Making Soap

Surplus rat and fat that has be e old and raneid can be used for naking soap. The fat should be eated until it is melted. To every 7 pounds of melted fat add 1 pound lye dissolved in three pints of water. The fat should not be too hot. About 110 degrees fahrenheit Pour the lye and water mixture int the fat and stir constantly until the mxture resembles honey. Pour the hot soap into a granite pan or into wooden or eardboard boxes, and allow to cool until almost hard. Then cut into squares. The soap shoul ripen for at least a month before
