Cyclone Dips In Floydada Early Monday Evening

GENERAL RAINS IN FLOYD COUNTY DAMAGING TO ALL CROPS

Torrential rains, accompanied by strong wind and hail, late Monday afternoon did much damage to mature wheat and growing row crops in Floyd county generally. Rain began falling at the northwestern edge of Floyd County at 5:40 o'clock Monday afternoon according to reports received here.

Heavy rains were received in the brief period of time that the storm continued, in practically every section of the county. Although the rain fell generally over Floyd County there was a variance in the amount received in several communities. Reports received indicate that the lightest precipitation in Floyd County was in the Campbell, Center and Cedar Hill communities.

Lee Wilkinson, mail carrier to Silverton, reported that only light rain was received north from Floydada and vicinity. J. E. Norton, of the Campbell community, reported, "We had about three quarters of an inch of rain with no hail and a hard straight wind."

Hail Damaging in Sections
The heavy rains were accompanied by wind and hail, which, in several communities caused a total loss of several hundred acres of wheat, cotton and growing feed.

The range of the damaging hail extended from the north edge of the McCoy community to the north of the Harmony community and vicinity, in south and west Floyd County; the hail cloud traveled in an almost direct eastern direction, varying a small bit to the south.

Total losses on wheat, cotton and feed crops were reported by Ham Smith, Harry Christian and others in the Blanco community, Ned King, R. I. Teeple, Hiram Johnston, southwest of Floydada, J. R. Terry, O. P. Rutledge farm, W. C. Cates, in the south and near southeast of Floydada. J. H. Fondy, whose farm is two miles south of town, said that his cotton crop was a total loss. Several others in the general swath cut by the storm, sustained heavy damages and losses, to wheat, cotton and other crops.

Tip Kendrick, who is working with his brother, Ernest, seven miles west of Floydada reported three inches of rain, little hail and no strong winds. John Shipley said that he had three inches of rain and no hail damage at his place.

J. R. Terry, whose farm is three miles south of Floydada, said, "We had about four inches of rain at my place. This is the biggest rain I ever saw on the plains at one time."

G. W. de Cordova, reported, "We had a good rain out at the place, with heavy damage to all the crops, have 93 acres of barley that I'll never run the combine in. My wheat will probably make three bushels to the acre." Mr. de Cordova's farm is located southwest of Floydada in the east of Harmony community.

C. A. Cass, teacher at Lakeview, said that they had a three or four inch rain in that community, with some hail damage. The rain and hail fell from the same cloud that drenched Floydada and sections of the county.

HERE IS ANOTHER TO ADD TO YOUR FREAKISH CYCLONE TALES

During the cyclone which occurred in southeast Floydada Monday evening when the Grady Hall house was torn almost to kindling wood, a strip of cotton wall canvas was driven through a tree limb three inches in diameter.

In the course of the cyclone a limb on a tree in the front yard of J. S. Collins' residence, was slightly split; into this incision the cloth was lodged and driven completely through the wood to the other side where a portion of the cloth is visible.

A 4x4 rafter, several feet long, was also lodged in the roof of the Collins home during the twister.

Debris from the wrecked house was scattered with that from the D. E. Smith house for several hundred yards by the storm.

REPAIR ON SNODGRASS BUILDING WILL SOON BE COMPLETED

The repair work on the Snodgrass Chevrolet Company garage building which has been under way for several weeks is advancing rapidly. Carpenters have completed the greater portion of their work and the interior of the building is being painted.

The building, which was damaged by a fire several months ago, is expected to be ready for use next week. Roy Snodgrass will reopen his Chevrolet agency when the building is ready for use.

H. O. Pope's battery shop and the Motor Inn service station have been in operation during the time repairs were being made to the building.

The front display space of the building was increased in the process of the remodeling.

EDGAR WRIGHT'S CONDITION IS UNIMPROVED; HE IS CRITICALLY ILL

Edgar Wright, son of Sheriff and Mrs. J. M. Wright, is unimproved this morning. He has been seriously ill for the past two weeks with a kidney ailment, which he had for several years.

"Edgar's condition is some worse this morning," Mrs. Wright said today.

Edgar has been confined to his bed for about two weeks.

FIRE THURSDAY EVENING DESTROYED CHICKEN HOUSE IN SOUTH FLOYDADA

Approximately \$50.00 damage was done by a fire Thursday afternoon which destroyed a poultry shed at the rear of the D. W. Johnston residence located at 102 East Hallis Street in this city.

An alarm was turned in to the Floydada Fire Department and the flames were extinguished before further damage could be done.

The fire was caused by kerosene igniting which was being used in the chicken house.

LAKEVIEW SCHOOL BUILDING UNDER CONSTRUCTION DAMAGED BY CYCLONE

A portion of the west wall of the new school building under construction at Lakeview was torn down by a light cyclone which struck it Monday evening late. The brick from the structure damaged was strewn for several yards about the building.

C. A. Cass, superintendent of the Lakeview school system, said that the storm which caused the damage to the school building also did damage to other buildings in the community.

"Besides the damage to the wall some new work, bricklaying and other work, was damaged by the wind and rain," W. H. Henderson of the Floydada Insurance Agency said. "We don't know exactly how much damage was done to the school building yet."

The building of the Lakeview school building has been under way for several weeks.

TRUCK ACCIDENT VICTIMS RELEASED FROM SANITARIUM MONDAY; RECOVERED

Eely Robbins, and daughters Jo and Vela, were released Monday from the Smith and Smith sanitarium where they had been since Thursday of last week, due to injuries received in a truck accident Thursday morning.

The three injured persons were of a party of ten persons who sustained minor injuries when a Chevrolet truck in which they were riding enroute to Bethel, Oklahoma, from Bent, New Mexico, over-turned 14 miles east of Floydada last Thursday morning. Several of the group were given medical attention, immediately following the accident.

Two families, the E. L. Robbins family and Mrs. Roberts and family, were the accident victims. All were reported as fully recovered from the accident at the time of their departure from Floydada Monday. It was first thought that three of the party were seriously injured but later developments revealed that they were suffering from shock and not internal injuries.

JUDGMENT GRANTED WILLIS ESTATE AGAINST GROCERY FIRM

The closing days of the May term of Floyd County District Court were active ones with several cases coming up and being disposed of by the court.

In the case of E. C. Nelson, executor, of the Willis Estate vs. Oscar L. Stansell et al, the plaintiff was granted judgment to recover the sum of \$1675.00 from defendants, Oscar L. Stansell, J. C. Stansell, E. M. Collins, W. G. Collins, P. M. Felton and T. P. Collins, jointly and severally.

Oscar Stansell, J. C. Stansell, E. M. Collins, and W. G. Collins, were also granted judgment by the court to recover from Co-defendants, P. M. Felton and T. P. Collins, the said sum of \$1675.00. By this action P. M. Felton and T. P. Collins being made defendants. The plaintiffs, E. C. Nelson, executor, will also have foreclosure on the properties of the Felton-Collins Grocery Company and other property of defendants, P. M. Felton and T. P. Collins, if necessary, to recover the sum of \$1675.00, according to the judgment of record.

SOUTH EAST FLOYDADA SWEEP BY CYCLONE AT 6:40 O'CLOCK MONDAY EVENING

\$1,500.00 LOSS IN FIRE SATURDAY NIGHT AT SOUTH FOURTH STREET HOUSE

Approximately \$1,500.00 damage was done to a five room frame house, located at 902 South Fourth Street in this city, by a fire of unknown origin which was discovered at 12:39 o'clock Saturday night.

\$1,200.00 insurance was in effect in the house which was owned by O. S. Jones of Amarillo, Texas. The house was the former home of O. E. Murray and family.

Floydada's volunteer fire department was called into action, although the flames had gained headway to the point that it was a matter of impossibility to check them. The house was a total loss.

INCREASE IN FIRST CLASS MAIL RATE TO BECOME EFFECTIVE JULY FIRST

An increase in First Class Mail rates will become effective July 1, according to information released by the local post office.

The increase in rates provides for 1 cent additional rate on letters, making the new postage rate 3 cents on each letter; Air mail rate, 8 cents for the first ounce and 13 cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof.

JOHN NICHOLS, COLORED, HORSE DROWNED DURING STORM MONDAY

A horse, belonging to John Nichols, colored, was drowned Monday evening, during the storm, at the intersection of Jeffie Avenue and Third Street in Floydada. The accident occurred near the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Jones, where the colored man had started when the storm hit, with his wagon and team.

During the storm one of the horses in the team became entangled in the harness and fell to the ground and was unable to arise. Efforts of colored men to get the horse on his feet were futile and the animal drowned in the back water of the street intersection.

Nichols sought refuge in the Edgar Jones garage during the storm being badly frightened.

WINDMILLS WRECKED IN STORM MONDAY EVENING

Several windmills in Floydada and small outhouses were wrecked during the storm late Monday evening.

Edgar Jones' windmill at his home located at the intersection of Jeffie Avenue and Third Street, was blown down.

John Wahl's windmill at his home across the street north of the Jones home was also laid low. Andy Ryals' windmill at his home on West Georgia Street was blown down and other minor damage done.

Several small chicken houses and other out buildings and fences were damaged during the severe wind, at various homes in the city.

COMMISSIONERS COURT TO SIT AS BOARD OF EQUALIZATION JUNE 28, 29 AND 30

The Floyd County Commissioners Court will sit as a board of equalization on the 28, 29 and 30th of this month, on state and county tax renditions for the 1932 tax roll.

Approximately 200 renditions were marked for hearing and notices sent out to the property owners. Various owners will appear before the board of equalization during the three days period set aside for this purpose.

JUNE TERM FLOYD COUNTY COURT CASES CONTINUED UNTIL NEXT TERM

The June term of Floyd County court which convened Monday morning of this week was adjourned the same day.

All cases appearing on the docket were continued until the next term of county court.

PANHANDLE STATION, ED BROWN, H. T. SMITH JONES, COLLINS, JENKINS, AND D. E. SMITH HOMES IN PATH OF TORNADO

Two frame residences located on East Marivena Street in South East Floydada were completely demolished and several others in the adjoining neighborhood were heavily damaged by a twister which struck at 6:40 o'clock Monday evening. The cyclone occurred in the midst of a terrific rain and hail storm which hit Floydada and Floyd County late Monday afternoon.

A six room frame structure belonging to Grady Hall of Plainview, was completely demolished and lumber from the structure strewn for two blocks. Another frame house, the home of the Smith family, was also practically demolished. The Hall house was unoccupied but the entire Smith family was at home at the time of the cyclone.

The twister which dropped from a heavy cloud during the rain and hail storm, first hit in Floydada at the Panhandle Filling Station located on the South end of Main Street. A Dodge sedan automobile parked in the Panhandle station at the time was caught up by the wind and carried to the front lawn of the Ed Brown and family residence. No damage of a serious nature was done to the Panhandle station or the Brown home.

The twister, sweeping diagonally to the southeast, struck the H. T. Smith residence which lay in the path of the destruction. A windmill was uprooted and carried along with the cyclone. Several trees in the Smith yard and in the W. O. Jones home yard, were uprooted and carried along the course. Trees, portions of a windmill and fences were carried to an approximate height of 300 feet during the course of the twister.

The Jenkins residence lying in the path of the storm was slightly damaged by the wind, two brick chimneys and small outbuildings, were demolished. Little damage other than to trees, fences and small out-houses, was done to the W. O. Jones residence. Mrs. W. O. Jones who

SOUTH EAST FLOYDADA SWEEP BY CYCLONE AT 6:40 O'CLOCK THIS EVENING
Continued from page one
was at home at the time of the cyclone said that the twister apparently came down the alley across their front yard and followed a south-easterly course into the country.
The former Grady Hall and family residence was struck by the cyclone and completely demolished, not a section being left intact. Timbers from the frame building were blown for a distance of three blocks in the general path of the storm. The J. S. Collins residence, located several yards and next door, from the Hall house, was slightly damaged about the roof and front portion of the building. Flying timbers from the demolished building struck the Collins home with terrific force causing the damage. Mr. and Mrs. Collins were not at home at the time, being in Amarillo visiting with relatives.
The other Smith home which was in the course of the cyclone was also heavily damaged; the roof and sections of the walls were drawn up into the twister and flung high into the clouds above. Mr. and Mrs. Smith and children, at home at the time of the cyclone, sought refuge under beds when the roof and ceiling was torn from above their heads, admitting torrents of rain and hail.
Fred Jenkins, who lives nearby the Smith family, was the first party to reach the scene of the twister. He reported no injuries to any one but all badly frightened. Neighbors rushed immediately to the scene of the storm havoc, to render aid if necessary but found no one had suffered any injuries.
Several light posts and power lines in the vicinity of the havoc wreaked by the cyclone were flattened and wires strewn for yards about. Many of Floydada's residents were present at the scene.
The persons caught in their homes during the cyclone were reported to be favorably recovering from the shock.

SOUTH EAST FLOYDADA SWEEP BY CYCLONE AT 6:40 O'CLOCK THIS EVENING

was at home at the time of the cyclone said that the twister apparently came down the alley across their front yard and followed a south-easterly course into the country.

The former Grady Hall and family residence was struck by the cyclone and completely demolished, not a section being left intact. Timbers from the frame building were blown for a distance of three blocks in the general path of the storm. The J. S. Collins residence, located several yards and next door, from the Hall house, was slightly damaged about the roof and front portion of the building. Flying timbers from the demolished building struck the Collins home with terrific force causing the damage. Mr. and Mrs. Collins were not at home at the time, being in Amarillo visiting with relatives.

The other Smith home which was in the course of the cyclone was also heavily damaged; the roof and sections of the walls were drawn up into the twister and flung high into the clouds above. Mr. and Mrs. Smith and children, at home at the time of the cyclone, sought refuge under beds when the roof and ceiling was torn from above their heads, admitting torrents of rain and hail.

Fred Jenkins who lives nearby the Smith family, was the first party to reach the scene of the twister. He reported no injuries to any one but all badly frightened. Neighbors rushed immediately to the scene of the storm havoc, to render aid if necessary but found no one had suffered any injuries.

Several light posts and power lines in the vicinity of the havoc wreaked by the cyclone were flattened and wires strewn for yards about. Many of Floydada's residents were present at the scene.

The persons caught in their homes during the cyclone were reported to be favorably recovering from the shock.

MRS. W. B. CLARK, 64, STRUCK BY LIGHTNING BOLT DURING STORM

Mrs. W. B. Clark, 64, was rendered unconscious by a bolt of lightning during the hail and rain storm in Floydada late Monday evening. Mrs. Clark, with Mr. Clark, were standing on the front porch of their home located at the end of California Street, when the near-tragedy occurred.

Mrs. Clark was stricken while in the act of sweeping the front steps of their home, during the storm; she was unconscious for a period of fifteen minutes.

Mrs. Clark's son, Byron Clark, and his wife, who live next door, rushed immediately to render aid to his mother, no physician was summoned. Latest reports indicate that Mrs. Clark is resting well after the ordeal and is recovering rapidly from the severe shock.

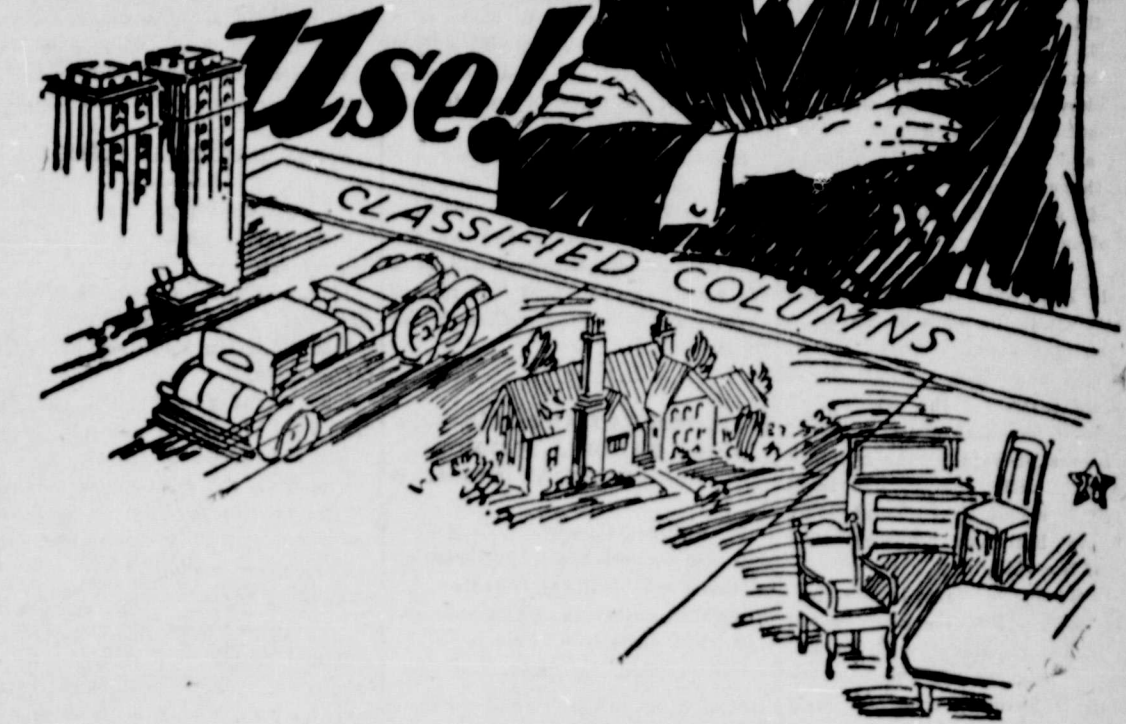

GENERAL RAINS IN FLOYD COUNTY DAMAGING TO GRAIN AND ROW CROPS

Continued from page one county west. A strong wind accompanying the storm wreaked havoc with several windmills, outhouses and slightly damaged several residences in the community. "This was the most rain I ever saw in Floyd County, since I have been here," Mr. Cass said.

V. E. Patterson, whose farm is ten miles southeast of Floydada in the Lakeview community, said, "I had about ten percent damage on my wheat and most of the other farmers in this community had the same." The rain and high wind caused the most of my damage," Mr. Patterson said.

Earl Edwards and Bill Ham-bright's windmills were blown down by the light tornado which apparently was the same that struck Floydada earlier in the evening.

Mickey Grocery Company reported four inches of rain in the Sandhill community with about one third damage to wheat by hail and wind. No heavy hail was reported from north of Sandhill.

G. L. Snodgrass' farm in the Harmony community received about three inches of rainfall with no hail damage. Mrs. M. J. Carr in the Harmony community reported about 25 percent loss on wheat by rain and wind, and damage to row crops.

W. B. Daniel in the Blanco community reported a total loss on wheat and other crops by the storm.

Heavy Rain Fall Here

Floydada was covered by a heavy rain which fell from 6:20 to 7:20 o'clock Monday night. Torrents of water caused streets to become flowing streams within the hour's period. The water receded late Monday night.

Some hail was received here which did damage to many gardens, shrubs house roofs and trees in the city.

More Hail and Rain Reports

Following are more rain reports received at the Plainsman office early this morning on the storm Monday evening and rain falling since that time:

SECTION 751 OF THE REVENUE ACT OF 1932 PASSED BY CONGRESS JUNE 6, 1932, imposed a tax of 2 cents on each check, draft or order for payment of money drawn upon any bank, banker or trust company. Such tax to be paid by the maker or drawer of the check or draft, and such tax to be collected by the bank, banker or trust company by making a charge to the account of the maker or drawer of the check or draft.
