### Mrs. Langford Wins Ten-Day Vacation Trip

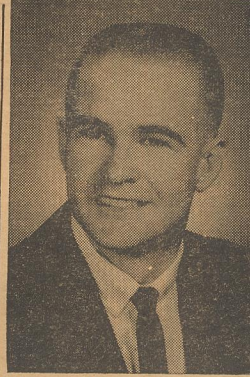
Mrs. Zola Langford of Dimmitt left today for Westfield, Mass., on a ten-day vacation.

Junior Riders To Have Riding Party

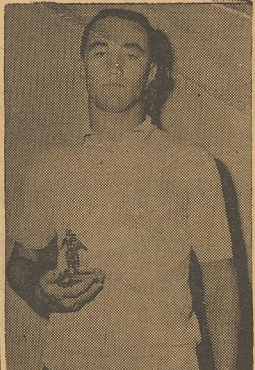

Gary Huffines, Jaycee announces the winners of the first city tennis tournament.

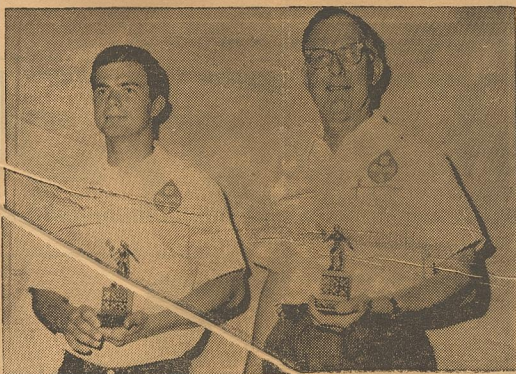

County Agent Suggests Early Fertilization Plan

It is now time to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted this fall, suggests County Agent Charles Hotel. Because Castro County soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrients, the most logical starting point for determining fertilizer needs is the soil test. Hotel states his office can supply information on how to collect and mail the samples. By sampling early the report will be received in plenty of time for making the final decision as to what kind and how much fertilizer to apply.

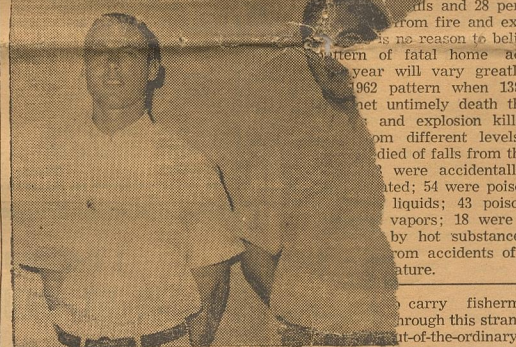
Nitrogen is the fertilizer element likely to be in shortest supply. Organic matter as measured by soil tests is one of the guides for determining how much nitrogen will be needed. However, factors such as amount and stage of decomposition of previous crop residue, physical condition of the soil, ability to irrigate adequately, and intended grazing practices will all influence the nitrogen need of the crop.

Research data of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station clearly indicates where wheat is grown on Pullman soils for grain only, the time of nitrogen application is of little importance. When wheat is to be grazed it is important to apply all or part of the nitrogen preplant. Adequately fertilized wheat forage can contain 20 per cent protein or 3 per cent nitrogen on a dry basis.

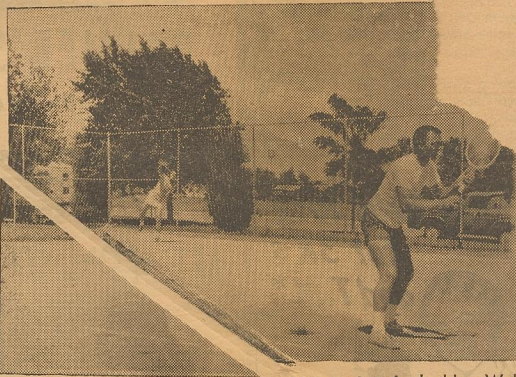
Insufficient phosphorus may be limiting wheat production, Hotel adds. Profitable response has long been evident on many of the sandy and mixed land soils, and more recently excellent yield increases have been noted on Pullman soils shown to be deficient by the soil

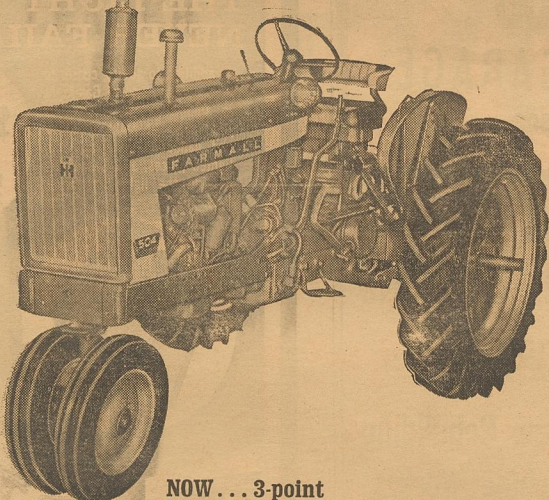

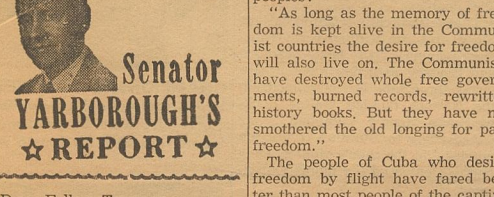

"As long as the memory of freedom is kept alive in the Communist countries, the desire for freedom will also live on. The Communists have destroyed whole free governments, burned records, rewritten history books. But they have not smothered the old longing for past freedom."

Let us talk about freedom for these eleven captive nations as the Communists have talked about freedom for colonies in Africa and Asia. Let us light anew the fires of freedom in Cuba. Let us move until Cuba and the ten captive nations in Europe are free of the Communist conspiracy, so they can again enjoy old liberties they once knew.

### POWER FROM DEEP IN THE EARTH

Man goes deep in the earth for sources. In this country and in others around the world there is growing interest in tapping the earth for, of all things, steam. It is there underground in untold quantity, waiting to be tapped to turn the turbines that generate electric power. Oil wells and gas wells are common sights in the Panhandle; because of the availability and low cost of natural gas burned to produce steam and generate power, we may never see the day in our area when wells are drilled to tap subsurface heat and steam. But in some parts of the United States and many countries of the world, tapping the earth for this so-called "geothermal energy" holds great promise for providing cheap electric power and heat.

An Interior and Insular Affairs Committee subcommittee of which I am a member recently held hearings on bills to permit the leasing of U. S. public lands to firms seeking to drill for geothermal energy and chemical by-products. The subject was most interesting to me because of its potential for enriching man's life by providing new, inexpensive source of power generation and heat.

Geothermal energy, or earth-heat energy, taps temperatures within the earth—temperatures considerably higher than found at the earth's surface. This difference in temperatures causes heat to flow from the interior of the earth to its surface. There it is dissipated in the air. When groundwater is

heated by a body of hot residual volcanic rock lying at shallow depth it rises rapidly mixed with hot gases and steam from rock itself. It follows cracks and fissures to the surface. These conditions sometimes produce such phenomena as hot springs and geysers.

Geothermal steam was first developed for generating electric power in the late 1930's near Florence, Italy. Power plants there are now generating more than 300,000 kilowatts from 24 generating units. As a sideline, a chemical industry has been established mainly for the manufacture of boron products. In the United States, deep drilling has been undertaken by private enterprise in Imperial County, Calif., at the southern end of the Salton sea. The project has disclosed boiling brines containing, in addition to a large quantity of steam, a high content of valuable chemicals. Single wells have a proved steam potential of generating 8,000 to 10,000 kilowatts. More tests are scheduled. In Iceland, steam and hot water from geyser areas are being tapped for community heating purposes.

The possibilities of developing geothermal energy exist extensively on public desert lands. Legislation has been introduced to making the development possible. The existing federal oil and gas lease framework would be suitable if only steam, heat and geothermal energy were to be extracted. But the wells also produce hot brines in which sodium, potassium, calcium, boron, silicon, manganese, magnesium, lead, iron, copper, titanium, lithium and strontium also may be found in quantities of possible commercial value. Therefore, leases for steam, heat and geothermal energy should encompass the production and sale of these by-products.

Geothermal energy development may take place in the United States primarily on public lands, but the government is not otherwise involved. Private enterprise

"How much?" asked Tommy.

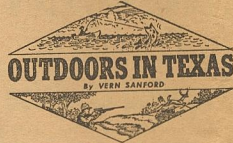
"It depends on the size," said the man. "It might be \$15, more or less."

## Accent on Health

If you are looking for a primitive fishing trip you don't have to go to the headwaters of the Amazon or to the Everglades of Florida.

Texas has an area, practically unexplored, where fishing is fabulous and the scenery is unbelievably beautiful.

Just head for Jefferson in East Texas, near the Louisiana boundary line.

There you have two choices—Big Cypress or Little Cypress.

Big Cypress is the river which flows down from the Ferrells Bridge dam. That's the dam that creates Lake-O-Pines. It is a wonderful float trip from the dam into the town of Jefferson.

Out of Jefferson you can take to the big river, or you can put into the wooded Little Cypress and float through miles and miles of the most wonderful scenery you've ever seen. A Seldom Visited Jungle

It is a jungle so seldom visited you won't even spot a bear can on an entire day's float.

Two outdoor writers from Austin Russell Tinsley and L. A. Wilke—recently made this trip. At Jefferson they got Roy Butler, a native of the area, as a guide. The three spent the day in a virtual wilderness where they saw no other human beings.

For fishing they got a mixed crew. They hooked bass, both black and white. Also several species of bream, catfish and pike. Here you never know what is going to hit when you toss out your lure.

### Jon Boat Transportation

Trip was made in a heavy, 20-foot jon boat. It was equipped with a fish well, two deck chairs, a 5-hp motor and two heavy oars. Butler sat in the back of the boat and pushed it slowly through the bayous.

Here the water runs almost fast enough to keep the boat moving without pushing it either with oars or motor. On this particular trip the motor wasn't used until the return to camp which was made upstream in the big river.

Some 100 years ago Jefferson was the largest water port in Texas with shipping facilities. Big boats came up the Red River from New Orleans in the Civil War days. Later a log jam, which acted as a natural dam to keep the water high, was blasted out by engineers.

Jefferson, then a thriving city of 40,000 became almost a ghost town for awhile. Today it boasts only about 4,000 population.

Butler was reared in the country around Jefferson. He says the wilderness area today is almost exactly as he knew it when a boy.

### Dogwoods Abound

Banks of the bayou are filled with dogwood and other blooming trees. Bayous themselves are thick with huge cypress trees, with great cypress knees (roots) in the most grotesque shapes. Wild grapevines in some spots furnish an entanglement you have to eat your way through.

Floods and winds of centuries have knocked down huge pine trees that stretch across the water. Debris lodged against these logs furnish places for wild flowers to sprout and provide shade for the big bass that inhabit the waters.

Butler now has set up a guide service. He has a half-dozen boats

The old man had been high on a ladder, pruning a pecan tree. Suddenly he was lying helpless on the ground, vulnerable to the ladder as it crashed down on his head.

He's still hospitalized. The price he paid for his back yard tree-pruning venture: both heels crushed, a broken vertebra, and a deep gash in his head. What prompted him to undertake so difficult a task when he was so obviously ill-equipped to handle it?

There is no firm answer to the question. The incident is just one of thousands which kill and maim and cripple people throughout Texas and the rest of the nation each year. Accidents, as of this moment stand as the fourth leading cause of death among all age groups in Texas and the United States as a whole.

Even more grim is the fact that of the 5655 accidental deaths of all types registered in Texas last year, one-fourth occurred in the most cherished of all places—the victim's home.

Thorough studies into the nature of accidents show that very few happen by pure chance. They occur because a stairway was improperly lighted, because an electrical circuit was overloaded, because a threshold strip wasn't jacked down tight, because the rung of a ladder was loose, because of an endless variety of human failings.

The National Safety Council defines accident statistics as "a single human tragedy multiplied to the point of indifference." The definition is an apt one, since accidents have become commonplace in the pattern of modern life.

Children and older people are most susceptible. Current national statistics show that 15,000 children are killed and 16,500,000 are injured each year. Persons 65 years old and over compose nine percent of the population; yet this age group experiences 74 percent of all fatal falls and 28 percent of all deaths from fire and explosion.

There is no reason to believe the pattern of fatal home accidents this year will vary greatly from the 1962 pattern when 1284 Texans met untimely death thusly: Fires and explosion killed 423; falls from different levels killed 310; 180 died of falls from the same level; 83 were accidentally shot; 79 suffocated; 54 were poisoned by solids or liquids; 43 poisoned by gases or vapors; 18 were burned to death by hot substances; and 194 died from accidents of an unspecified nature.

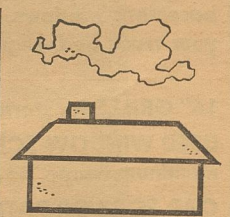

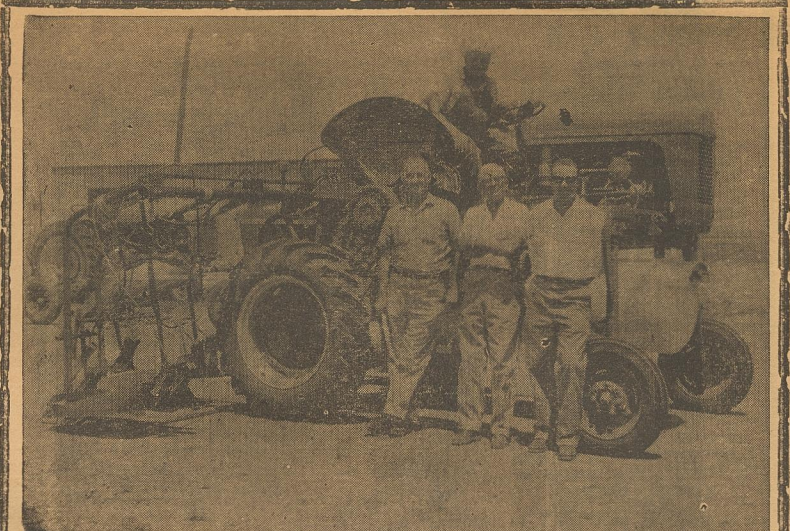
