that collars be fitted properly and that their shoulders be toughened. Collars should be 21/2 to 3 inches **Destroy** Quack Grass longer than the depth of the horse's Controlling or destroying quack neck. A collar that will let a man's grass is largely a matter of using

hand pass through may be long enough for light work, but for heavy pulls such a collar will tend to choke the horse. The width should be such as to permit the fingers to be pushed between the neck and the collar. A wide collar will slip from side to side and cause galling.

Necks can be kept free from sores if the collars fit and if the necks are washed daily with salt water solutions. Air slaked lime dusted on the shoulders at night aids in preventing soreness, but this should be thoroughly brushed out before collars are put on in the morning. Neglect the first week or two may mean the loss of time for horses throughout the summer .-- Prairie Farmer.

Certified Seed Needed

When farm prices are low, it pays to have good seed and grow superior potatoes that the market wants, E. S. Tussig, state potato specialist, says; and accordingly he recommends that this coming spring certified seed be used or else seed only one year removed from certified. This seed is high yielding and free from disease, inspected by state authorities where grown, Ohlo's best potato growers demand certified seed for highest yield, because they find it is most profitable in the end, Tussig states. While the average Obio yield is only 102 bushels per acre, 28 growers in the state last year grew more than 400 bushels and several over 500 bushels on the acre .- Ohio Farmer.

Cornborer Parasites

In the last 10 years 20 different kinds of comborer parasites have been imported into the United States from Europe and the Orient. Of these 12 have been recovered in the field, indicating that they have become established. So far control by this method has not had time to become effective, but in some fields as much as 15 to 25 per cent of parasitism has been found indicating that there is opportunity for fur-Prairie Farmer.

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

It will be perfectly obvious to the members of your committee, I think, that the present is an inopportune time for the writer to discuss the question of the proper type of reorganization of either the American Commonwealths Power Corporation or the American Community Company, primarily because the question of the treatment of the Six Dollar preferred stock represented by your committee, together with all other classes of stocks, bonds and debentures of said companies, is now the subject of serious consideration on the part of protective committees organized shortly after the appointment of receivers for said companies.

The writer has at all times taken the position with the receivers of said companies and also with the protective committee representing the American Community Company debenture, five and one-half percent bonds, that any reorganization plan that does not adequately provide for the security holders, represented by your committee, in a perfectly fair manner cannot be consummated. Any constructive plan for protecting the interests of the Six Dollar preferred stock represented by you will have my sincere and active support.
