The Robert Lee Steers will have their second district game of the season Friday night when the Eden Bulldogs come here. The Steers are looking for another victory after downing favored Bronte 7-3 last Friday night.

The Bulldogs will be coming into the game with a victory under their belts. In their district opener last Friday, they downed Santa Anna 27-14 in an upset. The victory was the first of the season for the Bulldogs.

## Absentee Voting Started Monday

Absentee voting started Monday on three constitutional amendments which will be voted on in an election Nov. 6. Eligible persons may cast absentee ballots in the office of County Clerk Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, or write to her office for a ballot and other necessary papers to be sent through the mail.

The November election will decide the fate of three proposed additions to the state constitution.

Amendment No. 1 would authorize the legislature to provide terms of office of notaries public and to specify the appointment of notaries public for the state instead of for each county.

Amendment No. 2 would provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department.

Amendment No. 3 would authorize the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified buyers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas.

Absentee ballots may be cast by those who are over 65 years of age, by those who will be out of the county on election day and by those who are not physically able to go to the polls.

Absentee voting will continue until three days before the election. The ballots may be cast at the clerk's office during regular office hours.

## Steers Upset Bronte In Important 6-B Game

The Robert Lee Steers retained possession of the Coke County Championship last Friday night when they went to Bronte and took the wind out of the sails of the high flying Longhorns. The game was a terrific defensive battle and ended 7-3 in favor of the Steers.

The only touchdown of the night was made by Darren Williams with an 85 yard kickoff return on the opening play of the game. Williams also kicked the extra point. The only other score came with 22 seconds left in the first half when Donnie Jackson booted a field goal after the Longhorns moved the ball 85 yards up the field but were unable to cross the double stripe.

After his sensational seven points in the fi-

rst 17 seconds of the ball game, Williams kicked off to the Longhorns. The Steers held and the Bronte punt carried to the Robert Lee 32. Brett Clark and Williams carried but were unable to make their first down. Williams' kick placed the ball on the Bronte 17. Again the Steer defense held with good tackles by Tim Bosworth and David Caves. Both teams drew penalties and Kerry Gartman almost connected with Graves Parks on a pass. However, the Longhorns held and the Steer punt went into the end zone.

Mark Ball made eight yards and Kendall Denton moved 29 yards to the Robert Lee 43. The Steers tightened their defense with good plays by Ricky Ross, Joel Percifull and Lynn Gul-

ley and the Longhorns' Jay Schoenfield punted to the Steer two yard line.

Bronte drew a five yard fine and Robert Tijerina moved to the 12 for a first down. Williams carried for 3 before the first quarter ended.

### SECOND QUARTER

With a third and 6 on the 14, Tijerina made a fine 23 yard gain for a first on the 37. After three tries, the Steers were faced with a fourth and 18 and had to punt. The Longhorns started at their 34 and made a first on the 44 before the Steers tightened up and forced

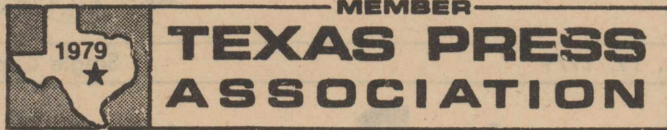

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### Drivers Injured in Two Accidents

Two accidents have occurred in Coke County in the past few days resulting in injury to the two drivers.

A 1977 truck trailer loaded with beef was involved in a one-vehicle accident about 6:15 a.m. Tuesday, Oct. 9. The mishap occurred 6.4 miles north of Robert Lee on Highway 208. The driver, Donald Anthony Araneo of Amarillo, was traveling south and was rounding a curve when his cargo of meat shifted. Winds and a blowout contributed to the truck turning over in the ditch alongside the highway.

The truck was owned by J. Lines, Inc. of Amarillo.

Araneo was taken to West Coke County suffering from a possible concussion and shoulder separation.

The second accident occurred about 2:55 p.m. Monday 4.1 miles north of Bronte on Highway 277. The 1977 Mercury driven by Thelma Arler Townsend, 74, of San Angelo was traveling south and ran off the right side of the highway. Apparently, the driver jerked it back to the left, ran off the left side of the road into the ditch.

Mrs. Townsend was carried to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo by the Bronte ambulance, apparently suffering from a fractured neck.

Patrolman Bobby Hart, who investigated both accidents, said J.D. Harmon of Robert Lee was the first person to stop after Mrs. Townsend's accident. He called the ambulance and kept the victim still until help arrived.

Hart said the ambulance crew did an outstanding job in handling the situation and caring for Mrs. Townsend. Those making the run were Louis Lee, George Eubanks and Paul Sublett.

### Antlerless Deer Permits Available

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits for Coke County on Oct. 25 from 8 a.m. till noon and 1 p.m. till 5 p.m. in the Coke County Courthouse located in Robert Lee.

A map with antlerless deer permits issuance compartment and issuance rate will be posted in the Coke County Courthouse prior to the issuance date.

To qualify for at least one permit, a landowner must own or control acreage at least equal to one-half the issuance rate of the compartment where the tract is located.

Ivey said he and all the personnel of the firm greatly appreciate the response given at their showing this year.

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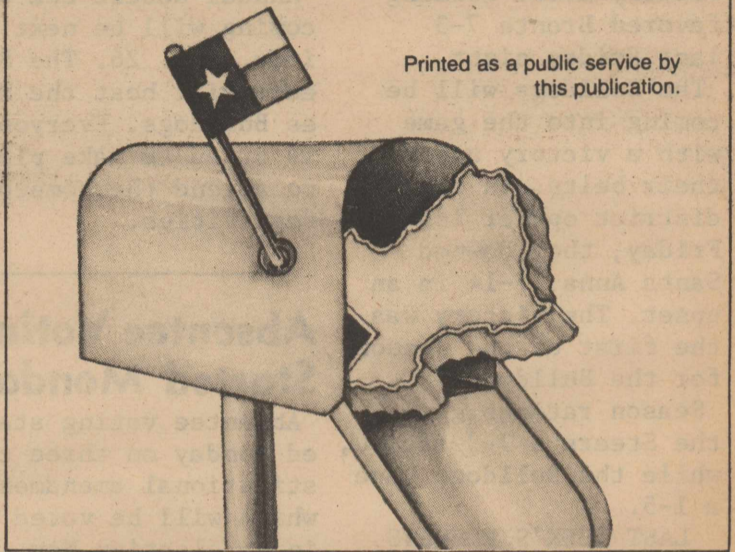

a fumble which Danny Doss recovered on the Bronte 38. The Steers couldn't go and got off a good punt which was downed on the Bronte six yard line.

The Longhorns moved the ball and a pass interference call against the Steers helped them considerably. Three successful passes took the ball to the Steer 16 yard line. After two incomplete passes the Longhorns made 3. It was on the 4th down that Jackson kicked the field goal for Bronte's only counter of the night.

Bronte kicked off and one play was run before the half.

**THIRD QUARTER**

Williams kicked off to start the second half. Scott Long, Clark and Percifull were credited with stopping the Horns and they kicked to the Steer 15. On a third and 13 play Williams got loose for a long run and with a 15 yard penalty tacked on to the end of it, the Steers had a first down on the Bronte 13. Three plays later, however, the Steers were faced with a fourth and 15. Williams tried a field goal but it was no good. The score remained 7-3.

The Longhorns made a first down on their 39, but the Steer defense held again and a punt was called for, giving the Steers the ball on their 16.

After three tries the Steers had to punt. It went to Hamilton and he ran it back to the Steer 22 yard line. The Longhorns were thr-

eatening and on three plays went for a first down at the 5. Gullely stopped a run for a 2 yard loss and Percifull tackled Cody McClure on the 2 yard line after he completed a pass. With one down left, the Longhorns decided to let Quarterback Kendall Gibbs carry around right end. The Steers were taking care of their assignments, however, and they stopped the ball carrier on the one yard line.

**FOURTH QUARTER**

The Steers couldn't make their first down and Williams punted, giving the Horns the ball on their own 49 yard line. The Longhorns moved for a first down at the Steer 33. Again the defense held and the ball went over on the 27 yard line.

Tijerina made a first down on the 37 but after three more tries the Steers had to punt. The Longhorns took over on their 32 and were unable to gain the needed 10 yards, so the ball went over. The Steers were unable to make their first down and the Longhorns took over on their 26. They kept the ball the remaining minutes of the game and moved it to the Steer 26 before the final whistle sounded.

Final score: Robert Lee 7, Bronte 3.

Coaches and fans were overjoyed with the performance of the Steers, particularly in view of the prediction that Bronte would win the game. They were pleased, too, that the Coke County Championship for 1979 will remain in Robert Lee.

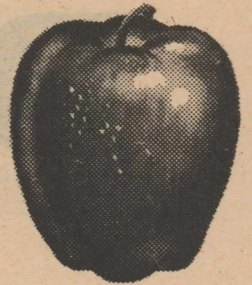

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## Heart Seminar Set for Oct. 30

A seminar for those who are interested in learning more about heart and heart-related diseases will be held Tuesday, Oct. 30, at West Coke County Hospital in Robert Lee.

Dr. Albert J. Forlano, medical lecturer and consultant, will be the speaker for the seminar. Official title for the session will be "Diagnostic and Therapeutic Approaches to Cardiovascular Diseases."

Dr. Forlano has presented numerous successful seminars around the country. He has done detailed studies of the cardiovascular system, the effects of exercise, medication, diet, etc. The seminar will include a review of the anatomy (how it is made) and the physiology (how it works) of the cardiovascular system (the heart). A discussion will follow on the effects of stress on the system and therapy.

The areas of angina pectoris, myocardial infarction, hypertension (high blood pressure) and congestive heart failure will be covered in detail.

The course is open to anyone who is interested. Dr. Forlano will try to speak in terms so that anyone can understand. He and nurses will be available to answer questions during breaks.

Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District, 400 E. 24th Street, Big Spring, Texas 79720, who holds License No. 79-1 of the State of Texas issued September 5, 1978 (renewal application was submitted July 17, 1979 and is pending at this time) intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling and Coke.

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence south-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.
3. The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include 3 cm and 5 cm radar systems, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.
4. The program will be operational during the period from March 1 through November 30 during the years 1980, 1981, 1982 and 1983.

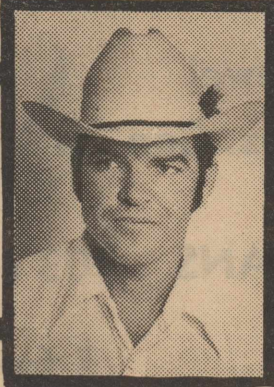

# Jerry Lackey's Country Folk

With more dust from Lubbock coming on down to southwest Texas than moisture as early northers enter...there is no wonder country folks are hauling livestock to the local auctions. They are afraid a drought is on!

WILLARD JORDAN said the Junction Stockyards have experienced weekly runs of sheep and goats numbering 13,000 and 16,000 per week. Those are record numbers for the nation's goat sales center.

"Of course, a lot of goatmen are selling off their mutton crops but an equal number just plain don't want a high feed bill this winter," he explains. "The same is true for the cow business."

Dry country worries are widespread.

ROB ROY SPILLER, a Junction banker and Bear Creek rancher, says it "looks like the dead of winter out Cleway."

In visiting with well-known cattle buyer LEA HUGGINS of Sherman, I learned it is dry all the way into Oklahoma and Kansas. "I am sending some cattle up into the cornbelt and some to southern Illinois," he stated. "It is dry up there, of course, it probably hasn't rained in three weeks."

"But some parts of West Texas still look good," continued Huggins. "I found Alpine in good shape."

DONALD ALLISON of San Angelo was in the Highland Country around Marfa last week and reported the area in good condition range-wise, "even if some of that green you see is Locoweed which is going to give us fits somewhere on down the road."

It has been three years now since the last big outbreak of "loco" in the Marfa area. I remember attending several ranch community meetings out there that year and saw lots of cattle taken because of eating the weed.

Well, the green is just in spots. I saw SAM AULT in the bank lobby the other day. He spends a great deal of time near his ranch in northwest New Mexico and in turn reports it

dry up there.

Bear Creek, Kimble County ranchwoman IRA DELL BANNOWSKY says her and husband Chester just returned from a vacation trip into New Mexico and confirms the "drought story."

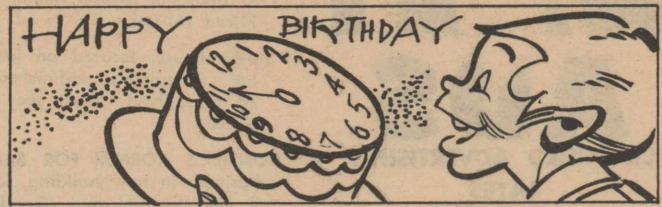
GILBERT ANDEREGG of Harper describes the dry range in that part of the Texas Hill Country "with a smell like hay curing in the field. That's what it smells like when I ride in the pasture...can't say as I ever remember a smell like it before."

On the other hand, Hill Country ranchmen can count their blessings. There is a better than average acorn crop in many areas and with the abundances thereof, they can spot some fat

deer. So, hunting season may be okay this autumn and winter.

My dad, STANLEY LACKEY, of Junction was sitting around the feed grounds the other day waiting for all the cows to come up. He spotted an old cow reaching into a liveoak tree nearby. After careful inspection, he found she was eating every acorn in reach.

Speaking of hunting, DOBBS HERMANN, manager of Rocker "b" Ranch at Barnhart, states this year's antelope hunt on the big ranch for the annual two week season was a big success. "We had a waiting list of hunters for the hunt, but those lucky ones who hunted bagged their limit."

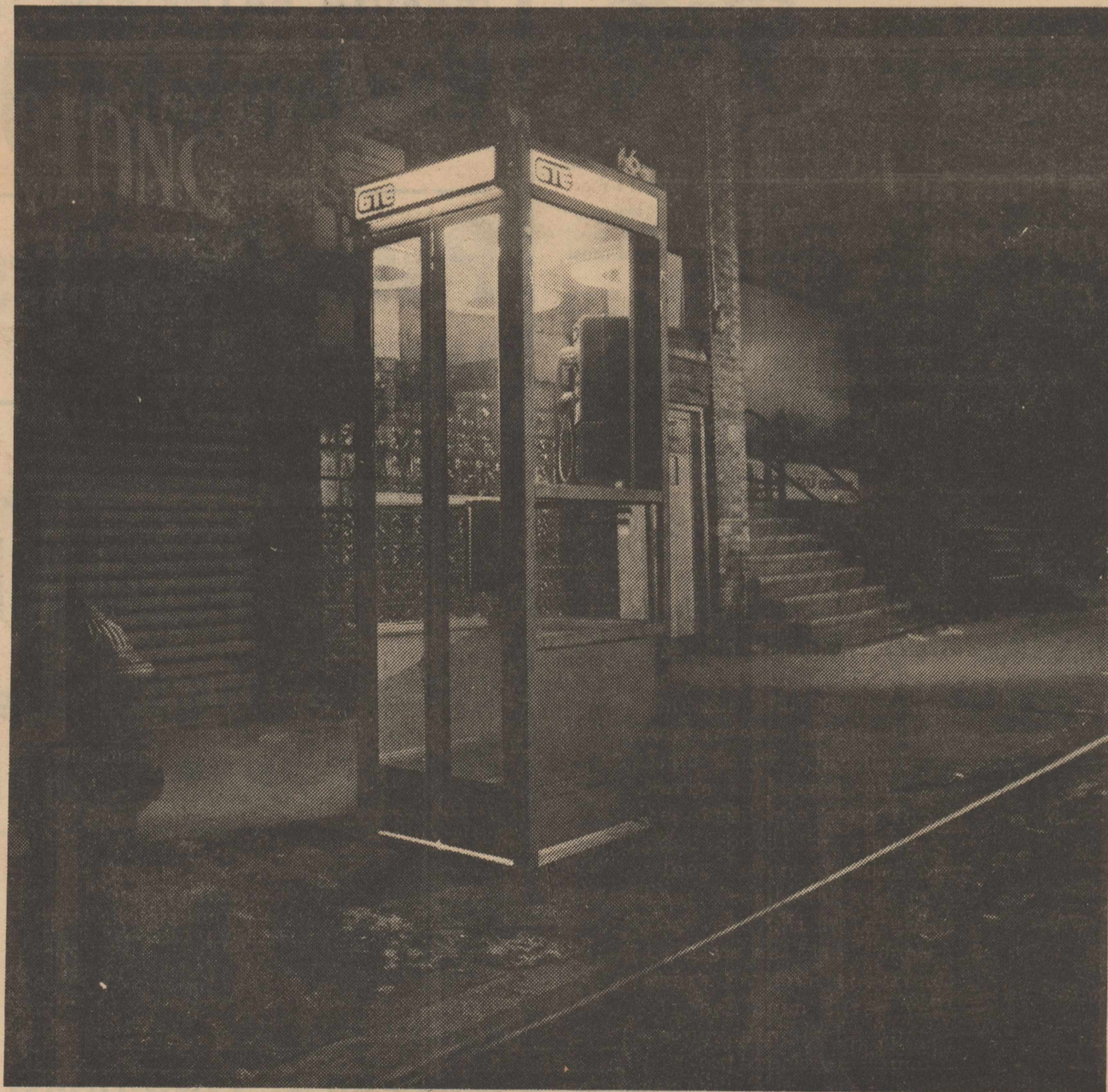

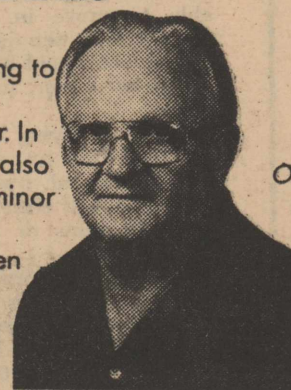

### Whose Right?

A home is the largest—and potentially the most complex—purchase that most of us ever experience. Unlike buying a car, where involvement probably is limited to you and the dealer, the purchase of a home may concern many rights and interests in the property claimed

by different individuals and entities. These tend to accumulate over the years as a piece of real estate is transferred to successive owners.

Everyone does not always share the same view on which rights and interests are valid, as a couple learned in the midwest.

After purchasing a home in a loan foreclosure sale, the buyers were startled to find upon arrival at the residence that the previous owners still occupied the property and refused to move. The occupants filed a petition in court claiming that they had not been served with a summons in the foreclosure—and alleged that the sale therefore did not affect them.

The perplexed buyers had obtained owner's title insurance in their real estate purchase, and turned to the insuring title company for help. Legal proceedings were initiated by the title company to remove the previous owners from the property, and the buyers then were able to move in. Expenses for affirming the rights of the buyers were paid by the title company under its owner's policy.

Besides paying for a defense against an attack on title as insured, owner's title insurance will either clear up title problems or pay valid claims.
