

Floydada's Fire Fighting unit is valued at 15000.00 according to Fire Chief G. R. Strickland, The Fire Department unit is composed of two fire trucks, both of which are valued 11500.00.


The large truck, a 500 gallon American-LaFrance pumper, was purchased by the City of Floydada in 1928 at the time of the building of the City Hall. A 350 gallon pumper, a Graham truck, was bought in 1926. Other equipment including ose, firemen's apparel, completes the fire unit.

Both of the fire trucks and other quipment is modern in every espect. In both trucks is incorporated hooks and ladders and other items.

#### FIRST FIRE TRUCK PURCHASED BY CITY OF FLOYDADA IN 1919

The first fire truck to serve the city of Floyeada was purchased in 1919. This truck was a 300 gallon pumper Ford and was used until the present Graham truck was purchased in 1926.






