### Petition For Appointment Of Conservator For Floyd County National Approved

A petition, as drawn up and submitted, by the Farm and Home Owners Protective League, to the depositors and debtors of the Floyd County National Bank Saturday afternoon was approved.

Discussions were heard concerning the procedure to be taken toward the forwarding of the petition to proper authorities and about the management of the receivership bank.

#### Conservator Not Named

A conservator and three directors, which are called for in the petition, have not been named. All must be of Floyd County and work in the interest of both the Floyd County National Bank depositors and debtors and the federal interest.

A motion was made by Fred Baty, during the session Saturday afternoon, which suggested that the board of directors, of the Farm and Home Owners League, select a man for the appointment to the directorship of Floyd County National Bank. The motion was passed and the board of directors have taken the matter under advisement.

#### Formed to Serve Many

"The constitution and by laws were adopted to guide the actions of the Farm and Home Owners League but if their present form fails to direct us to the greatest field of service then they should be made fit by those who are to be served.

"Our object is to serve the greatest number in the greatest way possible. Read this petition and if you are an interested party get your name attached and meet with us Saturday afternoon," John L. West president, urges.

Petition As Approved by League  
Following is the petition as approved by a vote of the group Saturday:

Floydada, Texas, March 25, 1933.  
Comptroller of Currency,  
Washington, D. C.

We address you in regard to our failed Floyd County National Bank of Floydada, Texas, and say because of losses sustained then, inability to pay debts at the prices of farm products, and the lack of a sympathetic management there has been but little returns to the depositors; therefore, we, the undersigned depositors and debtors of said bank, petition you to appoint a Conservator, Mr. \_\_\_\_\_ and three directors \_\_\_\_\_

all of Floyd County to take charge of our interest, who will work in conjunction with the federal interests, so expenses may be lessened, a brotherly feeling established, debtors aided over without undue burdens and depositors eventually get their equitable part.

If we have asked amiss please give us the legal procedure that we may get legally into possession of our own.

#### Another Meeting Saturday

Interested parties are asked to be present again Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the district court room when the plan of the Farm and Home Owners League will be explained. At the directors will hear opinions as to who will be recommended for the conservatorship of the bank.

John L. West, league president, issues the following message:

"It was voted that the board select the parties to be recommended to manage this interest but since so few of the parties interested had a voice in the vote we feel that it is unfair to the majority and an undue responsibility on the directors, and thinking our duty to have an expressed voice of a greater number of parties interested. So if you will be on hand Saturday at 2 o'clock and work out plans you can add much to a ready and satisfactory management.

"Will you give us your attendance for one hour Saturday from 2 until 3 o'clock and hear our plans and judge our hope for the future?"

### South Canyon Hill Will Be Improved Using R. F. C. Funds Supplied by County

It is planned to improve the stretch of highway on the south side using funds from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation Unemployment Committee, providing the county will pay dollar for dollar, one half of the cost.

### Rainfall General Over Floyd County Tuesday Will Help Grain

A beneficial rain, varying in intensity from .25 to .44 of an inch, fell generally over Floyd County early Wednesday morning of this week. Reports indicated that the rain was some heavier to the south of Floydada. Approximately .44 of an inch fell here.

The rain, which was the first moisture in several weeks, will greatly help the growing wheat, barley and other grain as well as recently planted crops and garden stuff. Wheat in portions of the county was suffering from want of moisture though to no great extent.

High, dry winds which had prevailed for several weeks were ceased with the rain. Temperatures have been much warmer in the past several days.

# West Texas Ready For The Decentralization Of Business

The people of this country learned from their recent experiences which made it necessary to declare a nation-wide bank holiday that it is a waste of time to discuss the merits and demerits of the unit bank, the branch bank, the group bank, the big bank and the little bank. As a result of the events of the past few weeks the public knows that the big bank and the so-called liquid bank is in the same class as the frozen asset bank when the people generally decide to keep their own money and start a run on the banks. Neither the size of the bank nor diversification of investment, nor the two combined, can keep the banks open when millions of depositors decide to keep their own money. The nation-wide bank holiday has made both the banker and the depositor realize that the policy of the bankers in the past with respect to saying to the public that a depositor, who as a rule never deposited anything but checks, could get the amount of his deposit in currency on demand, is all wrong. The bank holiday has made both the banker and the depositor realize that money is intended to be used solely as a medium of exchange and as such must not under any circumstances be hoarded. The public fully realizes today that all banking, like all business transactions, must be bottomed wholly upon the confidence of the public in the soundness of the banking system and business methods.

## BANKS SOUND IN THE PLAINS COUNTRY

According to the best information available at this time, out of approximately 6,891 Federal Reserve Member Banks in the United States, 5,342 were re-opened prior to March 25th, or about 77 per cent.

In Texas there are approximately 529 Federal Reserve Member Banks and 516 opened prior to March 25th, or about 95 per cent, which was 18 per cent higher than the general average of the Federal Reserve Member Banks in the United States.

There were approximately 12,432 non-member banks operating in the United States before the bank holiday and approximately 10,570 re opened prior to March 25th, or about 85 per cent; although some of the non-member banks were under restrictions. While in Texas there were approximately 535 non-member banks and 534 were re-opened, although some were under restrictions, prior to March 25th, or approximately 100 per cent.

In towns supplied by the Plains Division of the Texas Utilities Company with electric service, out of 18 Federal Reserve Member Banks 18 have re-opened, or 100 per cent.

In the Plains Division of the Texas Utilities Company there were 22 non-member banks oper-

ating before the bank holiday and 21 re-opened prior to March 21st, 16 without restrictions and 5 under certain restrictions. The two banks that have not re-opened will, according to reports at this date, be re-opened within the next few days.

In the towns supplied with electric service by the Southwestern Public Service Company located in the Panhandle of West Texas, out of 7 Federal Reserve Member Banks 6 have been re-opened. There were 7 non-member banks operated in the territory supplied with electric service by the Southwestern Public Service Company before the bank holiday and 7 have re-opened or 100 per cent.

According to the most reliable information obtainable the banks operated in the Plains Country above referred to have all shown substantial increases in deposits since the bank holiday. The average increase in deposits since the holiday in the above banks is conservatively estimated to be approximately 5 per cent.

The above comparison of the banking conditions in the Plains territory supplied with electric service by Texas Utilities Company and Southwestern Public Service Company clearly shows that the banking and business conditions in West Texas are as sound as can be found in any section in the United States.

**Tax Evasion Must Stop**  
Warns Authorities Against  
Gasoline Bootlegging

Governor Miriam A. Ferguson,  
concurring with both houses of the  
legislature in the view that tax eva-  
sion must stop in order to draw into  
the coffers of the state every dollar  
of available revenues, drove the last  
nail late last week into the coffin  
of the gasoline-bootlegging industry.

Tuesday she had signed the Met-  
calfe-Harmon bill, making gas tax  
evasion a felony, with heavy fines  
and prison sentences. Thursday she  
added the final blow against the  
huge "racket" which has grown up in  
the peddling of tax-free gasoline,  
when she signed House Bill 246,  
amending the Texas Food and Drug  
Act, and observers at the capitol  
were saying during the week-end  
that everything possible has been  
done to recover the \$4,000,000 yearly  
lost by evasion.

While gasoline is neither a food  
nor a drug, the new law was deemed  
necessary in order to curb the blend-  
ing of kerosene, naphtha and other  
tax-free lower fuels with gasoline,  
and selling the whole mixture to the  
motorist, plus the tax. Under this,  
the commonest method of tax eva-  
sion, the car owner often paid money  
which he believed was tax, but the  
state didn't get it.

This new law contains several  
drastic provisions for the protection  
of the public. First it gives the  
chemical analysis of gasoline, and  
forbids the use of the word "gasol-  
ine" on any motor fuel falling be-  
low that standard. All such fuels  
must be labeled "Inferior Motor  
Fuel" on all pumps which contain  
them.

Another provision is that every  
truck or carrier of motor fuel must  
be plainly labeled with the name of  
the distributor or maker, and every  
place where such fuel is stored must  
be marked in the same way. The  
new law also forbids sale of second-  
hand or used motor oil except when  
it is plainly labeled, "Reconditioned  
Motor Oil."

The law gives every Texas peace  
officer the right to inspect any ve-  
hicle hauling motor fuel, or any place

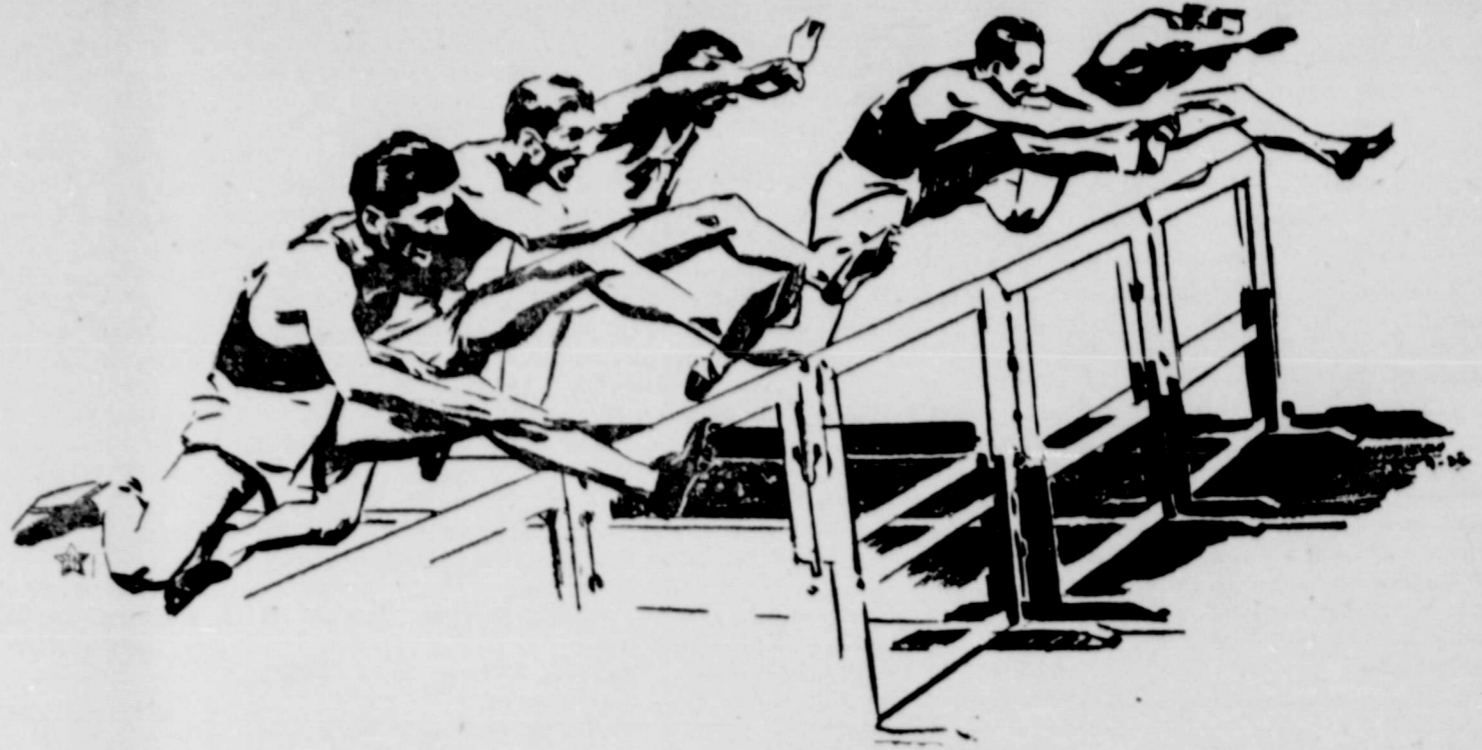

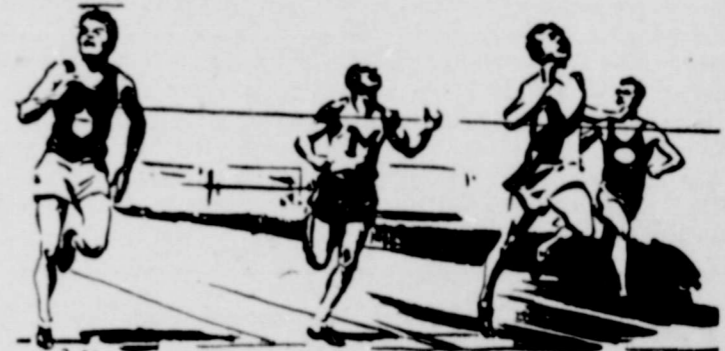
