

MEAT CANNING RECIPES RECOMMENDED BY THE EXTENSION DEPARTMENT

Stew-Generally the thin, muscled pieces of meat are used for stew thick. Cook meat until bones will slip. Add onions and salt. If tomatoes, carrots, parsnips or turnips can be had, they may be diced and added in the proportion of 1-2 cup each to each pound of meat used.


