BYRON CLARK GETS MAJORITY FOR CLERK; RANDERSON AND BREWSTER IN RUN-OFF FOR SHERIFF; MOORE WINS AS COLLECTOR

First Primary Closes Last Few Hours With Bunk and Undue Mud Slinging

Byron Clark of this city won by a majority of 64 votes over both his opponents, Tom W. Deen, incumbent and L. L. Muncy. Mr. Clark polled 1375 votes, Deen 1077 and Muncy 234, in the county clerk's race.

The second primary election to be held August 27, will determine the winner of the Floyd County Sheriff's office between E. S. Randerson and W. A. Brewster, as a result of the democratic primary election Saturday. Randerson, Floydada candidate, polled 967 votes against 839 ballots cast for Brewster of Lockney, according to unofficial election returns.

Frank Moore won by a 289 vote majority over C. M. Meredith, incumbent tax collector in the election Saturday. Moore received 1463 votes and Meredith received 1174, according to unofficial election returns.

McCullum and Howard in Run-Off J. W. Howard, incumbent and C. J. McCullum go into the second primary election. E. H. Rankin, of Lockney was third, polling 651 votes. Howard is leading in the voting for county judge with 1044 ballots against 969 for McCullum of Lockney.

Shelton is Winner A. E. Shelton totaled the greatest number of votes for public weigher of Precincts 1 and 4, winning over G. Scott King by a very small vote.

Miriam Ferguson Carried Voting for Floyd In Governor's Race

Miriam A. (Ma) Ferguson carried the Floyd County voting in the first democratic primary election Saturday. Mrs. Ferguson polled 981 votes to 767 for Sterling the nearest gubernatorial candidate. Hunter of Wichita Falls, was third in voting with 384 votes.

Floyd County again went Ferguson in the Saturday primary election casting a third of the total ballots for Texas' first and only woman governor. R. S. Sterling was a close second with Hunter bringing up third.

Governor R. S. Sterling, of Houston, incumbent, will go into the August run-off with Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson. If the procedure of two years ago is not repeated Mrs. Ferguson will become the next governor.

In 1930 Mrs. Ferguson entered into the second democratic primary or August run-off only to be defeated by Ross Sterling.

Tom Hunter, according to election results, threatened to step into second place to send Sterling to third, but later reports indicate that the final run-off will be between Sterling and Ferguson.

Interest in Politics Brightens Then Wanes as Election Passed Sat.

Voters' interest in politics, the election and political meetings, was at its height last week during the last few hours before and after election Saturday.

In the last few hours Saturday afternoon left for the voters to cast their ballots a number of candidates could be seen rushing madly this way and that passing out cards and making last minute pleas for votes, and incidentally discussing last minute campaign "talk".

Interest and discussions, although centered mainly on politics, has waned this week and will remain dormant until the latter part of August when again the candidates will "get in the harness" for the last lap of the race.

Polk Goen, who had been ill with an attack of blood poisoning for several days, is able to be up and in town this week. Although not completely recovered, Mr. Goen is much improved.

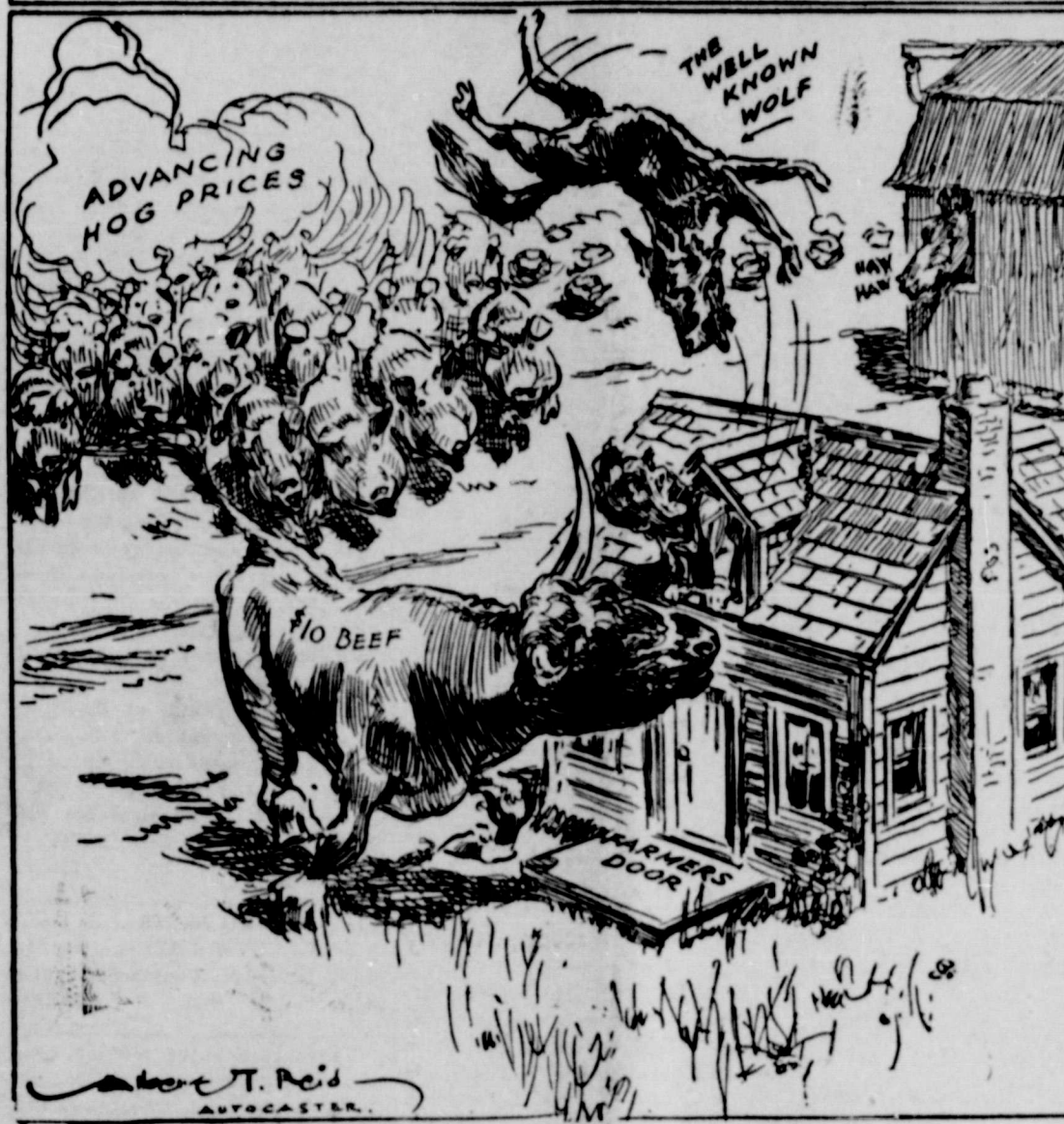

Work of securing the right-of-way, which was thought complete last week, has been underway for several weeks. The paving improvement of highway 28 will materially aid the financial situation locally and give Floyd County a paved road also it is pointed out by the road enthusiasts.

The market occupies the west half of the lower floor of the Reihimer building, former location of the Peoples Exchange.

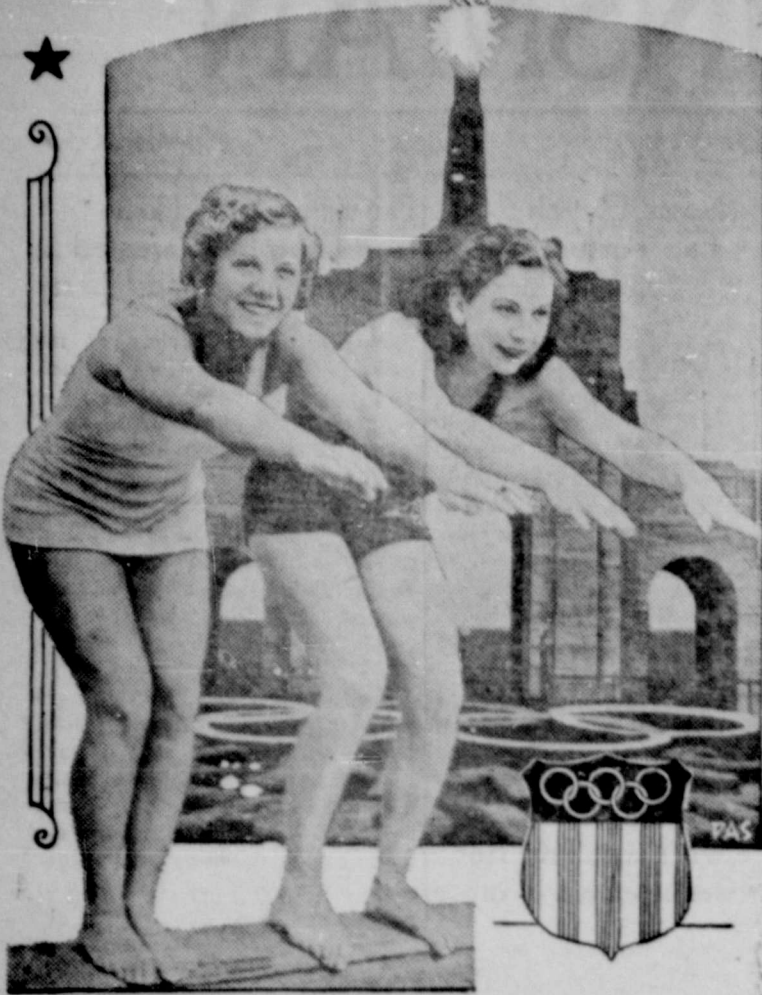
BONNOREA STEVENS BETTER

Voters' Trend to Install
New Officials in Election
Held Here Saturday

The general trend in the casting of ballots in the primary election held here Saturday was apparently to elect new officials in practically every office in the county where opposition was had.

In most instances the incumbent was defeated by persons seeking offices for the first time. Other incumbents entering in the August run-offs are expected to find their opponents slightly favored for the office, for which they are candidates, if the first primary is to be taken as a guide to follow.

Floyd County candidates who will enter into the second primary race have slightly relaxed this week following the election Saturday, and are getting their "wind" for the second lap of the race for office.

Candidates will, in all probability, begin canvassing the county again next week for votes to be cast in the second election, August 27. No over-confidence has been expressed by many of the candidates in the run-off, although some feel that they perhaps have a better chance to be elected now than they did before the first election.

J. N. Johnston Polled
Majority of Votes in County
For Representative

J. N. Johnston, of Floydada, candidate for Representative 120th Congressional District, received the greatest number of votes cast in Floyd County in the first democratic primary election Saturday.

M. R. Avery, of Castro County, and A. B. Tarwater, incumbent, neither polled many votes in the county.

Majority of Votes Cast
For A. J. Folley in District
Attorney's Race

A. J. Folley, incumbent district attorney, polled the greatest number of votes in Floyd County for district attorney.

Robt. A. Sose, of Floydada, received 673 votes in the county compared to 1903 for Folley.

Election returns from other counties in this district indicate that Judge Folley won the district attorney's race by a large majority.

Floyd County Club Poultry Demonstrators Make Profit on Flocks

Poultry demonstrators and other members of Floyd County home demonstration clubs have realized substantial profits from their poultry during the past month. More money is made annually by farm people from their poultry than practically any other commodity.

Mrs. M. Hassell, poultry demonstrator for the Starkey club, has a flock of 64 white wyandotte hens. During the demonstration period these hens laid 776 eggs or an average of 12 eggs per hen.

Mrs. Hassell's total receipts from the sale of eggs and poultry amounted to \$6.50. Expenses for the month amounted to 15c, thus showing a net profit of \$6.35.

Mrs. W. C. Hubbard, demonstrator for the Pleasant Valley club, showed a profit of \$7.25 at the end of the demonstrator's month.

The flock of 155 white leghorn hens produced a total of 1750 eggs, receipts from the sale of which was \$13.00. Expenses for feed amounted to \$7.75, revealing a profit of \$5.25. Mrs. Hubbard feeds mash and grain to her chickens.

Mrs. Karl Sammann, demonstrator for the Prairie Chapel Club, has a flock of 258 Rhode Island White hens. A total of 3817 eggs were laid by these hens during the month.

Total receipts from the sale of eggs amounted to \$31.23. An income profit above the \$6.15 feed costs amounted to \$25.08.

Miss Irene Smith demonstrator for the McCoy Girls home demonstration club, showed a net profit of \$7.55 on her poultry at the end of the month.

Miss Smith's flock of 65 hens produced a total of 1048 eggs, which sold for \$9.15. An average of 18.5 eggs was laid by each hen. Total expenses were \$1.60.
