stiff arm is expected to gain much yardage for the Whirlwinds this season. His determination and zeal in the game is unquestionable.

Verne Eastridge will probably see service in the wing back position this season. Eastridge is probably the outstanding bid for the position since the injury of Lowell Gamblin, who promised to develop into a stellar player. Gamblin sustained a broken shoulder bone last week in a practice scrimmage. Eastridge is doing exceptionally good blocking and totes the pigskin like a vet, and is a key on the defense.

Kyle Glover, strong bidder for a backfield job is expected to share honors with Eastridge or others in the seasons games. Glover is showing fine blocking tactics but does not seem to want to follow his interference much.

"Curley" Henderson another recruit, will give someone, probably Eastridge, a strong battle for a ball totting position. Henderson is showing plenty of fight and covets the feel of pigskin under his arm.

All of the letter men are looking in prime condition although Leo Jackson, burly guard, was laid out of practice a few days by a knee injury. H. Bishop, new man, who is making much headway toward the pivot position has been out of practice due to a thigh injury but is in condition and will be able to see service in the Plainview scrap.

Show Much Spirit

J. C. Powell, one of the boys from the rural schools, is doing exceptionally good work for new material. Powell, who is attempting the right tackle job, is showing up strong on the defensive and is improving on offensive play. Garth Powell, J. C.'s brother, is also unusually good on the defense, and had plenty of pep and determination to go with his hard tackles and fight. Powell promises to be a permanent fixture to the green and white front wall.

Alfred Edwards, fast court man of Dougherty, will also see service in all probability during the opening game. Edwards has enough ability, grit and weight, and a ration of spirit and we have a well rounded player, however, the latter is almost lacking as yet. Edwards is looking up and will give the Bulldogs something to worry over.

Johnny Baxter, 290 pounds of battle from Campbell, will probably start in the Whirlwinds forward wall next Saturday night. Baxter is exhibiting strong offensive and defensive play and may hold down the tackle position. Hoffman, last year second string tackle, will also be on the line when the Bulldogs and Whirlwinds tangle.

Lettermen, doubt of whose ability and determination, practically does not exist, and who will be in the starting lineup at Plainview probably are: Johnston, de Cordova, L. Murray, and Jackson. All are in fine shape and are in readiness for the Bulldogs encounter.

Strong Line Play

Aerial play by the Whirlwinds will be restored to only in an emergency. Spin play, end runs, and line plunges will be used mostly by the Whirlwinds, when they meet the Bulldogs.

Four mentors of the Plainview Bulldogs are sending their charges, 11 men to a coach, through rigid drills preparing them for the hard opposition of Amarillo, Lubbock and other Class A teams. Coach Kimbrough and his three assistants have a well directed backfield and aerial play by the Whirlwinds would gain probably sought. The game next Saturday night is expected to be one of the hardest of the entire season for the Whirlwinds, as the Plainview team is heavier and better coached than in recent years. The Class A squadron, however, has presented plenty of opposition for the Whirlwinds.

Floyd County Club Entry List Announced For Annual Exhibits

An interesting entry list has been announced for the annual Floyd County home demonstration club exhibit, which will be held Friday and Saturday of this week in the Maunaco building in this city.

Following is the exhibit list for women's home demonstration clubs. Each woman exhibit—4 quarts canned vegetables (in standard containers), 2 quarts canned fruit, 1 pint green tomato pickle, 1 pint cucumber pickle, 2 pints relish, 1 pint watermelon rind preserves, 1 pint watermelon rind pickle, 2 containers of jelly (No. 2891. Different varieties with sample of each in small containers.)

Each Club Exhibit—1 uniform poster of poultry demonstrator's record up to date, 1 uniform poster of food supply demonstrator's record up to date, 1 uniform poster of ward-robe demonstrator's record up to date, 1 hooked rug (wool) or (hemp) only one may be shown, 1 braided rug wool or hemp, woman's wash dress (print, gingham, linen etc.), boy's cotton suit (ages 2-5), girl's cotton dress (ages 2-5), guest towel, pillow slip with plain finish dress; scarf (linen), secretary record book up to date.

The girls club exhibits for the fair will include the miniature bedroom, hooked and braided rugs, poultry poster, record of poultry demonstrator, and a clothing exhibit, a list of which is given below.

A. Work clothes, cook apron, cup towel or kitchen towel, smock or work dress; B. Dresses, school dress, sport dress, nice dress; C. Undergarments and lounging garments—Slips, suit or underwear consisting of brassiers, bloomers, step ins, shorts or combination suit, pajamas, gowns, kimona or robe.

Gentlemen:

It will be perfectly obvious to the members of your committee, I think, that the present is an inopportune time for the writer to discuss the question of the proper type of reorganization of either the American Commonwealths Power Corporation or the American Community Company, primarily because the question of the treatment of the Six Dollar preferred stock represented by your committee, together with all other classes of stocks, bonds and debentures of said companies, is now the subject of serious consideration on the part of protective committees organized shortly after the appointment of receivers for said companies.

The writer has at all times taken the position with the receivers of said companies and also with the protective committee representing the American Community Company debenture, five and one-half percent bonds, that any reorganization plan that does not adequately provide for the security holders, represented by your committee, in a perfectly fair manner cannot be consummated. Any constructive plan for protecting the interests of the Six Dollar preferred stock represented by you will have my sincere and active support.

I realize the difficulties which will be encountered by your committee in its efforts to find a plan that will prove to be workable and acceptable to interested parties represented by your committee, nevertheless, I believe a plan should be devised which will, in your judgment, be for the best interests of the parties represented by you and the people residing in Eastern New Mexico and the Panhandle of Texas; and to that end I am pleased to assure you that I stand ready to render any assistance within my power to put into effect any measures or plans decided upon by you for the purpose of protecting the common interest of all parties concerned.
