STUNTS, PARACHUTE JUMPING FEATURED IN FIREMEN'S CIRCUS

Hundreds of people representing cities from over the major portion of the panhandle plains of Texas were in attendance at the second annual Firemen's Air Circus sponsored by the Floydada Fire Department Saturday and Sunday. A number of visitors were in Floydada from Matador, Lockney, Plainview, Lubbock, Spur and other neighboring towns and cities.

Stunts performed in a special constructed Eaglerock plane and a Traveler airplane with a Radial Whirlwind Motor held the crowds thrill bound at intervals during the days of the show. Stunt maneuvers included upside down flying, tailspins, barrel rolls, fish tailing and others. Varied entertainment including passenger rides, aerona ship demonstrations, parachute jumping and landing and take-off maneuvers completed the program for the circus.

The two aerona monoplanes exhibited during the show drew more comment from the crowd than any of the other planes. These midjet planes, although having a long wing spread, are much smaller than the other types of planes. Close inspection of the aerona revealed a compact well constructed machine weighing without passengers about 470 pounds. These ships are capable of landing and taking off within a ground space of approximately 20 yards with ease. A two cylinder opposed type motor of 40 horsepower propels these machines. Several demonstrations of the aerona were given at intervals during the circus, showing speed, power and ability of the motor and flexibility of construction. Pilots in charge of the machines stated, "These machines are as safe as the larger type of airship, easier to pilot and really more thrilling to the passenger."

Ben Branson of Lubbock and Les R. Stringer of Wichita Falls were in charge of activities of the show. Mr. Stringer was in charge of a passenger ship. Members of the Floydada Fire Department were in charge of ticket sales, traffic direction and other divisions of the show. The circus was held in the Massie pasture one half mile west of Floydada.

The two days show ended with the parachute jumping Sunday afternoon at 7 o'clock. Two jumps of this nature were made during the show.

BUNCH OF WHEAT PULLED FROM STREET OF UNUSUAL SIZE

S. B. McCleskey of this city brought in a bunch of green wheat to the Plainsman office yesterday afternoon to show the rapidly maturing grain. The bunch which was brought in was examined by the Plainsman's wheat expert and declared to have grown from one wheat grain and contained about two hundred individual stalks (call in Ripley).

The wheat sample exhibited in the Plainsman office shows the maturity of wheat in Floyd County at the present time. Mr. McCleskey said that he fed the top portion of the large bunch of wheat, including the heads of grain to his cow but thought the number of stalks in the bunch was remarkable and worthy of note.

FIRST DIVIDEND OF 9% TO BE PAID BY FLOYD CO. NATIONAL BANK

L. B. Withers, receiver of the Floyd County National Bank of this city, announces that a first dividend of nine percent, payable to all depositors whose claim has been proven and allowed, has been declared and he expects to be ready to deliver dividend checks on Monday, June 6. Delivery is made on presentation by the depositor of the Receiver's Certificate held by him, the dividend payment to be endorsed thereon.

This dividend is being paid from funds acquired by the receiver in the ordinary course of liquidation, supplemented by a small loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. This loan, which is secured by a lien on the remaining assets of the bank, must, of course, be retired and until this loan is repaid no further dividend disbursement can be made by the receiver. It is believed that with the cooperation of the borrowers, this loan can be repaid within a reasonable time and if so, the depositors will receive such further regular dividend payments as collections made by the receiver will warrant.

The funds released in payment of the dividend should be a material aid to the community in these difficult times.

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HIGHEST TEMPERATURE RECORDED TUESDAY SINCE SEPTEMBER

The highest temperature recorded since the installation of the Bristol Recording Thermometer the 8th of October, last year, was recorded Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock when the mercury climbed to 94 degrees. This was the warmest temperature since October 10, when the mercury stood at 91 degrees. Some warmer weather was had in September of last year.

MEN DRAW 12 YEAR SENTENCES ON HI-JACKING CHARGES HERE

J. N. White and R. W. Davidson were each given a 12 years sentence on a hi-jacking charge tried in Floyd County District Court this week. The defendants gave their ages as 20 and 21 years.

It was alleged that on or about the first day of February of this year that these men and one other held up W. C. Toon, Troy Gregory and Aaron Kingery on the road leading through the Ballis crossing canyon. The men who were robbed were residents of near Meadow, Texas. The hi-jackers were apprehended and arrested in Ardmore, Oklahoma, and were jailed at Brownfield, Texas, where they awaited trial. The two broke jail at Brownfield but were caught later and lodged in the Lubbock jail. Davidson and White given a 5 year sentence on a filling station robbery charge at Lubbock, before being brought here for trial.

White and Davidson were residents of Oklahoma. The defendants accepted sentence Wednesday morning to serve 12 years in the state penitentiary of Texas.

Jury Excused

The petit jury serving during the third week of court was excused but the men will be re-empaneled Wednesday of next week for the fourth week of court. In the intervening time non-jury cases appearing before the court will be tried.

MANY OLD TIMERS REGISTERED AT REUNION HERE SATURDAY

Over 250 names were recorded of persons who had been residents of Floyd County for over 25 years when the annual reunion of the Floyd County Pioneers Association was held here Saturday.

A large number of persons, both present Floyd County residents and those who are living outside of Floyd County were present, other than the old settlers. Many of the Floyd County pioneer families were present in groups.

No set program was followed during the day Saturday but activity during the day moved smoothly. The major part of the morning was given to registration and greetings by old timers with one another, talks by pioneers and a general old time get-together for Floyd County old settlers. Lunch was served at the noon hour from basket lunches brought by old timers.

Following lunch at the gathering, several old settlers in the county made two minute talks to those assembled. These included Elder J. J. Day, president; R. E. L. Muney, Mrs. V. A. Leonard, D. D. Shipley and several others.

Makes Welcome Address

Mrs. A. S. Hollis, (nee Aura Adams), made the first speech on the program for the day, Saturday afternoon with the welcome address to old settlers of Floyd County. In her address to fellow pioneers Mrs. Hollis traced the development of Floyd County from the pioneer stage to the present years. In this, Mrs. Hollis discussed the several stages of development of Floyd County giving dates and illustrations. Mrs. Hollis in conclusion of her address made a beautiful tribute to the pioneer parents of Floyd County and those who had begun the development of the plains country.

District Judge Kenneth Bain made the response to the welcome address. In his response to Mrs. Hollis, Judge Bain said in part, "Although not an old settler in Floyd County, having lived here since 1916, only, I consider that in spirit that I really am an old settler in Floyd County."

"I moved to the plains country early in 1900 with my parents to Canyon, Texas, where we lived for some time before moving to Brisco county," Mr. Bain further said in tracing the story of his life on the plains. In his speech Judge Bain also discussed the development of the plains country and Floyd county from the pioneer stage to the present times.

Following Judge Bains response address officers were elected for Floyd County Pioneers Association as follows: President, Glad Snodgrass; vice president, R. E. L. Muney; Tom W. Deen, secretary-treasurer. Members of the executive committee elected were: Geo. Fawver, R. E. Fry, H. C. Randolph, Mrs. E. C. Henry, Robin Baker. R. E. Fry succeeds Glad Snodgrass who was elected as president to succeed Elder J. J. Day. These officers will serve for next year.

Plans for a parade to be staged Saturday afternoon did not materialize and this colorful event was not held.

R. E. L. Muney serving as chairman during the day Saturday formally dismissed the reunion at four o'clock. A number of the old timers together with a number of younger group enjoyed a square dance following the reunion.

The fifth annual reunion will be held on the birthday anniversary of Floyd County, May 28th next year.

**FIRST MEETING OF
FARMERS' PROTECTIVE LEAGUE
HELD FRIDAY**

The first meeting of the Farmers
Protective League of America was
held in the district court room here
Friday afternoon. This was the
first meeting in Floyd County since
the organization of the Farmers'
Protective League some weeks ago.

A number of Floydada merchants
and business men were present at
the session. Farmers and business
men comprise the major part of the
membership of this league.

M. D. Ramsey, of Harmony com-
munity and vice president of the
Texas Farmers' Protective League
of America, introduced the speaker
of the afternoon acting as chairman
of the assembly. Mr. Ramsey also
stated the purpose of the meeting
and the aim of the Farmers' Protec-
tive League of America.

"I have worked in connection with
all cooperative and Protective
Leagues ever organized in which
Floyd County had a part," Mr. Ram-
sey said in beginning the discussion
for the afternoon.

"I have stood on the floor of the
Texas Grain Association meeting and
have seen a major part of the wheat
crop of Texas, sold to the Chicago
Board of Trade," Mr. Ramsey fur-
ther stated.

In stating the aim and outlook of
the Farmers Protective League of
America Mr. Ramsey said in part,
"We are trying to acquaint the peo-
ple of Floydada and Floyd County
regarding information concerning
these cooperative enterprises for the
protection of Farmers and to give
farmers and business men here in-
formation relative to the manipula-
tion of prices of farm products."

In explanation of the Cooperative
Marketing and exchange system the
chairman pointed out that a number
of similar organizations to the Farm-
ers Protective League had been or-
ganized but none had definitely
reached their goal. The Farmers
Protective League of America was
organized on the same basis of other
organizations—non profit, appoint-
ed officers, but with a determined
purpose in mind and that to continue
until members "are carried out feet
first."

Judge L. Gough of Amarillo, presi-
dent of the Protective League and
principal speaker of the meeting
Friday, was presented to the assem-
bly Friday by Mr. Ramsey follow-
ing his introductory address.

Judge Gough explained in his ad-
dress the remedy proposed by the
Farmers Protective League for the
present economic situation. In his
explanation Mr. Gough pointed out
that the fixing of the price of wheat
and other farm products amounted
to the confiscation of farm prod-
ucts in that the farmers were forced
to sell their products lower than
the actual production costs.

"We have identically the same
proposition as the railroads of
America, whose rates are governed
by the Interstate Commerce Com-
mission" Judge Gough said in part.
"We propose to have a system
whereby the farmers will receive a
legitimate price for their farm prod-
ucts and above actual production
costs. In the case of the railroads
the freight rates are set allowing for
a certain amount of profit on the in-
vestment other than actual expen-
ses."

In stating the cause of the pres-
ent economic condition Mr. Gough
said, "Gambling on the Chicago
Board of Trade and manipulation of
prices for farm products to a con-
fiscatory level is the cause of the
depression."

Explains Remedy
Mr. Gough in explanation of the
course to be taken by the Farmers'
Protective League to relieve the de-
pressed conditions and bring back
the prices of farm products said, "We
propose to go to the proper court
and ask this court to restrain gam-
bling and manipulating of the prices
of farm products."

He further pointed out that a small
group of men were virtually setting
the price to be received for farm
products by farmers all over Amer-
ica. Mr. Gough said that the Farm-
ers Protective League planned the
filing of three cases in Supreme
Court in which claims for damages
were to be brought for loss on crops
for the past three years. These
damages suffered by farmers is to
be determined by the actual value
of the wheat minus the price received
for it. The number of bushels on
which loss was taken will be figured
in this plan. Suit will be brought
for the damages according to the
plan of the Farmers' Protective
League. The main object of this
plan is to stop the crime of a small
group of men setting the price of
farm products.

The speaker said that he expected
to have the cases filed in ten days.
In regard to the question as whether
or not the Farmers' Protective

League had authority to file these
cases due to the fact that in reality
the League has no wheat, Judge
Gough explained that the members
of the League were owners of wheat
and their damages would be com-
piled in to one sum which would be
asked for in the suit.

Mr. Gough explained the advance-
ment being made by the Farmers
Protective League in neighboring
counties and urged the cooperation
of every farmer in Floyd County in
this venture. Following his speech
to the group present Mr. Gough ex-
plained the financing of the league,
and asked for pledges to pay court
costs. He explained the pledges to
support the league as "sinews of
war."

The meeting was dismissed by M.
D. Ramsey who stated that another
meeting of the Farmers' Protective
League would be held in the near
future at which time he expected to
hear reports on advancement being
made in this work.
