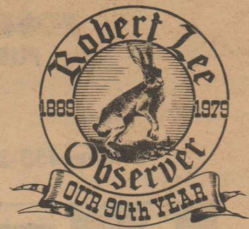

Steers to Finish Schedule With Trip to Irion County

The Robert Lee Steers will have to go to Merzton Friday night for their last regularly scheduled game of the season, even though they already have won the District 6-B West Zone Championship. The Steers clinched the title last Friday night with a decisive 40-0 victory over the Santa Anna Mountaineers. They now have a perfect 4-0 district record.

There is little likelihood that the Irion County lads can defeat the Steers, but even if they do, the Steers will take the championship.

Winning the West Zone will put Robert Lee in contention with the winner of the East Zone for the district title. East Zone winner will be decided tonight when Gorman and Blanket meet at Blanket.

UIL Makes Some Drastic Changes In Football Districts for 1980 Season

Some drastic changes were made this week in the alignment of football teams into districts for 1980 games. Class B teams are a thing of the past, as Class A was designated as the proper classification for small schools such as Robert Lee. Not many kind words were heard for the groupings in Coke County, since the county was split along the boundary lines of the Robert Lee and Bronte school districts. Robert Lee wound up in District 3-A, while Bronte was placed in District 7-A.

Classifications were all moved up a notch and schools like Forsan are now 2-A; Ballinger is 3-A; Lake View is 4-A; and the big ones like San Angelo Central are 5-A--just to give some examples.

District 3-A will be made up of an east and west zone with Roby,

Roscoe, Loraine, Water Valley, Sterling City and Robert Lee in the east zone, and New Home, Wilson, Meadow, Sands, Klondike and Garden City in the west zone.

Coke Voters Against Amendments

Coke County voters were about as enthusiastic as the rest of the state about the special constitutional amendment election which was held Tuesday. A total of 231 voters cast their ballots, with a majority going against all three of the propositions.

The first amendment on the ballot, concerning notaries public was defeated 93-136. No. 2, which provided for legislative review of executive department agencies, was defeated 84-145. The third amendment, concerning state guarantee of loans to purchase land, was defeated 106-122.

Steers Pound Santa Anna To Win West Zone Title

The Steers kept their honor intact with a shutout of the Santa Anna Mountaineers who sort of embarrassed the Steers last year, but the revenge was great after being called "the poor Steers."

The Steers like to have never got started; they moved the ball well the first quarter but couldn't score. But on the first play of the 2nd quarter, Kerry Gartman plunged over from the 1 and Williams kicked the extra point for a 7 to 0 lead. The Steers then waited till less than three minutes to go in the half, when Clark intercepted a pass and in four plays, they drove to the three where Williams scored. The extras failed and it was 13 to 0 at half-time.

SECOND HALF

Then the fun began as the third quarter started with Williams taking the kickoff and returning it 86 yards for a TD. (Remember another kickoff return?). Then the Steers kicked off and on the first play Joel Percifull intercepted a pass and returned it 42 yards for a TD. The Steers kicked off again and Santa Anna fumbled the ball at their 48. Gartman threw a 27 yard pass to Buck

Duncan and Robert Tijerina ran the next play 21 yards for a TD and suddenly the score was 33 to 0. The amazing thing of it all was that the three 3rd quarter touchdowns took only one minute and 59 seconds off the clock. At this point everybody started to get to play and the Steers didn't score their final TD until the middle of the 4th quarter when a little razzle dazzle pitch went to halfback Saul Saucedo and he unloaded a long pass to Ricky Ross that covered 49 yds for the final score which was 40 to 0.

After all this backfield heroics, there was the line play that held Santa Anna to only 19 yds rushing and that ain't bad. There was Vic Conner, Lynn (Monster) Gulley, Graves Parks, Wade Wallace, Armando Sanchez, Paul Bosworth, Clay Bloodworth, Scott Long, and Danny Doss.

Besides the scoring highlight of Williams' kickoff return, Percifull's interception returns and Tijerina's good run from 21 yds., there was Conner's recovery of a fumble, Clark got his 100 yds. plus game, and, oh yes, the Steers won District 6-B West Zone Championship!

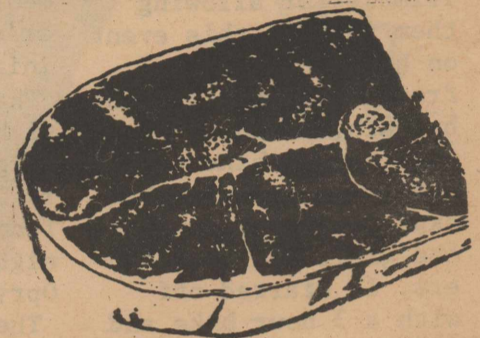

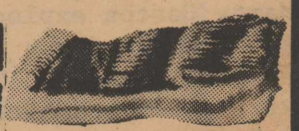
