HERE IS ANOTHER TO ADD TO YOUR FREAKISH CYCLONE TALES

During the eyelone which occured in southeast Floydada Monday evening when the Grady Hall house was torn almost to kindting wood, a strip of cotton wall canvas was driven through a tree timb three inches in diameter.

In the course of the cyclone a limb on a tree in the front yard of J. S. Collins' residence, was elightly split; into this incision the cloth was lodged and driven completely through the wood to the other side where a portion of the cloth is visible.

A 4x4 rafter, several feet long, was also lodged in the roof of the Collins home during the twister.

Debris from the wrecked house was scattered with that from the D. E. Smith house for several hundred yards by the storm.

PANHANDLE STATION, ED BROWN, H. T. SMITH JONES, COLLINS, JENKINS, AND D. E. SMITH HOMES IN PATH OF TORNADO

Two frame residences located on East Marivena Street in South East Floydada were completely demolished and several others in the adjoining neighborhood were heavily damaged by a twister which struck at 6:40 o'clock Mon. evening. The cyclone occured in the midst of a terrific rain and hail storm which hit Floydada and Floyd County late Monday afternoon.

A six room frame structure belonging to Grady Hall of Plainview, was completely demolished and lumber from the structure strewn for two blocks. Another frame house, the home of the Smith family, was also practically demolished. The Hall house was unoccupied but the entire Smith family was at home at the time of the cyclone.

The twister which dropped from a heavy cloud during the rain and hail storm, first hit in Floydada at the Panhandle Filling Station located on the South end of Main Street. A Dodge sedan automobile parked in the Panhandle station at the time was caught up by the wind and carried to the front lawn of the Ed Brown and family residence. No damage of a serious nature was done to the Panhandle station or the Brown home.

The twister, sweeping diagnoally to the southeast, struck the H. T. Smith residence which lay in the path of the destruction. A windmill was uprooted and carried along with the cyclone. Several trees in the Smith vard and in the W. O. Jones home yard, were uprooted and carried along the course. Trees, portions of a windmill and fences were carried to an approximate height of 300 feet during thecourse of the twister.



However, this action on the part of leading drug and toilet goods dealers whose names appear below, to lighten the burden on consumers, last only 10 days. After which time the tax will be added to the present retail prices of toilet goods, dentifrices, sporting goods, cameras and a few other sundry items.
