## THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving Day has become such a universally observed national holiday that few people realize that its general observance on the 'ast Thursday in November is quite a recent development. All of the states of New England and some of the other northern states, had an annual day of thanksgiving by the proclamation of the Governor, but while this custom came from the earliest colonial times, it seldom happened that more than two or three states picked the same day.

The real "mother of Thanksgiving Day" was Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale, who was the editor of the first magazine published especially for women, Godey's Lady's Book. Mrs. Hale, before 1850, tried to get the President of the United States to issue a proclamation for a national Thanksgiving Day. Mrs. Ruth E. Finley, in her new book, "The Lady of Godey's" tells how she bombarded president after president with her demand until, in 1863, President Lincoln issued the first national thanksgiving proclamation, naming the last Thursday in November as its date. From that time on every President has issued such a proclamation, and since the 1870's the Governor of every state has also proclaimed the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day. Since there has never been an act of Congress on the subject, Thanksgiving Day is not technically a national holiday. but it would be difficult to keep the people of any state from observing it, even if the Governor forgot to issue his proclamation.

In recent years there has been a tendency to take Thanksgiving Day lightly. We are all too much inclined, in good times, to take credit to ourselves for our blessings, whatever they may be, while in times of distress it is a very human inclination to ask "what have I got to be thankful for?" We hear lots of people asking that question this year, but in our opinion one of the best cures for pessimism is to stop thinking of your hard luck and try for one day to think of all the good things that have come your way since last Thanksgiving.

There is, perhaps, small consolation in that for people who have lost their faith in spiritual things. But we believe that the great majority of Americans, by whatever name they may call their religious creeds, still believe that there is a Divine Providence which has guided and still will guide our nation, and when we consider the state of most of the people of the rest of the world, we feel that there is ample ground for a National Thanksgiving Day.

MRS. H. A. HARRIS VALUES CANNED PRODUCTS AT \$96.25

Mrs. H. A. Harris, garden demonstrator for the Irick Home Demonstration Club, has canned 300 quarts of vegetables from her garden. Mrs. \$96.25.

Mrs. Harris states that her hot bed and seed cost \$2.35. From this hot bed she sold \$9.15 worth of okra, to. mato, pepper, sweet potato, lettuce radish and cabbage plants and used all she needed besides giving a num

ber of plants to friends. Her garden contained 30 varietic with permanent plantings of rhubarb 'and asparagus. "I have also planned on green in my hot bed al

winter", Mrs. Harris said. Besides the amount of canned pro ducts, Mrs. Harris has 30 bushels of sweet potatoes, 24 pounds of dry beans, 25 pounds of black eye peas 60 pounds of Irish potatoes and two bushels of onions.

LAKEVIEW GARDEN DEMONSTRATOR VALUES PANTRY AT \$100.0

Mrs. Henry Hollis, garden demonstrator for the Lakeview Home Demonstration club had 19 varieties of and strawberries.

From this garden Mrs. Hollis canned 100 quarts of tomatoes, 50 quarts of butter beans, 25 quarts of string beans, 30 quarts of black eye peas, 10 quarts each of English peas and

grapes, 4 quarts of tomato preserves, 29 pints of beets, 2 pints of cucumbers, 30 pints of relish and 2 pints of catsup. She values this pantry Bayer Aspirin is safe. at \$100.00. Mrs. Hollis also plans to

1/2 ounce cayenne pepper. 1/2 ounce corinander. 
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


