L. P. INGRAM, PROJECT ENGINEER, AND ASSISTANTS, ARE HERE

To Start Survey Work On Highway Number 28 Sometime This Week

Engineer L. P. Ingram, project engineer in charge, E. F. Filley, instrument man and Floyd Simpson, Rodman, all of the State Highway Department, arrived in Floydada Wednesday afternoon. Offices have been established in rooms 201 and 202 in the Headliner Building in this city, where plans will be made for the paving project on highway 28 through Floyd County.

The engineering crew came to Floydada from Crosbyton where they had been working on the asphalt paving of a highway in Crosby county.

"We expect to start the survey and plans for the highway improvement in Floyd County within the next two or three days," Engineer Ingram said yesterday.

"We will be ready to start our work here as soon as arrangements of the office is complete and preparations are made final," Mr. Ingram further said.

The project engineer in charge said that he expected to employ two or three men as helpers with the survey work but other activity would come later as the project advanced.

Improvement on Highway 28 is being made by appropriations by the State and Federal governments. Highway 28 through Floyd County is a Federal highway.

Activity prior to the building of the highway through Floyd County started in earnest this week after the Floyd County Commissioners Court had made a guarantee to the State Highway Commission that the right-of-way through Floyd County would be given. Work had been under way by several interested citizens of Floyd County on securing the right-of-way, which was completed late last week.

Several Floyd County officials have been busy completing arrangements for the arrival of engineers to begin the survey work and made plans. Several trips have been made by them to Lubbock to see Guy R. Johnston, district resident engineer. Messrs. Ingram, Filley and Simpson are completing the placing of instruments, charts and fixtures in their offices today.

MILES PATTON, 73, DIED FRIDAY MORNING AT HOME IN LAKEVIEW COMMUNITY

Miles Patton, age 73, died Friday morning at 5 o'clock at his home in the Lakeview community, after being ill for some time. High blood pressure was said to have been the direct cause of his death.

Mr. Patton was born in Tennessee November 17, 1858, moving with his parents to Marion County, Arkansas, during the period of the Civil War. He was reared in Marion County. He was married to Miss Fannie Davis, on October 8, 1883, she being a native of Arkansas.

Mr. Patton with his family first moved to Texas in 1889, making their home at Taylor county. A year later due to ill health, he was compelled to return to Arkansas but later returned to make his home in Comanche county, Texas, for a time. In 1896, after another return to Arkansas, Mr. Patton returned to Texas to make his home permanently in Comanche county.

Resident Here 14 Years
Mr. and Mrs. Patton moved to Floyd County in 1918 from Haskell county where he had lived since 1900. The family became well and favorably known in the Lakeview community and Floyd County. One son, Claude Patton, and family reside in the Lakeview community at the present time.

Surviving are two sons and a daughter, who are: Claude Patton, of Lakeview; Roy Patton, of Floydada and Mrs. Harley Brown of Rochester, Texas. Mrs. Patton also survives and resides in the Lakeview community. One sister, Mrs. Sarah Rhodan of Pyatt, Arkansas, also survives. All the children were present for the funeral as was Mrs. M. Patton, the widow. 18 grandchildren and one great-grand child survive.

Funeral Services Saturday
Services were conducted Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Lakeview Baptist church by Rev. J. Mat Harder, of Ralls assisted, by Rev. H. M. Reed of Crosbyton. Deceased had been a member of the Baptist church for a number of years and was affiliated in this connection with the Lakeview Baptist church, being one of the organization members. Mr. Patton had also been a member of the Masonic lodge for 52 years becoming a member when 21 years of age.

Pall bearers were as follows: Ollie and John Conway, Elmer and Fieldon Roy, B. L. Breed and Fred Battey. All were friends of long standing in the Lakeview community.

Annual Encampment For Club Girls to be at Hank Smith Memorial Park

The annual encampment for members of Girls Home Demonstration Clubs in Floyd County will be Friday and Saturday, August 26th and 27th this year, Miss Martha Faulkner, county home demonstration agent, announced Tuesday of this week.

Hank Smith Memorial Park, located in the southeast part of Floyd County on the Crosbyton Floydada highway, was selected as the scene of the annual outing of the club girls.

Ten Clubs to be Represented
A total of ten home demonstration clubs in Floyd County will be represented at the two day and night encampment, Miss Faulkner said this week. Girls will be in attendance from clubs at Antelope, Baker, Lakeview, Sandhill, Liberty, South Plains, Irick, Fairview, Starkey and McCoy.

"Arrangements are being made to accommodate 100 club girls at the encampment at the Hank Smith Park, although the exact number going has not been determined as yet," Miss Faulkner explained.

"We are planning on making arrangements whereby each club girl in Floyd County will be given the privilege of seeing Miss Alta Lloyd's improved bedroom at her home in the Lakeview community, and this is one of the primary reasons that the Hank Smith Memorial Park was selected as the location of the encampment," the home demonstration agent further said.

Club girls attending the encampment are asked to meet on the Floyd County Court House lawn Friday afternoon, August 26, early enough to be prepared to leave at 5 o'clock for the camp. Each club is expected to furnish its own car or cars to convey the group to the canyon. Every club is asked to have at least one chaperon and preferably two, a man and woman. The group will return to Floydada Saturday, August 27, at noon.

Miss Faulkner is mailing out a general letter of instructions, concerning food, clothing, bedding and utensils, to each girls club member in the county this week.

"We are expecting the encampment this year to be the most successful ever held and everything will be done possible to see that every one enjoys the encampment," Miss Faulkner, concluded.

Budget to be Submitted By School Board After Equalization Work

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**County School Census
Rolls Approved by State
Department of Education**

Floyd County Scholastic Census
Enrollments were approved this week
by state department of education
at Austin, according to Price Scott,
county superintendent. The rolls
were approved identically as sent in
to the department by the Floyd
County superintendent's office.

According to the census taken this
year and that of last there has been
a total loss of 293 scholastics en-
rolled, in Floyd County in the year.
"I think that the loss this year
was caused by general depressed
conditions in the county and due to
the fact that a number of families
have moved from Floyd County to
other points," Price Scott said in ex-
plaining the loss in scholastics en-
rolled.

Total Enrollment 3107

The census revealed that the total
number of scholastics in Floyd
County was 3107. The total num-
ber of scholastics in Floyd County
last year was 3400.

Losses in schools in Floyd County
are distributed as follows: Lockney
62, Floydada 107 and Rural schools
124. Losses in independent school
districts, Floydada and Lockney, ex-
ceeded the losses in Floyd County ru-
ral schools by a total of 45.
