UN TOTAL DE \$400,000 Y EL GRAVAMEN DE IMPUESTOS EN PAGO DE ESTO"

Se pondrán las palabras "EN PRO" y bajo ellas las palabras "EN CONTRA" a la izquierda de la proposición. Se dibujara un cuadrado a la izquierda de las palabras "EN PRO" y "EN CONTRA" y cada votante pondra una "X" en el cuadrado al lado de la proposición indicando como desea votar.

Lawn Problems and Solutions

By Sterling Lindsey

We receive numerous calls in the course of a year regarding (1) grub control and (2) lawn fertilization.

The white grub has caused a lot of damage the past 3-5 years to lawns in Texas. And there is no easy control for the grub. Right now, most grubs are fairly inactive and will not respond to chemical treatment. They are not feeding - they are preparing to emerge as a June bug or May beetle, rose chaffer or Japanese beetle. More than likely, treatment now will do very little good.

The adult will start a new cycle by laying eggs probably the last half of July and early August. After the eggs hatch, probably early August, and while the new grub is small, is the only time we can expect a good kill with chemical treatments. Start checking for new grubs the later part of July. If you find 3 or 4 per square foot of turf, then treat with diazinon according to the directions on the container.

In regard to fertilization, we are receiving more and more evidence of yellow color in lawn grasses. This is caused by one or more of several things. Lack of iron, salt or alkaline water and/or soil and too much phosphorous can lead to a chlorotic lawn condition.

We would suggest you have your soil analyzed before fertilizing or use more nitrogen and less phosphorous plus all some copperas to your fertilizer.

Do this, if possible, before hot weather sets in. The response is better now than it will be later on.

Cong. Loeffler Discusses Problems

Rep. Tom Loeffler of Kerrville was in Coke County Saturday visiting with constituents. He held an informal meeting Saturday afternoon in the Coke County courtroom in Robert Lee, and discussed a number of problems with about 25 persons present.

County Judge D.W. Sims told the 21st District congressman that one of the main long range problems of Coke County and most of West Texas is making good water available to the growing population. Loeffler agreed that water is a primary problem of the area and pledged his efforts toward assistance in overcoming water problems.

The hospital cost containment bill was discussed and the congressman said he was opposed to it, since it has been estimated that 25 per cent of the cost of medical care would go to pay expense of complying with the rules and regulations which will accompany the enforcement of the bill if it is enacted.

The federal revenue sharing program, initiated during the Nixon administration, which sends money from Washington back to almost all towns and counties of the country, came up for discussion. Loeffler said he was for a gradual reduction of the program, adding that he realized it could not be stopped all at once, since so many cities and counties are deeply dependent on it.

"A reduction would be okay," he said, "but I'm not for places like Coke County having the-

ir revenue sharing funds cut so the federal government can bail out New York City and Cleveland." He favored a gradual and equal cut in the program, noting that somewhere between 40 and 60 percent of the money sent to Washington gets lost in administrative costs and other red tape on its way back to the recipient towns and counties.

On the energy problem, the congressman said that decontrol of domestic oil prices is important and he believes the energy question is going to require a broad program and a concentrated effort by everyone. He stated that he believed the proposed Sohio pipeline from the West Coast to Midland was a dead issue, due to roadblocks thrown up by environmentalists and other red tape the company has encountered. He said Sohio already has spent \$50 million on the project and the federal government has spent another \$80 million through agencies working for and against the project.

Loeffler went on record as opposed to federal funding of congressional elections.

The congressman did have some good words for the body of which he is a member. He said a great many members of congress are concerned about balancing the budget in Washington. He also noted that there is more concern about national defense, stating that the lawmakers are finally recognizing that we are no longer number one in defense capability.


