## MEAT CANNING RECIPES BY THE EXTENSION DEPARTMENT

**Curing Pork**  
Precautions, that prevent ham warping.

1. Do not overheat animal before killing.
2. Bleed well.
3. Chill meat thoroughly before curing.
4. Use pure salts, sugar and salt-peter.
5. Boil brine before using.
6. Scald utensils before using.
7. Do not puncture pieces of meat to admit cures.
8. Cure in cool, dry place.
9. Examine meat and brine frequently.
10. Cleanliness in handling meat is always important.

**Rendering Lard**  
The leaf fat and the fat trimmings make the best lard. The gut fat makes the poorest. They should never be rendered together. Be sure all the lean is trimmed out. It is not necessary to remove the skin, but the fat should be cut in cubes. Cook over a moderately slow fire and stir frequently to prevent the lard from sticking to the bottom of the kettle. Do not burn pine planks as fuel, as the smoke will darken the lard. Cook the lard slowly until white blisters form on the cracklings and they begin to turn brown. At this point most of the cracklings will float. When these signs show up it is about time to take the lard off the fire. As an accurate test dip up some of the cracklings and if they fry themselves dry in a few moments, the lard is ready to come off. Press out the cracklings and strain the lard through a cloth. The lard should be stirred occasionally as it is cooling, because this stirring will make the lard whiter and give it a finer texture.

**Making Soap**  
Surplus fat and fat that has become old and rancid can be used for making soap. The fat should be heated until it is melted. To every 7 pounds of melted fat add 1 pound of lye dissolved in three pints of water. The fat should not be too hot. About 110 degrees Fahrenheit. Pour the lye and water mixture into the fat and stir constantly until the mixture resembles honey. Pour the hot soap into a granite pan or into wooden or cardboard boxes, and allow to cool until almost hard. Then cut into squares. The soap should ripen for at least a month before it is used.

## THE VERY LATEST BY MARY MARSHALL

Strictly speaking, it isn't a collar. You may prefer to call it a pair of revers. But the dainty bit of lingerie shown at the neck of the dress in the sketch answers the purpose of a strictly speaking collar and is easy to wear and easy to make.

The size of the triangular revers should depend somewhat on the neckline of the dress. The diagonal side that follows the line of the neck should extend from the point of the V in the front to the shoulder seam. Before beginning your finished ar-



It would be a good plan to cut pieces of the desired shape and size from some old muslin, pin them into position and even off the edges as directed.

If you like, you may make the revers entirely of lace, using bands of insertion mitered at the corners, with slightly falled edging on the two exposed sides. You may, if you like, combine Irish and Valenciennes insertion, and if you have bits of any sort of real lace stowed away from the time when laces were extensively used, remember that now is the time to bring them forth, because the best dressmakers are making use of the finer sorts of lace this season.

The revers may be made by combining bands of organdie and a good imitation lace, or, to wear on a tailored or sports type of dress, you may use revers made entirely of white silk pique.

A very decided advantage of this type of neck trimming is that it is

so easily washed and ironed and just as easily put back into position again. Another advantage is that the lingerie does not extend to the back of the neck, where it might be soiled or mussed when coming in contact with the coat collar.

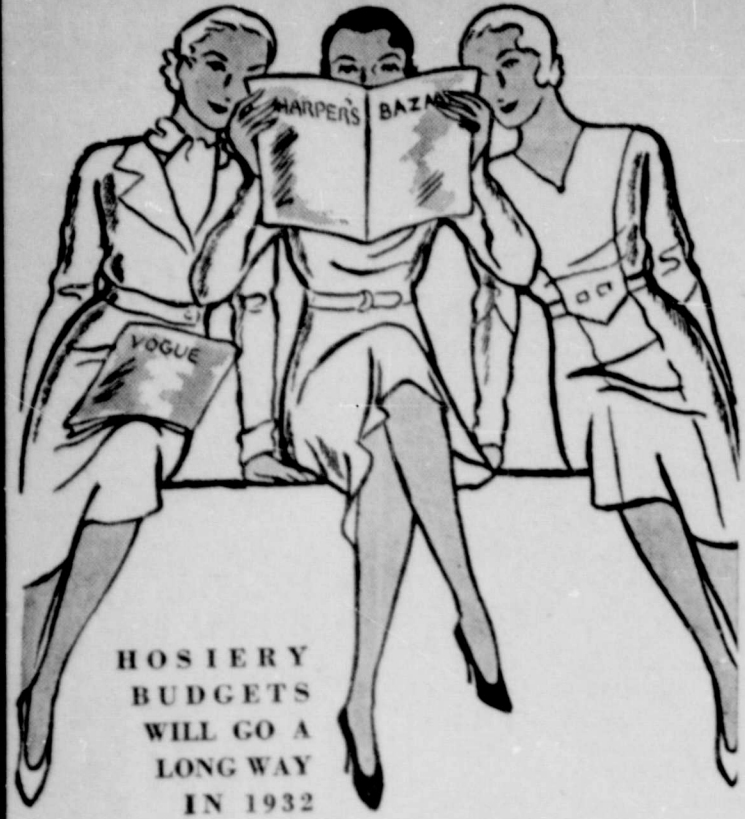

HINTS FOR THE HOME COMPILED BY NANCY HART

French Vanilla In France ice creams and ices of all sorts are something of a luxury. In America if not actually a necessity, ice cream is assuredly a most commonplace commodity. It has been brought within easy reach of all. Perhaps plentiful ice cream has its advantages, but when any article of food becomes commonplace it is somehow robbed of some of its appeal. From the French point of view the American portion of cream or ice is much too large. It should not be regarded as a mere food—mere nourishment. There should be only a morsel of it eaten as a pleasing contrast to more substantial viands. Ices and ice creams in France are very often served in little plated-silver dishes—that look exactly like very small porringers. There is one neat scoopful of the ice or cream on the dish. "Glace vanille"—vanilla ice cream—is most usually found on the bill of fare and is usually well made. Strawberry sherbet is usual enough and sometimes a vanilla ice—a very anemic sister to the more tempting "glace vanille." If you are going to France and want to bring home an unusual little souvenir, get a set of those little metal "glace" dishes—the dishes that look like very little porringers. Then when you have friends for dinner or luncheon and want to offer an unusual touch to the serving of the sweet, you can serve some sort of sherbet or ice cream on these little French dishes.

Simple Mince Meat

Mix one cup of chopped cooked meat, two cups of chopped apples, half a cup each of chopped raisins, currants, and molasses, one cup of elder, one cup of grape juice, two teaspoons of salt, one teaspoon each of cinnamon and allspice, and half a teaspoon each of clove and nutmeg. Heat to the boiling point, boil slowly 30 minutes and pack in a stone jar until ready to use.

Grilled Pears

(To serve with meat.) Peel and halve pears and brush with melted butter. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) until tender. Sprinkle with grated cheese and continue cooking under the broiler until cheese is melted and delicately browned.
