DISTRICT COURT ENTERS THIRD WEEK'S WORK—SEVERAL CASES DISPOSED OF DURING PAST WEEK'S DELIBERATIONS

The third week of the October term of District Court opened yesterday morning. The second week was closed last Wednesday and the jury was adjourned.

In the cases last week the following results were had:

State of Texas vs. Marlin Wynn, charged with burglary, received two years suspended sentence.

State of Texas vs. Lawrence Adams, charged with driving a car while intoxicated, case resulted in a hung jury. This case was the outcome of a car wreck on West California Street in which two person vere injured several weeks ago.

State of Texas vs. Leo Austin harged with cattle theft, jury as sessed penalty of four years suspended sentence. This trial was the outcome of the case where Leo Austin and two companions were charged with theft of cattle from the Frank Baird farm in west Floyd county.
