APPROPRIATION TO BE MADE FRIDAY BY STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION FOR PAVING OF HIGHWAY 28, IF RIGHT-OF-WAY IS SECURED

An appropriation will be made Friday, 15, by the Texas State Highway Commission for the construction of 40 miles of paved highway through Floyd County, providing the right-of-way is completed by that time.

Committees at work on the right-of-way are confident that the route through the county will be secured by Friday, which has been set as the date for completion of the right-of-way. It is believed by those in charge of the securing of the right-of-way that all details will be in readiness for the action of the State Highway Commission this week.

A definite route for the highway has not been set as yet, although it is known that the present route of Highway 28 will be used partially. The highway will go south of the Santa Fe railroad through the outskirts of Lockney to connect with the end of the Hale County pavement, near Aiken.

"There are approximately 60 or 65 names of landowners to be obtained before the right-of-way is completed," a member of the committee said.

"We have only 6 or 7 more names to obtain then the right-of-way through the county will be complete," J. N. Johnston, right-of-way chairman said Monday.

If the appropriation is made by the Highway Commission for the Floyd County paving project by Friday, activities are expected to be well underway within the month.

It is believed that the persons who robbed the Santa Fe and Q. A. & P. railroad stations safes are guilty of the automobile theft.

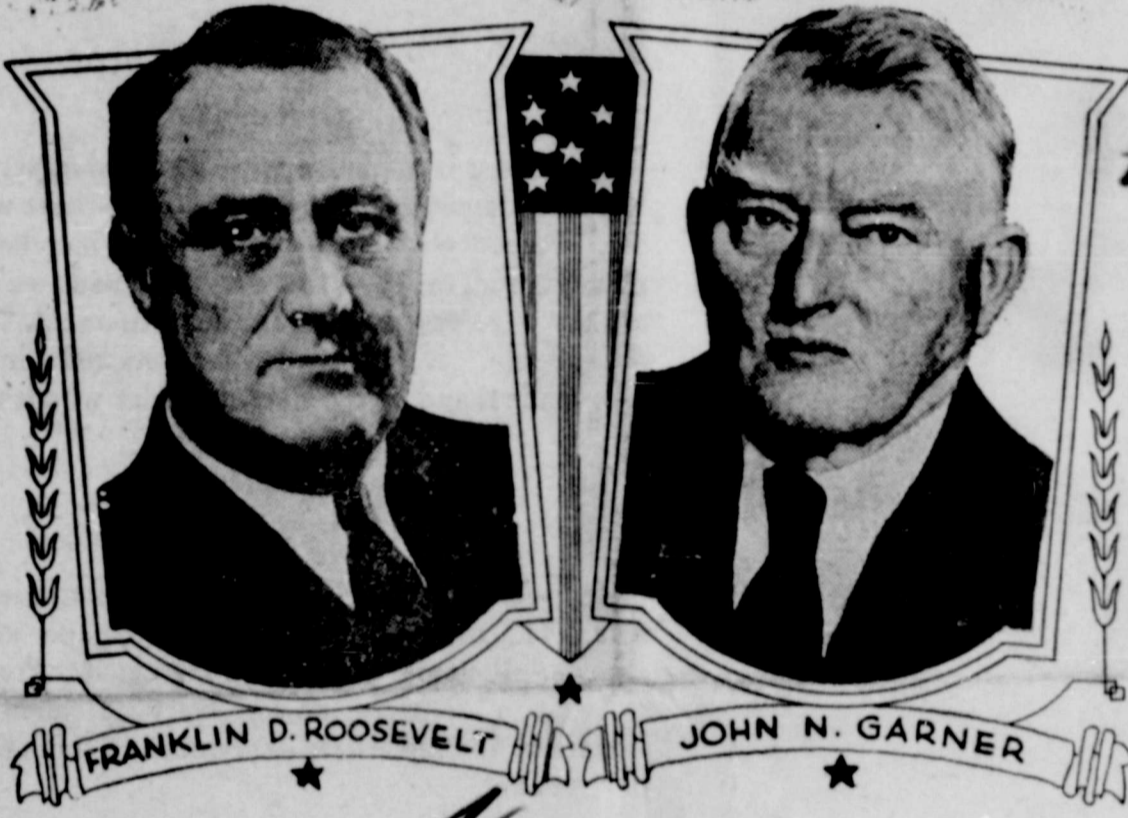
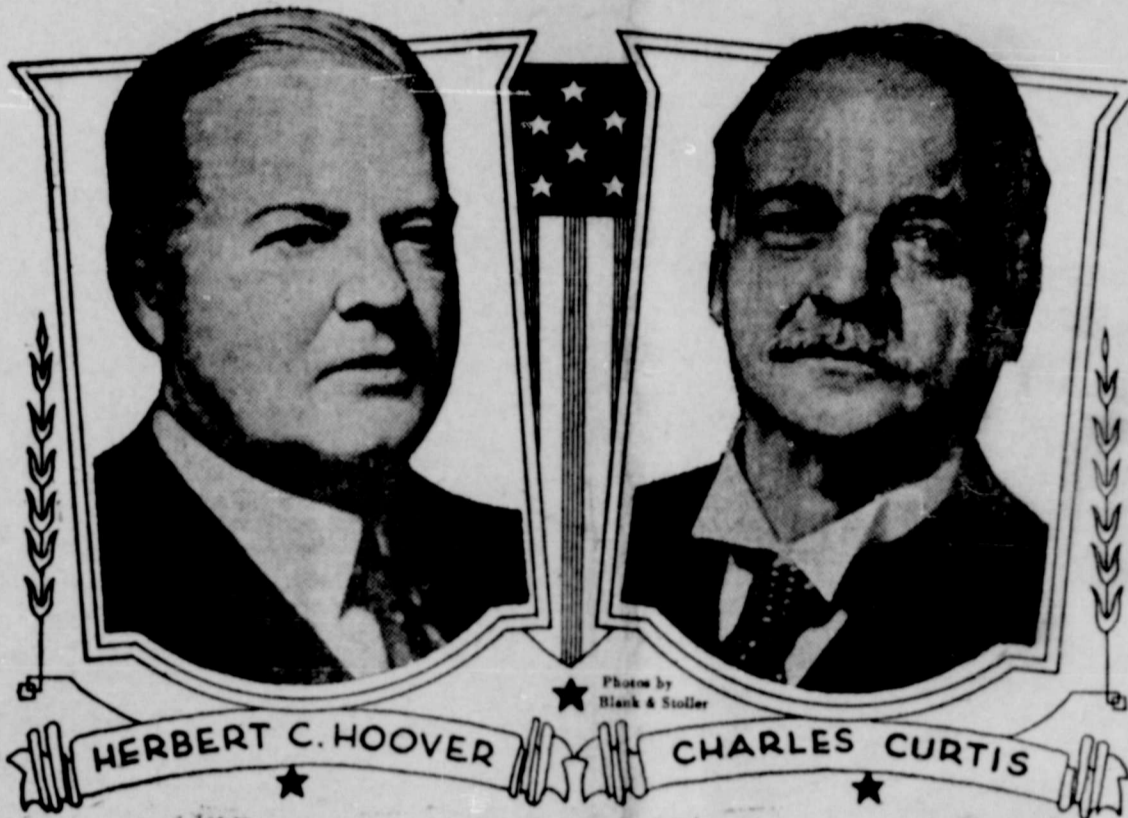
The car thieves had not been apprehended at the time of going to press. Footprints were found near the scene of the theft.

Q. A. & P. AND SANTA FE STATIONS ARE BURGLARIZED

Another series of burglaries in Floydada Thursday night netted thieves \$45.00 in cash. The Q. A. & P. and Santa Fe Railroad stations' offices were entered, sometime during the night.

The burglars gained entrance to the Q. A. & P. station by forcing a window with a heavy bar of some kind. The knob on the safe was knocked off and approximately \$15.70 in cash stolen, no other papers or valuables being taken.

Access was gained into the Santa Fe station in like manner and a similar procedure followed to obtain approximately \$30.00 from the Santa Fe station safe.

The robberies occurred in Floydada the same night that railroad stations in Justiceburg, Southland and Hale Center were entered and the safes robbed. It is believed that the same parties were guilty of all offenses.

Clues leading to identification and arrest of the guilty parties had not been found by local officers Friday morning, although an investigation followed the discovery of the robberies early that day.

WILL ROGERS, COWBOY HUMORIST-CRITIC, MAKES SHORT STOP IN FLOYDADA WHILE EN-ROUT TO MASHED-O RANCH AT MULESHOE

DEMOCRATS HAVE A GREAT CHANCE UNTIL ELECTION DAY, SAYS WILL ROGERS

"Well, the Democrats have a great chance until election day comes", Will Rogers, noted cowboy humorist and critic said while in Floydada late Thursday evening, when expressing views on the political situation.

"This is the year for Democrats, because the 'ins' must get out and the 'outs' must get in", the famous columnist said.

Will Rogers enroute to Mashed O, Halsell ranch at Muleshoe, Texas, from the W. T. Waggoner ranch at Vernon, stopped in Floydada Thursday evening at 5:30 o'clock. He was accompanied by Charles H. Featherston, old time friend and fellow delegate to the Chicago National Democratic Convention.

Frank Hughes, 87, Died Monday at Italy, Texas, was J. M. Hughes' Uncle

Frank Hughes, Ellis county pioneer, 87 years of age, died Monday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Elay Price in Italy, Texas. He became seriously ill Friday and that night Jim Hughes, of near Floydada went to his uncle's bedside, returning Saturday.

The deceased was a pioneer peace officer of Ellis county, serving in this capacity for more than 50 years. He was born in Mississippi, but came to Texas with his parents in 1855.

He served in Parson's Brigade of the Confederate Army and after the war, was peace officer for many terms. He was married to Miss Kate McClain, in 1872, who survives as do the following children: Mrs. Mary Pittman, Harlingen; Mrs. Katie Jennings and Mrs. Jennie McKinney, Chandler and Mrs. Price. Funeral services were conducted at the Presbyterian church at Italy, by Rev. E. C. Cargile of Seymour, with burial in Hughes Cemetery.

Will Rogers, world famous humorist and political wisecracker, found time Thursday evening for a brief visit in Floydada, while enroute to Muleshoe to the Halsell Mashed O ranch from W. T. Waggoner's three D ranch at Vernon.

The cowboy humorist in company with Charles H. Featherston, former resident of Floyd County, now of Wichita Falls, arrived in Floydada at 5:30 o'clock Thursday evening in an auto. They visited while in Floydada in the Fred Zimmerman home in southwest Floydada. Mr. Zimmerman and C. H. Featherston are friends of long acquaintance.

A few friends were present at the Zimmerman home during Rogers' visit of about two hours duration, and enjoyed a chat and informal visit with the famous newspaper critic humorist.

Dressed in Cowboy Garb
Rogers was dressed during the brief visit here in typical cowboy regalia with the usual boots and ten gallon hat. He wore a pair of much wrinkled rough khaki pants and a light colored shirt with the collar unbuttoned at the collar and no tie. The habitual Rogers grin overspread his countenance.

Rogers appeared to be in perfect physical condition with a healthy tan complexion, sparkling clear, gray eyes, and height of color in his cheeks. His personal appearance was more of comfort than style and he seemed perfectly at ease and was refreshingly natural. Rogers does not use tobacco but enjoys chewing gum.

During the more than two hours that Will Rogers visited in the Zimmerman home in this city he seemed at ease at all times and appeared to enjoy the visit very much and without a hint of formalism.

When asked if it bored him to have so many people want to see him and talk with him, Rogers replied, "It's purty nice to have your friends want to see you." Rogers talked almost continuously, mixing a liberal amount of humor and wit in the conversations. He replied to interrogations instantaneously.

To California
Will Rogers was enroute to Muleshoe, from which point he went to Amarillo by airplane, leaving there Saturday morning with his home in California as his destination.

WILL ROGERS REFUSES AID OF TUMBLER WHEN DRINKING RED SODA POP

It is reported that the only refreshment, other than water, that Will Rogers enjoys is 'country' red soda pop, and this was proved to be fact, in a rather humorous manner, while the noted humorist was visiting in the Fred Zimmerman home last Thursday evening.

When, during the course of the evening red soda pop was proffered him, Rogers accepted the refreshment and positively refused the aid of a glass in drinking it. Will likes his straight from the bottle. This type of refreshment was requested by Mr. Rogers at several stops in his return trip from Chicago to Claremore, Oklahoma, and on to California, often using more than one bottle to quench his thirst.

During his stay here Rogers talked with N. A. Armstrong, veteran cattleman of Floydada, who had several friends in general with Rogers at Coffeyville, Kansas, and Claremore, Oklahoma, and other points, both having had dealings in cattle with them.

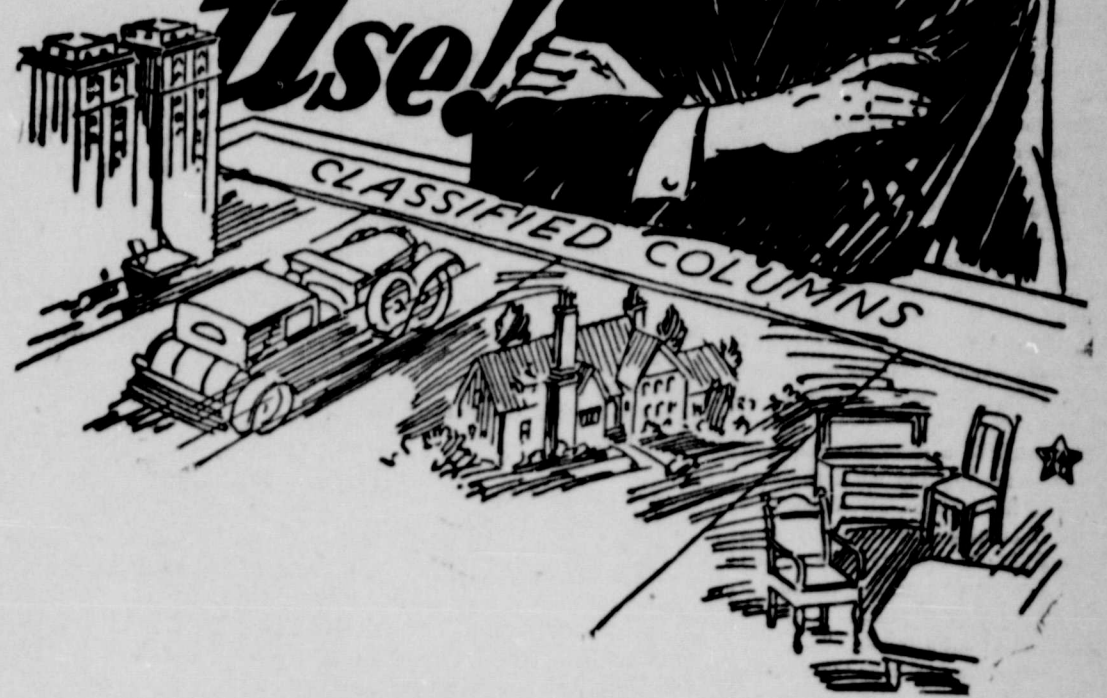

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Modern Home is Built in Log of Fir More Than 2,100 Years Old

A home, modern in every respect, built in a giant Douglas Fir tree section, which is mounted on a truck, was on exhibition in Floydada Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

Doc L. and Mrs. Carter, working with the Tate Medicine Company, live in the home in the interior of the log, and conduct visitors through their home.

The section, in which the house is built, is eight feet in diameter, 15,700 pounds and is mounted on a Pierce-Arrow truck. A gallon of gas is consumed by the truck in traveling a distance of one and one-half miles.

The tree from which the huge log was cut grew near Seattle, Washington, and had been growing 175 years when Christ was born and 1783 years when the colony of Jamestown, Virginia, was founded in America.

"A period of a year was required to hollow the log and build the furniture in the interior, all of the furniture, including cabinets, tables, dressers etc., was constructed of the Douglas Fir", Doc Carter, in charge of the unique house, said.

"There was not a fourth of an inch of space in the entire log that was not utilized in some manner."

"The tree from which this section was cut was 305 feet tall and this section was cut 64 feet from the earth," Doc Carter further explains to the sightseers to the log.

A gasoline tank, built into the log, carries 30 gallons of fuel for the truck. There is also built into the log water storage tanks for the bathroom and kitchen fixtures, which are modern in every aspect.

161 people registered during the day Tuesday in Floydada as they passed through the log. The register pad was placed on a table in the breakfast nook of the unique home.

"This is one of the worth while sights that people get to see that is one of the wonders of nature," Mr. Carter said. "As far as we know this is the only exhibition of its kind in the entire world."

"This tree was cut in 1924 and hewn out and the home built inside in 1925, at an original cost of \$12,500.00," the exhibitor concluded.

TEXAS RAILROADS PAY SUBSTANTIAL PART OF STATE'S TAX BURDEN

● Taxes is one of the large fixed charges connected with the operation of Texas railroads. From the standpoint of the welfare of state, counties and communities, railroad taxes are of much importance. This annual obligation must be met from the earning capacity of the rail carriers.

In 1931 the railroads of Texas paid a total of \$8,303,108.47 in federal, state, county, municipal and miscellaneous taxes. The distribution of this amount to the various tax funds is shown below:
