CARS DAMAGED IN COLLISION AT STREET CROSSING MONDAY

None of the occupants of either of the automobiles were seriously injured when two cars collided at the intersection of West Missouri and Fifth Streets Monday afternoon at about five o'clock.

One of the cars, a Plymouth roadster, was driven by B. C. Lanier and occupied by Robert Hancock, Jess Lanier and Bill Baker all of this city. DEMONSTRATOR FOR PLEASANT HILL CLUB MAKES GOOD PROFITS ON EGGS

Mrs. Tate Jones, poultry demonstrator for the Pleasant Hill Home Demonstration Club, is making a profit from her flock in spite of the fact that egg prices are low.

Mrs. Jones has 120 White Wyandottes, about 50 of this number are Spring pullets and the remainder of the flock are old hens. When she started the demonstration in November, Mrs. Jones was getting from 6 to 8 eggs a day. Before the end of the month the egg production had increased to 35 eggs a day.

The total eggs produced in November was 605, in December 1114, which shows almost a double in number produced. Profits for the two months have been \$5.45 in November and \$15.83 in December. This makes a total of \$21.28 which has been made above expenses in two months.

Mrs. Jones is feeding mash as recommended by the Extension Service and grain, milk and green wheat.

FIRST FLOYD COUNTY MEAT SHOW TO BE HELD IN MARCH

The first meat show ever staged in Floyd County will be held in Floydada Friday and Saturday, March 11th and 12th, it was announced by Miss Martha Faulkner, County Home Demonstration Agent, and S. W. Ross, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. Details were worked out by these officials this week.

Meat shows, such as this one will be, are a comparatively new thing, the only other meat show ever held was held at Lubbock last spring by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce cooperating with the Texas A. & M. Extension Service. At this show many hundreds of fine cuts of meats were shown.

Winners to Show at Lubbock The Meat Show at Lubbock this year will be held on March 24 and 25 and it is the plan of the sponsors of the Floyd County Meat Show to select the winners at this show and to enter them in the Lubbock Show if final details can be worked out with the exhibitors.

The primary idea in staging this show is to give the public an idea of the high quality of meats put up in Floyd County. It is also to demonstrate the many new cuts, the new curing methods at the same time acquaint the general public with the fact that Floyd County folks do not have to send out of the county to secure their meats. Meats of high quality can be obtained in just as fine a condition in Floyd County as can be obtained anywhere.

Exhibits will be placed in the Chamber of Commerce building on West California street. Any person in Floyd County may enter meat exhibits in as many classes as desired. All that is necessary is the meeting of requirements on the entry blanks. A large or small exhibit may be entered according to specifications which will be given.

Judging of the exhibits will be done by competent judges which will be secured for the occasion. Exhibits will be judged Friday afternoon, March 11. At the time of the judging, information on the proper methods of cutting, canning and curing of meat will be given by the judges.

It is hoped by Miss Faulkner and Mr. Ross that entries will be placed from every community of the county.

HOW FARM RELIEF LOOKS TO US FROM SIDELINES

We have been following, as well as we could, the discussions about farming and the condition of the farmer which have been going on at Washington and elsewhere, and it seems to us that, in spite of all the criticisms that have been made of the Federal Farm Board and the other agencies that have been set up by the government to help agriculture, that practically nothing has come out of it.

Everybody who knows anything about rural life knows that there are good farmers and bad farmers, that some farmers are good business men and make a surplus above their living, and that some farmers are poor business men, or have other handicaps which, under any circumstances, would always keep them poor. But, on the whole, the man who owns a piece of land and is able to work can always be sure of at least a living for his family, barring droughts, floods and other acts of God, and we do not know of any other industry or kind of work in which that is true.

The farmers who are subject to the greatest distress are the one-crop farmers, who grow nothing but a single commodity, wheat, cotton or tobacco, or whatever it may be. They have nothing to fall back on when the prices of their cash crops go down. We think that all of the discussions at Washington have made this so clear that there is now a much stronger movement toward diversified farming, with the farmer's own living as the first consideration, and his cash crop as a secondary item, than there ever was before. And we are just simple enough to believe that if all farming were to be conducted on that principle, of first raising the food for the farm family and then trying to make a good cash crop of any of the important staples, there would not be any serious farm troubles, and there would not be any groups of political farmers constantly clamoring for help from the government.

Through an oversight while taking the records from the minute book of the City Council meetings, it was stated in last week's issue that the council granted a petition of the Associated Charities and Pastors' Association to allow people to work for the city to pay water and sewer bills. This petition was not granted but a motion was made and seconded which was not passed to allow this order to be made. R. F. Brown voting yes, the remaining aldermen remaining silent, the motion being lost.

MEAT CANNING RECIPES RECOMMENDED BY EXTENSION SERVICE DEPARTMENT

PORK SAUSAGE—25 pounds pork (4 parts lean to 1 part fat.) 1 cup fine salt. 3 tablespoons black pepper. 1 cup ground sage (slightly packed.) 2 tablespoons red pepper. 1 cup brown sugar.

Cut the meat for grinding. Measure and mix all seasonings. Mix well the meat and seasonings. Grind using a medium knife. To pack bulk sausage in the can take about one and one fourth pounds of the meat, slip it into the shape of the can. Put it into the can, packing down firmly. Run a silver knife around the sides of the can to avoid air spaces. Stack cans in a cooker, cover, but leave the jet cock open. Allow the heat to penetrate to the center of the can. Cans may also be placed in a moderate oven and heated. When thoroughly heated seal and process under 15 pounds pressure. No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes.

Sausage cakes may be made by molding in medium sized cakes. Place in a large shallow pan and cook in the oven until slightly browned, but not done. Fill cans, add the fat and juice is cooked out in the pan; seal and process under 15 pounds pressure. No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes.

Stuffed sausage may be made by stuffing seasoned ground meat into casings. Smoke until slightly dried and brown. When sufficiently cured, cut the sausage in lengths 1-3 inch less than the length of the cans. Place in a pan and heat in the oven or pack into the cans and heat in the cooker before sealing. Add 2 tablespoons of hot fat. Seal and process under 15 pounds pressure. No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes.

PORK ROAST—

The large pieces which are cut from the shoulders and loin make good roast pieces. Cut in sizes which will just fit into the can when seared. Sear in deep hot fat or in the oven. Pack into the cans. Add 2 tablespoons fat and 1 teaspoon salt and pepper mixture to each No. 2 can and 1 1/2 teaspoon, to each No. 3 can. (Salt and pepper mixtures is made by mixing in proportions of 1-4 pepper and 3-4 salt.)

Seal hot and process under 16 pounds pressure. No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes and No. 3 cans 55 to 60 minutes. Some people prefer to salt, pepper and flour before pre-cooking but the salt draws out a portion of the meat juices which are usually lost by cooking and sticking to the bottom of the pan in which it is seared. The flour which does not cook off from a starchy coating over the surface making heat penetration more difficult. The main essentials are to brown or sear the roasts, steaks and chops and heat them thoroughly to the center without cooking done.

BEEF CANNING RECIPES—CHILI

15 pounds meat (Beef). 3 3/4 cups of chili blend. 7 cups finely chopped onion. 1 1/2 cup of salt. 1 1/2 cup of finely chopped garlic. 4 tsp. comino seed. 4 cups of fat.

Enough water to keep from sticking to pan. Melt fat and fry onion and garlic until a golden brown. Add meat and sear until white, then add chili blend, salt, comino seed, and water. Cook until consistency to serve. Fill cans within 1/2 inch of the top and seal while hot. Process under 15 pounds pressure. No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes.

HONORABLE CLYDE E. THOMAS CANDIDATE FOR STATE SENATE

Reared in Bell County, Mr. Clyde E. Thomas, after receiving a high school education and a year in the State Normal College at San Marcos, taught in the public schools, then in West Texas, being Superintendent of the schools at Haskell at our time; he supported himself, working for his board and room while going through the high school, and by waiting on tables at old "B. He was admitted to the practice of law in 1913, and within a short time thereafter settled in Big Spring, where he has been identified with the Civic and Business development of the town, having acquired property therein, and where he has built up a large law practice.

About eight years ago he was elected Mayor of the City of Big Spring, and under his promise of an economical administration, he paid off all of the current bills, amounting to thousands of dollars, and reduced, within twelve months, the tax rate thirty-three percent, and at the same time made many civic improvements namely, paving, ornamental lights, a new water works and a sewer system—all without raising the tax rate or the valuation, and at the same time reducing the taxes and running on a cash basis.

Mr. Thomas advocated the City Manager Form of government, and during his administration, the plan was worked out and thoroughly established. He has always been interested in Government and Civic improvements; while in the University, he received his best grades in Government.

He is in favor of exempting the homestead, be it in town or in the country, from any and all taxation except local taxes, such as would come in the class of special school taxes of the community; it does seem that, since many of these homes are indebted, and a large percent of home owners own a very small equity in their homes, that this tax burden could and should be shifted to the owners and holders of the Vendor Liens and Deeds of Trust Mortgages; for it does not appear, as is the popular opinion, that this shift in the burden of tax should run money out of the State, as nearly all of the mortgages on homesteads is local or Texas money anyway, save and except Federal Farm Loans, and the money representing such loans are exempt as a matter of Federal law.

Mr. Thomas is in favor of law enforcement, and pointing out that a large percent of crime is committed, not by the home-owning citizens of the community, but by the drifting element who are hard to identify, believes that a central bureau of identification and fingerprint should be maintained in some Department at Austin for the use and benefit of the Sheriff, Constable and City Police, that such services would be of very little expense and render the cause of law enforcement a splendid service, and at the same time supplement and aid in the proper use of the Suspended Sentence.

He calls attention to the fact that during the depression and just afterwards, there is and will continue to be large quantities of Bankrupt Stocks of merchandise dumped upon the public, which are hurting the local merchant more than the depression is; and points out that some regulation should be had to prevent such stocks from being moved in from other communities and thrown upon the market, with its usual fraudulent advertisements, deceiving the retail purchasers through the sale of the usual shoddy goods.

MEAT CANNING RECIPES RECOMMENDED BY EXTENSION SERVICE DEPARTMENT

PORK SAUSAGE—
25 pounds pork (4 parts lean to 1 part fat.)
1 cup fine salt.
3 tablespoons black pepper.
1 cup ground sage (slightly packed.)

2 tablespoons red pepper.
1 cup brown sugar.
Cut the meat for grinding. Measure and mix all seasonings. Mix well the meat and seasonings. Grind using a medium knife. To pack bulk sausage in the can take about one and one fourth pounds of the meat, pat it into the shape of the can. Slip it into the can, packing down firmly. Run a silver knife around the sides of the can to avoid air spaces. Stack cans in a cooker, cover, but leave the jet cock open. Allow the heat to penetrate to the center of the can. Cans may also be placed in a moderate oven and heated. When thoroughly heated seal and process, under 15 pounds pressure. No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes.

Sausage cakes may be made by molding in medium sized cakes. Place in a large shallow pan and cook in the oven until slightly browned, but not done. Fill cans, add the fat and juice is cooked out in the pan; seal and process under 15 pounds of pressure. No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes, No. 3 cans 55 to 60 minutes.

Stuffed sausage may be made by stuffing seasoned ground meat into casings. Smoke until slightly dried and brown. When sufficiently cured, cut the sausage in lengths 1-3 inch less than the length of the cans. Place in a pan and heat in the oven or pack into the cans and heat in the cooker before sealing. Add 2 tablespoons of hot fat. Seal and process under 15 pounds pressure. No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes, No. 3 cans 55 to 60 minutes.

PORK ROAST—
The large pieces which are cut from the shoulders and loin make good roast pieces. Cut in sizes which will just fit into the can when seared. Sear in deep hot fat or in the oven. Pack into the cans. Add 2 tablespoons fat and 1 teaspoon salt and pepper mixture to each No. 2 can and 1 1-2 teaspoon, to each No. 3 can. (Salt and pepper mixtures is made by mixing in proportions of 1-4 pepper and 3-4 salt.)

Seal hot and process under 16 pounds pressure, No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes and No. 3 cans 55 to 60 minutes. Some people prefer to salt, pepper and flour before pre-cooking but the salt draws out a portion of the meat juices which are usually lost by cooking and sticking to the bottom of the pan in which it is seared. The flour which does not cook off from a starchy coating over the surface making heat penetration more difficult. The main essentials are to brown or sear the roasts, steaks and chops and heat them thoroughly to the center without cooking done.

BEEF CANNING RECIPES—CHILI
15 pounds meat (Beef).
3 3-4 cups of chili blend.
7 cups finely chopped onion.
1-2 cup of salt.
1-2 cup of finely chopped garlic.
4 tsp. comino seed.
4 cups of fat.
Enough water to keep from sticking to pan.

Melt fat and fry onion and garlic until a golden brown. Add meat and sear until white, then add chili blend, salt, comino seed, and water. Cook until consistency to serve. Fill cans within 1-3 inch of the top and seal while hot. Process under 15 pounds pressure, No. 1 cans 40 minutes, No. 2 cans 45 to 50 minutes.
