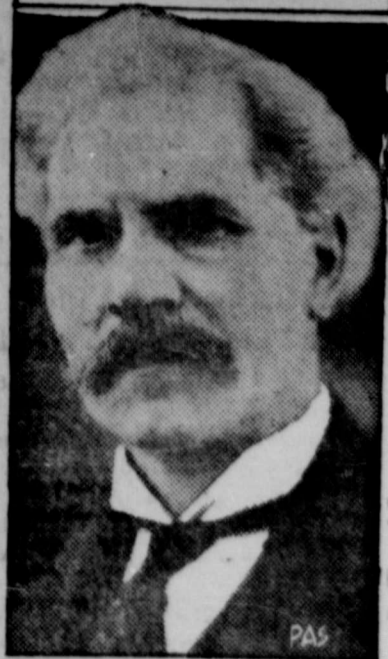


Visits Roosevelt

Rufus Parker, 83, Died Friday Morning at Home of Mrs. C. E. Cowan

R. Parker, aged 83 years, 6 months, died Friday morning at 11:30 o'clock in Floydada at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. E. Cowan, located in north Floydada. Mr. Parker had been ill for two weeks with pleurisy but death came as a result of a stroke of apoplexy.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. R. Parker; three daughters, Mrs. C. B. Barton, of Littlefield, Mrs. H. B. Stewart, of Pampa, and Mrs. Cowan and one son, L. H. Parker, of Dallas. Mr. and Mrs. Barton and son, C. B. Jr., Mr. and Mrs. Stewart and children, H. B. Jr., and Billy Louise, and Mrs. Cowan and family were present for the services.

One brother, Willie Parker, of Wenesoga, Mississippi, and two sisters, Mrs. Lizzie Smith, also of Wenesoga, Mississippi, and Mrs. Mollie Clifton, of Wilson, Oklahoma, also survive. None were present for the funeral services.

Rufus Parker was born in Corinth, Mississippi in 1849, and lived there for the major portion of his life. He was married in 1893 to Miss Eddie Norman, of Corinth, Mississippi. The children as named above and two others, who died in infancy, were born to this union.

Mr. Parker first came to Texas about twenty years ago and made his home in Ellis County. He had lived in Floyd County since 1920. For the past four years Mr. and Mrs. Parker had made Floydada their home living with Mr. and Mrs. Cowan. He was a member of the Methodist Church with his membership at Fort Worth.

Members of the Floyd County Commissioners Court, the county judge and road officials from the county attended the good roads association meeting held in Lubbock Friday.

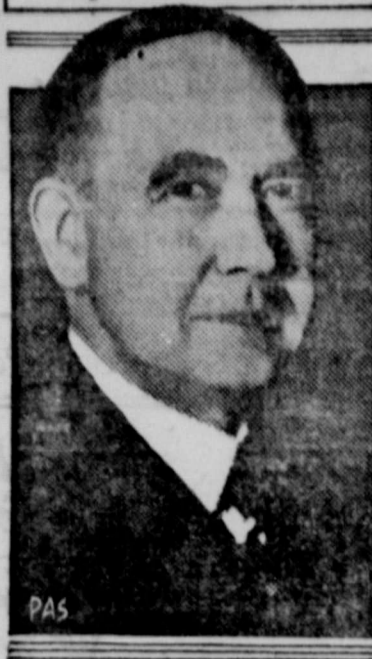
One of the main purposes of the meeting was to organize a movement for the building in of the gaps between the units of the surfaced roads on the plains. Representatives were present from several plains counties.
