**MEASURES BEING TAKEN BY TEXAS FIRE INSURANCE DEPARTMENT TO PREVENT FIRES IN VACANT HOUSES IN FLOYDADA**

Prevention measures in vacant houses are being taken by the Texas Fire Insurance Department through Floydada Fire Marshal and insurance agents of Floydada to eliminate fires.

According to the local fire marshal's report, which do not cover the entire state, there were 769 vacant dwelling fires in Texas during 1931, the loss on which amounted to \$662,000. During January of this year out of 483 fires on dwelling, 71 were vacant. Twenty-two of these 71 were reported as being of incendiary origin. Eight of the 22 were over-insured. Approximately one sixth of the dwelling fires are on vacant dwellings, while certainly one out of every six dwellings in Texas is not vacant.

Each of the insurance agents of Floydada have been sent a number of forms to fill out to prepare the agent's vacant dwelling inspection report. One report is sent to G. R. Strickland, city fire marshal, and the other is sent to the Texas Fire Insurance Department. This report includes the name of the owner of the house, where the house is located or property located which is insured, with construction, number stories and type of roof.

The following questions are asked in the reports: What is the physical condition of the dwelling? Is there any rubbish in dwelling? Are doors and windows kept locked? What, in your opinion, would it cost to replace dwelling—deductive for depreciation? Amount of insurance carried? And others.

City Fire Marshal G. R. Strickland is required to inspect the vacant houses in Floydada and is doing so. To the present date 56 reports have been filed in the City Fire Marshal's office.

Following is the letter as received by the city fire marshal:  
Austin, Texas, March 26, 1932.  
To All Local Fire Marshals of the State of Texas.

Gentlemen:  
We are attaching a letter which is being sent to the local fire insurance agents throughout the state. No one realizes more than you the importance of this movement. It is of vital importance that you make inspections of these vacant dwellings as the reports are received in your office. If you find any irregularities, you should discuss them with the local agent and seek his cooperation in having them corrected. Should any of the agents fail to cooperate with you, kindly mail the report to this office, giving us complete description of the irregularities and what steps you took to have them remedied.

May I suggest that you inform your local newspaper of our activities and seek their cooperation. They are in a position to aid us materially in our cause by conveying to the public our plans and asking the people to cooperate in this movement. Ask the people, through the press, to notify you of any undue fire hazards. We are all working toward the same goal—the prevention of fires, which means the saving of human lives and the preservation of property.

Your whole-hearted cooperation in this movement will be appreciated by your citizens, as well as this department.

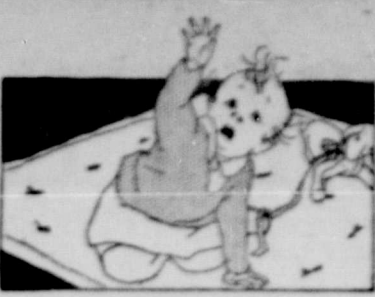

## CITATION BY PUBLICATION

You are hereby commanded, That you summon, by making publication of this Citation in some newspaper published in the County of Floyd once each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return day hereof, Lonnie McCarty whose residence is unknown, to be and appear before the Hon. District Court, at the next regular term thereof, to be holden in the County of Floyd, at the Court House thereof, in Floydada, on the third Monday in May, 1932, same being the 16th day of May, 1932, then and there to answer a Petition filed in said Court, on the 12th day of April, A. D. 1932, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 2497, wherein Eliza McCarty, Mary McCarty, a feme sole, Viola Humphreys, joined pro forma by her husband, D. B. Humphreys, and Roy McCarty, are plaintiffs and C. J. McCarty, individually, and C. J. McCarty, Guardian of the Estate of E. B. McCarty, Non Compos Mentis, and Lonnie McCarty are defendants. The nature of the plaintiffs demand being as follows, to-wit:
