Martin Brothers Recover Judgment for \$4,546.00 In Building Suit Here

A jury in Floyd County District Court last week returned a judgment in favor of plaintiffs in the case of Martin Brothers vs. Cannaday Brothers. The suit was on a breach of contract.

Martin Brothers, C. M. and J. G. recovered judgment for \$4,546.00, against Cannaday Brothers, H. E. and W. I. \$12,500 was asked for in the original petition. Of this amount Judge K. E. Bain ruled out one item of \$5000.00, ruling that the damage thus collected would be double recovery if assessed by the jury.

Plaintiffs sought damages on the grounds of a contract entered into by them and the defendants, in which terms the Cannaday brothers are said to have agreed to construct a building adjacent to the Martin building. The Cannaday Brothers sold the ground on which the Martin building was constructed.

The Martin building is located at the corner of West California and Fifth Streets.

Lawyers for the defense Ayres & Ayres, Floydada, and Joiner & Cook, of Plainview, this week are preparing a motion for new trial on appeal.

New Bowls and Bearings Being Installed in City Water Wells

A crew of men under the supervision of E. S. Price, city water superintendent, and a specialist from the McDonald Well Machine Company, of Amarillo, are busy this week doing some repair work to city water wells.

New bowls and bearings are being installed in two of the water producing group. The south well of the two deep wells and the north-west well at the station are being repaired.

Approximately five days will be required to do the work, which started Monday morning.

TEXAS COWBOY REUNION TO BE HELD IN STAMFORD JULY 3, 4 AND 5

Stamford, June 14.—A genuine western rodeo featuring actual cowboys from the ranches of Texas and adjoining states will be the central attraction around which is being arranged the program of entertainment for the Fourth Annual Texas Cowboy Reunion to be held in Stamford July 3, 4 and 5.

Rodeo performances will be held twice daily, at 2:30 p. m. and 8 p. m. in the natural amphitheatre on the reunion grounds. Grandstand seating capacity has been doubled this year to accommodate the crowds which have been increasing in number each year. Several down town ticket booths will be operated this year to avoid delay and confusion at the grounds.

The rodeo program will include contests in bronc-busting, steer riding, calf roping and wild cow milking at each performance. Two special features will be the contest for the best "cutting horse" and the calf roping contest for cowboys over 55 years of age. A handsome saddle will be the prize for the champion roper among these veterans of the lariat.

Special prizes also are offered for the champion ropers among the younger generation of cowboys. The ten ropers making the best average in calf roping and wild cow milking during the three days of the rodeo will compete for these prizes in the closing performance on the night of July 5.

In addition to the special prizes, some \$1450 in cash will be paid the winners in various events, the money being awarded at the close of each day's contests. Low admission prices will prevail.

Entry fees for rodeo contestants will be \$4 a day for calf roping, \$3 a day for bronc riding, \$4 a day for wild cow milking, \$5 for cutting horse contest and \$2.50 a day for steer riding. There is no entrance fee for the old-timer cowboys' calf roping contest.

Day money in each of the roping events—calf roping and cow milking is \$130 per each day, divided into five prizes ranging from \$50 for first prize to \$10 for fifth prize. The purse each day in bronc riding is \$100 and in steer riding \$75. The purse in the cutting horse contest is \$150 for one day only.

The reunion management has just published a folder containing the rodeo rules and detailed prize list. "Scandalous" John Selman, who was selected last year as the most typical cowboy under 55 years of age, is rodeo arena director.

Mr. Wyman formerly resided in Floydada and left here in 1927, since making his home at Dallas with his son and family and in Kentucky. While here Mr. Wyman was a rural letter carrier for a portion of the time and farmed some. He had made several visits to look after farming interests here, the latest being in March and April of this year.

James A. Wyman was born August 24, 1868, in Kentucky. He lived in that state until 1908 when he moved with his family to Floydada. His survivors include one son, Judson Wyman, and four brothers. One brother lives in Carlsbad, New Mexico, and the others in Kentucky. Mrs. Wyman died in Floydada in September, 1927, and Mr. Wyman moved from here soon after. Judson Wyman graduated from Floydada High School.

Examinations To Be Given For Cotton Statistics Collector

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an open competitive examination for the position of collector of cotton statistics for Floyd County. The position is a branch of the bureau of census, department of commerce.

Applications must be on file with the U. S. Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C., not later than June 27, 1933. Information in regards to application blanks may be secured at the Floydada post office. The examinations will be given in Floydada for Floyd County's statistics collector.

The duties of the collector is to visit in person in the district to which assigned all cotton ginners, cotton consuming establishments and cotton storages and secure reports of cotton ginned to specified dates and monthly reports of cotton consumed and held and of spindles and active spindle hours.

Annual salary for Floyd County as given in a bulletin received through the Floydada post office is \$210.00. Persons wishing further information on the examinations for the position of cotton statistics collector may inquire at the post office.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS

S. J. E. NO. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto a section to be Section 3, which shall provide:

"Section 3. (1) Holding the belief that the highest degree of local self government which is consistent with the efficient conduct of those affairs by necessity lodged in the Nation and the State will prove most responsive to the will of the people, and result to reward their diligence and intelligence by greater economy and efficiency in their local governmental affairs, it hereby is ordained:

"(2) Any county having a population of sixty-two thousand (62,000) or more according to the then last Federal Census may adopt a County Home Rule Charter, to embrace those powers appropriate hereto, within the specific limitations hereinafter provided. It further is provided that the Legislature, by a favoring vote of two-thirds of the total membership of both the Senate and the House of Representatives, may authorize any county, having a population less than that above specified, to proceed hereunder for the adoption of a Charter; however, as a condition for such authorization, it is required that notice of the intent to seek Legislative authority hereunder must be published in one or more newspapers, to give general circulation in the county affected, not less than once per week for four (4) consecutive weeks, and the first of such publications shall appear not less than thirty (30) days next prior to the time an Act making proposal hereunder may be introduced in the Legislature. No County Home Rule Charter may be adopted by any county save upon a favoring vote of the resident qualified electors of the affected county. In elections submitting to the voters a proposal to adopt a Charter (unless otherwise provided by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of each House of the Legislature) the votes cast by the qualified electors residing within the limits of all the incorporated cities and towns of the county shall be separately kept but collectively counted and the votes of the qualified electors of the county who do not reside within the limits of any incorporated city or town likewise shall be separately kept and separately counted, and unless there be a favoring majority of the votes cast within and a favoring majority of the votes cast without such collective cities and towns, the Charter shall not be adopted. It is expressly forbidden that any such Charter may in any way affect the operation of the General Laws of the State relating to the judicial, tax, fiscal, educational, police, highway and health systems, or any other department of the State's superior government. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorize the adoption of a Charter provision inimical to or inconsistent with the sovereignty and established public policies of this State, and no provision having such vice shall have validity against the State. No Charter provision may operate to impair the exemption of home-steads as established by this Constitution and the Statutes relating thereto.

"(3) a. A Charter hereunder may provide: the continuance of a County Commissioners' Court, as now constituted, to serve as the governing body of a county to operate hereunder; or, may provide for a governing body otherwise constituted, which shall be elective, and service therein shall be upon such qualifications, for such terms, under such plan of representation, and upon such conditions of tenure and compensation as may be fixed by any such Charter. The term for service in such governing body may exceed two (2) years, but shall not exceed six (6) years. In any event, in addition to the powers and duties provided by any such Charter, such governing body shall exercise all powers, and discharge all duties which, in the absence of the provisions hereof, would devolve by law on County Commissioners and County Commissioners' Courts. Further, any such Charter may provide for the organization, reorganization, establishment and administration of the government of the county, including the control and regulation of the performance of and the compensation for all duties required in the conduct of the county affairs, subject to the limitations herein provided.

"b. A Charter hereunder may provide that Judges of County Courts (including that County Court designated in this Constitution), and Jus-

tices of the Peace be compensated upon a salary basis in lieu of fees. The jurisdiction of the County Court designated in this Constitution, and the duties of the Judges thereof, may be confined to that general jurisdiction of a probate Court which elsewhere is defined in this Constitution. The office of Justice of the Peace may be made either elective or appointive. Other than as herein provided, no such Charter shall provide for altering the jurisdiction or procedure of any Court. The duties of District Attorney and County Attorney may be confined to representing the State in civil cases to which the State is a party and to enforcement of the State's Penal Code, and the compensation of said attorneys may be fixed on a salary basis in lieu of fees.

"c. Save as hereinabove and hereinafter otherwise provided, such Charters, within the limits expressed therein, may invest the governing body to be established for any county electing to operate hereunder with the power to create, consolidate or abolish any office or department, whether created by other provisions of the Constitution or by statute, defined the duties thereof, fix the compensation for service therein, make the same elective or appointive and prescribe the time, qualifications and conditions for tenure in any such office; save, that no such Charter other than as hereinbefore authorized, shall provide to regulate the status, service, duties or compensation of members of the Legislature, Judges of the Courts, District Attorneys, County Attorneys, or any office whatever by the law of the State required to be filled by an election embracing more than one county. Excepting herefrom nominations, elections or appointments to offices, the terms whereof may not have expired prior to the adoption of this Amendment to the Constitution, at such time as a Charter provision adopted hereunder may be in effect (save as to those offices which must continue to be elective, as herein elsewhere specified), all terms of county officers and all contracts for the giving of service by deputies under such officers, may be subject to termination by the administrative body of the county, under an adopted Charter so providing, and there shall be no liability by reason thereof.

"d. Any county electing to operate hereunder shall have the power, by Charter provision, to levy, assess and collect taxes, and to fix the maximum rate for ad valorem taxes to be levied for specific purposes, in accordance with the Constitution and laws of this State, provided, however, that the limit of the aggregate taxes which may be levied, assessed and collected hereunder shall not exceed the limit or total fixed, or hereafter to be fixed, by this Constitution to control counties, and the annual assessment upon property, both real, personal and mixed, shall be a first superior and prior lien thereon.

"e. In addition to the powers herein provided, and in addition to powers included in County Home Rule Charters, any county may, by a majority vote of the qualified electors of said county, amend its Charter to include other powers, functions, duties and rights which now or hereafter may be provided by this Constitution and the statutes of the State for counties.

"(4). Any county operating hereunder shall have the power to borrow money for all purposes lawful under its Charter, to include the refunding of a lawful debt, in a manner conforming to the General Laws of the State, and may issue therefor its obligations. Such obligations, other than those to refund a lawful debt, shall not be valid unless authorized by a majority of all votes cast by those resident qualified voters of the area affected by the taxes required to retire such obligations, who may vote thereon. In case of county obligations, maturing after a period of five (5) years, the same shall be issued to mature serially, fixing the first maturity of principal at a time not to exceed two (2) years next after the date of the issuance of such obligations. Such obligations may pledge the full faith and credit of the county; but in no event shall the aggregate obligations so issued, in principal amount outstanding at any one time, exceed the then existing Constitutional limits for such obligations and such indebtedness and its supporting tax shall constitute a first and superior lien upon the property taxable in such county. No obligation issued hereunder shall be valid unless prior to the time of the issuance thereof there be levied a tax sufficient to retire the same as it matures, which tax shall not exceed the then existing Constitutional limits.

"(5). Such Charter may authorize the governing body of a county operating hereunder to prescribe the schedule of fees to be charged by the officers of the county for specified services, to be in lieu of the

then existing Constitutional and Statutory provisions of this State; and provided further that the governing body of the county for the government of such areas shall have and exercise all powers and authority granted by law to the governing bodies of similar areas when separately incorporated as a city or town, and such areas shall be subject to additional taxation within the same Constitutional limits as control taxation for a city or town of like population. Likewise such Charter may provide for the governing board of the county subject to existing Constitutional and statutory provisions to define, create and administer districts, and have and exercise the powers and authority granted by the Constitution and laws relative to the same.

"(6) a. Subject to the express limitations upon the exercise of the powers by this subdivision to be authorized, such Charters may provide (or omit to provide) that the governmental and proprietary functions of any city, town, district or other defined political subdivision (which is a governmental agency and embraced within the boundaries of the county) be transferred, either as to some or all of the functions thereof, and yielded to the control of the administrative body of the county. No such transfer or yielding of functions may be effected, unless the proposal is submitted to a vote of the people, and, unless otherwise provided by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of each House of the Legislature, such a proposal shall be submitted as a separate issue, and the vote within and without any such city, town, district, or other defined governmental entity, shall be separately cast and counted, and unless two-thirds of the qualified votes cast within the yielding defined governmental entity, and a majority of the qualified votes cast in the remainder of the county, favor the proposed merger, it shall not be effected. In case of the mergers hereby authorized, without express Charter provision therefor, in so far as may be required to make effective the object of the proposed merger, the county shall succeed to all the appropriate lawful powers, duties, rights, procedures, restrictions and limitations which prior to the merger were reposed in, or imposed upon, the yielding governmental agency. Particularly, it is provided that the power to create funded indebtedness and to levy taxes in support thereof may be exercised only by such procedures, and within such limits, as now are, or hereafter may be, provided by law to control such appropriate other governmental agencies were they to be independently administered. Such mergers may be effected under proposed contracts between the county and any such yielding governmental agency, to be approved at an election as hereinafter provided for. In order to increase governmental efficiency and effect economy the county may contract with the principal city of its county to perform one or more of its functions, provided such contracts shall not be valid for more than two (2) years.

"b. In cases of the partial or complete merger of the government of a city operating under a Home Rule Charter, with the government of a county operating hereunder, those city Charter provisions affected thereby shall cease to control, and the county Charter provisions shall control.

"c. When any embraced incorporated city or town elects to merge its governmental functions with those of the county under the provisions hereof, such Charter may provide for defining or redefining the boundaries of such cities and towns, provided, however, that in defining or redefining the boundaries of such cities and towns, such boundaries may be extended only to include those areas contiguous to such cities as are urban in character; and as to such cities or towns and for the benefit thereof the county, in addition to the primary city and county tax herein authorized and any other lawful district tax, may levy and collect taxes upon the property taxable within such city or town as defined or redefined, within the limits authorized by Sections 4 and 5 of Article XI of this Constitution, (or any Amendment thereof) for incorporated cities according to the population, provided that no tax greater than that existing at the time of such merger or for any added purpose shall be imposed upon any such city or town unless authorized by a majority of all votes cast by the resident qualified voters of such city or town.

"d. Areas urban in character though not incorporated, under appropriate Charter provision may be defined as such by the governing body of the county, provided, however, that no portion of the county shall be defined as an urban area unless it has sufficient population to entitle it to incorporate under the then existing laws of the State; and no such urban area, when created, shall be vested with any taxing or bonding power which it would not possess if it were operating as a separate incorporated unit under the

then existing Constitutional and Statutory provisions of this State; and provided further that the governing body of the county for the government of such areas shall have and exercise all powers and authority granted by law to the governing bodies of similar areas when separately incorporated as a city or town, and such areas shall be subject to additional taxation within the same Constitutional limits as control taxation for a city or town of like population. Likewise such Charter may provide for the governing board of the county subject to existing Constitutional and statutory provisions to define, create and administer districts, and have and exercise the powers and authority granted by the Constitution and laws relative to the same.

"(7). No provision of this Constitution inconsistent with the provisions of this Section 3, of Article IX, shall be held to control the provisions of a Charter adopted hereunder, and conforming herewith. Charters adopted hereunder shall make appropriate provision for the abandonment, revocation, and amendment thereof, subject only to the requirements that there must be a favoring majority of the vote cast upon such a proposal, by the qualified resident electors of the county; and, no Charter may forbid amendments thereof for a time greater than two (2) years. The provisions hereof shall be self-executing, subject only to the duty of the Legislature to pass all laws (consistent herewith) which may be necessary to carry out the intent and purpose hereof. Further, the Legislature shall prescribe a procedure for submitting to decision, by a majority vote of the electors voting thereon proposed alternate and elective Charter provisions."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1933, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"For the Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas, adding Section 3, providing authority for the adoption of a Home Rule Charter by the voters in counties having a population of sixty-two thousand (62,000) or more, to effect more sufficient and economical gov-

Each voter shall scratch out one of the above listed clauses on such ballot, leaving unscratched that particular clause which expresses his vote on the proposed Amendment to which it relates.

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Floyd County Pros Unite In Effort To Keep County Dry

Committees were appointed and primary plans laid for action in a drive against the legalization of 3.2 percent beer and the repeal of the eighteenth amendment by the prohibition forces of Floyd County. The meeting was held Saturday afternoon in the district court room. Rev. G. W. Tubbs, chairman temporarily, was elected as permanent county chairman of the drive, which it is planned will be made from now until August 26 when the beer question will be voted on in Texas.

In the plan as outlined in the discussions Saturday the county will be canvassed and united in the following manner: An executive committee of twelve from various communities of the county for each of the voting precincts in the county. The voting precinct committees will have charge locally in the anti-beer-liquor-saloon drive.

Name Executive Committee The county prohibition committee composed of Rev. Willis J. Ray, of Lockney, G. W. Tubbs, H. G. McChesney, and Tom W. Deen of Floydada appointed the twelve members of the executive committee. Tom W. Deen was elected as secretary of the county committee.

Members of the executive board and their locality are: Floydada—D. I. Bolding; Lockney, L. A. Cooper; McCoy, P. H. Pharr; Sterley, Prof. W. E. Grimes; Dougherty, Mrs. Walter Newell; South Plains, Chas. Knierim; Sandhill, Tom McLain; Carr's Chapel, Mather Carr; Lakeview, Claude Patton; Aiken, Mrs. G. M. Tate; Fairview, Olin S. Miller and Center, W. B. Jordan.

A committee of three people, men and women, will be selected for each of the community voting places in the county. An appeal is being broadcast to the communities to unite in this effort. There will be a separate committee in charge of both Lockney and Floydada.

Attendance at the first county wide prohibition rally included some forty men and women. This number included representative pastors from several church denominations who are making a fight against the 3.2 beer and repeal of the 18th amendment.
