## Fire Destroys Oil Storage Tank

## A crude oil storage

 tank on the Bert Blaylock place exploded and burned early Monday morning.The 210 barrel tank, one of two located at a recently drilled well just west of highway 208 approximately six miles south of Robert Lee, was apparently isnited when struck by lightning. A violent thunderstorm covered the area at the time. The fire was spotted by a passing motorist and reported to Robert Lee fire chief Gary Williams who called in the alarm. The siren sounded shortly after $4: 30 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. The fire was also spotted by Earl Bradley, who lives on the Blaylock stockfarm, and Bobby Roberts who lives nearby and was at the scene when firemen arrived. Roberts looks after the facility which belongs to Crown Oil Co. of Dallas. He said the well was shut in and the tanks contained only a few feet of oil at the time.
No attempt was made to put out the fire due to the risk involved and the fact that little could be saved. The fire burned itself out within a few hours. The entire top section of the welded steel tank was blown off and land ed some 30 or 30 yards away.

## County Needs Street, Road Repair

## (An Editorial)

Citizens of Coke County are going to make a decision May 22 as to whether or not they want to keep their paved rural roads and city streets in a state of good repair or let them deteriorate beyond the point of no repair.
The commissioners of the county probably are the four men most knowledgeable about the condition of our roads and streets and about what it will take to put them back in good condition. They have come out in support of the bond issue to finance the repair job. The mayors of Robert Lee and Bronte, two other men who are deeply concerned about the condition of our pavement, have proclaimed their support of the bond issue.
These men stand to gain no more than you or I from passage of the bond. They are taxpayers just as we are and will have to pay their part of the bill just as we will.
Paved roads and streets in Coke County are a tremendous asset--in convenience, in appearance and in the everyday carrying on of affairs of the county.
It's a simple matter of fact that we can afford to repair our streets. Financial consultants have set up a bond retirement schedule which can be handled with the 15 cents per $\$ 100$ valuation we are now paying. No tax increase will be required to pay off the bonds in ten years. We had better do it now, rather than wait and have to drive in the mud.
The cost is not going to get any cheaper and the chugholes are not going to get any smaller.

## Delegation 'Brands' Coke Panel

The search is on throughout Texas for outstanding cattle brands to include on county panels at the Kleberg Center's "branded stairway" at Texas A\&M University.
L.A. Maddox, chairman of the unique branding project, said that some 3,500 brands, or more, are expected to be imprinted on the 254 "county oak panels" in the University's new $\$ 9.5$ million Rober J. Kleberg Animal and Food Sciences Center. "County Extension agents are working with their local beef cattle committees to select eight brands per county, and with historical societies to select other brands for the panels," Maddox, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist, said. Recently, a delegation from Coke County added local brands to the county's oak panel. Participating were: Mr . and Mrs. J.R. Willcockson, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hamilton, Carol Hamilton, Mrs. J.W. Arledge Jr., Mrs. Grahame Fenton, Cynthia Ann Hipp, Mr . and Mrs. C.E. Arrott, Mr. and Mrs. E1ton Mims, Bill Allen, Don Bowen and Mr. and Mrs. Wayne McCabe.
There are some 200,000 brands recorded in Texas and on file with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth. This is the state's most complete record.
The "branding" was an idea of Dr. O.D. Butler, for many years head of Texas A\&M's Animal Science Department and now associate vice president for agriculture and renewable resources. He said that not only are cattle brands a rich part

[^0]of Texas livestock history but a prized possession of ranchers in identification of their cattle.
"We felt that the branding ceremonies would bring about a closer tie-in between cattlemen and our animal science facilities on campus as well as with research and educational work throughout Texas," Butler said.
Maddox said that branding ceremonies will be conducted by Extension district groups until "all panels are branded.'

## Wise Land Use Through Planning

When an inch of rain
falls on a 160 acre farm, it delivers over four million gallons of water weighing 152 tons. If this is multiplied by the three, four and five inch rains we receive in the county, this is a lot of water. When rains like this occur, many farms suffer if not protected by the necessary vegetative and structural conservation measures. With such a destructive potential always possible, one can readily see the need for conservation planning to protect and conserve our basic resource--THE SOIL.
Using the land according to its capabilities and treating it according to its needs has always assured the farmer of the best production attainable. The basis of conservation planning is land capability classes.
Our land is divided into eight capability classes based upon the limited factors of a particular tract of land. Each class is designated by a Roman numeral and each is different because of the kind of soil, the slope, the degree of erosion, the fertility, and the physical condition of the soil. As you go from Class I to Class VIII, your choices in use become fewer and the risks become greater.
Knowing this, the best possible way to make land use decisions is to use a good soils map. For example, very shallow soil on a steep slope would be of a capability not suitable for cultivation. However, very shallow soi1s on a steep slope would be capable of supporting good range grasses.
Treating the land according to its needs is the next item of importance. Soil, water and plant conservation practices such as conservation cropping systems, contour farming, terrace maintenance, crop residue use and crop rotations can be applied to cropland now and affect this years crop yields.
For more information and assistance in making these decisions, contact your local Soil Conservation Service office working through the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District.
