MRS. T. J. BOYD OF THE ANTELOPE CLUB WON FIRST PLACE ON DRESS AT ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENT DAY EVENT HELD HERE

THREE SERIOUSLY HURT; OTHERS INJURED IN TRUCK WRECK

Ely Robbin, 45, Jo Robbins, 8, Vela Robbins, 13, are all in the Smith and Smith hospital here in a critical condition following an accident which occurred this morning at 9 o'clock. Seven others in the party sustained minor injuries as a result of the accident.

Two families, E. L. Robbins and family and Mrs. Duteh Roberts and family, were enroute to Bethel, Oklahoma, from Bent, New Mexico, in a Chevrolet truck when the truck overturned. The accident occurred 15 miles East of Floydada on the Matador highway, near the J. R. Reidhimer residence.

Ten persons were riding on the truck at the time of the accident, there were: Ely Robbins, 45, Jo Robbins, Vela Robbins, 13, Clayton Roberts, Ray Robbins, Elvis Robbins, Grady Robbins, Mrs. Duteh Roberts, and little son Eugene, and Mrs. E. L. Robbins. Clayton Roberts was driving the truck when the accident occurred.

The F. C. Harmon ambulance was rushed to the scene of the accident. Dr. W. M. Houghton went immediately to the accident, where he gave medical aid to the injured persons in the party. Several cars of people from Floydada went to scene of the accident. The ambulance returned to Floydada at 10:30 with the three critically injured persons and further medical treatment is being given at the Smith and Smith sanitarium. The extent of the injuries had not been determined by physicians attending at the time of going to press, but the three seriously injured parties are suffering from severe internal injuries, bruises, cuts and minor hurts.

PAVING OF HIGHWAY 28 TO BE DISCUSSED AT MEETING IN LOCKNEY TONIGHT

Committees, to secure right-of-way for the paving of highway 28 through Floyd County, will probably be appointed in a meeting at the Municipal Auditorium at Lockney tonight. Committees for this section of Floyd County have been appointed and are working on the matter.

The meeting this evening at Lockney will be the first in that city for the purpose of hearing discussions on the paving issue. Reports from Lockney indicate that the land owners on the proposed route of the highway are favoring the plan.

Mrs. T. J. Boyd, of the Antelope Home Demonstration Club, was first place winner among the club demonstrators at the annual Floyd County Home Demonstration Club Clothing Achievement Day, held Saturday. Achievement Day for the club members was held at the Floydada High School beginning at 10 o'clock.

97 Dresses Judged

Miss Pauline Lokey, county home demonstration agent of Swisher county, judged a total of 97 dresses exhibited by club demonstrators and cooperators during the clothing day event. 17 club demonstrators were present with dresses completed and 80 cooperators were present with their dresses complete.

A total of 70 home demonstration club members were registered Saturday morning at which time the clothing articles were checked in by Miss Martha Faulkner, county home demonstration agent.

During the morning session the judge of the event, Miss Lokey, judged the demonstrators dresses while the remainder of the club women present selected a first place winner from the individual clubs.

Lunch was enjoyed at the noon hour. Each of the women present brought a dish of food and dinner was served together.

Style Show at 2:30

A style revue was held at 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, at which time each of the ladies present displayed the dress she had made. Explanations were heard from the women who gave reasons why they had chosen the type of dress made. This included style, pattern and color of material of which the garment was made. Cooperators and demonstrators were entered in the style show.

The style revue was held on the stage of the Floydada High School auditorium. 165 women were present for this event, 150 of whom were club members of the county.

Following the style show the decision of the judge was announced. Mrs. T. J. Boyd was declared first place winner with a score of 97 points; Mrs. H. H. Meador, of the Lone Star Club, was announced second place winner with a total score of 96 points. Miss Blanche Ramsey, of the Harmony-Allmon Club, and Mrs. S. M. Lester of the Liberty club, tied for third place with 92 points. Mrs. G. E. Bond of Campbell club was fourth with a score of 90 points.

Score was determined by the following articles judged, book and records complete up to July first, narrative and story of demonstration, foundation pattern and dress.

It is planned to give the first place winner among the demonstrators, Mrs. T. J. Boyd, of the Antelope club, a free trip to College Station to the A. & M. Short Course the last week in next month. Mrs. Boyd will be sent by the Floyd County Home Demonstration Council. Mrs. C. A. Caffee, council chairman, also of Antelope club, will also be sent to the short course.

WHEAT AND ROW CROPS HEAVILY DAMAGED BY HAIL STORM IN NORTH AND EAST FLOYD COUNTY THURSDAY NIGHT

A hail storm which apparently swept the entire length of Floyd County Thursday night between the hours of ten and twelve o'clock, heavily damaged several thousand acres of wheat and row crops in the north and eastern sections of the county.

The hail storm was accompanied by a heavy down-pour of rain in several portions of the area and reports of rain, varying from one-fourth to four inches, were received from farmers, in the area effected.

Reports received indicate that the storm cloud gathered in the vicinity of the Hillcrest community and swept a strip several miles in width the entire length of Floyd County to Lakeview and through that vicinity.

Several farmers whose wheat and row crops were within the path cut by the hail storm reported damages ranging from 10 percent tototatolosa. Heavy losses were reported from the Fairview community, Baker, East Campbell and Lakeview communities.

The storm traveled in a southwestern course across the county. Several wheat farms received practically a total loss while others were only slightly damaged.

A terrific hail and rain storm occurred in almost the same territory last year on Friday afternoon, June 11, while the hail Thursday night was on June 10. Several of the farmers whose crops sustained damage last year were again heavy losers by hail.

Reports received from various portions of the hail effected area by the Plainsman office are as follows: E. J. Hoffman farm East of the Fairview school house, wheat and row crops almost total loss. S. L. Rushing near the Hillcrest community reported no hail and very little rain. Former Featherston place in northeast Floyd County reported covered by hail, almost total loss on four sections.

A. H. Kreis in the Baker community reported a heavy loss on two sections of wheat. G. L. Pawver reports approximately 30 percent damage on entire crops. Fred Brown sustained about 50 percent loss on his farm located ten miles northeast of Floydada.

R. L. Carter in the Fairview community reported a heavy loss on wheat and row crops. G. R. May, whose place is three and one-half miles southeast of Floydada, had a ten percent damage on his wheat farm in the Baker community.

Severe losses were also sustained by W. C. Cates, W. W. Payne, J. R. Reidhimer and others in the Baker vicinity.

In the Lakeview community heavy damage was reported by Conway Brothers and several others.

A heavy rain and severe hail was received in Floydada. Several residents indicate that they have received heavy damages to gardens and shrubs. Local carpenters have been called to several residences to inspect roofs which it is believed were damaged by the hail.

Several stockmen and farmers of the county reported injuries to livestock and poultry by the hail stones and many received damages to roofs and windows of their homes.

Rain Not General

Rainfall was not general over Floyd County, precipitation being within the range of the hail storm and accompanied by it. Rain fell from Floydada and vicinity east to the Motley county line in the county and south from the Fairview and Hillcrest communities.

Light showers but no hail was reported from the O. S. Miller and T. J. Gill farms in the Center community. Some rain also fell in the territory southwest of Lakeview.

TAXPAYERS LEAGUE COMMITTEE REPORT ADVANCEMENT IN WORK

The first regular meeting of the Executive committee of the Floyd County Tax Payers League, held in the Floyd County court room Friday afternoon at two o'clock, revealed that the organization of the Tax Payers League had obtained visible results in moves toward a substantial tax reduction.

Following is the report of the committee on the meeting Friday afternoon:

Floydada, Texas, June 10, 1932.

We the undersigned committee appointed by the Floyd County Tax Payers League, in session of this date at the court house in Floydada, Texas, hereby make the following report:

"We find that action is being taken by those in authority to make substantial reductions in our valuations which brings our taxable values down to an average of about \$9.00 per acre on land with City property showing about the same proportion of reduction as placed on land. This is upon County and State values only.

This committee is kept active and will try to meet any emergencies for the interest of the Tax Payers, we desire to hereby express our confidence in our commissioners and other officials as being willing to cooperate with the tax payers in substantially lowering our tax values, they have so expressed themselves and assure us that they are in sympathy with this move and will work with us to the end of lowering all taxes over which they have authority as fast as conditions and set indebtedness will justify."

COMMITTEES APPOINTED TO SECURE
RIGHT-OF-WAY FOR PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT
HIGHWAY NUMBER TWENTY-EIGHT

In group meetings held Thursday night and Friday morning of last week at the county court room an organization was perfected to complete arrangements to secure the 100 foot right-of-way for the planned improvement of highway number 28 in Floyd County.

According to information received by J. N. Johnston of this city, some time ago, the State Highway Commission will finance the construction of grade and drainage structures on the proposed paving or art surfacing project on Highway number 28 which goes through Floyd County from the Motley County line to Hale county.

In the meeting Thursday night, concerning the highway paving project, about thirty interested Floyd county people including Floydada merchants and business men were present. Guy R. Johnston, division highway engineer, of Lubbock, was present at the meeting Thursday night and explained the part of Floyd county citizens in securing this highway improvement.

No Bond Issue

"There will be no bond issue connected in any way with the proposed plan to improve highway 28 through Floyd County. The Federal and State Highway Commissions are sponsoring and financing the construction of this new highway through Floyd County and all that is asked of Floyd County citizens is that they secure the 100 foot right-of-way necessary for the highway," Engineer Johnston said in part.

Committee and Officers

As a forward move to secure the proposed improvement of highway number 28 through the county an organization for this purpose was perfected with officers and committees elected to serve in this connection.

Johnston is President

J. N. Johnston of this city was elected as chairman of the right-of-way organization. Mr. Johnston has made extensive inquiries to the State Highway Commission and obtained visible results. S. W. Ross, secretary of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, was selected as secretary.

J. B. Jenkins of Floydada made a motion that a body be organized to get movements underway to secure the right-of-way necessary and asked by the State Highway Commission to build the highway. On a motion made by Mr. Jenkins, seconded and passed, Mr. Johnston and S. W. Ross were elected as chairman and secretary respectively.

An executive committee consisting of N. A. Armstrong, Glad Snodgrass and J. B. Jenkins were named to work in connection with the officers.

Engineer Johnston explained that as soon as the highway right-of-way was secured and an order signed by the Floyd County Commissioners Court giving the State Highway Commission the deed to the right-of-way property was secured, that the State Highway Commission and highway engineers were ready to start the construction work on the new highway.

Many property owners along the right-of-way proposed, following the present highway 28, have indicated

that they will donate the land necessary for the right-of-way.

Three Routes Proposed

Three proposed routes have been mapped out by Engineer Johnston of Lubbock, one of which will probably be followed in the construction of the improved highway.

The three routes have been pointed out by Chairman J. N. Johnston as follows: "Beginning at the Motley County line and straight in to or near Floydada over the present highway number 28, thence to Lockney over one of two routes north or south of the railroad, thence by way of Aiken to connect with the Hale County paved highway west of Aiken." One route is over the highway east of Floydada straight to Main street thence past the Court house and on north past the Floydada Laundry and north west by the compass. Other routes will be used on any street west through Floydada, thence north to the present highway south of the railroad.

Guy Johnston of Lubbock also explained the plan of the improved highway Friday morning at the meeting at which 100 persons were present. Much interest in the plan was expressed by those present.

\$50,000.00 Immediate Outlay

J. N. Johnston in explaining the expenditures to be made by the Federal and State Highway Commissions has said: "For several years the people of Floyd County have been in need of good roads and highways. Under the then existing conditions the commissioners court have made the best use of the money entrusted to it and the roads have served the people only fairly well.

"Several efforts have made to vote bonds for road construction but have failed for reasons that are obvious.

"Years ago the federal government designated Highway 28 and the State Government adopted it with the three other highways over the same route east and west through Floyd County. Highway 28 is now being designated for immediate improvement.

"West Texas and specially the plains has occupied a very important position in the economic and fiscal affairs of the state. The people pay on more motor vehicles than the number of children on the plains and pay more gasoline tax than in any other part of the state according to population.

"In the 129th Representative District there are 24,000 motor vehicles while according to population not half so many children, which makes more taxes on both gasoline and vehicles on the plains.

"The people of the plains during the past several years have paid more than their part of the taxes on both gasoline and property, and have little benefit from the funds for highway construction. The amount of gasoline tax collected each year approximates 33 millions dollars. This augmented by the federal government and the counties approximates \$55,000,000 or near 150 thousand a day.

"Recently the balance on hand showed an excess of 13 million dollars," Mr. Johnston further said.

Highway Number 28 is a national highway and extends from the eastern states through Floyd County to San Francisco. The federal government is intensely interested in the construction and maintenance of this highway and in case the federal government needs this highway for transportation in any emergency its convenience would facilitate federal purposes.

"The immediate outlay in Floyd County will be approximately \$50,000.00," Chairman Johnston explained. This amount will aid materially the economic situation in Floyd County during the late summer and fall months.

Expect Results Soon

It is expected that the Right-of-way will be secured and work will be started within the near future on the improvement of the highway. It was pointed out in the meeting that the new highway would be constructed either of concrete or caliche.

A committee to secure the right-of-way from landowners along the route of highway 28 were appointed as follows: East of Floydada to Motley county line, Claude Goen and A. H. Kreis;

From end of paved highway in Hale County to past Aiken in north-west Floyd County, Robert E. Jones and G. C. McAvoy. This committee has been active during the past week and report favorable results.

No committee has been appointed in Lockney as yet, but committees will very likely be named in a meeting at the Municipal Auditorium there tonight.

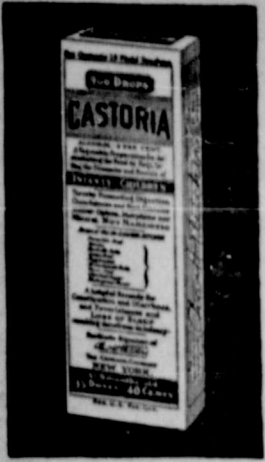

This represents a decrease of more than \$37,000,000 in purchasing power in Texas communities. There has been a corresponding decrease in purchase of materials and supplies by Texas railroads. The ability to have maintained railroad payrolls and purchases would have been a very important factor in overcoming the present trying economic condition.

The decline in railroad payrolls and purchases is due only in part to economic conditions. The revenues of the railroads have been affected not only by business conditions but to a very large extent by loss of traffic to trucks and buses using the public highways in competition with the railroads.

● The time has come when the people of Texas must decide whether the traffic of this state can best be carried by the railroads, using facilities which they built and maintain at their own expense, or by trucks and buses using the highways built and maintained at the taxpayers' expense.
