## Testimony Heard In Trial Of V. A. Readhimer, Charged With Slaying

Trial of Vert A. Readhimer, 27, charged jointly with his father J. R. Readhimer, in the slaying on April 6 this year of Stokes Campbell, is underway this week in 99th District court in Lubbock. The case was transferred to Lubbock from Floyd County district court on a change of venue.

The younger Readhimer's trial was severed from that of his father on a defense move Monday. A jury was selected Monday from over a hundred veniremen summoned.

According to testimony brought out by the prosecution Campbell, at that time a senior in Floydada High School, was fatally shot by J. R. and V. A. Readhimer on the late afternoon of April 6. The shooting occurred just in front of the Smith and Smith Sanitarium on South Main street. V. A. Readhimer, according to testimony of eye witnesses, held young Campbell while the elder Readhimer did the shooting.

Description of the fatal shooting was the feature of the state's testimony Tuesday morning. J. V. Jones, eye witness, was the first to take the stand. W. B. Cantrell and Dale Strickland followed in order. Both Cantrell and Strickland were eye witnesses to the slaying.

Six witnesses appeared on the stand for the prosecution Tuesday morning and as the court adjourned for the noon hour, G. E. Hamilton, special prosecutor announced the state had rested its case with the exception of reading the change of venue transcript. The state rested with short testimony from T. J. Campbell, father of the slain youth, who testified briefly regarding the boys age, his height and weight and regarding an eye infection he was suffering from at the time of his death.

Dr. V. Andrews, physician and Lee Mayhew, undertaker, testified as to the wounds found on the boy's body. Both said there were four, two in the small of the back and two in the back of the head.

Two defense witnesses, Lloyd Readhimer, brother of the defendant, and his wife Mrs. Georgie Readhimer, told of how young Campbell had "been going with sister for four or five years" and related incidents leading up to April 5 when the sister, Grace Readhimer, 22, told of "her condition" to the defendant at the home of her grandmother in Amarillo. Both said the girl named the slain youth as the father of her unborn child.

Grace Readhimer, over whose honor the shooting is said to have occurred, occupied the witness stand Wednesday morning and related the story of her "love affair" with Stokes Campbell.

Vert A. Readhimer, defendant, took the stand Wednesday afternoon in his own behalf.

The defendant's testimony followed that of his sister, Grace Readhimer, who sobbed the story of her love affair with the deceased youth and named him as the father of her three-months-old baby which she held in her arms on the stand.

"I was so excited, I just didn't know what happened," the defendant testified upon being questioned about the fatal shooting of the youth after he had related incidents leading up to the affair.

He testified Grace, his sister, had told him that "Stokes was the only boy she ever really could love" and denied knowing that she went with other boys regularly other than Stokes. He told of his sister's visit to her grandmother in Amarillo and of his grandmother coming to see his father several days later and staying two weeks. He said he took her back to Amarillo on April 5 and it was on that day that he learned of his sister's condition.

Recalling his sister's conversation, the defendant began sobbing and placed a handkerchief over his face. He said, "It just tore me all to pieces."

He said he told his sister he believed he could go to Stokes and get him to do the right thing.

He said breaking the news to his father and mother, "just tore them to pieces," and described how his mother screamed and cried. He testified as to the conversation among members of the family and how they had decided to get Stokes to marry the girl.

They drove to Floydada, and met Stokes.

"I saw Stokes hit papa up side the head and kinda knock him to his knees," the defendant said. "And I saw Stokes bending over papa and I run up and got hold of Stokes and tried to pull him off but couldn't get him loose. . . I got hold of his right arm and whirled him around and then I heard some shots. When I heard them shots, it scared me and I was so excited I just really don't know what happened."

### 644 APPLICATIONS FOR WHEAT CONTRACTS ARE RECEIVED

A check up made by Glen A. Lindsey, county farm agent, and his assistants yesterday revealed that a total of 644 wheat acreage contracts applications had been received by the Floydada association from Floyd County wheat farmers.

A total average of 1,288,067 bushels of wheat is represented and accounted for in these applications. Average acreage represented is 135.318. The average yearly yield of those who have signed applications is 8.64 bushels.

Approximately three fourths of the farmers in the county not signing contracts have been checked as to average acreage, production and averages. On these not signing the average yield per seeded acre was 6.57 bushels. The average yield per acre for all, including those signed and those not signed up, is 8.2 bushels. These averages are taken over the 1930-31-32 period.

### CASEY WILL START FOR PRISON TODAY

Sau Angelo, Oct. 18.—Will Casey, Coleman county farmer under two years sentence for harboring George (Machine Gun) Kelly, will leave here tomorrow in custody of W. L. Holmesley, U. S. deputy marshal, for Abilene and will be taken there Friday to Leavenworth, Kansas.

Cass Coleman a co-defendant with Casey, who pleaded guilty and was sentenced to a year and a day, will remain here to be called for later in the week a marshal from Memphis, Tenn. Coleman is to be in Memphis Monday for the trial of Langford Ramsey, youthful attorney, who is under indictment on charges of aiding Kelly. Coleman said that Ramsey came to his Coleman county farm and asked for the \$73,250 in Urschel ransom money which was buried there to be delivered to Kelly. Coleman refused. Ramsey was arrested at Memphis shortly after Kelly's capture there. He is a brother of a former wife of Kelly's. Coleman is Kathryn Kelly's uncle.

**Wheat Review Board To Have Farmer Member**

Farmers familiar with conditions in the wheat producing regions of the country will be among members of the "county acceptance organization" a review board which will give final inspection to acreage-reduction contracts when the contracts are sent to Washington, it was announced today by the wheat section of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

George E. Farrell, associate chief of the wheat section, today announced plans for the organization to review county records and contracts. The board will include farmers, statisticians, and extension service workers from the principal wheat States.

"With these men from the major wheat areas on the board, farmers may be certain that the records from their counties will receive sympathetic and informed consideration," Mr. Farrell said.

"The record of each county will be accepted as a unit; the county records will be considered in the order in which they are received," the wheat section head announced.

"After the county wheat production control association has made the individual farm allotments and contracts have been signed, the applications contracts and association records are forwarded to Washington, where the acceptance board will check the county totals of farmers who participate, the total acreage involved, and also the acreage not included in the wheat program. Another item which the board will check is the budget adopted by the county association. This is done to insure that expense to farmers in every county is held to a minimum.

"In addition to checking county totals, the board will review in detail a number of contracts selected at random from each county. "As each county is accepted, it will be given a number, and adjustment payments under the program will be paid in the order in which the county records are approved. If for any reason a county report cannot be accepted, the member of the board who is from the area in which the county is located will be given an opportunity to present the case to the board.

"Rejected county reports will be returned to the county for correction when necessary. Such rejected reports will not receive a number until they are corrected in the county, sent back to Washington, and given final approval by the county acceptance organization."

**Public Works Program Must Reckon With Old Jack Frost**



The Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works is fighting a battle with frost in its drive to move men from relief rolls to pay rolls. Recognizing early that the advent of winter would cripple some types of construction, the Administration has stressed the necessity of speed in getting work-creating projects in the Northern States started.

Studies were made and the above map drawn and distributed to the farflung State organization of Public Works, showing how the South-ward sweep of winter would handi- cap actual construction and the need of fast action.

The map is based upon United States Weather Bureau statistics. The lower line was plotted as the

upper limit of the area in which the mean daily winter temperature was above 30 degrees fahrenheit from December through February, inclusive. It was assumed that where this condition existed the ground freezing would be negligible, and work could be carried on without difficulty for the entire year.

The other lines plotted showing by 15 day periods the average date when the daily mean temperature falls below 32 degrees fahrenheit. It was assumed that after this date the ground would be frozen and construction work involving trenching or foundation work would have to be stopped or carried on under adverse conditions.

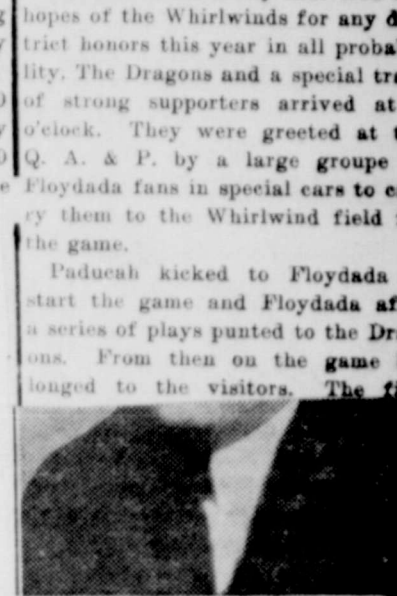
Paducah kicked to Floydada to start the game and Floydada after a series of plays punted to the Dragons. From then on the game belonged to the visitors. The first

State Health Department Issues Warnings in Regard To Scarlet Fever

Austin, Texas.—The State Department of Health has just issued a warning in regard to scarlet fever, as the number of cases usually increase during the fall months. Last year over twenty-six hundred cases were reported in Texas. The majority of deaths occur from October through February.

Scarlet fever is a very contagious and serious disease. Grown people may catch scarlet fever, but children under 15 years are most likely to have it, if exposed. It is especially dangerous for children under five years, and for babies. Do not let your children take any chances with scarlet fever. Call the doctor as soon as the symptoms appear.

If your child is going to have scarlet fever, the first signs you may notice are that he seems tired, restless and out of sorts. Usually, there is a sore throat, chill, vomiting, or convulsion. The child has fever. His skin is dry and hot. His tongue is furred, and, under this white covering, it is red and swollen. In ordinary cases, these early signs are followed in a day or two by a rash. Little flat red points, close together, appear first on the neck and chest. Soon the rash is over most of the body and brilliant in color.

The doctor is required by law to report the case to the local health officer. Do your part by following carefully the quarantine instructions which the health officer will give you. Children who have had scarlet fever, or who have been exposed, must not return to school until permission is given by the health officer and physician. A severe or fatal case of scarlet fever may develop from contact with some one who has only a light attack.

**Young Pullets Should Be Placed in Laying Pens Before Laying Period**

It is important to have pullets in their laying quarters at least two or three weeks before they start laying. A radical change in their environment after they start laying may lead to a moult which, possibly will postpone egg production for some considerable time. As pullets are usually more profitable than hens, it will pay to allow at least one week for the birds in order to allow sufficient room for the incoming pullets. It does not pay to overcrowd these layers but, if there is any question about allowing sufficient floor space, it is better to crowd the older birds than to allow insufficient room for the pullets.

Perhaps the most important consideration in the prevention of cannibalism in pullets is the amount of space allowed per bird. For general purpose or heavy breeds, it is best to allow four square feet per bird. For Leghorns, three and a half square feet per bird if penned up during the winter and three square feet if the birds run out year round, is standard. Less space per bird is needed in large flocks than in small ones. More pullets can be housed successfully in a given area as the pullets are more susceptible to colds than are hens and, as has already been mentioned, are more liable to become cannibalistic. It is also important to allow at least one nest to each four or five pullets.

Before the pullets are placed in their laying quarters the house must be free from disease and parasites. A mixture of boiling water and household lye is commonly used, at the rate of one pound of lye to forty gallons of water. The hot lye solution, applied as near the boiling point as possible, helps to remove dried manure and dirt that may be on the floor, walls and equipment of the house. Following the washing, it is advisable to apply a spray containing some good disinfectant. There are many disinfectants on the market suitable for poultry houses. In purchasing disinfectants, it is advisable to note the phenol coefficient of the materials, as disinfectants are rated by a comparison of their germ-killing power with carbolic acid. Pine oil disinfectants have been found to be very effective germ killers.

In addition to the elimination of diseased or apparently diseased birds at the time the pullets are housed, many poultrymen take precautions of vaccination against chicken pox and the treatment of the pullets for intestinal parasites while they are still on range.

Pullets require careful supervision at the time they are first put into their laying quarters. It is usually necessary to give them some assistance in becoming accustomed to the roosts.

An epidemic of Fall colds often starts by allowing pullets to spend the night on the floor, huddled into a corner, on or in the nests, on the rafters of the house, or even in the windows at the front of the house.

**Weekly Cotton Grade and Staple Report For Week Ending October 12**

The most significant feature revealed by the report showing the grade and staple of Texas cotton classed this week was the big increase in the proportion of cotton equivalent to the Spotted and Yellow Tinged Standards. Week before last only 13 per cent of the cotton was classed as equivalent to those designations; last week 34 per cent of the cotton was equivalent to the Spotted and Yellow Tinged Standards, and this week 50 per cent of the cotton classed from Texas was of those designations. The proportion of cotton classed on the Extra White Standards for the past weeks and this week shows little change. This week 14 per cent of the cotton was classed as equivalent to the Extra White Standards. There has been a consistent decline in the proportion of the higher grades of the White Standards. This week only 17 per cent of the cotton was White Strict Middling compared with 33 per cent week before last. White Middling made up only 10 per cent of the cotton classed this week compared with 27 per cent week before last. However, there was a decline in the proportion of White Strict Low Middling cotton during the last week. There was a small increase in cotton classed as equivalent to the grades White Strict Good Ordinary and Good Ordinary this week.

In District Two, the high plains of West and Northwest Texas, 55 per cent of the cotton was found to be Strict Middling and better of the Extra White and White Standards this week compared with 53 per cent to date. Thirty-two per cent of the cotton was equal to the Spotted and Yellow Tinged Standards this week compared with 29 per cent to date. There has been very little change in the distribution of the staple lengths for that section. About 74 per cent was 7-8 inch and longer, and 57 per cent was 7-8 to 29-32 inch in staple length this week. There was an increase in untenderable cotton.
