ile accident and has the response to the emergency is by a welltrained, well-equipped EMS, he or she will be checked for injuries, treated appropriately (for possible head, neck and spinal injuries and to control bleeding) and life-support measures will be started. If a bystander takes him (or her) to the hospital these vital services will not be available. The immediate care given at the scene and enroute to the hospital can mean the difference between

State Representative Mike Ezzell, chairman of the House Health Services Committee, has been named by Governor William P. Clements Jr. to the international committee on the U.S.-Mexico Health Initiative following the recommendation of State Health Commissioner Dr. Raymond T. Moo-

Also named was Rick Montoya, Director of the Governor's Office of Regional Development.

Representative Ezzell, of Snyder, has worked closely with the Texas Department of Health on many public health programs.

Ezzell and Montoya will attend a meeting in Mexico City October 10-12 to examine the U.S.-Mexico border as it relates to health issu-

Rep. Ezzell has also been named to the Sunset Advisory Commission by Speaker of the House Bill Clayton.

Representative Ezzell becomes one of four

House members serving on the commission. The other four members are members of the Texas Senate and appointed by the Lt. Governor. The commission is charged to review those agencies due to be abolished by the Texas Sunset Act. The review process includes public hearings and a final report of findings to the Legislature with the commission's recommendations for each

"Sunset is proving to be an important addition to our legislative system." Clayton said. adding, "Rep. Ezzell will be a strong member of the commission and will help provide the leadership necessary to determine the need for agencies to contin-



Working and Parenting a Big Job

Attentive parenting takes commitment and a plan, especially for newly employed "working mothers" who now find themselves with two jobs.

To them, "organizational juggling" emerges as the key to successnting and professional

It may be comforting to know that some studies are reporting similarities in the amount of "attentive time" or "quality time" spent with children by both employed and unemployed mothers.

However, at first, for many newly employed mothers, finding the time for mutually satisfying parent-child interaction is an important issue.

mitment to plan parentchild time.

Initially, employed mothers get so bogged down with the management of existing chores and responsibilities that they are psychologically and physically overwhelmed.

To make a commitment to parent-child time, you may have to review priorities.

ng less-essential things go--or dividing and sharing tasks in order to have planned time with all family members.

Some families plan for a special night together once a week.

One or more family members assume the responsibility of planning the meal and any activities which may take place.

Other families focus on a special weekend once a month.

However, parent-child time doesn't have to be elaborately planned. It may mean an opportunity for the parent to share with the child in reading a book or becoming involved in undertaking a task or simple project together.

Children need to feel their parents want to be with them and that parents also enjoy the interaction which takes place.

Find some opportunity for giving each child "time alone with the parent."

These are moments when the child feels they have the total attention of the parent.

This is a time for enjoying each other and recognizing individual needs and personality traits.

Outside employment of the parent does not necessarily mean the reduction of parentchild interaction but perhaps some reorganization in the time planned for it. No matter what, it is an important time for both parent and child.

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Computers help take guesswork out of ranching

COLLEGE STATION -Ranching, in the past, usually depended on a sharp eye, experience or luck.

Computer technology is now taking some of the guesswork out of raising cattle, says Dr. Lowell Schake, professor of animal science at Texas A&M University and a researcher who develops computer appli-

Where once a rancher with a sharp eye for beef flesh could get by, a computer does the job comparing variables to determine which feed rations are best, what cows to keep and how the hands are working out.

With the advent of inexpensive, programmable calculators, the speed of the computer is now available to every cattleman from feedlot manager to small rancher.

If the cattleman doesn't want to write his own program, there are plenty of private consultants, extension specialists, breed associations and feed companies who will help, Schake said.
