MANY FLOYD COUNTY AND FLOYDADA TEACHERS WILL ATTEND ASSOCIATION

A large number of the Floyd County rural school teachers and several of the Floydada and Lockney independent school teachers will attend the 53rd annual convention of the Texas Teachers Association.

The meeting will convene in Amarillo Thursday morning at 10:00 o'clock with the Amarillo public schools as official hosts. Last sessions will be held Saturday afternoon, night sessions will be held on Thursday and Friday evenings.

According to Price Scott, county superintendent, many of the rural school teachers will attend if the weather conditions are favorable. Holidays Friday and Thursday of this week will be observed by schools over the county in order to enable teachers who wish to attend to do so.

Many of the Floydada High School teachers as well as some of the ward school faculty will not be at the opening session Thursday but will attend the Floydada-Lamesa ball game to attend to matters there.

Both Floydada school superintendent and County school superintendent W. E. Patty and Price Scott, respectively, have made plans to attend.

WHIRLWINDS HAVE TOUGH BATTLE IN GOLDEN TORNADES THURSDAY

The Whirlwinds will meet a tough aggregation in the battle with the Lamesa Tornados on Thursday of this week. Coach Barksdale's Whirlwinds will probably journey to Lamesa tomorrow morning to acquaint themselves with the Tornados field.

Coach McCollum of the Lamesa Golden Tornados will probably start the following eleven in the tilt: Ends, Lymore and Conquino; tackles, Addison and Couger; guards, Boswell and Jordan; center, Womack; quarterback, Marr; halfbacks, Moore and Cox and fullback, Treadway.

Cox, halfback and Treadway, fullback, are the outstanding threats that the Whirlwinds will have to conquer in the backfield to win district laurels.

Floydada's starting lineup will probably include: de Cordova, Go-lightly or Young at end; Murry and Jackson or Sims at guards; McLaughlin and Johnston at tackles; Dorrell or Jackson at center; Welch, Heald, Bridges and Floyd Murry in the ball carrying positions.

Much of the credit in Floydada's victory over the Littlefield is due to Bruce McLaughlin, heavy Whirlwind tackle, who played an excellent game and made one of the touchdowns for the green and white eleven.

According to Coach L. T. Barksdale, the Whirlwinds will resort to aerial plays as a means of major gains against the Golden Tornados. The local eleven have some passes which, if well executed will gain some yardage for the Whirlwinds.

**MRS. H. A. HARRIS VALUES
CANNED PRODUCTS AT \$96.25**

Mrs. H. A. Harris, garden demonstrator for the Irick Home Demonstration Club, has canned 300 quarts of vegetables from her garden. Mrs. Harris values her canned products at \$96.25.

Mrs. Harris states that her hot bed and seed cost \$2.35. From this hot bed she sold \$9.15 worth of okra, tomato, pepper, sweet potato, lettuce, radish and cabbage plants and used all she needed besides giving a number of plants to friends.

Her garden contained 30 varieties with permanent plantings of rhubarb and asparagus. "I have also planned on green in my hot bed all winter," Mrs. Harris said.

Besides the amount of canned products, Mrs. Harris has 30 bushels of sweet potatoes, 24 pounds of dry beans, 25 pounds of black eye peas, 60 pounds of Irish potatoes and two bushels of onions.

**LAKEVIEW GARDEN
DEMONSTRATOR VALUES
PANTRY AT \$100.00**

Mrs. Henry Hollis, garden demonstrator for the Lakeview Home Demonstration club had 19 varieties of products in her garden. She also had permanent plantings of asparagus and strawberries.

From this garden Mrs. Hollis canned 100 quarts of tomatoes, 50 quarts of butter beans, 25 quarts of string beans, 30 quarts of black eye peas, 10 quarts each of English peas and okra and tomatoes, 4 quarts of grapes, 4 quarts of tomato preserves, 29 pints of beets, 2 pints of cucumbers, 30 pints of relish and 2 pints of catsup. She values this pantry at \$100.00. Mrs. Hollis also plans to can either pork or beef or both.

Mrs. Hollis made her hot bed from scrap lumber and with no expense but the labor. The seed for the hot bed and garden cost approximately \$2.00. From the hot bed she raised enough tomato plants for herself and three others. The garden is irrigated from a windmill and an up right tank.

Mrs. Hollis is fully prepared to live at home because in addition to this good garden she has 25 fruit trees, consisting of peaches, apples, plums, cherries and pears and also 12 grape vines; 70 Rhode Island red hens furnish eggs and three thoroughbred Jersey cows furnish milk, cream and butter.

**REPIPT—BOLOGNA
STYLE SAUSAGE**

- 30 pounds salt cured beef.
- 20 pounds of fat pork, or bacon if desired.
- 5 quarts of water.
- 1 pound of salt.
- 1 ounce mace.
- 1 ounce black pepper.
- ½ ounce cayenne pepper.
- ½ ounce coriander.

Grind the beef, add the salt and pepper, mix well, put into clean crock and let stand in cool place for 24 to 36 hours before using in sausage. After curing the beef, grind it very fine again, then add the pork which has first been ground using the medium plate. Combine the meats, add the remainder of the spices and mix thoroughly as the water is added, until the mixture becomes sticky and darker in color. Stuff into beef casings, ten to twelve inches long. The bologna can also be stuffed into muslin bags if they are paraffined. Allow to hang in a cool place then smoke over a cool smoke about 3 to 3 hours. After smoking cook in a moderate oven for about 1 and ½ hours or until when the sausage is squeezed in the hand it will squeak as the pressure is released. Drop the cooked bologna into cold water for about ½ hour then hang in a cool place.

Bologna sausage made with fresh beef is not recommended for farm manufacture. Fresh meat stuffed in casings and smoked invariably spoils.

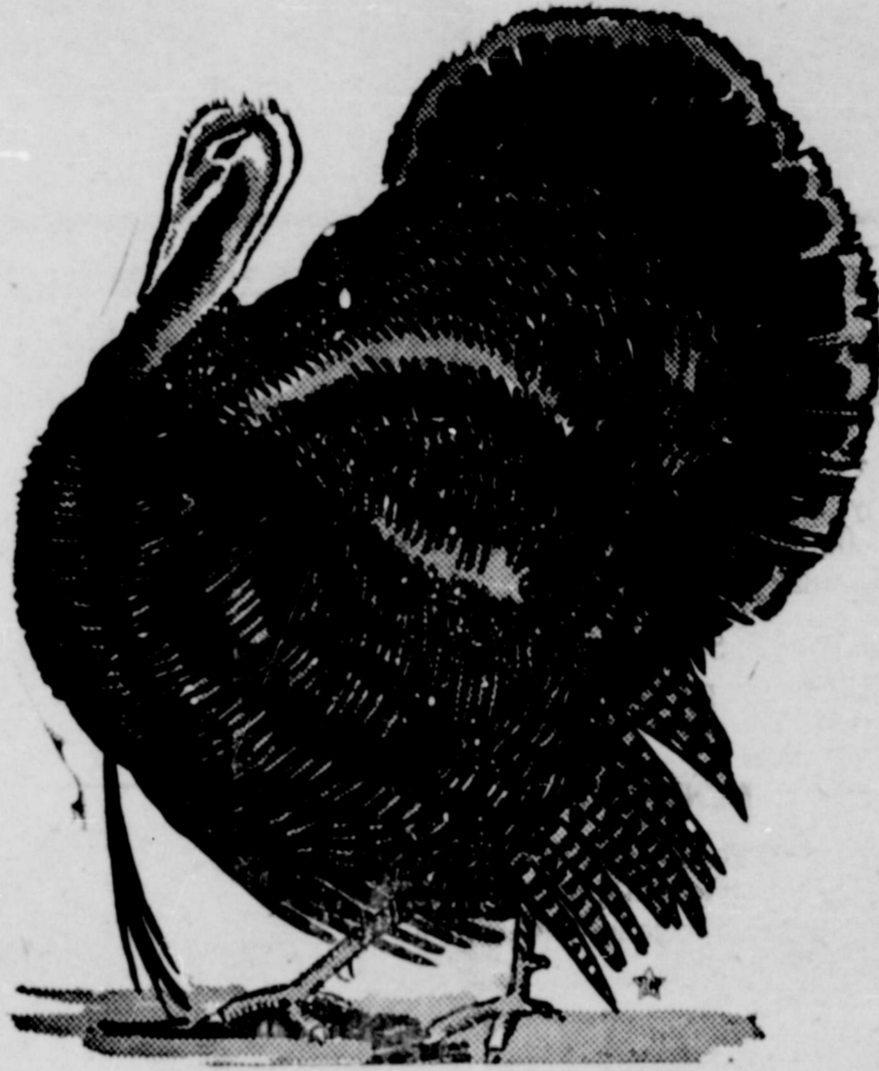

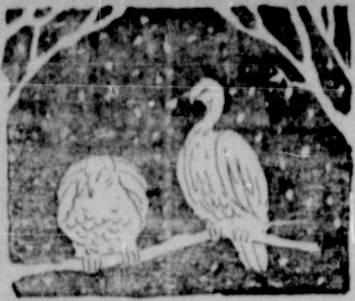

WINTER PAYS FIRST VISIT TO FLOYDADA AND FLOYD COUNTY

Floydada and Floyd County with the other panhandle plains counties were in the first icy grips of winter over the week end as the entire plains section was grabbed in a cloak of ice and a cold fog from early Sunday morning to Monday morning.

The temperature locally began to become colder Saturday evening and night and the mercury continued to fall until late Saturday night and Sunday morning. Falling and heavy mist was frozen and trees and other vegetation were covered with a sheet of ice.

All Sunday morning continued to be very cold but the temperature began to steadily rise in the afternoon and by yesterday morning a noticeable change had thawed the ice and warmed the atmosphere.

Floydada kicked to Littlefield after the touchdown, Littlefield returned to their own 45 yard line. In the latter part of the fourth quarter, the Wildcats made a last desperate rally and resorted to long passes which were incomplete and no gain was made.
