Floyd County again went Ferguson in the Saturday primary election casting a third of the total ballots for Texas' first and only woman governor. R. S. Sterling was a close second with Hunter bringing up

Governor R. S. Sterling, of Houston, incumbent, will go into the August run-off with Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson. If the procedure of two years ago is not repeated Mrs. Ferguson will become the next governor. in 1930 Mrs. Ferguson entered into the second democratic primary or August run-off only to be defeated by Ross Sterling.

Tom Hunter, according to election results, threatened to step into seond place to send Sterling to third, but later reports indicate that the final run-off will be between Sterling and Ferguson.


