Funeral services for Thomas Pool Adams, 57, of Wichita Falls, were held at 4:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon in Wichita Falls from the Chapel of the Merkel Undertaking Company. Mr. Adams was a brother of Mrs. Edd Johnson, Mrs. Glad Snodgrass and Miss Ona Adams of this city, and formerly practiced law in Floydada.

Mr. and Mrs. Glad Snodgrass and daughter, Miss Gwendolyn, and Mr. and Mrs. Edd Johnson attended the funeral services from Floydada.

Died of Sunstroke

Mr. Adams, pioneer oil operator in and around Electra, Burkburnett and Wichita Falls, died in Longview Friday night, dying from sunstroke. His body was forwarded to Wichita Falls Saturday night for services.

Mr. Adams came to Floydada in 1909 and practiced law from that time until 1911, when he moved to Wichita Falls. He engaged in the insurance business in Wichita but soon became attracted by important oil discoveries in Electra in 1912 and became one of the district's largest independent operators.

His most successful operations were in the Clara district in the Ramming and other pools of that section. He was head of the Adams Oil Company, the I-Tex Oil Company and the McEam and other producing companies.

Born in Bosque County

T. P. Adams was born in Bosque County, the son of J. W. and Matilda E. Adams, both pioneer Texans. A graduate of Southwestern University at Georgetown in 1898, he practiced law until moving to Wichita Falls.

Survivors include: Two daughters, Mrs. Wendell Pickens of Cleburne, Texas, and Mrs. Hallie Donley of Houston; three brothers, Geo. I. Adams of Austin, John Adams of Hillsboro and Hugh Adams of Valley Mills, Texas. The sisters surviving are: Mrs. Edd Sears of Valley Mills, Texas; Mrs. Levi A. Dunlop of Meridian, Texas, Mrs. W. S. Moss of Mansfield, Texas, Mrs. Glad Snodgrass, Mrs. Edd Johnson and Miss Ona Adams of Floydada. Those present for the funeral services were: Geo. Adams, Mrs. Wendell Pickens and Mrs. Hallie Donley, other than the Floydada relatives.

Interment was made in the Rosemont cemetery.

Mercury Mounted to 101 Sunday Afternoon; Seasons High Temperature

Floydadans sought refuge from Old Sol's scorching rays Sunday afternoon as the mercury soared to reach the highest temperature of the season. The Bristol Thermometer at the West Texas Gas Company here indicated 101 degrees Sunday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, which is the highest reached yet.

A nation wide heat wave which started last week was not broken this week but people continued to sweeter in the heat.

Hot suns and winds have rapidly diminished the ample supply of moisture in Floyd County farms, which was stored up from the recent rains, and crops are slightly suffering for want of rain. Floydada residents in numbers have abandoned the idea of irrigating gardens and lawns, after attempting this action for several days but to no avail apparently.

Voting to be Heavier In Election This Year Than That in 1930

Voting strength of Floyd County will exceed that of the last primary election according to the poll tax records kept in the office of C. M. Meredith, tax collector. In 1930 the total number of paid poll taxes was 1974, this year there have been issued 2,432 poll tax receipts.

There will probably be around 3,000 votes polled this year in the election Saturday. The 2,432 paid polls together with the exemptions will approximate 3,000 ballots.

In several instances during the last minute political rallies heated discussions between office aspirants have arisen, which were not unexpected.

The Floyd County race track is now lined with candidates in the last "heat" of the race for office with the white line marking victory lying in the polls at the first primary election Saturday.

The Plainsman has never taken a stand in an effort to try to tell any one how to vote, but it is hoped that every voter in Floyd County will come out to the polls Saturday, July 23rd and place their vote as they may choose—but by all means, vote. Of course, we have our choice and naturally we are going to place our vote accordingly, and we ask that every voter likewise exercise their rights and opinion in the forthcoming election.
